(agoraphobia)

(Adams-Onis Treaty)

(John Cabot)
3. "Semper Fidelis" is the motto of the US Marines. What does "Semper Fidelis" mean?
("always faithful"--accept anything similar)
4. In The Adventure of the Empty House, by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, what partner of Professor Moriarty is described by Dr. Watson as "the second most dangerous man in London"?
(Colonel Sebastian Moran)
5. She won an Oscar for her role as Gloria Wandrous in the 1960 movie, Battlefield 8. * She later won another Oscar for her role as Martha in the 1966 movie, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf. Name her. (Elizabeth Taylor)
6. This US President's term of office was marked by a lack of opposing parties; * thus his term became known as "The Era of Good Feelings." Name this fifth President. (James Monroe)
7. Bellerophon's beloved equine, Pegasus, sprung from the blood of what monster, slain by Perseus? (Medusa--prompt: the Gorgon)
8. He wrote the biography J.S. Bach. * He was an Alsatian-born doctor, musician, and missionary who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1952. He established a hospital in Lambarene, Gabon. Name him. (Albert Schweitzer) "

10. [read this question SLOWLY] According to the conventions of standard music, what type of a seventh chord is formed by adding a major third above a diminished triad in root position *?
(half-diminished seventh chord [this question is worth 30 points])
11. In 1997, for the fourth year in a row, what NBC sitcom won the Emmy for best comedy series?
("Frasier")
12. He was a rebel, a non-conformist, and a student expelled from Oxford in 1811. Before dying at age 30, he left England permanently. He wrote the tragic play The Cenci [CHEN-chi] * and the poem "Ode to the West Wind. Identify this Romantic poet, whose second wife was also a famous writer.
(Percy Bysshe Shelley)
13. Despite its continuing objection to the republic's use of the name of a northern Greek province, with which former Yugoslav republic has Greece agreed to end its economic blockade in 1995?
(Macedonia)
14. During a Christmas season in the past a woman named Rachel received a ghastly gift from a famous artist. * The gift was a severed right ear that the artist had cut off from himself. Who was that artist?
(Vincent Van Gogh--prompt on an early buzz: ear)
15. The real-life Queen Supayalat of Burma ordered the execution of one-hundred relatives of her husband, King Thibaw. Supayalat and Thibaw became the subjects of what Rudyard Kipling work *? (The Road to Mandalay--30 points)
16. In April, 1998, Daniele Malpeli was fined $\$ 1,000$ for this offense. However, New York City Parks Commissioner Henry Stern offered to waive the fine if Malpeli would apologize for his offense. What did Malpeli do wrong?
(He chained his bike to a tree--he hugged the tree to express apology)
17. This New York literary circle of the nineteenth century included writers * Washington Irving and James Fenimore Cooper. This group's name became the name of a professional sport team. Name the group. (the Knickerbockers)
18. This 1903 treaty contains the names of two persons, one of which was the US Secretary of State who dispatched the Open Door Notes to China. Name this treaty * that gave the US control "in perpetuity" of the Panama Canal.
(the Hay-Bunau-Varilla Treaty--accept: the Hay-Bunau Treaty)
19. Math question, 10 seconds, listen carefully: If a turtle crawls 10 meters due north, then 5 meters due east, and then 22 meters due south, what is the turtle's net displacement in meters?

21. This planet is not dense at all; in fact, if placed in water, this planet would float. * Of the 61 sizable satellites in our solar system, 18 belong to this planet, making it the planet with the most identifiable moons. What is this second-largest planet, the sixth planet from the sun?
(Saturn)
22. He once said that the Vietnam War was immoral, and he lost his job soon after that. He's a business genius of * Ford Motor Company who became Secretary of Defense in John F. Kennedy's cabinet. He was asked to resign for his anti-war comments during the Vietnam War. Name him.
(Robert McNamara)
