## TOSSUP 1

This taxonomic group is notable for the water vascular system which is used in gas exchange, feeding, and locomotion and which, along with the calcareous spines and plates that form a skeleton just under the skin, help to define this exclusively marine group of invertebrates which generally shows pentaradial symmetry as adulthood is reached. #### TOSSUP 2

The composition of its central, and most celebrated, panel was copied from Giotto's Ascencion of St. John the Evangelist. In the four corners are violent scenes of Haman's death, the Brazen Serpent, and the decapitations of Goliath and Holofernes. Its central narrative extends from the primordial void in the east to Noah's drunkenness in the west, while the lunettes depict ancestors of Christ, prophets, and pagan sibyls. FTP, what 5800-square foot fresco is located 70 feet overhead within the Vatican museums?

## TOSSUP 3

She grew up in Worcester, Massachusetts, where her father ran a stationery store. In her senior year at Mount Holyoke, she attended a lecture by Florence Kelley which inspired her to enter a political career, and she joined the Democratic party at the urging of Al Smith. Smith's successor as Governor of New York would win the presidency and appoint her to his Cabinet. FTP, name FDR's Labor Secretary.

#### TOSSUP 4

Chinua Achebe called this work the perfect example of racism in the English novel. It tells of a journey like traveling to the earliest beginnings of the world. After being held up at a run-down customs station, the narrator, Marlow, sets out to find the company's most successful ivory trader; when he finally succeeds, he is greeted by weird rituals and severed heads on stakes. FTP, identify this story of the search for Mr. Kurtz.

## TOSSUP 5

The protagonist is a man of the 80s who is down with the ladies. After administering the title substance to his dog, Spuds Mackenzie and Alex from Strohs were breaking down his door. It is necessary to ensure that a girl is pure before using it, as he discovered from his encounter with the transvestite Sheena. FTP what is this 1989 Tone Loc song about a drug better than any alcohol or aphrodisiac?

#### TOSSUP 6

A quantitative theory of this concept was developed independently by Marian Smoluchowski and Albert Einstein. It was originally observed in particles suspended in pockets of fluid inside pollen grains; later experiments showed that it became faster and the particles moved farther when the temperature was raised, the fluid's viscosity lowered, or the average particle size reduced. FTP identify this erratic zig-zag motion first noted by an English botanist.

## TOSSUP 7

Born in Spain, this religious philosopher is sometimes known as Rambam (Rom-bomb). The author of the Strong Hand, an organization of Jewish oral law, he settled in Cairo in 1165 and became physician to Saladin. He attempted to reconcile Aristotle's theories with Jewish theology in his work \_The Guide to the Perplexed\_. FTP, who is this rabbi and philosopher?

## TOSSUP 8

The event which inspired this novel took place at Big Moose Lake in 1906. After a deadly accident in the Midwest, the protagonist moves to New York, where he seduces a poor co-worker but falls in love with an upper-class girl; he plans to kill his pregnant lover, then changes his mind, but lets her drown and is convicted of murder. Grace Brown and Chester Gillette become Roberta Alden and Clyde Griffiths in -- FTP -- what Theodore Dreiser novel?

#### TOSSUP 9

In 1966 he was named institute professor of economics at MIT. He has served as a consultant to the Rand Corporation and Federal Reserve Board, an advisor to presidents Kennedy and Johnson, and a columnist for Newsweek. Yet he is best known for a work which expounds in mathematical and quantitative terms his middle-of-the-road economic philosophy. FTP, name the Nobel-winning author of the textbook Economics: An Introductory Analysis.

# TOSSUP 10

His 63rd birthday was recently celebrated in a sports stadium where the Badia forces cheered in front of thousands of spectators of both Bedouin and Palestinian descent. He was not present, but his elder brother, the Crown Prince Hassan, was there. "God willing I very soon will be with you again," said this man, the last four months of whose nearly fifty-year reign have been spent at the Mayo Clinic. FTP, name this Hashemite king.

#### TOSSUP 11

All the 114 hymns in the ninth book of the Rig Veda are invocations in his honor. Later representing the moon, he was originally a sort of Hindu Bacchus, and gave his name to an intoxicating drink brewed by priests from the juice of a plant and drunk by Brahmins. To drink it means to become immortal. FTP name this substance and you also name the mass pleasure provider in Aldous Huxley's \_Brave New World\_.

#### TOSSUP 12

When the man who commissioned this painting became a baronet in 1803, he requested that his coat of arms contain Neptune with his trident at the apex, and a picture of a right leg in the top left corner. In the picture, a sailor throws him a rope, while the oarsmen row furiously and a man in the prow is about to thrust a hook into the beast. FTP, what is this John Singleton Copley painting depicting a 1749 fish attack in Cuba?

#### TOSSUP 13

This republic is a group of islands divided into the Barlavento and Sotavento groups, the latter of which contains Sao Tiago, where the capital is located.

Discovered in 1546 by Luigi da Cadamosto, it gained independence from Portugal in 1975, and a later movement for union with Guinea-Bissau proved unsuccessful. FTP, what republic west of Senegal has its capital at Praia? Answer: \_CAPE VERDE\_ Islands

#### TOSSUP 14

Rulers in this dynasty include the Mad Caliph Al-Hakim, who tried to make Shiism the orthodox religion of Egypt, and Al-Mustadi, who lost Jerusalem to the crusaders in 1099. Claiming descent from the caliph Ali, they rose to power as a result of Shiite propaganda among the Berbers. FTP, what dynasty, succeeded by the Ayyubids under Saladin, is named for the daughter of Mohammed?

### TOSSUP 15
