1. Considered by the ancients second only to Homer for his understanding of the human condition, he brought Greek drama from the world of the gods to that of ordinary people. He was particularly noted for the amazing depth he gave to such stock characters as Moschion, Chrysis and Parmenon. Through imitations by Terence and Plautus he exerted a strong influence on comedy through the 17th century. FTP, name this Greek playwright of New Comedy whose only completely extant work is the *Dyskolos* or *Old Cantankerous*.

# Answer: Menander

2.. He holds the career scoring record for his school, which played its home games at Horten Fieldhouse, even though he did not play as a freshman. He was the last American to score in the infamous 1972 Olympic game against the Soviet Union when his two free throws gave the U.S. the lead. After his senior year at Illinois State he was the number one overall pick in the 1973 NBA draft. FTP name this NBA broadcaster whose fiery personality cost him his coaching jobs with the Chicago Bulls and more recently the Detroit Pistons.

# Answer: Doug Collins

3. One granted seats on the judiciary to the equites. The other proposed a land reform bill in 133 B.C.E., ousted fellow tribune Octavius, and was the executor of the will of Attalus III of Pergamum. Both attempted to reform the law in favor of the plebeians, and both got whacked for it. FTP, identify this pair of Roman tribunes and brothers.

# Answer: Gaius and Tiberius Sempronius Gracchus or the Gracchi

4. They share the class Anthozoa with sea anemones. Many exist in a symbiotic relationship with certain algae, which have been documented to increase skeletal growth in high light conditions. FTP, name these animals, the best known for the calcium carbonate skeleton that many of them, most of the order Scleractinia, leave behind.

5.. It was founded in 1718 by John Law's Company of the West. Once home to a branch of the US Mint, it is the second largest US port in tonnage handled. Among the universities located there are Dillard University and Tulane University. FTP identify this city on the Mississippi, the largest in Louisiana.

6. This 1995 film included the work of Allison Anders and Alexandre Rockwell. The soundtrack was performed predominantly by Combustible Edison and some prominent actresses, such as Kathy Griffin, Marisa Tomei, and Salma Hayek, appear in small parts. FTP, name this 1995 film set in the Mon Signor Hotel on New Year's Eve, starring Jennifer Beals, Bruce Willis, Antonio Banderas, Quentin Tarantino, Madonna, and Tim Roth as Ted, the Bellhop.

Born in Persia, her parents moved to Southern Rhodesia in 1924. Her autobiographical series Children of Violence chronicles the intellectual development from childhood in Africa to womanhood in London of Martha Quest. FTP, identify this author of *The Golden Notebook*.

8. Born on January 11, 1815, in Glasgow, Scotland, this conservative was prime minister for two separate periods. Death ended his second period of time in office on June 6, 1891. He was instrumental in putting the 1871 Treaty of Washington together, and was known as the "Old Chieftain". FTP, name Canada's first prime minister.

Answer: Sir John A. Macdonald

9. When reacting Cyanide ions with alkyl halides the reaction becomes increasingly more difficult as the length of the alkyl chain increases. Charles Starks discovered that when he used a small amount of quarternary ammonium salt the reaction could be carried out with rapidly, even for long chains. FTP name this type of catalyst which permits reactions to occur between layers of organic and aqueous solutions.

Answer: phase transfer or interface catalyst

10. The first and last names are the same. One is an MIT educated theoretical physicist, the first African-American Chairman of the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission and a 1998 inductee into the National Women's Hall of Fame. The other is the author of such literary works as "The Bird's Nest," "The Sundial," "The Witchcraft of Salem Village," and "The Lottery." FTP, give the shared name.

Answer: Shirley Jackson

11. One of the quintessential basso buffo roles, he is tied to a chair and threatened with a razor by Zerlina in a low-comedy scene that is almost always cut nowadays. This is but one of many sticky situations he is put into on account of his master, who, as we find out in the famous "Catalogue Aria," has seduced 1003 women in Spain alone. FTP, name this servant of the title character in Mozart's Don Giovanni.

Answer: Leporello

12. Its course was determined by Mungo Park in 1795-7 and John and Richard Lander in 1830. It rises in the Fouta Djallon plateau in the southwest of the Republic of Guinea. From Guinea it flows into Mali where it forms an extensive inland delta, before circling clockwise into Nigeria before eventually emptying into the Gulf of Guinea. FTP, identify this river, the major waterway in western Africa.

Answer: Niger river

13. Born circa 515 BC, this man held that the senses are deceptive and "that which there is to be spoken and thought of must be." Non-contradiction entails that things be timeless, static, homogenous, and continuous, and even that language is inadequate for description as it defines things in opposition. FTP, name this philosopher who holds that non-existence is unintelligible and that "it is" is the only possible coherent statement, and who was the mentor of Zeno.

Answer: Parmenides of Elea

14. He was probably the most famous law clerk in Canada in the early 1970's. Working for peanuts in a Toronto law firm because the Montreal Canadiens were unwilling to meet his financial demands, he sat out the 1973-74 season before returning the next year and posting a mediocre season in the net as the Habs were swept out of the playoffs by Buffalo FTP, name this Cornell-educated lawyer, author and Toronto Maple Leafs general manager who is the only player in NHL history to be named rookie of the year the year after winning the Conn Smythe Trophy as the MVP of the playoffs.

Answer: Ken Dryden

15. The name is the same. Edouard Manet painted his in 1863. Monet started his two years later but was forced to stop painting it when he realized that he could not finish the massive canvas in time for the salon showing. Monet then handed over what he had finished to his landlord to pay for his rent. When he went to reclaim it only two portions of the canvas could be saved from mildew damage. FTP give the name of these similar paintings which depict men and women dinning in the woods.

Answer: Le dejeuner sur l'hurbe or The luncheon on the grass

16. It begins, appropriately enough with "Introduction" and ends with "On Anothers Sorrow." It was first published in 1789 and was the first of the author's "illuminated books." Among the other poems in it are "The Chimney Sweeper," "Night," and "The Lamb.." FTP, identify this collection by William Blake which was reprinted in 1794 with the supplementary Songs of Experience.

Answer: Songs of Innocence

17. Running from 1984 to 1986 this was one of the most popular kid's shows of the eighties. It has been resurrected recently as a new 3D computer generated series. All of the old characters are back, some slightly changed, but still basically the same. Keith, Lance, Hunk, Pidge, and Allura are back from days long ago and uncharted regions of the universe to defend it once again in FTP what series.

Answer: voltron or voltron 3D

18. In 1938, Roy J. Plunkett discovered that a tank that was supposed to be full appear to have no gas in it. Rather than discarding the tank, he cut it open and found the inside coated with waxy white substance. The substance, which was remarkably unreactive, proved quite useful for the gaseous diffusion of uranium hexafluoride. 60 years later, it has become quite a commercial product, best known for its use in non-stick cookware. FTP name this polymer.

Answer: teflon or tetrafluoroethylene

19. On January 29, 1932, its protagonist is sure that "something has happened to me. I can't doubt it any more. It came as an illness does, not like an ordinary certainty, not like anything evident." Much later, while eating in a cafe with the Self-Taught Man, the protagonist experiences the title illness again, tempted to stab a knife through his companion's eye. FTP, name this Jean-Paul Sarte novel, and you name the protagonist's affliction.

Answer: Nausea

20. The 33rd Reconnaissance Battalion of this army holds the world's record for the longest single-day's advance against resistance, 158.7 kilometers, on June 26-27, 1942. It's former commander was in Berlin for his wife's birthday at the time of the Normandy Invasion, and was later nearly killed when his staff car was strafed by a South African air ace in France. FTP, name the German army that fought in the Battles of Tobruk, Gazala, and El Alamein, led by Erwin Rommel.

Answer: Afrika Korps

21. "First: each person is to have an equal right to the most extensive basic liberty compatible with a similar liberty to others. Second: social and economic inequalities are to be arranged so that they both (a) reasonably expected to be to everyone's advantage, and (b) attached to positions and offices open to all." FTP, name the concept, of which these are the two principles, developed as an alternative to utilitarianism in A Theory of Justice by John Rawls.

Answer: distributive justice (accept Two Principles of Justice before the word "concept")

22. Though he died of blood poisoning at the age of 36, his contributions to physics are extensive, including the discovery of radio waves, and demonstrations that they reflected, refracted, and diffracted as do light, and have the same speed as light. FTP, name this physicist, after whom the SI unit of vibration is named.

Answer: Heinrich Hertz

23. Born in Niles, Ohio in 1843, he briefly attended Allegheny University, got a job as a teacher, then joined the Union Army when the Civil War broke out, but only acheived the rank of brevet major of volunteers. After the war, he got a law degree, opened an office in Canton and married Ida Saxton a local banker's daughter. Soon, he became interested in politics, ran for and won a seat in Congress, which he held for 14 years. FTP name this Dead Republican, who then was the Governer of Ohio for two terms before being elected the 25th President of the United States.

Answer: William McKinley

24. It is only the 77<sup>th</sup> most abundant element in the Earth's crust, but its presence is evidence of a meteor that may have wiped out the dinosaurs. Discovered in 1804 by Smithson Tennant, its atomic number is also 77. Contrary to recent ads, FTP, what element does NOT have six dots shaped like the big dipper as its chmical symbol?

Answer: Iridium

25. Late in his life, this man was sent to Algeria by the French government to discredit native priests that used magic to cause a rebellion. He accomplished this by convincing the natives that he could drain the strength of any man with the help of a hollow wooden box with an iron bottom. After they lifted the box once he would turn on an electromagnet beneath the stage, making it impossible to lift again. This was perhaps the best trick of the long and illustrious career of FTP what magician who greatly influenced a young Erich Weiss.

Answer: Jean Eugene Robert Houdini
