1. This field was studied by H. W. Bates and Fritz Muller, who explained why various species of butterfly that were not closely related genetically still had similar appearances. FTP, name this evolutionary approach, in one type of which weaker species will emulate stronger or more dangerous ones for protection.

ANSWER: mimicry

- 2. Riding in a chariot drawn by goats, this god was represented as slow-wiited but extremely strong and belligerent. He was armed with iron gloves and a belt of strength, as well as a magic hammer, which returned to his hand after striking. FTP, identify this son of Odin, the Norse god of thunder. ANSWER: Thor
- 3. Some people called it voodoo economics. Ronald Reagan called it trickle-down economics. Conventional economists, however, use a different term. FTP identify the term used to describe economic theories in which money flows from rich to poor, rather than from poor to rich as in demand-side economics?

ANSWER: supply-side economics

4. He entered the political realm by prosecuting Cimon and implemented democratic reforms with Ephialtes shortly thereafter. He would die of the plague at age 66, but his political leadership saw the creation of the Parthenon, as well as many other Greek marvels. For ten points, identify this man who led Athens during its Golden Age.

ANSWER: Pericles

5. Born in Macon, Georgia on May 3, 1928, his first hit was "Please Please Please." The grooves in songs like "The Payback" and "Super Bad" emphasized rhythm and bottom and revolutionized black music in the late 1960s and early 70s. FTP, name this "Godfather of Soul" who influenced everyone from Miles Davis to George Clinton.

ANSWER: James Brown

- 6. Whiskey and Coke, morphine, a \$300 stripper who lacked cocaine, marijuana, vodka and orange juice, and the John Hancock Building. All of these elements were part of the last hours of a man who was found dead in December. For ten points identify this recently-deceased star of *Beverly Hills Ninja*. ANSWER: Chris Farley
- 7. Her works explore the interaction among race, heritage, and culture. Her tenure as senior editor for Random House in the 70s and 80s helped her influence black thought in the period. She is most famous, though, for her novels, including *Sula*, *Tar Baby*, and *The Bluest Eye*. FTP, name this Nobel Prizewinning author of *Beloved*.

ANSWER: Toni Morrison

8. Established as a secret fraternal order in 1869 by Philadelphia garment worker Uriah Stephens, it excluded lawyers and liquor dealers. In an 1878 general meeting in Reading, Pennsylvania, it advocated an eight-hour workday, an end to child labor under age 14, and equal pay for women. FTP, name this chivalric-sounding labor union that lost strength in the late 1880s.

ANSWER: The Knights of Labor

9. Originally titled *Scary Movie*, its credits give "No thanks" to California's Santa Rosa High School, which refused to allow the director to shoot scenes there. The sequel to this film has enjoyed considerable success since its release last December. FTP, name this 1996 Wes Craven film that starred Neve Campbell and Courtney Cox.

ANSWER: Scream

- 10. This story, which asks "What is this world?", is a variant of Bocaccio's story "Teseida", and provides much of the plot for Shakespeare's "Two Noble Kinsmen." FTP, name this first Canterbury Tale that features the two noble brothers Palamon and Arcite fighting for the love of Emily.

 ANSWER: "The Knight's Tale"
- 11. Born in 1749, he was a precocious and sensitive child of a doctor of law. Napoleon exclaimed "Behold the man" upon their meeting, and some of his lesser known works include *Gotz von Ber-lich-ingen* and *Iphegenia at Taurus*. FTP, name this German author of *Wilhelm Meister's Apprentice* and *Faust*. ANSWER: Johann Wolfgang von Goethe
- 12. Incorporated in 1946, this company initially made voltmeters, electrically heated cushions, and resonator generators. It later produced consumer items such as tape recorders, radios, and television sets. In 1969 it introduced the color video cassette recorder and formed an affiliate to market its Betamax technology. FTP identify this electronics giant that innovated the Trinitron picture tube. ANSWER: Sony Corporation or Tokyo Telecommunications Engineering Corporation
- 13. Aberdeen, Scotland is using this compound to remove chewing gum from its sidewalks. This linear molecule, a gas at room temperature, combines with ammonia to form a urea precursor. FTP, name this greenhouse gas—essential to the survival of plants—that can exist in solid form as dry ice.

 ANSWER: <u>carbon dioxide</u> or <u>CO₂</u>
- 14. St. Thomas Aquinas, Blaise Pascal, and Friedrich Nietzsche have been called members of this philosophical movement, but it is more accurate to mark its origins with Soren Kierkegaard. This term may refer to any of several philosophic systems centered on the individual and his relationship to the universe or God. FTP, identify this movement whose leading figures also include Jean-Paul Sartre. ANSWER: existentialism
- 15. A city of about 700 000 residents, it grew rich from the Crusades. It defeated Pisa and Venice in the 1200s, but its fleet was captured by Venice in 1380. Wracked by internal disputes despite having a doge [DOEZH] since 1339, it lost most of its overseas possessions, but held Corsica until 1768. FTP name this home of Christopher Columbus.

ANSWER: Genoa or Genova

16. He painted a series of six paintings depicting seasonal changes in landscapes and peasant life, one of which is "Hunters in the Snow". FTP, name this sixteenth century Flemish painter, perhaps best known for "The Peasant Dance".

ANSWER: Pieter Bruegel the Elder

17. Though she was prolific, this 19th-century writer is better known for her romantic liaisons. However, write she did, using a pseudonym of course. She is the author of *Indiana*, *Lelia*, *Consuelo*, and *Valentine*, among other works. FTP, name this author, perhaps most famous for her affair with Frederic Chopin. ANSWER: George <u>Sand</u> or Amandine-Aurore-Lucile <u>Dudevant</u>

- 18. They are occasionally named for feast days, when their radiants cannot be located. In November 1833, a massive one was observed originating from Leo. That one was later shown to recur at 33-year intervals. FTP, identify these drizzling phenomena, annual examples of which are the Leonid and Perseid. ANSWER: meteor showers
- 19. "If a young man . . . can write a symphony like that, in five years he will be ready to commit murder." So was said of this composer who wrote *Statements for Orchestra* in 1930, who won an Academy Award for the score to *The Heiress*. FTP, identify this composer of *Quiet City, Appalachian Spring*, and *Fanfare for the Common Man*.

ANSWER: Aaron Copland

- 20. Although this lascivious monarch and closet-Catholic could be called the father of his country, he amazingly failed to sire a legitimate heir to the throne. This lack of offspring led to the crowning of his brother, which precipitated a political crisis that ended with a Dutch invasion of England in 1688. FTP name this king of England whose reign ended with the Glorious Revolution.

 ANSWER: Charles II
- 21. Does. Lead. Desert. Use. Read. Sow. Wind. Subject. Object. Project. Record. These are all examples, FAQTP, of what type of word whose meaning changes depending upon the pronunciation? ANSWER: homophones
- 22. It took four months to negotiate this treaty that is named for a town in present-day Poland. In it, Russia acknolwedged the "independence"—or more accurately, loss—of Finland, Poland, the Ukraine, and the Baltic Republics. FTP, name this 1918 treaty which marked Bolshevik Russia's exit from World War I.

ANSWER: Treaty of Brest-Litovsk

23. The magnitude of the force, measured in dynes per square centimeter of surface, needed to maintain a velocity difference of 1 centimeter per second between layers of a fluid 1 centimeter apart is a measure of this characteristic. For water, it is .01 poises [PWAH-ziz] at room temperature and .0028 poises at 100 degrees Celsius. FTP, name this property of liquids that decreases as temperature increases. ANSWER: viscosity
