1. She is also an acclaimed author of "Delusions of Grandma" and "Surrender the Pink." A drug meltdown in the 1970's was the subject of her 1987 book, "Postcards from the Edge." For 10 points, what actress appeared as John Belushi's avenging girlfriend, Meg Ryan's best friend, Marie, and Alderaan's princess, Leia.

answer: Carrie _Fisher_

2. He was an atheist in his boyhood, as told in his book "Surprised by Joy; The Shape of My Early Life," yet he later supported Christianity in books such as "The Problem of Pain." For ten points, name this Cambridge professor who wrote such works as the "The Great Divorce", "The Narnia Chronicles," and "The Screwtape Letters."

answer: C(live) S(taples) _Lewis_

3. President Didier Ratsiraka helped create the 840-square-mile Masolala National Park, which will help protect species like the serpent eagle, and the red ruffed lemur, in--for 10 points--what island, the world's 4th largest, off the eastern coast of Africa?

answer: Republic of _Madagascar_ or Repoblikan'i _Madagasikara_ or Republique de _Madagascar_

4. Scheduled for completion in 2009, it will displace 1.2 million people, stretch across nearly one mile, rise 575 feet in height, and create a 400-mile-long reservoir. For 10 points, name this hydroelectric project, potentially the largest in world history, begun in 1994 on the Yangtze.

answer: The _Three Gorges_ dam project

5. Works of his include "The Assassination Bureau, Ltd.", "Smoke Bellew," and the futuristic "The Iron Heel." His "Burning Daylight" and "The Son of the Wolf" depicted life in the Klondike. For 10 points, name this California-born novelist, whose novels include "The Call of the Wild" and "White Fang"

answer: Jack _London_ or John Griffith _Chaney_

6. The oldest continuously published magazine in America, it was originally subtitled "The Advocate of Industry and Enterprise and Journal of Mechanical and other improvement." For 10 points, what monthly included features like "Working Knowledge," "Mathematical Games" and "The Amateur Scientist"?

answer: The _Scientific American_ or _SciAm_

7. It is a territory of some 6,000 square miles reaching to the "South Sea", exactly to the west of Connecticut. In 1800, it was attached to the Ohio territory. For ten points name this region, the namesake of a boarding school and university which in 1967 merged with the Case Institute of Technology.

answer: the _Western Reserve_ or _Connecticut Western Reserve_

8. Vessels made from it appeared in Egypt about 1450 BCE during the reign of Thutmose III. Of the two main varieties of it, most is made of the soda-lime-silica variety. For 10 points, name this transparent inorganic solid material which since the 17th century has been used to make beer and wine containers.

answer: _glass_

9. Her Nobel lecture was entitled "The Significance of Responses of the Genome to Challenge," which embodied her work that traced the evolutionary history of domesticated maize. For 10 points, name this geneticist who showed that genes could transpose within chromosomes, with her work with "jumping genes".

answer: Barbara _McClintock_

10. It ran aground at Montauk Point on New York's Long Island. The subject of a 1989 novel, "Echo of Lions," it was Spanish for "friendship," and was steered towards Sierra Leone via a revolt led by Simbhe Pieh, or Joseph Cinque. For ten points, name this ship, the subject of a 1997 Steven Spielberg movie starring Anthony

Hopkins and Morgan Freeman.

answer: the Amistad or la Amistad

11. This one-word term originally meant a chemical unit that worked as a chemically inalterable single unit. In modern usage, it can refer to a chemical compound of unpaired electrons that can bond to another compound at the site of the unpaired electrons. For 10 points, name this chemistry term, one type of which can be "free."

answer: radical

12. Beginning in the 50's, he and various groups created the jazz classics, "Four," "Milestones," and "So What." By 1969, he was playing jazz-rock fusion music in the album "Bitches Brew." For 10 points, name this trumpeter who also did "In A Silent Way," "Kind of Blue," and "The Birth of the Cool."

answer: Miles Dewey Davis III

13. Caused by *Borrelia burgdorferi*, its two most common treatments are doxycycline and ceftriaxone (sold as Rocephin). It was first discovered in the United States in Connecticut in 1975. For 10 points, name this spirochete-caused disease transmitted by the bite of Ixodes ticks.

answer: Lyme disease

14. 336 rivers and streams flow into it, including the Selenga, Upper Angara, Turka, and Snezhnaya. Located northeast of the city Irkutsk, in southeastern Siberia, it is more than a mile deep, making it the deepest continental body of water in the world. For 10 points, name this lake, Asia's largest freshwater lake.

answer: Lake Baikal or Ozero Baykal or Ozero Bajkal

15. She was the first black woman to have an original screenplay produced in 1971: "Georgia, Georgia." She also wrote: "You may write me down in history/With your bitter, twisted lies/You may trod me in the very dirt/But still, like dust, I'll rise." For 10 points, name this author of "I Shall Not Be Moved" and "I Know Why The Caged Bird Sings."

answer: Maya Angelou or Marguerite Johnson

16. He won the \$50,000 Wolfskehl Prize 10 years before the prize deadline for providing the first correct solution to the statement that there are no natural numbers x , y , and z such that $x^n + y^n = z^n$, in which n is a natural number greater than 2. For 10 points, name this Princeton mathematician who solved Fermat's Last Theorem.

answer: Andrew Wiles

17. Episodes include Fashion, Fat, The End, Death, Morocco, France and Door-Handle. It has won two Popular Arts, International Emmys. For 10 points, name this BBC comedy, in which Jennifer Saunders plays PR rep Edina Monsoon, and Joanna Lumley plays fashion consultant Patsy Stone.

answer: Absolutely Fabulous or Ab Fab

18. If you include the word "President", and one transliteration, his first and last name anagram into "Endless insobriety trip". In "Against the Grain," he talked about his career, including his tenure as mayor of Moscow. For 10 points, name this president and first popularly-elected leader of Russia.

answer: Boris Nikolayevich Yeltsin

19. It's the one-word title of a Jim Crace book, nominated for the 1997 Booker Prize, which retells the story of Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness. For 10 points, what word referred to a period of seclusion or isolation after exposure to infection from a contagious disease, as the name suggests, for 40 days?

answer: Quarantine

20. In this city's harbor, in 1917, the supply ship Imo collided with the munitions ship Mont Blanc. The resulting explosion destroyed much of the northern portion of this largest city in the Maritime Provinces. For 10 points, name this Canadian city, home to Pier 21, and the capital of Nova Scotia.

answer: _Halifax_

21. He also worked in physical geography, writing "General Natural History and Theory of the Heavens" in 1755. But he is best known for works like "Metaphysics of Ethics," and "Perpetual Peace." For 10 points, name this Konigsberg-born philosopher who wrote "Religion Within the Boundaries of Pure Reason," and "Critique of Judgment."

answer: Immanuel _Kant_

22. He got a 1977 Oscar nomination for "Turning Point," and he became the director of the American Ballet Theater; he continues work with his company, the White Oak Dance Project. For 10 points, name this dancer who joined the ABT in 1974 upon his Soviet defection.

answer: Mikhail _Baryshnikov_ (prompt on: Misha)

23. He founded the New York Rangers before moving to the Toronto St. Patricks, which he renamed the Maple Leafs and with whom he won seven Stanley Cups. For 10 points, name this hockey pioneer who is the namesake of the trophy for the NHL Playoffs' MVP.

answer: Conn _Smythe_

24. He discovered that water can remain liquid below its freezing point and that atmospheric pressure affects the boiling point of liquids. His inventions include the alcohol thermometer and the mercury thermometer. For 10 points, name this Polish-born German scientist best known for inventing a namesake temperature scale.

answer: Daniel Gabriel _Fahrenheit_

25. "There is nothing more exhilarating than to be shot at without result." "We are all worms, but I do believe I am a Glow Worm." "I have taken more out of alcohol than alcohol has taken out of me." "It's a good thing for an uneducated man to read books of quotations." So said--for 10 points--what master of bon-mots, and World War II Prime Minister?

answer: Sir Winston Leonard Spencer _Churchill_

26. It was sacked in June 1756 by the nabob of Bengal. 27. He began broadcasting for both the St. Louis Browns and Cardinals in 1945. Once the Browns left, he teamed up another Hall of Famer, Jack Buck, until 1969. Then to Oakland for 2 years, and in 1972, he worked for the White Sox. For 10 holy points, who joined Steve Stone in 1983 to air Chicago Cubs games?

answer: Harry _Caray_ or Harry _Carabina_

28. Created by John G. Serling, it doesn't accept students under 23. Its 40,000-plus students make it, in 1998, America's largest private university. For 10 points, what school has its main campus located just five minutes away from the Sky Harbor International airport in the state of Arizona.

answer: _U_niversity of _Phoenix_

C. This Austrian physicist learned about De Broglie's work through Einstein. He produced the papers that gave the foundations of the quantum wave mechanics, and his differential equation is the basic equation of quantum mechanics.

answer: Erwin _Schrodinger_
