1. A hideous old woman, Thokk (who was really Loki in disguise) failed to weep for him, so he had to remain in Hell. This was because he did not die in combat, instead being murdered by the one plant his mother, Frigga, forgot to have swear never to harm him. Name this Norse god who lived with his wife Nanna in Breidhablik, slain by mistletoe, for ten points.

BALDER

2. Considered in his own time (343-292 BC) to be the greatest comic genius next to Aristophanes and the greatest poet next to Homer, he was the leader of what was called "the new comedy." "The Dour Man" is his only complete play, with "The Girl from Samos," "The Shearing of Glycera" and a hundred others existing only in fragments. Name this playwright of "The Arbitration," FTP.

MENANDER

3. A painting by Gustav Dore featuring what could be either animals, angels or demons on a greyish background, a band consisting of Romanian Michael Cretu, an encoding machine decrypted in large part by Alan Turing, and a set of Variations by Edward Elgar all share what one word?

ENIGMA

4. This modern author, known best for his short stories, also wrote three novels, Web of the City, Sound of a Scythe, and Spider Kiss, and serves as a creative consultant for the series Babylon Five. He recently published a collector's illustrated novel of his "Repent Harlequin, Said the Ticktockman." Name this author of stories such as "The Deathbird" and "I Have No Mouth, and I Must Scream," for ten.

HARLAN ELLISON

5. Richard Feynman borrowed this man's car to visit his dying wife, although Feynman had no knowledge of his illicit activities at the time. This German spy was not executed, but emigrated to East Germany after spending nine years in prison for passing atomic secrets to the USSR. Name him, for ten points.

Klaus FUCHS

6. He wasn't Elvis, but one of his favorite songs to sing with his band was Jailhouse Rock. An accomplished athlete, he was a hurdler for his country in the 1972 Olympic games, and returned to found the P.R.E. and win the mayoral race of Guayaquil, his countries' largest city. Criticizing the oligarchy, he won the presidential race in 1996, but was deposed soon after for "Mental Incompetence." Name this former president of Ecuador, known as "El Loco" for ten points.

Abdala BUCARAM Ortiz (Prompt on _El Loco_)

7. Descended from the Alpine Scheitholt, this musical instrument comes in two main varieties, the Salzburg and the Mittenwald. It, is plucked with both hands on a set of major strings and accompanying strings. Its name also serves as a generic term for any stringed instrument which lacks any projecting neck or arms. Name this relative of the dulcimer, for ten points.

the ZITHER

8. The Lexus RX300, the GMC Denali, The Acura SLX, and Infinti QX4, join the Lincoln Navigator and the

Mitsubishi Montero as examples of this type of vehicle, the bane of sportscar fans and environmentalists. Name this type of auto, for ten points

SPORT UTILITY VEHICLE or SUV

9. Following his m4entor William O. Douglas to the Federal Securities and Exchange Commission, he successfully argued Gideon vs. Wainwright before the Supreme Court in 1963. After becoming a justice, he was nominated to replace Earl Warren as Chief Justice, but he became the first nominee for that position since 1795 to fail his senate approval hearing. The next year, he became the first Supreme Court justice to resign under threat of impeachment. Name him, for ten points.

Abe FORTAS

10. One of the earliest forms of herbal birth control, manuals describing its use as an abortifacient date back to 500 BCE. Its oil can be extremely toxic, and can be used as an insect repellant. As a tea, this member of the mint family can be used to relieve menstrual cramps and to promote perspiration. Name this plant, scientific name Hedeoma pulegioides.

PENNYROYAL

11. The Mashantucket have established one of the largest gambling casinos in the world in Ledyard, Connecticut where the few hundred remaining members of this tribe live on two small reservations. Their language was similar to the Algonquians, but a costly war against the colonists in 1637 cost them most of their members. Name this Eastern Tribe, for ten points.

The PEQUOT

12. Starting his career at 15, he recorded more than 100 albums, many with guitarist Django Reinhardt as part of the "Hot Club Quintet" in the 1930's. Choosing the violin over the sax or piano "Because there wasn't much competition" this Frenchman went on to virtually create jazz violin. Name him for ten points.

Stephane GRAPELLI

13. Compressors and cooling systems using this technology might someday become as commonplace as lasers. Invented by Tim Lucas at Los Alamos, sound waves are sent through empty containers of various shapes to eliminate shock waves and allow sound to reach power levels never before thought possible. For ten points give the full name of the process abbreviated RMS.

RESONANT MACROSONIC SYNTHESIS (prompt for more on early buzz of RMS_)

14. A conservative statesman who sought to improve the economic status of the Russian peasantry, he was better known for his network of courts-martial which were quick to sentence left-wing opponents to hanging, so much so that the noose came to be known as "[his] Necktie." He earned the favor of Czar Nicholas II, but his brash political moves such as the dismissing of the entire duma created many enemies, one of whom, Dmitri Bogokov, shot him to death at an opera in 1911. Name him for ten.

Pyotr Arkadevich STOLYPIN

15. With the help of Increase Mather, the Church of England was resisted. The Dissenting churches of Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania and New Jersey were unified in 1706 by Francis Makemie. They thus formed the first US church of which division of Protestantism, for ten points?

PRESBYTERIANism

16. A long poem called "Mother Hubbards Tale" is one of the lesser known works by this author of a 12 eclogue poem called the "Shepeardes Calendar" and the long lyric Epithalamion. He is by far best known for a supposedly unfinished 1596 epic poem concerning such characters as Duessa, the Red Cross Knight, and the title character. FTP, name this author of The Faerie Queen.

Edmund SPENSER

- 17. For a quick ten points, give the probability, in fraction form. I have two children. Each one has a 50/50 chance of being a boy or a girl. One of the children is a boy. Given that info, what is the probability that the other child is a girl?
- 2/3 (this is RIGHT!--ask Jeremy Smith if you don't understand)
- 18. U.S. Poet Laureate Richard Wilbur authored the most popular English translation of this play, which contains all the traditional comic elements, the irritating old man, Orgon, the wise servant Dorine, and the two-faced title character. Many early performances also featured King Louis XIV, who allowed the playwright's satire to the dismay of most of his court. Name this play about a drunken hypocrite pretending to be a holy man, written by Moliere.

TARTUFFE

19. Though a respected linguist in his day, this moonlighting fire insurance inspector's mastery of the Hopi language has been called into question in recent years, as has the validity of the conclusions he made based on his observations of Hopi speech. An extension of the theories of Herder and Humboldt, his beliefs that time and punctuality depended on the availability of verb tenses was an example of his hypothesis that the structures existing in a language affect the way we think. Name this linguist for ten.

Benjamin WHORF

20. One of the most overused words today, it is defined as "The condition in which the result of the combined action of two or more agents is greater than the sum of their separate, individual actions." Give this word, a favorite of Scott Adams, overused in company mission statements and corporate pep rallies to mean "getting everyone together to give each other energy," for ten points.

SYNERGY

21. His movie roles have included The Chase, Lost Highway, Heat, and Johnny Mnemonic, but this bodybuilding punk rocker is best known for spoken word albums such as "Human Butt." Although his lyrics and spoken word appearances consistently earn parental advisories, his self-deprecating humor has led some to compare him to Lenny Bruce in his humor and honesty. Name this former lead singer for the band "Black Flag" for ten points.

Henry ROLLINS

22. This substance is obtained from the species Gadus Morhua. It underwent a quick decline in popularity in the last forty years thanks to the fortification of milk. Prescribed as a folk remedy in the 1800s, its nutritional value was proven by 1922 and a bottle of this liquid found its way into many refrigerators, and from there into the stomachs of many unappreciative children. Name this fatty oil, for ten points.

COD LIVER OIL

23. This Asian country contains some of the most unexplored regions between the Arctic and Antarctic. Its mineral

wealth is substantial, but as most of this landlocked republic's land is above ten thousand feet, it's the poorest of the former Soviet republics. A major war in 1992 between communists and Islamic fundamentalists has not helped matters. Name this small Soviet republic bordering China and Afghanistan, with capital at Dushanbe.

TAJIKISTAN

24. The ruler of this feudal state united all China, centralized the Chinese legal system, unified their writing script, their system of weights and measures, and consolidated much of what came to be known as the "Great Wall" into a uniform structure. His methods were brutal and exhausted the people, so when he died, so did the dynasty. Name this dynasty which lasted from 221-206 BC, lead by the Shih Huang-Ti, and predecessor to the Han.

CH'IN

25. This supreme court case, decided March 2, 1824, concerned two former partners in a steamboat business, who when their partnership ended, fought over shipping rights between New York and New Jersey. One had purchased an exclusive trading license from the State of New York, and the other retaliated with competing licenses given by New Jersey. Name this case which established the US government's right to regulate interstate commerce, for ten points.

GIBBONS v. OGDEN

26. A boat in the distance passes by unseen and a waterspout hovers in the background. A hurricane has shredded the sails of the small craft, snapped off the mast, and snatched away the rudder, and as sharks circle the boat, a black man lies inert on the deck, powerless against nature. This describes what 1899 painting, the most famous of artist Winslow Homer, for ten points?
