- 5. These are any particle that has integer spin measured in the units of h-bar (spin=0, 1, 2...). They are associated with the force fields, carrier particles, & include mesons. FTP, name this class of particles that do not follow the Pauli Exclusion principle & are often paired with fermions.

- 6. His left wing views angered conservative dictators, and he spent the 1960s and 1970s in exile in Mexico. In the early 1980s, he was invited back to Columbia, and in 1982 he won the Nobel Prize for Literature. FTP, name this Moroccan mountain range, which shares its name with the figure in Greek mythology who supposedly supported the sky.

In chemistry it's the splitting of a molecule into simpler molecules; in biology it's a series of synchronous cell divisions, either radial or spiral, which changes the zygote into a multicellular organism; in geometry it's the capacity for a crystallized substance or rock to split along definite planes. Finally, in popular culture it's the depression between a woman's mammary glands. FTP, name the term. cleavage
