Tossups

1. They were the descendants of Abu Sufyan, a Quraysh merchant, and their reign is divided into a Marwanid and a Sufyanid period. They reached their height under Abd al-Malik, under whom they spread throughout Central Asia and from Sind in India to southern Spain. FTP name this Islamic dynasty, overthrown in 750 at the Battle of the Great Zab River by the Abbasids.

Answer: <u>Umayyads</u> (oo-MY-ad) dynasty (or caliphate)

2. In birds, the bursa of Fabricius, which controls antibody-mediated immunity, is an outpocketing of this organ, and a "kiss" involving this organ is involved in bird reproduction. Present in sharks and monotremes but not in bony fishes or placental mammals, it exists in human embryos prior to the full development of the kidney, after which it subdivides into a urogenital sinus and a rectum. FTP, name this organ, whose name is Latin for "sewer," which serves as an excretory organ in many vertebrates.

Answer: cloaca

3. Robert Lucas critiqued the use of this on the grounds that increases in production costs and prices can offset increases in revenues and wages. It first appeared in a 1958 paper which compared the rates of change in money wages to the unemployment rate in the United Kingdom for the pevious 96 years. FTP, name this curve, discredited by the period of stagflation in the 1970's, which predicts an inverse relationship between unemployment and inflation.

Answer: Phillips curve

4. This man was jailed for vagrancy at the age of 17. Later an outspoken socialist, he twice ran for mayor of Oakland. Before his death in 1916 at the age of forty, he had written twenty novels and two hundred short stories including such works as "Revolution", and *The Iron Heel*. His planned Glen Ellen, California home, Wolf House, burned before he could move in in 1913. FTP, name this author of "To Build a Fire," *The Sea Wolf*, and *White Fang*.

Answer: John Griffith "Jack" London

5. This winner of the Prix de Rome had his first piano lesson at the age of nine and studied at the Paris Conservatory by the age of eleven. Born in 1862, his influence on twentieth century music results partly from his rejection of the then popular styles of Mahler and Strauss. Famous more for his "miniatures," he composed 24 piano concertos, such as "Dead Leaves" and "What the West Wind Saw." FTP, name this founder of musical Impressionism, composer of "Clair de Lune."

Answer: Claude Debussy

6. Ernst Kummer's discovery that 37 is not a regular prime invalidated Gabriel Lamé's proof of this result. Over a century later, Gerd Faltings showed that it could be violated only finitely many times, but it was Richard Taylor's work on Hecke algebras and Barry Mazur and Ken Ribet's proof that it is implied by the Taniyama-Shimura conjecture that finally allowed for its proof. FTP, name this result which first appeared in the margin of a book and was finally proved in 1993 by Andrew Wiles.

Answer: Fermat's Last Theorem

7. Consisting of 120 representatives, its procedures, or *takkanoth*, are based on the House of Commons', and laws it approves are published in the *Reshumot*, or Official Gazette. FTP, what legislative body first met on February 16, 1949, when it elected Chiam Weizmann the first president of Israel?

Answer: Knesset

8 Deriving its name from a verb meaning "to conquer," the orders of this religion include Kottiya, Mula-Sangha, and Terapanth. It teaches that Brahma-charya, aparigraha, asteya, satya, and ahisma are principles which will help rid one's soul of karma. FTP, name this Indian religion tracing its roots to 24 great teachers, the last of which was Mahavira.

Answer: Jainism

9. Founded as an 1899 merger primarily by Minor Keith, it became known in Latin America as *el pulpo* or "the octopus" due to its extensive land holdings in Central America. This reputation was solidified in 1954 when it was implicated in the CIA overthrow of the Guatemalan government in order to reclaim 200,000 acres of socialized land. FTP identify this U.S. corporation whose banana plantations and other holdings were merged into United Brands in 1970.

Answer: United Fruit Company

10. A nameless main character, the traveler, arrives at the titular location, apparently to evaluate the work of the island's chief administrator, known only as the officer. The traveler watches an execution with disinterest, until he is mortified at the officer's cruelty while using a torture machine to literally tattoo the man's crime on him before death. FTP, name this short story by Franz Kafka in which the Harrow is used to punish offensive individuals.

Answer: "In the Penal Colony" ("In der Strafkolonie")

11. This complex mixture of mostly aromatic hydrocarbons, with smaller amounts of oxygen-, nitrogen-, and sulfur-containing compounds is a rich source of alkanes. To prepare this substance for commercial use, it is first separated by distillation according to the volatility of the different hydrocarbons. Next, alkanes with 12 or more carbon atoms are broken into smaller ones by heating, a process known as cracking. FTP, identify this compound, commercially used to make gasoline.

Answer: petroleum (accept crude oil)

12. The one with Savoy recognized Victor Amadeus II as king of Sicily. The one with Portugal recognized its sovereignty in the Amazon mouth area. The one with Britain ceded St. Kitts, Newfoundland, and Nova Scotia and promised the destruction of the fort at Dunkirk. FTP identify this series of agreements signed by France in 1713 that also put Bourbon Philip V on the Spanish throne.

Answer: Treaties (or Peace) of Utrecht

13. After spending two years in the U.S. at Williams College in the 1860s he returned to his homeland where he served two terms in the legislature and was appointed to the Supreme Court in 1887. Six years later, however, he agreed to chair a committee to overthrow the government and he became president in 1893 and territorial governor in 1900. FTP identify this cousin of a fruit magnate who replaced Queen Liliuokalani as leader of Hawaii.

Answer: Sanford Ballard Dole

14. "I don't want to paint for the few who can see a canvas in a museum, for I believe that in a democracy art belongs to the people. I want my pictures to be published." These are the words of an American artist who during his 84 years was married three times, twice judged the Miss America beauty pageant and became famous as an illustrator for Judge, Look, McCall's and Ladies' Home Journal. FTP, name this one time art editor for Boys' Life and perhaps the most famous illustrator of the Saturday Evening Post.

Answer: Norman Rockwell

15. This work's six books represent Holiness, Temperance, Chastity, Friendship, Justice, and Courtesy, and many of its characters, such as Florimell, Marinell and Scudamore all represent specific English personalities. FTP, give the title of this story about the search for Arthegall, the fated lover of Britomart; the most important work by Edmund Spenser.

Answer: The Faerie Queene

16. It was used as early as 1936 in "Anthony Adverse," but it was Orson Welles in 1941 with the release of "Citizen Kane" that made this technique a staple of Classical Hollywood in the forties. Because of the required amount of light, it virtually eliminated the soft, gauzy quality of many earlier films. Revived by Speilberg and De Palma in films like "Jaws" and "Blow-Out", the technique retains a strong presence today. FTP, name this technique which, by using large amounts of light, effectively lengthens a camera's depth-of-field and allows objects in several planes to be sharp.

Answer: Deep Focus

17. Composed of specialized muscle tissue, in humans, this group of cells is located near the point where the superior vena cava enters the heart. Generating electric impulses much like those produced by nerve cells, it sets the rate at which all cardiac muscle cells contract. FTP, name this structure in the wall of the right atrium which functions as the primary pacemaker of the heart.

Answer: Sinoatrial node or SA node (prompt on pacemaker early)

18. It burned down three times in its first hundred years and was almost abandoned in its second year before Thomas West, Lord De La Warr, arrived with supplies. Though its site is now an island it was then a peninsula jutting into the local river which, like this colony, was named for the king who reigned at the time of its founding. FTP identify this settlement, established in 1607 as the first permanent British North American colony.

Answer: Jamestown

19. She first appeared in films as Meredith Neal in *Flashfire*, but she started as a model in Europe. While there, she landed a role on the TV series *Dark Justice*, and has continued with TV roles, earning a Gemini Award nomination for her guest appearance on *Due South*. She has also appeared on *Silk Stalkings* and *Baywatch*, and she had a recurring role on *Models*, *Inc.* But after she appeared in a movie this April which made 171 million dollars her career has skyrocketed, and she has three movies set to release next year. FTP, name the skin-tight-leather clad heroine who played Trinity in *The Matrix*.

Answer: Carrie-Anne Moss

20. This lake, whose first European visitors were Richard Burton and John Speke, is home to many crocodiles and hippopotamuses, and rice and oil palms grow on its shores. It is fed by the Ruzizi, Malagarasi, and Kalambo rivers, its outlet is the Lukuga, and its major ports include Kalemi, Kigoma, Ujiji, and Bujumbura. FTP, name this lake which forms the boundary between the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Tanzania, and, after Lake Victoria, is the second largest lake in East Africa.

Answer: Lake Tanganyika

21. Born circa 1505 in the village of Painalla, she was the daughter of a noble Aztec family, but was sold into slavery and proclaimed dead after her father's death and mother's remarriage. As a slave she learned Mayan dialects, but continued to speak her native tongue Nahuatl which made her useful as a translator for Cortes. FTP, give the Aztec name for this woman instumental in the conquest of Mexico and baptized Doña Marina

Answer: La Malinche (accept Doña Marina on early buzz)

22. This project, which has been dubbed by some the greatest engineering effort of all time, has had a checkered past. Bad press led it to be rejected multiple times before 1992, when the People's Congress declared that only positive reporting about the project would be allowed. FTP, name this \$76 billion structure that, when complete, will divert China's Yangtze River.

Answer: Three Gorges Dam

23. The general motion of an extended body, or system of bodies, can be considered as the sum of the translational motion of this position on the body, plus rotational, vibrational, or other types of motion about this point. It is the point where all the mass of an object can be considered to be concentrated. FTP, identify this position, which for almost all objects is at the same point as the center of gravity.

Answer: Center of Mass (Do not accept _center of gravity_)

24. Originally described as hysteria, this disorder produces sensory and motor symptoms suggestive of neurological damage although no evidence of illness can be found. FTP, name the disorder considered by Freud to be caused by diversion of energy from repressed instincts to senory-motor channels.

Answer: conversion disorder

25. It extends through Senegal, Mauritania, Burkina Faso, Niger, and Nigeria. Reforestation has been started within it to counteract the desertification that is occurring. FTP, name this semi-arid geographical region separating the Sahara from tropical West Africa.

Answer: Sahel

26. It may be the oldest book in the world. It evolved from the Tortoise Oracle and associates images of reality with 64 numbers. FTP, name this Chinese Book of Changes.
Answer: <u>I Ching</u>

- a) (30) This Briton, although popular in France during his career did not gain popularity in his native land until long after his death. His paintings were the focus of a mystery story by Ngaio (pron. Ny-oh) Marsh.
- b) (20) He painted some portraits and topical works, such as "the Opening of London Bridge." His work was so popular in the Louvre that it was given a place of honor, and the King of France awarded him a medal.
- c) (10) Known for his landscapes, his works, such as "Dedham Vale" and "The Hay Wain", were based on locations in Suffolk, Brighton, Dorset and Salisbury. Overall, you might say he has an "arresting" body of work.

Answer: John Constable

- 4. Signal processing, the branch of electrical engineering that deals with the manipulation of waveforms, is a science that has developed greatly in the past century. FTP each, name these contributors to signal processing.
- a) His transform is the basis of signal processing and is used in everything from radios to image reconstruction. He developed his theory of the decomposition of functions into an infinite sum of cosines while working on problems of heat transfer in the 19th century.

Answer: Joseph Fourier

b) This mathematician's transformation of a function from the time domain to the frequency domain encapsulated the Fourier transform and greatly simplified working with periodic waveforms.

Answer: Pierre Simon Marquis de Laplace

c) In addition to his work in simplifying Maxwell's equations, this physicist and engineer, after whom a step function is named, was a pioneer in applying the Laplace transform to circuit analysis.

Answer: Oliver Heaviside
