1. She wrote Life and Labour of the People in London and in 1894 with her husband wrote The History of Trade Unionism. He was a Labour member of Parliament. Together they helped establish the London School of Economics and the left-wing journal The New Statesman. FTP, name this couple who were leaders in the British Fabian movement.

ans: Beatrice and Sydney _Webb_ (accept Beatrice Webb on early buzz)

2. While at Cambridge, he was a member of a reform-minded undergraduate society called "The Apostles." He made a splash as a young poet, but his stock fell when, in 1832, he published a poem ridiculing Christopher North, the acid-penned critic at Blackwood magazine. Fortunately, he received a comfortable pension from Sir Robert Peel, and when he began publishing again, he met critical and popular success. FTP, name this poet laureate whose works include The Princess, Ulysses, Locksley Hall, In Memoriam, Crossing the Bar, The Idylls of the King, and the Charge of the Light Brigade.

Ans: Alfred Tennyson

- 3. When freshly deposited, it is the best reflector of visible light known. It is stable in pure air and water, but unfortunately it becomes discolored when exposed to ozone, hydrogen sulfide, or air containing sulfur. It has the highest electrical and thermal conductivity of all metals, and possesses the lowest contact resistance. It is of great importance in photograpy, with about 30% of the U.S. industrial consumption going into this application. FTP, name this metal whose atomic number is 47. ans: _silver_



He has hosted a daily radio program on WFMT Chicago and over the years has amassed a collection of about 9000 interviews of ordinary people, pioneering in the creation of the field of oral history. FTP, name this author of Coming of Age: The Story of Our Century by Those Who've Lived It, My American Century, Working, Hard Times, and The Good War.

- 8. It refers to any idea, behavior, or skill that can be transferred from one person to another by imitation, such as stories, fashions, inventions, recipes, songs, and ways of plowing a field, throwing a baseball, or writing a quiz bowl packet. FTP, name controversial term coined by Richard Dawkins in his 1976 study, The Selfish Gene. ans: meme
- 9. He is a well-known skeptic about government regulation and a recent op-ed piece said that he is "the only person in the world who is a viable candidate for both the Supreme Court and Nobel Prize in economics." Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson must share an equally high opinion of him. FTP, name this author of An Affair of State: The Investigation, Impeachment, and Trial of President Clinton. He is the Chief Judge of the Seventh Circuit Court and was the unsuccessful arbitrator in the Microsoft antitrust case. ans: Judge Richard Posner (pose ner)
- 10. He intended to enter Harvard Law School, but failing eyesight kept him away. Instead he worked in a pump manufacturing plant in Philadelphia where he rose to the position of chief engineer. In 1893, he opened a consulting firm specializing in the systemization of management and helped overhaul the Bethlehem Steel Company's works. FTP, name this pioneer of time and motion studies who is often called the father of scientific management.

Ans: Frederick Winslow _Taylor_

- 11. The investigations of Secretary of the Treasury Benjamin Bristow led to 237 indictments, including the chief treasury clerk and the president's private secretary. Over \$4 million in unpaid taxes were recovered and Ulysses Grant was cleared personally, but the Republican Party was damaged. FTP, name this scandal in which Midwestern distillers evaded taxes through a series of bribes. ans: the Whiskey Ring
- 12. He attended Eton on a scholarship and then went to Burma to work as a policeman for five years. After resigning his post, he lived among working-class people in Paris and tramps in England for more than a year. These experiences formed the basis of an autobiographical work, Down and Out in Paris and London. He then worked as a school teacher and bookstore clerk, writing Burmese Days and Keep the Aspidistra Flying. FTP,

name this author whose visit to the depressed industrial areas of England in the mid-30s caused him to become a socialist and led to the publication of The Road to Wigan Pier. Ans: George Orwell (aka Eric Blair)

- 13. The lumbrical muscles, the adductor pollicis muscle, the flexor retinaculum sheath, and the opponens digiti minimi muscles. These can all be found in the same structure of the human body that includes eight carpal bones, five metacarpals, and over a dozen phalanges. FTP, name this body part which attaches to the ulna and radius. ans: the _hand_
- 14. The story of this man influenced Jewish and Christian thought about the afterlife and is used to explain the dogma of Mary's Assumption into heaven. In the fourth chapter of Genesis, he is referred to as son of Cain and father of Irad, but in the fifth chapter, he is given as son of Jared and father of Methuselah. FTP, name this Biblical figure who is mentioned in Hebrews as being assumed into heaven following the wording in Genesis which says he "walked with God; and he was not, for God took him."

- 15. It is Symphonic Movement Number One of Mouvements Symphonique. The title has nothing to do with the ocean, but refers to a type of locomotive and its wheel numbering. In fact, the music is based on the acceleration of a train. FTP, name this musical composition by the French composer Arthur Honneger.

- 16. He was hauled before the Inquisition in 1800 and charged with fornicating with Maria Herrera, reading books on the Index Expurgatorius, and gambling. FTP, name this priest who on September 13, 1810, summoned parishioners to the church in Dolores, assembled a band of Indians and Mestizos and began a march and series of massacres that began the Mexican Revolution.

17. Born and raised in Grenoble, he was headed for the Ecole Polytechnique and arrived in Paris on the day of Napoleon's coup d'etat. His works include Racine and Shakespeare; Lives of Haydn, Mozart and Metastose; and the Life of Napoleon, but his is better known for his memoirs, such as The Life of Henri Brulard and Recollections of an Egotist. FTP, name this writer most famous for his novels, especially La Chartreuse de Parma and Le Rouge et le Noire.

Instead, this economist argued that many national currencies should be done away with, as he invented the idea of an optimal currency area. Hence, he is often called the intellectual father of the Euro. FTP, name this Columbia University economist, winner of the 1999 Nobel Prize.

- 21. It was located where the Via Flaminia crossed the Tiber River about two miles from the walls of Rome. On October 26, 312 the ill prepared forces of Maxentius met the advancing army of Constantine and were routed. Constantine's victory and an earlier vision led to his conversion to Christianity and the adoption of Christianity as the Empire's state religion. FTP, name this crucial battle or the bridge where it was fought. ans: the _Milvian Bridge_
- 22. - 24. Several classic adventure stories were written when the author bet that he could pen a novel better than the best sellers of the day. Such was the case when an unsuccessful writer who had recently returned from Transvaal to Britain, bet his brother that he could write a story which would equal the success of Stevenson's Treasure Island. The story and its sequel Allan Quatermain became best sellers for H. Rider Haggard. FTP, name this story in which a group of Europeans search for riches in Africa. ans: King Solomon's Mines
- 25. Geographically, it comprised the land bounded by the Black Sea to the west, the Caucasus Mountains to the north, the Surami Range to the east and the Meskhetian

Mountains to the south in modern Georgia. This painting takes a number of liberties with topography, so that the pastoral foreground with the Tagus River and Alcantara bridge, serve as a foil for the haunting vision of the Alcazar and cathedral tower against an eerily stormy sky. Painted in 1597, it shows the adopted home town on Domenikos Theotokopoulos.

ans: The _View of Toledo_

This painting shows Romulus, ruler of the newly founded city of Rome, giving a prearranged signal with his cloak for the Roman soldiers to carry off the wives of the visitors from a neighboring city who have come for a religious celebration. Name this painting by Nicolas Poussin.

ans: The Rape of the Sabine Women

Finally, name the German chemist who adapted Haber's method of ammonia synthesis to commercial use during the 1930s. The process of manufacturing ammonia for use in explosives and fertilizers is named for Haber and this man.

During his travels to the South Pacific and back, Melville sailed from Massachusetts to the Marquesas on a whaler, participated in a mutiny on an Australian whaler, shipped as a boat-steerer on a Nantucket whaler, and served as an ordinary seaman on a U.S. Navy frigate. Name any one of these four ships on which he sailed for ten points. ans: the _Acushnet_ or _Lucy Ann_ or _Charles and Henry_ or _United States_

For five points, what was the subtitle of Melville's Moby Dick?

ans: The Whale

Finally, for ten points, to which American author was Moby Dick dedicated? ans: Nathaniel Hawthorne

First name the man who was born on August 5, 1930 on his grandparents' farm near Wapakoneta, Ohio who is famous for a trip he took between July 16 and July 24, 1969. ans: Neil _Armstrong_

On Christmas eve, 1968, this astronaut read the first part of the Bible to a national audience: "God created the heavens and the Earth, and the Earth was without form and void." Meanwhile, he and his Apollo 8 crew beamed back footage from the first circumlunar flight. Name this astronaut who later became president of Eastern Airlines, during its most profitable period.

He graduated from North Carolina A & T and earned a Ph.D. at MIT, writing pioneering papers on chemical and high-pressure lasers. After working at Hughes Research Labs in Malibu, CA, he was selected in January 1978 to train with NASA. After Guion Bluford, he became the second African-American in space. Name this man who died in the Challenger accident.

ans: Ronald McNair

5. Answer these questions about Caesar's campaigns in Gaul for fifteen points each. Caesar's first campaign was provoked by the migration of a Celtic tribe from Switzerland through Provence. Caesar defeated them in 58 BC at Toulon-sur-Arroux. Name this tribe whose name is still connected with Switzerland.

This man used his cavalry to intercept Caesar's foraging parties and instituted a policy of burning stores of grain. After he defeated Caesar at Gergovia, almost all of Gaul rallied behind him. But after defeat at Alesia, he became Caesar's prisoner and was taken to Rome and executed.

Taylor's daughter was married on June 17, 1835, but she and her husband contracted malaria on his Mississippi plantation and she died only three months after the wedding. Name the man who was Taylor's son in law for three months. Hint, he later served as a cabinet officer and president.

Ans: Jefferson Davis

Taylor's Secretary of State, John Clayton and Britain's Sir Henry Lytton-Bulwer signed a treaty in 1850. What was the subject of this treaty?

Ans: A _canal_ through Central America (accept equivalents)

Taylor forced the British to give up their control over the Mosquito protectorate before he would agree to the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty. In what country was Britain's Mosquito protectorate?

As applied to glacier ice, it is the process by which ice below the snow line is wasted by evaporation and melting.

ans: ablation

It is the land counterpart of a delta. An assemblage of sediments marking the place where a stream moves from a steep gradient to a flatter gradient and suddenly loses transporting power—typical of arid and semiarid climates but not confined to them.

ans: alluvial fan

It is a permeable region of rock or soil through which ground water can move.

ans: aquifer

It is a mass of sand, gravel, or alluvium deposited in a body of water and also a unit of pressure, approximately equal to atmospheric pressure at sea level.

ans: bar

It is a dark colored extrusive igneous rock composed chiefly of calcium plagioclase and pyroxene. The extrusive equivalent of gabbro, it underlies the ocean basins and comprises much of the oceanic crust.

ans: basalt

13. Identify these flowers for ten points each:

Its name comes from Latin and refers to the fact that its flowers resemble circle of little doves. It is the state flower of Colorado.

Ans: Columbine

It yields a dark purlish dye used in India for blackening shoes, and is sometimes called the shoeflower. In China it was used for medicine and in Polynesia it was a sacred flower. It blooms all year round, but individual flowers bloom for only one day. Name this state flower of Hawaii.

Ans: Hibiscus

It is named for the physician to the Homeric gods. The ancient Greeks believed it was an emanation of the moon and that it shone in the dark and drove away evil spirits, acting as a cure for epilepsy, nightmares, and mental illness. It is the state flower of Indiana.

Ans: Peony

14. Its first six chapters are "The Sound of the Shell," "Fire on the Mountain," "Huts on the Beach," "Painted Faces and Long Hair," "Beast from Water," and "Beast from Air." Name this dark novel set during World War II, for five points.

ans: Lord of the Flies

The most savage of the boys in William Golding's novel, he loves to tortures pigs and Piggy and is Jack's major supporter. For five points, name this character from Lord of the Flies, whose name means "spear."

ans: Roger

For ten points, name the twin brothers in the novel, who are so inseparable, that they are often referred to in the singular tense.

ans: Sam and Eric (or Samneric)

For ten points identify the novel by William Golding that deals with the survival of a shipwrecked sailor who shuns the lobster that lurks by his island rock. He hates that kind of creature. But, as Golding makes clear, he is a lobster. Like other Golding characters, he fails to use reason to control the violence in himself, because he does not know himself.

This Marxist-turned-conservative wrote the classic Roll, Jordan, Roll, as well as The Political Economy of Slavery, and a forthcoming book with his noted wife, titled The Mind of the Master Class.

ans: Eugene Genovese

The wife of Eugene Genovese, her noted works include Within the Plantation Household: Black and White Women of the Old South

ans: Elizabeth Fox-Genovese

His works include The Political Economy of the Cotton South and an insightful analysis of the post-slave South titled Old South, New South
