1. He cited the fact that he had lived -- at various times -- in Illinois and in Wisconsin which had both outlawed slavery because of the Northwest Ordinance and the Missouri Compromise respectively. A St. Louis county court accepted his position but the Missouri Supreme Court overruled the decision and when the case went to the U.S. Supreme Court, Roger Taney went ballistic and said that Blacks were not citizens at all. For 10 points, who was this man on the wrong end of a horrible landmark decision in 1856-57.

Answer: Dred Scott

2. Paper and pencil ready: Let's say that you are playing in an NAQT match. Your team correctly answers 3 power toss ups, 6 regular toss ups and commits 4 neg fives. Your team also averages exactly 20 points for every bonus that you are asked. For 10 points, what is your team's final score at the end of the game? You have 10 seconds.

Answer: 265 points (45 + 60 - 20 + 180 = 265)

3. In March of 1998, he criticized colleagues for their reluctance to test promising drugs that might help in the fight against AIDS. And though he resigned from the World Health Organization in 1990, he was on his way to a WHO meeting in Geneva when the plane that he was traveling on crashed in the Atlantic Ocean. For 10 points, name this pioneering fighter of AIDS who died in the Swissair Flight 111 crash in September of 1998.

4. Some may be zigzagged to look like a flower -- thus attracting insects to it. Others may be fashioned like a net so that bubbles can be put in it to be used as an air supply. The materials to make them are usually 3000 times thinner than a human hair but relatively stronger than steel. For 10 points what are these structures that are homes to 8 legged creepy crawlies?

Answer: Spiderwebs

5. It was an obvious Pac Man ripoff. But this game went a bit further. Although the bonus items were a bit more abstract like paper clips -- the actual game board made more sense since it was littered with cheese bits that your protagonist ate up and dog bones served as the equivalent of energizers and low and behold -- you turned into a dog and could chew on the cats that pursued you. For 10 points, what was this classic video game released by Exidy that also was the name of a classic 1970's board game?

Answer: Mouse Trap

6. Born in 1577, he served for 8 years as court painter to the duke of Mantua before returning to Antwerp where he was crowned as the greatest painter of his country. He was also one of the greatest teachers, as he taught Van Dyck the craft and in all -- 2000 canvases came from his studios. For 10 points, name this Flemish painter of Raising of the Cross, Descent from the Cross and The Judgement of Paris.

Answer: Peter Paul Rubens

7. One terminus of it is at Cape May near the United States Coast Guard Receiving Center. From there it goes Northeast over the great Egg harbor, by Atlantic City International, over the Mullica River, near the Forsythe National Wildlife Reserve, still further north through Monmouth and Middlesex Counties, smack dab through Paramus and up to New York. For 10 points, this is what highway, so named because it holds the nickname of the state that it traverses -- that state being New Jersey.

Answer: The Garden State Highway

8. "so much depends on <blank> glazed with rain/water beside the white chickens. The object in question was ruminated on in 1923 by a New Jersey pediatrician. For 10 points, what is the title of this poem by William Carlos Williams, a crimson farming tool for transferring materials with ease?

Answer: The Red Wheelbarrow

9. This statistical problem is predicated on an interesting notion. Let's say you have 3 curtains and behind one of the curtains is a prize and behind the other two are lemons. You are asked to pick one. Then the host opens one of the unpicked curtains which contains a lemon and asks you if you want to switch your original pick. Statistically speaking, you should, as you would now have a 2/3 probability of claiming the prize. This problem, named after the Game Show host who provided these choices on a regular basis on TV, caused a minor statistical scandal with its truth. For 10 points, what is this problem named after the host of Let's Make a Deal.

Answer: The Monty Hall Problem (Prompt on Let's Make a Deal)

10. At any one time, she could breathe a combination of Fire, Lightning, Poisonous Chlorine gas, Acid and Cold upon her enemies. In the cartoon Dungeons and Dragons, she often fought with the overlord Venger but she also pursued the kids every now and then. In Babylonian mythos, she fought against Marduk. For 10 points, name this 5 headed beast, the queen of the evil dragons.

Answer: Tiamat

11. Its city-states such as Erech, Kish and Lagash developed into considerably powerful political entities at around 3000 B.C. Using irrigated agriculture, making pottery and working metal objects, and inventing cuneiform, this civilization thrived until it was conquered by Semitic Rivals like Akkad. For 10 points, name this southern mesopotamian culture whose most notable city-state is Ur.

Answer: Sumer or Sumeria (prompt on Mesopotamia)

12. Born ca. 1906 in Mobile, Alabama, he played in as many as 2,500 games and was credited with more than 50 no-hitters. He finally joined the Cleveland Indians when he was over 40 years old in 1948, one year after the Major Leagues allowed integration of baseball teams. For 10 points, name this man who went by either his real first name Leroy or his nickname "Satchell."

Answer: (Leroy) "Satchell" Paige

13. With the recent outbreaks of tornadoes, meteorologists are reconsidering how they study and classify these phenomena. In particular -- their use of the Fujita scale may be changed because of the occasional "supertornado" that has wind speeds and destructive capabilities far beyond the rest of the strongest twisters. Therefore -- scientists are considering adding -- for 10 points -- what new number to the Fujita scale that will truly give credit to these supertwisters?

Answer: F - 6 (Prompt on early buzz of Fujita)

14. A roll-out tie dispenser. An invisible coffee table. A cologne that smells like the beach. A bra for chesty men. A car equipped with a periscope. Adding a garbage disposal to the shower drain to save on food prep time. For 10 points -- these were all ideas dreamed up by what neurotic New York resident, now in jail for a year with three of his closest companions?

Answer: Cosmo Kramer (prompt on "Seinfeld")

15. He put a curse on anyone that planned to rebuild Jericho, warning that when the foundation was laid, the builder's oldest son would die, and when the gates were set up, his youngest son would die. For 10 points, name this successor of Moses as the leader of Israel.

Answer: Joshua

16. This short story came as a result of the authors misadventures on the way to covering an insurrection in Cuba in 1897. The accompanying notes call it "A Tale Intended to be after the Fact: being the experience of Four Men from the Sunk Steamer Commodore." For 10 points, name this short story published 2 years before its author -- Stephen Crane -- died.

Answer: The Open Boat

17. In 1998, health care providers went into deliberations. But temporary policies have decided to cover 6 to 12 pills per month. One company estimated that unlimited coverage would cost \$100 million dollars per year. But the old saying you have to pay to play is still true -- especially if playing means sex and you are impotent. For 10 points, what is this new hottest drug on the market?

Answer: Viagra

18. Two answers required. Have you so quickly forgotten Article 1, section 1 of the U.S. Constitution? Let me remind you that it states that "All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States which shall consist of "-- for 10 points -- what two elements that comprise its bicameralism?

Answer: The Senate and The House of Representatives (prompt on partial answer)

19. The agent to the British one -- Robert Clive -- defeated the French one at which point Warren Hastings became governor general of British India. The Dutch one lasted for 196 years and was a master of subduing local rulers of such places as Ceylon, Malaya and Indonesia. For 10 points, give the common three words that follow all of these trading companies in the 17th through 19th centuries in Europe.

Answer: East India Company (Prompt on Partial Answer)

20. Phillip Lenard, the 1905 Nobel Prize winner in Physics, was one of the first to investigate this effect -- though his Nobel was awarded for other work. It took another scientist 16 years to win a Nobel for his research done in investigating this, research done ironically in 1905. For 10 points, what is this phenomenon that occurs when ultraviolet light falls on some metals, causing electron emission -- studied also by Albert Einstein?

Answer: The photoelectric effect

21. It sounds like a good meal: A Giant Hamburger with Pickle Attached, Slice of Iced Layer Cake, and Ice Cream Cone. Or how about a Chocolate Icicle the size of a skyscraper. This artist would have you consume these things to go along with his crazy world of Soft Objects and Ghost Typewriters. For 10 points, name this pop art sculptor.

Answer: Claes Oldenburg

22. He is a short, pot-bellied rustic, full of common sense but without a grain of "spirituality." He is also famous for his proverbs. For 10 points, identify this character, whose name in Spanish means paunch, a Cervantes creation and squire of Don Quixote.

Answer: Sancho Panza

23. It is the center of an agricultural area and a resort town located across the U.S. border from Catexico, California. For 10 points, name this city in NorthWest Mexico, the capital of the state of Baja California.

Answer: Mexicali

24. If Linda Blair -- possessed by the devil -- were to go to court today for killing someone, she'd get life in prison, just like this defendant who claimed to be possessed by demons which caused him to kill his mother. For 10 points, name this possibly insane, possibly repentant murderer from Pearl Mississippi.

Answer: Luke Woodham

Answer: Antipholus

Answer: Dromio

C. For 5 each, what two cities are each home to one Antipholus and one Dromio?

Answers: Ephesus

Answer: Benjamin O. Davis Sr. (accept equivalents)

Answer: Abraxas

5 Steve Miller Band had a hit with this song in their early 80's where they rhymed the word with "I wanna reach out an grab ya."

Answer: Abacadabra
