1. His father rented a farm from Will Varner particularly late in the season, and too late to revoke the lease, Varner learned of his family's reputation for burning barns when they became upset with their landlords. To head off problems, he gave this man a job in his store, and soon he had displaced Varner's son Jody as Will's favorite. Soon, however, his shiftless cousins began moving into Frenchman's Bend, and he pushed them away, sowing the seeds of the destruction of his family. FTP, identify this character featured in *The Hamlet*, the patriarch of the Snopes clan.

Answer: Flem Snopes (Prompt on Snopes)

2. His wife was responsible for securing the first eighty Japanese cherry trees planted along the banks of the Potomac River, as well as the second gift of three thousand from the City of Tokyo. Members of his cabinet included Secretary of State Philander Chase Knox, Treasury Secretary Franklin McVeigh, Secretary of War Henry Stimson, and Agriculture Secretary James Wilson. FTP, name this president, the first member of the cabinet other than a Secretary of State to become president, perhaps best-known for his excessive weight.

Answer: William Howard Taft

3. He died in 1906 in Aix-en-Provence, his boyhood home, having moved there from Paris 11 years earlier after breaking with the impressionists. Called "the father of us all" by Pablo Picasso, some of his best works, including such landscapes as Le Chateau Noir, date from his post-Paris life. FTP, identify this French landscapist responsible for Mont-Sainte-Victoire with Large Pine Trees and The Card Players.

Answer: Paul Cezanne

4. He was a graduate student at Cambridge in 1937 when he published "On Computable Numbers, with an Application to the *Entscheidungs-problem*". It tackled a question posed by David Hilbert at the turn of the century: Can all mathematical problems be solved by a fixed, definite set of procedures? He answered no, and in the process established the theoretical basis for the digital computer. FTP, identify this man who went on to head the team that realized the dream of the digital computer.

Answer: Alan Turing

5. He studied at the University of Havana before becoming a journalist. He published a study of Afro-Cuban - 1933's ¡Ecué-Yamba-Ó! - and an imaginary evocation of the life of 19th century Haitian leader Henri Christophe in The Kingdom of this World. His masterpiece, published in 1953, is a study of the coexistence between primeval myths and imposed Spanish civilization titled The Lost Steps. FTP, identify this Cuban author, who in the late 1940s began using the term "magic realism" to describe the works of some Latin-American authors.

Answer: Alejo <u>Carpentier</u>

6. He was of great size and masculine beauty and won distinction for his exploits while still a child. His prowess was increased by the gift of seven fingers on each hand, seven toes on each foot, and seven pupils in each eye. Favored by the gods and immune from the feebleness laid upon the men of Ulster, his single-handed defense of Ulster against the forces of Queen Medb is chronicled in *The Cattle Raid of Cooley*. FTP, identify this greatest of the Knights of the Red Branch and hero of medieval Irish literature.

Answer: <u>Cú Chulainn</u>

7. In April 1864, a detachment of Confederate cavalry surrounded a Union garrison in Tennessee and demanded its surrender. When the surrender did not come, the Confederate commander, Nathan Bedford Forrest, ordered his men to storm the fort. When they found the fort garrisoned with 6 black regiments and only one white regiment, they began systematically killing the defenders, long after resistance had stopped. FTP, identify this massacre for which Forrest never repented and was never punished.

Answer: Fort Pillow

8. It is made of up of five movements - "Now shall the sun as brightly rise", "Now I see clearly, why such dark flames", "When your dear mother [comes into my room]", "Oft do I think that they have just gone walking", and "In this foul weather". Based on five of the nearly 500 poems written by Friedrich Rückert in reflection on the premature death of his sons, the composer also knew the subject well after losing his daughter in 1907. FTP, identify this orchestral work by Gustav Mahler.

Answer: Songs on the Death of Children or Kindertotenlieder

9. Each has two membranes: a smooth outer membrane and an inner membrane that is elaborately folded to increase internal surface area. The infoldings are called cristae and form a compartment known as the matrix. The number of these in each cell varies according to the metabolic demand placed on the cell. FTP, identify these organelles involved energy generation and respiration, the "powerhouse furnace" of the cell.

Answer: Mitochondria

10. Its first rite is the donning of the ihram, a white seamless garment which is symbolic of purity and of the renunciation of evil and mundane matters. After donning the ihram, the talbiyah, a short prayer which reaffirms allegiance to God, is invoked. Next comes the stoning of the white pillars, followed by a sacrifice and the cutting of hair. After this, the ihrams are exchanged for regular clothing, and pilgrims then perform the tawaf - the seven-fold circling of the Ka'bah, or "House of God". FTP, identify the name of the pilgrimage to Mecca, one of the five right pillars of Islam.

Answer: <u>hajj</u> (Prompt on pilgrimage to Mecca or equivalents)

11. Central to this case were five provisions of the Pennsylvania Abortion Control Act of 1982, including a 24 hour waiting period, parental consent, and spousal notification. It never took effect, as it was tied up in the courts until 1992, when the Supreme Court overturned the law and upheld *Roe v Wade*. FTP, identify this most recent challenge to *Roe v Wade*, one party of which was the recently deceased ex-governor of Pennsylvania.

Answer: <u>Planned Parenthood of Southeast Pennsylvania v Casey</u>

12. The first provincial-born emperor, he followed his father into the imperial army, and took command of a legion in Spain in 89 CE. Domitian sent him to Upper Germany to quell a rebellion, and although it was over when he arrived, Domitian made him consul in honor of his accomplishments. When Nerva succeeded Domitian, he made this man governor of Upper Germany, but, Nerva survived only a year and a half, and this man became emperor. FTP, identify this second of the Five Good Emperors.

Answer: Trajan

13. He was named Most Promising Comic of 1959 by none other than Spencer Tracy, but by the early sixties he had forsaken comedy for a chance to interview newsmakers on his weekly show. He began to run with the Rat Pack, and even helped Dean Martin write a sure fire hit song - until it was learned that the song infringed on one Dean had recorded years earlier. FTP, identify this owner of the I'm-On-A-Rolla Gay and longtime Springfield children's entertainer.

Answer: <u>Krusty</u> the Clown (Accept Herschel <u>Krustofski</u>)

14. Poets included Stephane Mallarme, Paul Verlaine, Arthur Rimbaud, and Georges Rodenbach. Remy de Gourmont was the principal critic. The group criteria were applied most successfully to the novel by Joris-Karl Huysmans and to the theater by Maurice Maeterlinck. FTP, identify this literary movement of the late 19th century, originating in France, interested in the bizarre and the artificial and in themes of decay and ruin.

Answer: Symbolists

15. It was confirmed at CERN in Switzerland in 1983, some four years after Sheldon Glashow, Abdus Salam, and Steven Weinberg shared the 1979 Nobel Prize in Physics for theorizing its existence. The confirming discovery was the discovery of W & Z particles, two of a number of elementary particles this unified field theory predicted. FTP, identify this theory which describes two of the fundamental forces in nature.

Answer: <u>Electroweak</u> theory

16. He had himself elected and crowned king of England while his older brother, Robert II, duke of Normandy, was on crusade. In 1101, Robert invaded England, but he bought Robert off, waited four years, and launched his own invasion of Normandy, defeating his brother. This was not his first experience with treachery, however. He ascended to the throne after another older brother was killed in a "hunting accident". FTP, identify this hunting partner and successor of William II.

Answer: Henry I (Prompt on Henry)

17. It is composed of two essays. "My Dungeon Shook: Letter to My Nephew on the One Hundredth Anniversary of the Emancipation" attacks the idea that blacks are inferior to whites, while the second essay, "Down at the Cross: Letter from a Region in My Mind," recounts the author's coming-of-age in Harlem, appraises the Nation of Islam, and gives a statement of his personal beliefs. FTP, identify this 1963 work by James Baldwin.

Answer: The Fire Next Time

18. Born in Chicago, in 1890 he invented the spectroheliograph, which led to the discovery of magnetic fields and vortices in sunspots, and in 1895 founded the Astrophysical Journal, still the leading publication in its field. He also founded and served as director of the Yerkes and Mount Wilson Observatories, but never served as the director of his greatest legacy. FTP, identify this founder of the Palomar Observatory, who died before it was completed.

Answer: George Ellery Hale

19. A graduate of Atlanta (Georgia) University, he was the first African-American admitted to the Florida bar, and from 1906 to 1912 he served as American consul in Nicaragua and Venezuela. In 1901 went to New York with his brother, where they wrote some 200 songs for the Broadway stage, and later penned such works as *The Autobiography of an Ex-Colored Man* and 1930s Black Manhattan. FTP, name this poet, diplomat, and anthologist of African-American culture, most famous for his seven sermons in free verse, God's Trombones.

Answer: James Weldon Johnson

20. The first was masterminded by Godfrey Hounsfield of the British firm EMI. It hooked up an X-ray machine to a digital computer, enabling radiologists to distinguish normal from clotted blood and to examine the ventricles that hold cerebrospinal fluid. Variations soon appeared - notably, the full-body version, which required people to lie for extended periods inside a coffin-like cylinder. FTP, identify this medical scanner, whose acronym has a definite feline ring.

Answer: Computerized Axial Tomography (Accept CAT-Scan or equivalents)

21. Outnumbered and surrounded by Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist forces, the Communists of China's Jiangxi province abandoned their beleaguered encampment in 1934. On October 16, under the cover of darkness, some 80,000 men broke out of Jiangxi, piercing Chiang's cordon. Leaving their wives, children, and a rear guard of 28,000 mostly wounded men, they marched for 6,000 miles before arriving in the safety of Yan'an. FTP, identify this defining event of Communism in 1930s China.

Answer: The Long March

Answer: John Sevier

- A. FFP, influenced by Calvin, this man set up a Presbyterian church in Scotland in 1557.

B. FTP, this is the title given to church elders that manage the spiritual conduct of the church, unlike deacons or trustees which handle temporal issues.

Answer: Prebyters

C. F15P, this Irish missionary is considered the founder of Presbyterianism in America, having set up two churches in Maryland and one in Philadelphia in 1706.

Answer: Francis Makemie

- 5. Identify these glacial sedimentary land forms FTP each.
- A. Usually found in clusters and around 25-50 meters high, these are large streamlined hills of till and bedrock that parallel the direction of ice movement.

Answer: <u>drumlins</u>

B. Often exploited commercially, these are small hills of sand and gravel dumped near or at the edge of the ice.

Answer: kames

C. Often steep-sided and occupied by ponds or lakes, these are hollows formed when a melting block of ice is partly buried by sand and gravel.

Answer: McKinley Tariff Act

B. This 1894 act shaved the McKinley tariff from 48% to 41%, and also introduced a federal income tax, which was declared unconstitutional. Cleveland allowed the act to pass without his signature.

Answer: Wilson-Gorman Act

C. This 1897 tariff, sponsored by a Republican from Maine, restored tariffs to about 46%, fulfilling a McKinley campaign promise. Unlike its predecessors, this one lasted over a decade, until being replaced by the Payne-Aldrich tariff in 1909.

Answer: <u>Dingley</u> Tariff Act

C. This was the first historic dynasty of China. The Chinese calendar, well-developed writing, and social classes first appear. This dynasty gave way to the Chou in about 1027 BCE.

Answer: Shang or Yin

C. FFP, in a last resort to solve the financial crisis, Louis was forced to assemble this body in 1789. It quickly broke with the king and declared itself the National Assembly, which would eventually condemn Louis to death - by a single vote.
