TOSSUPS

TOSSUP 1

His essay "The Player on the Other Side" inspired an Ellery Queen novel of the same title where the detective is pitted against his "dark self". Later works of this British author, who died on the same day as John F. Kennedy, reflect his distrust of 20th century political and technological trends and his experimentation with hallucinogenic drugs such as mescaline. FTP, who is this author of "The Doors of Perception" and "Brave New World"?

Answer: _A_ldous _HUXLEY_

TOSSUP 2

Warning: Two answers required.

Geoffrey of Monmouth concatenated these names to identify a giant Cornish chieftain. Another legend applies them to two wooden effigies in the Guildhall in London representing survivors of a giant race destroyed by Brutus the Trojan. Biblically, it is not clear if they describe a king and his land or two independent states. FTP, what are these two hostile powers, which according to the book of Revelation are the nations led to war by Satan?

Answer: _GOG_ and _MAGOG

TOSSUP 3

This culture flourished in Iran and northern India around 1000 BC and produced the Vedas and the Ramayana. Their name came from the Sanskrit for "noble", as they used this term to distinguish themselves from the native Dravidians. To 19th century linguists the name was synonymous to "Indo-European", but some ethnologists applied it to an elevated Nordic civilization. FTP, what is this culture whose name was used by the Third Reich to describe their "superior race"?

Answer: _ARYAN_

TOSSUP 4

Bssed on the novel "D'Entre les Morts", one of the many visual effects in this 1958 movie was the addition of a bell tower to the San Juan Batista mission through trick photography. Another was the combination of foward zoom and reverse tracking to convey a sense of dizziness to the audience. FTP, what Alfred Hitchcock movie starred Jimmy Stewart as a retired police detective stricken with a paralyzing fear of heights?

Answer: _VERTIGO_

TOSSUP 5

In "Fight the Future", it served as the cover story concealing the alien contagion in a Texas town. The first version isolated in the U.S. was originally christened the Muerto Canyon Virus but was later

changed to the Sin Nombre Virus, and victims of this antigen are stricken by an eponymous pulmonary syndrome. The Four Corners Outbreak on a Navajo reservation in 1993 was caused, FTP, by what infectious agent carried by rodent fecal matter?

Answer: HANTAVIRUS_

TOSSUP 6

On December 11, 1576, it was publically condemned by the Republic of Venice, and the Catholic Church later declared it a gambling device. Ironically, the first organized leagues for this sport formed in France. The three main styles of play are puntata, "gentle"; volo, "strong flying"; and raffa, "strong smash," but all have the goal of closely approaching the pallino. FTP, what is this sport of Italian lawn bowling?

Answer: BOCCE

TOSSUP 7

Contrary to rumor, this piece of legislation is not up for Congressional renewal in 2007, but lawmakers _will_ be voting to repeal its preclearance clause. It was passed in the aftermath of the protest marches held by the SNCC at the Edmund Pettus Bridge outside Selma, Alabama. Proposed by Lyndon Johnson, FTP, what is this act which allows federal intervention in state registration processes and also bans literacy tests?

Answer: _VOTING RIGHTS ACT_ of _1965_

TOSSUP 8

This 16th and 17th century musical form develops one or more themes through melodic imitation. Its name comes from the Italian for "seek out". Venetian composers such as Andrea Gabrieli were particularly adept at using stretto, augmentation, and diminution to expound upon a simple theme. It is itself a recurring theme in Douglas Hofstader's "Godel, Escher, Bach." FTP, name this musical form, perhaps best known from the seven-part example created by Bach for "The Musical Offering".

Answer: _RICERCAR_ (or _RICERCARI_ or _RICERCARE_)

TOSSUP 9

In September this former Green Beret was hospitalized after a failed suicide attempt. The developer of the "constitutional covenant community" Almost Heaven and the host of the radio talk show "Freedom Calls", he lead team of searchers in North Carolina in pursuit of Eric Rudolph. FTP, who is this leader of the Patriot Movement who acted as a negotiator during the Montana Freeman standoff and the Ruby Ridge siege?

Answer: James "Bo" GRITZ

TOSSUP 10

During WWII, he led a group of scientists at the Research Laboratory for Electronics at MIT who helped in the development of radar. Later, he originated the concept of CERN and was one of the founders of Brookhaven National Labs. In 1938, he pioneered a method for studying the magnetic properties of atoms based on the measurement of nuclear

proton spin. FTP, who won the 1944 Nobel Physics Prize for his work on atomic and molecular beam magnetic resonance?

Answer: Isador _RABI_

TOSSUP 11

He served briefly as an Iranian delegate to the United Nations in 1988 but soon after was severely injured in a helicopter accident. Canonically his criminal career began as the Red Hood, but he later switched to a more familiar guise after a disfiguring accident. Portrayed in the movies by Cesar Romero and Jack Nicholson, FTP, who is this psychotic arch-enemy of Batman who looks like a clown?

Answer: the _JOKER_

TOSSUP 12

At the age of 20, he undertook his first voyage to the East as the second mate aboard the Judea, a coal ship which exploded en route to Bangkok. Later in life while stationed near Aden, he befriends a young mate named Jim from the sunken ship Patna. Another time, his aunt got him a comission to captain a Belgian river steamer in the Congo. FTP, name this narrator of Joseph Conrad's "Lord Jim", "Youth", and "Heart of Darkness".

Answer: Charlie _MARLOW_

TOSSUP 13

Possible creators of them include the Paracus people who inhabited the region until 300 BC and the Ayacucho settlers who arrived in 630. Etched into the desert mesas of the Pampa Colorada, the German mathematician Maria Reiche spearheaded their preservation movement for over 40 years. Including spirals, a bird and a monkey, FTP, what are these large, aerially visible designs in Peru which are believed to be a pre-Incan astronomical calendar?

Answer: _NAZCA LINES_

TOSSUP 14

Otto Rank theorized that it was the guiding force in personality development and that it controlled a person's instinctual drives. Arthur Schopenhauer belived that this corresponded to Kant's ding-an-sich, and in "Philosophical Fragments", Kierkegaard presented Christanity as a form of existence which presupposes the free version of it. FTP, what is this human attribute which characterizes volition?

Answer: _WILL_

TOSSUP 15

Among the casualties was Lady Alice Lisle, who was beheaded for harboring rebels. It occured after the Battle of Sedgemoor when James II established a court to prosecute members of the "pitchfork army." Of those convicted, 320 were executed by the hangman Jack Ketch and 800 others were sentanced to penal servitude in Barbados by Lord Chief Justice George Jeffreys. FTP, what were these English county trials held in 1685 after the collapse of Monmouth's Rebellion?

Answer: _BLOODY ASSIZES_

TOSSUP 16

Better known by contemporaries for their political views than their verse, this group's "The Anarchiad" adopted the style of Butler and Pope to criticize states which were slow to ratify the Constitution. Advocates of a strong central government and opponents of Jeffersonian democracy, most of their leaders were graduates of Yale. FTP, what was this group of Federalist poets which included John Trumbell and Joel Barlow?

Answer: _HARTFORD WITS_ or _CONNECTICUT WITS_

TOSSUP 17

The earliest example still in existance was made in France by Nicphore Niepce in February 1827, and depicts a portrait of Cardinal d'Amboise. In England, two Englishmen, Thomas Wedgwood and William Henry Fox Talbot developed it using paper soaked in a mix of sodium chloride and silver nitrate. Meanwile, back in France, Niepce's work was advanced by his partner, who developed a process using silver iodide and named it after himself. FTP, what is this invention, popularised by the Frenchman Daguerre?

Answer: _PHOTOGRAPHY_

TOSSUP 18

It began as a spa, called Aquisgranum by the Romans. It suffered heavy damage during WWII, and, on Oct. 20, 1944, it was the first major German City to fall to the Allies. Fortunately, its cathedral suffered minimal damage. It includes the Palace Chapel that dates back to 790 AD and features a Chandelier presented by Frederick I Barbarossa in 1168. FTP, name this city, burial site of Charlemagne.

Answer: AACHEN (or AKEN or AIX-LACHAPELLE_)

TOSSUP 19

Coleridge, Samuel Taylor, by Thomas De Quincey in the 8th edition. Yosemite, by John Muir in the 10th edition. Americanism, by H.L. Mencken, and Conjuring by Harry Houdini, both in the 13th edition. Ether by James Clerk Maxwell in the 9th edition. All of these articles appeared in editions of, FTP, what Encyclopedia that dates back to 1768?

Answer: _ENCYCLOPAEDIA BRITANNICA_

TOSSUP 20

He wrote his first newspaper editorial, on the Spanish Civil War, at age 10, and claims to have rejected Marxism for anarchism at age 12. Despite the influence of his father's noted work in Hebrew grammar, he claims to have fallen into linguistics for lack of anything better to do. Regardless, he took to the field, eventually publishing "Syntactic Structures" in 1978. FTP, name this linguist and political commentator, perhaps the first to speak the sentence "colorless green ideas sleep furiously."

Answer: Noam _CHOMSKY_

This movement's most fervent supporter and rhetoricist was Feargus O'Connor, but it finally collapsed once and for all after an 1848 organizational meeting was canceled due to bad weather. Taking its name from an 1838 document, it asked for such things as voting by ballot, universal male suffrage and annual Parliaments. FTP, name this movement, which led to several workingmens association riots and was based on the People's Charter.

Answer: _CHARTISM_ or _CHARTIST_ movement

TOSSUP 22

First isolated from the adrenal glands by Albert Szent-Gyorgyi and called "hexuronic acid," it plays a primary role in the synthesis of collagen. It is slowly metabolized in humans, and therefore it takes three to four months of its deficiency in the diet to bring about the visible symptoms of scurvy. FTP, name this compound, found in the Hungarian red pepper and many citrus fruits.

Answer: _ASCORBIC ACID_ or _VITAMIN C_

TOSSUP 23

He moved from his native country to England to do research at Leeds University. His first play, "The Invention", premiered in 1955 while he was a play reader at the Royal Court Theater. He returned to his homeland in 1959 where he produced "The Swamp Dwellers" and "The Lion and the Jewel." For ten points, name this Nigerian playwright, novelist, and poet who won the 1986 Nobel Prize for literature.

Answer: Wole _SOYINKA_

TOSSUP 24

"Picture with a Circle" and "Painting with White Border" are from his earlier stage of abstraction, and they feature fluid lines and indistinct shapes, while his Bauhaus works contain sharp geometric features, as in "Hard in Soft" and "Through-going Line". FTP, identify this member of Der Blaue Reiter and painter of "First Abstract Watercolor."

Answer: Wassily _KANDINSKY_

Identify the quasi-historical Romans FTPE.

A. This ancestor of one of Julius Caesar's assassins drove out Tarquinius Superbus, the last king of Rome, and was elected as one of the first consuls in 509 BC.

BONUS 4

Identify the following from Haitian mythology FTPE.

A. These are a group of divinties who are concerned with the lives of humans and often personify forces of nature. Their leader is the snake-god Damballa.

Answer: LOA_

B. This title for a priestess of a loa cult is shared with a fast and complex Caribbean dance.

Answer: MAMBO_

C. Also known as Ghede, this figure is the traditional intercessor with the dead. He is usually depicted in a top hat, black coat tails, sunglasses, and smoking a cigar.

Answer: _BARON SAMEDI_

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BONUS 5

And now for a bit of astronomy. FTPE, answer the following questions on matters celestial.

A. One of most fundamental aspects of astronomy is the measuring the distance to stellar objects. This process has recently been given a boost by a European Space Agency satellite that compiled precision parallaxes for 120,000 nearby stars and over a million more slightly less accurate measurements. Name it.

C. One of the possible ways to measure the mass density of the universe is by observing the emission of relativistic electrons from galaxy clusters when they scatter off the 2.7 K cosmic background photons. Name this effect.

Answer: _SUNAYAEV-ZEL'DOVICH_ (Soon-NIE-ev Zell-DOUGH-VICH) Effect Also accept: _INVERSE COMPTON_ Scattering (Compton Scattering is not acceptable)

Identify the following figures of speech which begin with the letter "p" from definitions FTPE.

A. Investing abstractions or inanimate objects with human qualities or abilities, such as with anthropomorphism.

A. Vibrational/rotational spectroscopic bands are split into two branches due to the breakdown of the rigid rotor and harmonic oscillator assumptions, each with a one-letter name. For five points each, name these two branches.

B. Four nuclei upon which nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy experiments are based are hydrogen-1, carbon-13, fluorine-19, and phosphorus-31. Each of these nuclei have a common spin. For ten points, identify the value of that spin.

Answer: _ONE-HALF_ (Accept "plus or minus one half")

C. Bond movements which do not change the dipole moment of the molecule do not show up in an infrared spectrum. In order to study such movements, chemists rely on a similar spectroscopic technicque, which scans the same range of the spectrum. For ten points, name this type of spectroscopy.

Answer: _RAMAN_ Spectroscopy

BONUS 18

Answer: Alexander _STEPHENS_ (Savannah, GA March 21, 1861)

C. "I am loath to close. We are not enemies, but friends. We must not be enemies. Though passion may have strained it must not break our bonds of affection."

Answer: Abraham _LINCOLN (1st Inaugural Address, March 4, 1861)

Given a description of a bay, identify it, ftpe.

A. Originally named Stingray harbor by Captain Cook, this is an inlet of the Tasmanian Sea that is about 5 miles across.

B. This inlet of the North Atlantic Sea covers an area of about 86,000 square miles. Bordered to the east by France and the south by Spain, it is fed by the Loire and Garonne rivers.

Answer: Bay of _BISCAY_

C. A shallow inlet of the Indian Ocean, it is bordered by Bangladesh to the north, Sri Lanka to the west, and Burma to the east.

For fifteen points each, name these jazz greats.

A. With his fellow trio members Eldee Young and Red Holt, they scored big with the 1965 instrumental hit, "The In Crowd." Sadly he is currently a morning DJ on a Chicago smooth jazz station.

Answer: Ramsey _LEWIS_

B. Considered Canada's best-known jazz pianist, this Montreal native specialized in bop and swing and had a hit in the 50's with his rendition of "Tenderly."

Answer: Oscar _PETERSON_
