1. The protagonist seduces an employee at his cousin's collar factory, but falls in love with a girl of the local aristocracy, who symbolizes the wealth and glamour that he seeks. Clyde's relationship with Sondra is menaced when a pregnant Roberta demands that he marry her, so he takes Roberta rowing and allows her to drown after the boat overturns. FTP, name this 1925 Theodore Dreiser novel, based on an actual murder in the Adirondacks in 1906.

Answer: An American Tragedy

2. The essential feature of this process came through desiccation, effected by means of dry sodium carbonate, also known as *natron*. Resin, resin-soaked linen, sawdust, or occasionally, wood pitch were used to fill the cavities, while *canopic* jars or chests stored the organs. FTP, name this process, which often took most of the 70 days between death and burial, according to ancient Egyptian records.

Answer: <u>Mummification</u> (accept equivalents, but prompt on "embalming")

3. This dynasty's mathematicians are credited with creating the modern decimal system and numerals, but that didn't stop the White Huns from sapping its strength after the mid 5th century CE. Its first noteworthy ruler married Princess Kumaradevi of the powerful Licchavi family, which enabled him to expand his territory, laying the foundation for an empire. FTP, name this dynasty, which ruled present-day northern India from about 320 to 550, considered by many to be the golden age of India.

Answer: Gupta Dynasty

4. A public recital of this work took place in Vauxhall Gardens on April 21, 1749, and the crowd of 12000 stopped traffic for three hours. The performance followed six days later at Green Park on a stage built by the theatrical designer Servandoni, all of which was to celebrate the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle. FTP, name this baroque work commissioned by George II of Britain and composed by G.F. Handel.

Answer: Music for the Royal Fireworks

5. Born August 30, 1871, early in his career he studied iron's magnetic properties in high-frequency discharges and designed a time-measuring device. He taught at McGill University in Montreal from 1898 until 1907, at the University of Manchester from 1907 to 1919 and from 1919 was director of the Cavendish Laboratory at Cambridge. FTP, name this 1908 winner of the Nobel Prize in chemistry for his theory of the radioactive transformation of atoms.

Answers: Ernest Rutherford or 1st Baron Rutherford

6. The essence of the novel lies in the central character's remark, "Live all you can; it's a mistake not to." The story revolves around the saga of Chad, who is deeply involved with a French woman named Madame de Vionnet. FTP, name this 1903 Henry James novel, concerning Lambert Strether and Sarah Newsome, who are sent to Paris to persuade Chad to return to Massachusetts.

Answer: The Ambassadors

7. They usually have twelve wings or segments, not including the head, and to each of the first three segments is attached a pair of five-jointed legs. When mature, it will cast off its outer covering and develop the hard-shell covering of the chrysalis. FTP, name this worm-like creature, the second stage in the life cycle of moths and butterflies.

Answer: <u>Caterpillar</u>

8. In this story, Theseus of Athens defeats Creon of Thebes, and the royal Theban cousins Palamon and Arcite are imprisoned in the tower. Both men fight for the love of Emily and their prayers to the gods are both answered - Saturn arranges for Arcite to win the joust but to be thrown from his horse and die, thus allowing Palamon to win Emily's hand. FTP, name this Canterbury Tale, a chivalric romance adapted from Boccaccio's *Teseida*.

Answer: The Knight's Tale

9. His second voyage, to find an open way north to Cathay between Novaya Zemlya and Spitsbergen, was financed by the Moscovy Company, but the passage was blocked by the polar ice and he had to turn back. His last voyage, aboard the Discovery, ended when his crew mutinied and set him adrift. FTP, name this English explorer who also sailed the Half Moon and explored the North American coast, finding both a river and a bay that now bear his name.

Answer: Henry Hudson

10. The essential parts of its mass balance are the zone of accumulation, and the zone of ablation, and it can erode through plucking or by abrasion of the substrate. At its head, a bergschrund crevasse develops during the summer; during winter, it is filled with snow. FTP, name these long, narrow streams of ice that originate in the snowfields or cirque basins of high mountain ranges and flow down preexisting river valleys.

Answer: Alpine glaciers

11. It consists chiefly of two spacious rectangular courts and the halls adjoining them: the Court of the Pool, or of the Myrtles, and the Court of the Lions. The entire plateau on which it is located is surrounded by a reddish brick wall, from which the place takes its name. FTP, name this Moorish fortress palace located in Granada, Spain.

Answer: Alhambra

12. Born in Derby (say "Darby") on April 27, 1820, from 1837 to 1846, he worked as an engineer for the London and Birmingham railway, and later edited the *Economist*. He posited that there are two kinds of knowledge: that gained by the individual, and that gained by the race. FTP, name this Briton, who, in *Programme of a System of Synthetic Philosophy* applied the idea of evolution to fields such as biology, psychology, and sociology.

Answer: Herbert Spenser

13. First headed by Hugh Johnson, it gained the support of labor unions by guaranteeing the right of workers to form labor unions. It's characteristic emblem disappeared after the Supreme Court ruled it an unconstitutional delegation of legislative power to the executive in *Schecter v. United States*. FTP, name this federal agency, created to fight the Great Depression by the National Industry Recovery Act.

Answer: <u>National Recovery Administration</u>

14. Some of his projects have included co-writing the Coen brothers' The Hudsucker Proxy and co-producing two Jean-Claude Van Damme vehicles, Hard Target and Time Cop. He made his major-studio debut in 1990s Darkman and directed the Sharon Stone-Leonardo DiCaprio-Gene Hackman Western The Quick and the Dead. FTP, name this shock-schlock auteur, who secured cult immortality with the 1983 low-budget film The Evil Dead.

Answer: Sam Raimi

15. In the largest Confederate railroad troop movement, a large part of Longstreet's Corps was dispatched via the Carolinas and Georgia to arrive at this battle. A Union division mistakenly left its place in the line, allowing Southern troops to sweep Rosecrans and the Union right flank from the field, but they weren't able to take Snodgrass Hill from Thomas' troops. FTP, name this 1863 Civil War battle, the greatest Confederate victory in the western theater, fought near Chattanooga.

Answer: Chickamauga

16. He had a genius for creating extended poetic metaphors, or conceits, and such seduction pieces as "The Good-morrow" and "The Sunne Rising" deploy Petrarchan conventions. A descendant of Thomas More, he became an Anglican in the 1590s and became secretary to Sir Thomas Egerton in 1597. FTP, name this English poet, who wrote the lyric "A Valediction: Forbidding Mourning".

Answer: John Donne

17. The primary scriptures include 111 pastoral letters under the title Rasail as-Hikma. It originated during the rule of al-Hakim, the sixth imam of the Fatimid dynasty, who proclaimed himself the incarnation of God. FTP, name this religious sect, which combines Christianity and Islam, whose name comes from the first man to proclaim the faith publicly, al-Darazi.

Answer: <u>Druze</u> or <u>Druse</u>

18. Made up of cells called chondrocytes, it occurs singly or in groups and lies within small spaces called lacunae. Surrounding each structure made of this substance is a membrane called the perichondrium, and there are three types of it: fibro-, elastic, and hyalin. FTP, name this tough, resilient connective tissue, found in places such as the tip on one's nose.

Answer: <u>Cartilage</u>

19. Their fortunes took a turn for the better under King Genseric, who ruled from 428 to 477, when Count Boniface, in the midst of a quarrel with Emperor Valentinian III, invited them into the province he governed. Boniface got more than he bargained for as they swarmed into North Africa from Spain, setting up a kingdom that was later destroyed in 534. FTP, name this barbarian tribe, related to the Goths, who also sacked Rome in 455.

Answer: Vandals

20. His profound wisdom came from his having tasted of the salmon of knowledge, which fed on the hazelnuts of wisdom. His life is one of many deeds in the service of the high king at Tara, and his two great loves are his first wife Sedb, and his second wife Gráinne. FTP, name this legendary Irish hero, leader of the Fenians.

Answer: Fionn mac Cumhail or Finn MacCool

21. According to the Argive story, he was exposed at birth and was torn to pieces by dogs but his father, Apollo, later took revenge. In the Theban version, he invented the song which became his namesake, but was put to death by Apollo for presuming to be his rival. FTP, name this Greek mythological figure, the personification of lamentation.

Answer: <u>Linus</u>

- 1. Answer these questions about the literary bent of the Transcendentalist movement FTSNOP.
- A. FFP, this was the movement's major literary vehicle, a magazine edited by Margaret Fuller and later by Emerson, which published 16 issues over 4 years.

Answer: The <u>Dial</u>

B. FFP each, name the Massachusetts town associated with the movement, and name the only member of the group native to that town.

Answers: Concord, Henry David Thoreau

C. F15P, this was virtually the only work of fiction produced by the movement -- a lengthy 1845 local-color novel by Sylvester Judd.

Answer: <u>Margaret</u>
