1. There's a friar, of course, named Francis, and the usual assortment of attendants and messengers, including Margaret and Ursula, and Conrad and the villainous Borachio. Themes of servitude continue throughout as Don John refuses to submit to his brother, the Prince of Aragon, and the two main characters attempt to retain the freedom of being single, but are, FTP, ultimately joined together in marriage at the end of which Shakespearean comedy involving Beatrice and Benedick?

Answer: <u>Much Ado About Nothing</u>

2. It is somewhat an oddity among scientific tools because its horizontal axis increases from right to left. This horizontal axis can be divided up into seven sections, labelled O B A F G K M, which come from Annie Cannon's classification system. The majority of the plot-points on the graph lie along a downward sloping band known as the main sequence, with the horizontal axis measuring temperature and the vertical axis measuring brightness. FTP, identify this astronomical tool which helps explain stellar evolution by allowing astronomers to plot the absolute magnitude of a star against its apparent color.

This quote is from, FTP, what British-intercepted, 1917 document sent by the German foreign minister?

Answer: Zimmermann Telegram

4. Its name comes from a Sanskrit word meaning "Lord of the World". It is found in Puri on the northeast coast of India, in a nine-hundred-year old temple. Every year, it and its siblings Balabhadra and Subhadra are placed on forty-five foot carts with sixteen wheels, each seven feet in diameter. Worshippers pull the carts through the streets, and, according to legend, some used to hurl themselves under the carts. FTP, name this wooden statue of Krishna, whose name has been adapted into an English term meaning "an unstoppable force".

Answer: <u>Jaganath</u> or <u>Juggernaut</u>

5. First detailed by C. Anthony R. Hoare in 1962, it works by recursively partitioning and sorting an array. Algorithm analysis has shown that its average running time is Oh of n log n, but quadratic worst case running time can result if a good pivot is not chosen. Fortunately, the median-of-three method avoids worst case time without destroying the elegance of its implementation. FTP, name this fastest of all internal memory sorting algorithms.

Answer: Quicksort

6. His stage work has brought him nominations for an Olivier Award for "Outstanding Newcomer" and a Tony Award for "Outstanding Supporting Actor" for *Indiscretions* alongside Kathleen Turner, and he starred in a 1999 London production of *Tis a Pity She's a Whore*. A former roommate of Ewan McGregor and teenage star of the daytime soap *Families*, he can be seen in the upcoming film *The Wisdom of Crocodiles*. He played the white trash boy toy of Kevin Spacey in *Midnight in the Garden of Good Evil* but, FTP, you may remember his best as golden boy Dickey Greenleaf in *The Talented Mr. Ripley*.

Answer: Jude <u>Law</u>

7. Born sometime around 460 B.C., he became a commander of Athenian hoplites in northern Greece, but lost his position and was exiled for twenty years after he lost a battle at Amphipolis to the Spartans in 424 B.C. His exile afforded him a more objective view of events in Greece and he started to write a chronology of the conflict between Sparta and Athens. FTP, name this historian, the author of *History of the Peloponnesian War*.

Answer: Thucydides

8. Set in the author's hometown of Lorain, Ohio, during 1941, it is told from the point of view of Claudia, a young girl. The main plot, however, revolves around Claudia's friend, Pecola Breedlove, who is raped and impregnated by her troubled father, Cholly Breedlove. By the end of the novel, Pecola's obsession with beauty and the death of her baby cause her to withdraw from reality in, for ten points, this 1969 book, the first by Toni Morrison.

Answer: The Bluest Eye

9. Although the motivation behind this still remains unclear, a partial explanation can be offered by the observation that languages tend to maximize use of the phonological space. Thus languages with three vowels tend to have a high front vowel, a low central vowel, and a high back vowel. Old High German and Spanish underwent a process similar to this and reduced the number of regular vowels in the languages from seven to five. Beginning during the Middle English period and ending in the eighteenth century, FTP, what phenomenon resulted in a systematic raising and diphthongization of English vowels?

Answer: Great English Vowel Shift

10. The artillery bombardment began at 6 a.m. and it is estimated that both sides fired around 15,000 rounds per hour during the course of the fifteen hour battle. Louis Davout attacked with the French left wing, during which his horse was killed, but made little headway. The French Fifth Corps were able to take the village of Utitsa, and in the afternoon captured the Great Redoubt which was defended by 27 cannon. Bagration retook the redoubt, though, which caused Napoleon to train 200 cannon upon it, and Bagration was killed. FTP, identify this famous battle, which ended with the Russian army retreating to Moscow during the night of September 7, 1812.

Answer: Battle of Borodino

11. The electric field at a point due to this type of charge configuration is effectively equal to one over four pi times the permittivity constant times the quantity q d over z to the third power, when z, the distance between the point and the configuration, is sufficiently large. Subsequently, the strength of the electric field radically decreases as one moves away from the configuration, which makes sense because the charges almost cancel each other out. FTP, identify this configuration of two oppositely charged particles, of which a water molecule is an example.

Answer: dipole

12. In *Monologion*, he offers cosmological arguments that things are good to the extent that they exist - the greater a thing is, the more of a metaphysical existence it has. He is often referred to as the "Father of Scholasticism", and was the second Norman Archbishop of Canterbury. FTP, name this theologian and saint, known for his ontological arguments in proof of the existence of God.

Answer: Saint Anselm of Canterbury

13. According to this man, both conviction and conversion were such overwhelming emotional experiences that the human frame could scarcely contain them. If someone was to fall to the ground or cry out in the midst of such an experience, then undoubtedly the Holy Spirit was the cause. This belief angered many of his contemporaries who felt that his manner of preaching inspired more hysteria than holiness, but his erudition in matters of philosophy, and his wholehearted embrace of Calvinism provide the intellectual foundation for the Great Awakening. FTP, name this Northampton, Massachusetts preacher, author of Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God.

Answer: Jonathan Edwards

14. He was awarded the Legion of Honor by Mitterand in 1983, shared the Formentor Prize with Samuel Beckett in 1961, and had been honored as the director of the national library of his country in 1955. After suffering a severe head wound in 1938, he no longer limited himself to the historical sketches which appeared in *Historia universal de la Infamia*, and began to write fantastic short stories which were collected in *Ficciones* and *El Aleph*, as well as a number of detective stories published under the pseudonym H. Bustos Domecq. FTP, identify this Argentinian author, famous for his dream-like short fiction and poetry.

Answer: Jorge Luis Borges

15. Born in Glasgow, Scotland, on October 2, 1852, he received a doctorate from the University of Tübingen at the age of 19. His early work showed the relation between the alkaloids and pyridine. Later he studied the critical state, and in 1897 he and Lord Rayleigh announced the discovery of the gas argon. FTP, name this British chemist, who won the 1904 Nobel Prize for chemistry for discovering helium, neon, xenon, and krypton, and determining their place in the periodic system.

Answer: Sir William Ramsay

16. Of his supposed 123 plays, only 7 remain extant today. He had strong cultic connections, as he was a priest of a minor healing divinity named Alkon, and his plays often deal with the hero,s relationship to the gods. He set his last play in the section of Athens known as Colonus and its tragic hero, a once strong king who is now an enfeebled old man, is symbolic of the post-Periclean Athens at the time of the author,s death. So great was the respect for this tragedian that Aristophanes never ridiculed, FTP, this author of Ajax, Oedipus at Colonus, Oedipus Tyrannus, and Antigone.

Answer: <u>Sophocles</u>

17. In the wake of this event, Parliament passed the Six Acts which suppressed public meetings, curbed the press, and speeded up procedures for prosecuting offenders against the public order. It began on July 16, 1819 when the local magistrates ordered the arrest of the speakers and Captain Hugh Birley led his visibly drunk men into the crowd. The crowd of perhaps 50,000 local reformers resisted Birley's yeomanry, and Lieutenant Colonel L'Estrange sent the 15th Hussars into the crowd resulting in, FTP, what famous Manchester massacre?

Answer: Peterloo Massacre

18. Through his acquaintance with Jusepe de Ribera, he learned something of the potentialities of a limited palette of black and neutrals as is evidenced in the subtle harmonies of grays and blacks in his portraits. These portraits convey little of the individual personalities of his subjects, although that of Innocent X hints that he may have wanted to express his interpretations more if his duties as court painters had allowed him to do so. FTP, name this painter of *Christ at Emmaus*, *The Surrender of Breda*, and *Philip IV*, Spain's greatest master.

19. It has wide leaves and reddish-purple flowers and in Asia, where it originated, its starchy roots are made into a paste and eaten. In the 1800's, it was introduced to the United States as livestock feed. Because bacteria that live on the roots enrich the soil, it was used as ground cover during the 1930's. FTP, name this vine, which belongs to the pea family, spreads rapidly, is difficult to control, and can be found all over the southern U.S.

20. He does not see dead people, but he often writes them letters, usually while traveling between his country home in the Berkshires and New York, or Martha's Vineyard, or his childhood home in Chicago. The loss of his ex-wife, Madeleine, to his former friend, Valentine Gersbach, has so upset him, however, that he cannot finish writing his second book on romanticism and history. By the end of the novel, he learns to accept this loss and regains his former confidence in his own sanity. FTP, who is this lost intellectual, the titular character of a 1964 work by Saul Bellow?

21. The surprisingly strong sales of the complete sessions of this artist's most controversial work has renewed interest in jazz fusion, probably much to the chagrin of noted traditionalist Stanley Crouch. Crouch should not be too quick to judge, however, as Wynton Marsalis, Crouch's critical darling, has been greatly influenced by the work of this artist's second quintet, which already showed him experimenting with the rhythm section as the primary focus in a jazz ensemble, albeit in an acoustic setting. FTP, identify this restless trumpet player, the genius behind 1969's Bitches Brew.
