Only the roofless church remains intact at its former site on right bank of the Wye River. Yet for some reason there was a good place to compose lines a few miles above it. FTP, identify this namesake of a poem by William Wordsworth.

ANSWER: Tintern Abbey

- 2. Boxburghshire, Ross and Cromarty, Caithness, Ayrshire, Perthshire, Fife, Midlothian, Angus. This counties are all located in a single European country. It has been part of the United Kingdom since 1707, and its patron saint is Andrew, even if he did not wear a kilt. FTP identify this home of Loch Ness. ANSWER: Scotland
- 3. Arizona. California. Hawaii. Louisiana. New Mexico. North Carolina. Texas. These are the seven states in which, FTP, what scholarships touted by President Clinton would fully cover the costs of two years at a community college?

ANSWER: HOPE Scholarships

4. In the middle were Towton, Barnet, and Tewkesbury. At the start was St. Alban's, and at the end, depending on which version you prefer, is either the wedding of Henry VII and Elizabeth of York, or Bosworth Field. FTP name this series of English civil wars.

ANSWER: The Wars of the Roses

5. This film begins with the title character floating in a pool, singing a song about the virtues of sun tan lotion. The plot is this: an immature 28-year-old must repeat 12 years of school in 24 weeks or else his father's aide will gain control of the family empire. FTP, name this movie that features Bridgette Wilson, Norm MacDonald, and of course, Adam Sandler in the title role.

ANSWER: Billy Madison

6. In the work of Wagner she is a Valkyrie who defies her father, Wotan. In the Icelandic version, the Vol-sun-ga-saga, she is the chief of the Valkyries who is saved by, and falls in love with, Sigurd. FTP, identify this mighty female warrior of Germanic mythology who, in the medieval epic poem, is defeated in combat by Siegfried and is wed to Gunther.

ANSWER: Brunhild or Brunnehilde or Brynhild [don't accept Broom Hilda]

7. The nickname is the same: a Muslim pirate born Khayr ud-Din who captured Algiers in 1529 and Tunis in 1534 for the Ottomans; a Holy Roman Emperor named Frederick; and the code name for the 1941 German invasion of Russia. FTP, give the common name.

ANSWER: Barbarossa

8. It was recently shown that nitric oxide, NO, is one of these, as are histamine, aspartate, glycine, and dopamine. FTP, name this class of molecules, whose most famous examples are serotonin and acetylcholine, which are released at synapses between neurons to transmit messages.

ANSWER: neurotransmitters

- 9. The son of Charles IX, he became king of his country in 1611. He was a devout Lutheran, and he was fluent in 5 languages and acquainted with 8. He entered the Thirty Years' War on the side of the Protestants in 1630 and met his demise at the Battle of Lutzen in 1632. FTP, name this King of Sweden. ANSWER: Gustavus Adolphus or Gustav II Adolf
- 10. Sometimes called the Stagirite, this man's extant works consist largely of written versions of his lectures. Chief among these are the *Organum*, *De Anima*, *Physics*, *Metaphysics*, and *De Poetica*. In 335 BC he opened his own school, the Lyceum. FTP, identify this Greek philosopher, tutor to Alexander the Great, and Plato's most famous student.

ANSWER: Aristotle

- 11. His first public concert was in St. Petersburg in 1911. When the Russian Revolution broke out, his family emigrated to America; he made his Carnegie Hall debut in 1917. He became a musical sensation overnight, and a US citizen in 1925. In the 1940s he settled in Beverly Hills, CA, where he lived until his death. FTP, name this prodigy of the violin who played for 83 years. ANSWER: Jascha Heifetz [DNA: Sergei Rachmaninoff]
- 12. His wife Elaine was also a painter. His paintings usually retained figurative elements, and were often characterized by frenzied brushwork. He emigrated to the US in 1926 from the Netherlands. FTP name this abstract expressionist action painter whose famous works include a series entitled *Woman*. ANSWER: Willem **De Kooning**
- 13. Michael Bennet. James Kirkwood. Nicholas Dante. Marvin Hamlisch. Edward Kleban. All five men collaborated to create this play that won the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1976. In addition, the show garnered 9 Tony Awards, including Best Broadway Musical. FTP identify this "one singular sensation" that ran 6137 times and was made into a 1985 movie.

ANSWER: A Chorus Line

- 14. The tallest mountain in Florida, it is located on private land. There is also one in California, but Mount Whitney clearly dwarfs it. Not only can you not climb it, but you have to be at least 40 inches tall just to enter it. FTP, name this Walt Disney World ride that takes you on a ride through the universe. ANSWER: Space Mountain
- 15. By Gibbs' phase rule, for a pure substance, it can only occur at a single combination of temperature and pressure. For water, it occurs at 4.58 millimeters of mercury and 0.01 degrees Celsius. FTP, identify this location on a phase diagram where solid, liquid, and gas phases are at equilibrium. ANSWER: triple point
- 16. A man was arrested in Phoenix and brought to a police station. There, a victim identified him as a kidnapper and rapist. Despite this and a signed confession, the United States Supreme Court freed Ernesto. FTP, identify this 1966 court case that ensured that accused criminals would be made aware of their constitutional rights, which police officers now read to arrested individuals. ANSWER: *Miranda v. Arizona*
- 17. In July 1781, George Washington gave him command of a battalion which fought at Yorktown. The illegitimate son of a drifting Caribbean trader, he was born on Nevis in 1755. After serving in Washington's Cabinet, he went on to win a seat in New York's state legislature in 1786. FTP name this statesman and financial wizard who appears on the \$10 bill.

ANSWER: Alexander Hamilton

18. This Scottish author of A Plain Discovery of the Whole Revelation of Saint John was one of the first to use the decimal point. But, FTP, who is best known as the inventor, as described in his 1614 Ca-no-nis De-scrip-ti-o of the first system of logarithms?

ANSWER: John Napier

19. Margaret Fuller, Theodore Parker, Bronson Alcott, and William Ellery Channing were all members of a Boston club founded in 1836, This group, which lent its name to a literary movement, published a magazine entitled *The Dial*. FTP, name this club, whose other members included Ralph Waldo Emerson and Henry David Thoreau.

ANSWER: The <u>Transcendental</u> Club [ACC: <u>Transcendentalism</u>]

20. Bird. Fish. Wild. Cool. Pole. Fat. Tom. Big. Pussy. All of these words can precede or follow, FTP, what three-letter word?

ANSWER: cat

21. It was the first major advance in fluid mechanics since Archimedes's principle. Formulated 1800 years later, this law relates the efflux velocity of a liquid through an orifice in a vessel to the liquid height above it. FTP, name this law first stated in 1643 by the inventor of the barometer.

ANSWER: Torricelli's law

22. His first singing group was "The Hoboken Four," but he gained fame as the lead crooner for the Tom Dorsey Band. His solo career took off during World War II as women swooned over him. His singing started to falter, so he switched to film, winning an Oscar for his roles in *From Here to Eternity* and *The Man With The Golden Arm*. FTP, name this leader of the Rat Pack.

ANSWER: Frank Sinatra

23. Born in England, he spent most of his adult life in Canada. He became famous with the collection Songs of a Sourdough in 1907, and wrote the popular novel The Trail of '98 in 1910. FTP, name this writer and poet famous for the frontier ballads The Shooting of Dan McGrew and The Cremation of Sam McGee.
