1. Hindered by bad eyesight, he was unable to read until the age of twelve, yet he still became a prolific playwright. The socialist message in such plays as Purple Dust and The Star Turns Red damaged his popularity. I Knock at the Door is the first book of his six-volume autobiography, and The Shadow of a Gunman was the first of his plays to be produced. His greatest success might have come in the Abbey Theatre production in which Sara Allgood played the title role in Juno and the Paycock. FTP, identify this Irish dramatist and author of The Plough and the Stars.

# Answer: Sean O'CASEY

2. Its center portion contains several scattered symbols – fruit for carnal pleasure, eggs for alchemy and sex, the rat for falsehood and lies, and dead fish for memories of past joys. The painting's themes were derived from three major sources: medieval bestiaries, Flemish proverbs, and dream books. Unlike van Eyck's *Ghent Altarpiece*, Eve, as she is shown in the left panel, is not the mother of mankind, but the temptress who caused original sin. On the right side the numerous horrors of the Devil are displayed. The left panel is labeled *Creation of Eve*, and the right one is called *Hell*. FTP, identify this triptych, the most famous work of Hieronymus Bosch.

# Answer: GARDEN OF EARTHLY DELIGHTS

3. In World War I he was exempted from military service because of his clubfoot, which later allowed for the drawing of a parallel with the cloven hoof and limp of the Devil. He was not initially anti-Semitic, for his favorite high school teachers were Jews, and he was engaged to a half-Jewish girl. A gifted orator, he became editor of the biweekly National Socialist magazine, and Hitler appointed him Berlin district leader of the National Socialist German Worker's Party in 1926. He would later edit *The Assault* and *Das Reich*, magazines through which he could use his skills. FTP, name this minister of propaganda for the Third Reich.

# Answer: Joseph Paul GOEBBELS

4. French investigators first proved these drugs to be the active principle in dye, and although synthesized in 1908, it was not until 1932 that Gerhard Domagk noted their antibacterial effects. The first one used was Prontosil on streptococcal infections in mice. Fewer than 20 have therapeutic value and they have been largely replaced by more potent drugs, except in the treatment of urinary tract infections. FTP, identify this class of drugs, including a –thiazole and a –nilamide, all beginning with the same five letters.

Answer: SULFA drugs or SULFONAMIDE drugs

5. At Omaha Technical High School he was a star in baseball and track, as well as a baseball catcher. He got a scholarship to Creighton University where he blossomed as a shortstop and outfielder. However, he is best remembered as a pitcher, and his 3,117 strikeouts had been the highest total since Walter Johnson. His 13 shutouts in 1965 is a remarkable feat, yet, FTP, what man surpassed that with 22 wins and a 1.12 ERA as a St. Louis Cardinal in 1968.

Answer: Bob GIBSON

6. Though he came from a wealthy lawyer's family, he ran away from home to work as a sign painter and travel with a medicine show. He wrote of his traveling experiences and contributed poems to several newspapers under the name "Benjamin F. Johnson of Boone." In addition, he became a celebrated platform reader, often appearing with humorist, Bill Nye. Some of his poems were collected in *The Old Swimmin' Hole* and 'Leven More Poems. FTP, name this author of such poems as "The Raggedy Man" and "Little Orphant Annie," who wrote in the dialect of Indiana to earn his title of Hoosier Poet.

Answer: James Whitcomb RILEY

7. The case would have never arisen if not for the *Lochner* v. *New York* decision just three years earlier. Boston attorney Louis Brandeis defended the law under question, utilizing his namesake "briefs" filled with sociological data. Researchers such as Josephine Goldmark stressed women's "special physical organization" and frailty. FTP, name this decision, in which the Supreme Court upheld a state statute limiting women's work hours, arising from a challenge from businessman Curt Muller.

Answer: MULLER V. OREGON

8. This novel's message is revealed by the statement "All is well when it leaves the hands of the Creator of things; all degenerates in the hands of man." It emphasized expression rather than repression and that children are natural and good, and during their early years they should grow in the classroom of nature. Only between the ages of 12 and 15 should intellectual subjects and the stifling influence of books be introduced. FTP, what is this fictional treatise on the proper education for life, as told about a young boy and written by Jean-Jacques Rousseau?

Answer: EMILE

9\*. This binary representation of numbers is the most common one used in computers today for storing signed integers. One advantage of this system is a single representation of zero. A slight disadvantage is the ability to represent one negative value which cannot be inverted without overflow or the addition of an extra bit. For ten points, name this binary number system which is merely an improvement on the one's complement system.

Answer: TWO'S COMPLEMENT

10. Carl Maria von Weber wrote numerous types of this dance for piano. The music is in lively 6-8 time with the women frequently carrying tambourines. It is a couple folk dance characterized by quick steps and flirtatious behavior between partners. Its origin lies in a form of hysteria that appeared in Italy from the 15<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> centuries. FTP, name this dance that supposedly cures that disease and takes its name from the large, hairy spider that supposedly transmitted the disease.

## Answer: TARANTELLA

11. The name of this novel's hero translates from German for "God-Begotten Devil's Dung." Interspersed between the hero's words, which are in quotation marks, are the remarks of an imaginary editor, who puts the story together from assorted documents written by the hero. In that sense the title refers to editor's role of patching the story together, though it also refers to the author's so-called Clothes Philosophy. It is a combination of novel, autobiography, and essay that deals with the fictional Professor Diogenes Teufelsdrockh (Too fells drauk). FTP, what is this Thomas Carlyle work that literally means "The Tailor Retailored?"

# Answer: SARTOR RESARTUS

12. He introduced the art of mezzotint and printmaking into England. His parents, Elizabeth Stuart and Frederick I of Bohemia were driven to the United Provinces where he grew up. Captured at Vlothe on the Wesser River and held captive in Austria for three years, he was banished from England by Parliament upon his uncle's surrender. FTP, who was this brilliant cavalry officer and commander of Charles I's armies during the English Civil War?

Answer: Prince RUPERT of the Rhine or RUPRECHT or RUPERT of the Palatinate

13. Many claim that Lothar Meyer actually first proposed the arrangement credited to this man. Following his studies of molecular cohesion, he met with Stanislao Canizzaro, whose insistence on the difference between molecular and atomic weights greatly influenced this man. Dissatisfied with current scholarship he wrote his own textbook, *The Principles of Chemistry*, now a classic. He left several gaps in his most famous discovery, claiming that they would be shortly filled. FTP, name this developer of the periodic table of elements.

# Answer: Dmitry Ivanovich MENDELEYEV

14. Some of its famous limestone caverns are included in Wind Cave National Park and Jewel Cave National Monument. Because of its rich timber and game, the region was extremely important to such tribes as the Arapaho and Kiowa. In 1903 Teddy Roosevelt set aside 28,000 acres of it as a protected area. If not for the gold discovered in the range in 1874, an expedition would never have been sent through. FTP, what is this mountain range, site of Little Big Horn and Mt. Rushmore, a group of peaks in western South Dakota?

Answer: BLACK HILLS

15. He plays the prominent role in Thomas Love Peacock's *Misfortunes of Elphin*, and a famous monument honoring him stands on the banks of Gerionydd Lake. He describes his origin with the lines, "First I was formed in the shape of a handsome man, / in the hall of Ceridwen in order to be refined." According to legend, he had the secret of prophetic poetry and he could strike less gifted poets dumb. FTP, who was this man, taking his name from the Welsh for "shining brow," the greatest of the Welsh bards?

## Answer: TALIESIN

16. His elder brother Novatus is remembered for presiding over St. Paul's arraignment, and his younger brother, Mela, was the father of the poet, Lucan. Caligula, jealous of this man's oratory, called his speeches "sand without lime" and banished him to Corsica. His work *The Mad Hercules* was a takeoff on Euripides' version, but his two most successful plays were *Phaedra* and *Medea*. While in Corsica he wrote *Consolation*, and upon Nero's ascension, he wrote the "Pumpkinification," a satire based on the deification of earlier emperors. FTP, identify this Roman, who shares his name with an Indian tribe of New York?

## Answer: Lucius Annaeus SENECA

17. After fleeing to Toronto, he secured a Canadian passport, flew to London on May 5<sup>th</sup>, Lisbon on May 7<sup>th</sup> and secured a second Canadian passport on May 16<sup>th</sup>. However, on June 8<sup>th</sup>, as he was about to embark for Brussels, he was apprehended at Heathrow Airport by London police and sent back to the U.S. He would escape from Brushy Mountain Prison nine years later and remain at large for 54 hours before being recaptured. He is most famous for an act committed after he had escaped from the Missouri State Penitentiary in 1967. FTP, name this man, who, on April 4<sup>th</sup>, 1968, shot and killed Martin Luther King, Jr.

#### Answer: James Earl RAY

18. It opens with a young Spanish hero singing of finding his love when an old fellow, the overseer of the estate, appears. That old fellow is scheming against Pedrillo, a servant and gardener for the love of Blondchen, an English maid. Meanwhile Belmont, a Spanish nobleman, wants to save Constanze, a Spanish lady who is the captive of Pasha Selim. FTP, what is this Singspiel, an opera written by Mozart, which appealed to the Turkish craze of 18<sup>th</sup> century Vienna?

# Answer: The ABDUCTION FROM THE SERAGLIO

19. The essence of the novel is expressed by the protagonist's comment to "Live all you can; it's a mistake not to." The second one of the title characters is Sarah, who comes to Paris to see her brother. Her brother, Chad, is involved in an affair with the French woman, Madame de Vionnet. The first of the title characters is sent by Chad's mother, Mrs. Newsome, a wealthy widow who wants her son to return home to Woollett, Massachussetts. FTP, what is this novel, centering on Lambert Strether, and written by Henry James.

Answer: The <u>AMBASSADORS</u>

20. He impressed Karl Schwarzschild so much that he was given an appointment to the staff at Gottingen Observatory. Although he had no formal education in astronomy, in 1913 he established the luminosity scale of Cepheid variable stars. In two separate papers he showed that giant and dwarf stars must exist and that a relationship exists between star color and their true brightness. FTP, who was this Danish astronomer who partly gave his name to a graph of the absolute magnitude of stars?

Answer: Ejnar HERTZSPRUNG

21. At the age of 20 he defeated the Roman general, Syagrius, and by the time he was 27, he had absorbed many territories around his capital at Soissons. The only son of Childeric I, in the next century, he would completely defeat a confederation of German tribes known as the Alamanni. The first of his kind to successfully unite the Ripuarian and the Salian groups, he was always respectful to the Catholic Church. FTP, identify this man, whose wife Clotilda convinced him to convert to Christianity in 496, the Merovingian founder of the Frankish kingdom.

Answer: <u>CLOVIS THE GREAT</u> or <u>CLOVIS I</u>
