FTP, identify this highly desirable layer of real estate approximately thirty six thousand kilometres above the earth's surface.

GEOSYNCHRONOUS ORBIT or _CLARKE ORBIT_ (accept GEOSTATIONARY ORBIT; it's a subset of geosynchronous orbits)

2. This French author discussed adolescent love in Le Ble en Herbe, in which Phil and Vinca discover each other, and Mme Dalleray, by the Breton seashore. She covers an affair between an older woman and a younger man in the novel Cheri. She spent part of her life as a music-hall performer before writing her novels. Name this author who is said to have exclaimed "She is Gigi!" when introduced to Audrey Hepburn.

COLETTE

3. Two answers required. They're certainly not the best of friends, but they'll at least have to learn to share their "winnings." One is a 61-year old Catholic from Londonderry, while the other is a 54-year old Protestant. They are both pleased, however, with the recognition given to their common cause. FTP, name the winners of the 1998 Nobel Peace Prize, for their work in bringing peace to Northern Ireland.

John _HUME_ and David _TRIMBLE_

4. You've probably never heard of a country named Fyrom (FYE-rahm). While the government of this republic, led by President Kiro Gligorov, would have preferred it to have always been known by another name, pressure was exerted by the Greek government to prevent this. Allegedly the preferred name of this nation, along with its original symbol, the star of Vergina, implied a claim on a region of Greece with the same name. FTP, name this former Yugoslav republic which shares its name with the ancient empire ruled by Alexander the Great.

Former Yugoslav Republic of _MACEDONIA_

5. This famous painter died on March 19, 1997 in East Hampton, NY, after a long struggle with Alzheimer's Disease. Sometimes known as the "American Picasso", his series "Woman I-IV" caused a sensation with its with its violent imagery and impulsive, energetic technique. FTP, name this Dutch-born American master who was one of the leading exponents of Abstract Expressionism, particularly the form known as Action painting.

Willem de __KOONING_

6. The dialect of this region is the oldest Semitic dialect still preserved. The northern limit of the region stretched past the modern cities of al-Fallujah and Baghdad. To the south lay Sumer. FTP, name this historical region of central Iraq ruled circa 2300-2150 BC by Sargon and his descendants and which was named after its chief city, Agade.

AKKAD

7. Carolina Cougars, Denver Nuggets, UCLA Bruins, New Jersey Nets, Kansas Jayhawks, San Antonio Spurs, Los Angeles Clippers, Indiana Pacers, Philadephia 76ers. These are the stops in the 26-year coaching career of one of the NBA's most fickle but most successful head coaches. For ten points, name this former University of North Carolina point guard, the only man to lead all four former ABA teams as an NBA head coach.

L_arry_BROWN_

8. This physicist may hold the record for shortest dissertation. In its two pages, this Frenchman made a major theoretical assertion which had never been observed experimentally. The phenomenon he described is now the basis for electron and neutron diffraction, as well as countless freshman physics problems about the wavelength of a fastball. FTP, identify the conceiver of "electron wavelength" recipient of the 1929 Nobel Prize for his theory of matter waves.

Louis-Victor-Pierre-Raymond, duc _DE BROGLIE_

9. In this Booker-Prize winning novel, Seigfried Sassoon protests against the conduct of WWI and ends up in a mental hospital, being treated for war neuroses even though he is completely sane. There he meets Wilfred Owen and forms a friendship with his psychiatrist, who himself suffers from a kind of war neurosis. It belongs to a trilogy, the other two books of which are The Eye in the Door and the Ghost Road. FTP, name this Pat Barker novel which was recently made into a film.

REGENERATION

10. He made it into Princeton's Class of 1917 but never graduated. Born into a wealthy Minnesota family, his Irish heritage gave him a interesting take on the dazzling prospects of American life. He ended up leaving Princeton to serve in the Army, but he never saw action. Instead, he worked on his first novel. The success he met with the novel's publication allowed him to marry Zelda Sayre, the daughter of an Alabama judge. He imitated his characters, living a rich, intoxicating life that led him to breakdown. For 10 points, name this author of _The Last Tycoon_, a novel left unfinished at his death that many critics consider his finest work.

_F_rancis Scott Key _FITZGERALD_

11. Now a province of Pakistan, in the nineteenth century it was the scene of numerous campaigns pitting the British army against tribes such as the Pathans, Mohmands, and Chitralis. FTP, Name this mountainous area shared by Pakistan and Afghanistan.

NORTHWEST FRONTIER

12. This man was the hero of a widely sung U.S. black folk ballad. Writers and artists see in him a symbol of man's foredoomed struggle against the machine. FTP, name this man, and in so doing, the name of the song about a contest with a steam drill in which the title character wins, but afterwards dies "with his hammer in his hand".

John _HENRY_

13. The snood was a traditional Scottish sign of it. In THE STORY OF CIVILIZATION, Will Durant asks what "changed [it] from a fault into a virtue" and answers the question: "Doubtless it was the institution of property." Gregory of Nyssa and Basil of Ancyra wrote entire treatises on it. FTP, name this state of being attributed to King Wenceslas, Saint Cecelia, Elizabeth Tudor, and most academic competition aficionados.

VIRGINITY (prompt on synonyms if answered before the Durant quote)

14. He was portrayed in the 20th century as "sensitive, intelligent, and kindly," but friends of the murdered Travis family probably thought otherwise. When he and his band converged on Jerusalem, Virginia, in 1831, they did not know that they were making history. For 10 points, name this man whose "confessions" helped William Styron win the Pulitzer Prize in 1968.

Nat _TURNER_

15. After exhausting the names of mythological figures, scientists named them after heroines from Wagnerian operas, and then after wives, friends, flowers, cities, colleges, pets, and even favorite desserts. One is named for a computer (NORC). The thousandth one is named Piazzia and number 1001 is Gaussia. Others are named Washingtonia, Hooveria, and Rockefilia. For ten points what are they?

ASTEROIDS

16. He was born in 1864, the son of a widely celebrated horn player who saw to his early musical education. His music forms a bridge between 19th-century German romanticism and the new order of the 20th century. He served briefly in the Nazi regime, but was exonerated in 1948, the year before his death. For ten points, name this composer "Don Juan", "Don Quixote", "Till Eulenspiegel's Merry Pranks" and "Thus Spake Zarathustra".

Richard _STRAUSS_

17. He appears as an English nationalist in Shakespeare's Richard II. The fourth son of Edward III, though he never was king, he did father Henry Bolingbroke, later Henry IV, along with a line of kings and claims to the throne. FTP, identify this man, perhaps more popularly known as the founder of the house of Lancaster.

JOHN OF GAUNT

18. After receiving a through ball at midfield, he was off on a mad individual dash for glory. One of the most memorable moments in the 1998 world cup, this man went left, then right, and fired a shot from the top of the penalty area, beating Argentinian goalie Carlos Roa. Name this 18 yr. old English soccer star.

Michael OWEN

19. He opposed science in favor of the antirational and mystical and postulated change as the basis for all reality. For him, time was a continuous flow in which past and present were inseparable from the memory and consciousness. This theory is perhaps most notably embodied in Proust's Remembrance of Things Past. His chief works include Creative Evolution, Time and Free Will, and Laughter. FTP, name this Jewish/French philosopher.

Henri BERGSON_

20. According to Biblical tradition, this people came from Crete, and evidence now suggests that they came from the Greek archipelago. They formed a confederation of five cities: Ashod, Ascalon, Ekron, Gath, and Gaza. For ten points name these people who so stubbornly held the land of Canaan that it was subsequently named after them.

21. Bounty, Chatham, Campbell, Antipodes, Kermadec, Steward, North, and South, are all islands of, For ten points, what nation of the South Pacific?

NEW ZEALAND

22. Construction of this city began sometime in the late ninth century under king Yasovarman I. It reached its height with the construction of the Great Temple of Suryavarman near the northern shore of Tonle Sap in the twelfth century, and has been decaying ever since. Recently it has served as a hideout for rebels opposing the regime of Heng Samrin. For ten points "wat" is the name of this ancient Khmer capital, home to a famous "wat".

ANGKOR (do not accept Angkor Wat)

23. The bacillus, Yersinia pestis, enters the stomach of Xenopsylla cheopis, the common flea, where it feeds parasitically on blood taken in by the flea and is regurgitated into the

host. The host, usually the European Black Rat, dies quickly and the flea must find another host, often human. The outbreak only ends when there no more hosts or the fleas die out. For ten points what is this disease, which killed 28 percent of all the Cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church in 1348?
