This papal name did not appear again until 1963 and continues in the name of today's pope. FTP, who was this pope born Camillo Borghese?

7. A sharp, cramplike pain that shoots down the legs after exertion, this symptom of peripheral arterial disease is usually relieved by rest. For 10 points, name this condition named for the cuckolded husband of Messalina, or that Roman emperor who walked with a limp.

Answer: intermittent claudication or Claudius

8. The lead character is a man who suffers from an acute case of insecurity and stress, which causes serious mental problems and faulty leadership that his underlings are beginning to notice. The situation comes to a head during a fierce storm, in which Lt. Steve Maryk relieves Queeg of his duties against Queeg's will in order to save the ship and the men. 12. As a player he never even got a cup of coffee in the majors. In 1991 he became the 30th manager in New York Yankees history and the youngest manager in baseball at the time. He was employed by his most recent team for two years before that team even began play. Despite winning a division title in 1999, FTP, who was recently let go as manager of the Arizona Diamondbacks?

At the feast of Dagon, he was brought to the temple to be mocked for his blindness and weakness, but Jehovah gives him the strength to knock down two pillars of the building. As a member of the expanding military bands, it became a permanent fixation in orchestras in about 1850. FTP, name this lower brass instrument, the companion to the tuba, trumpet, and French horn, which features a large sliding section.

*24. It had been established as a military post during the revolt of the Maccabees, and was converted into a palace by King Herod the Great during the Parthian invasion of 40 BC. It was held by the Romans until AD 66, when around 1000 Zealots under Eleazar ben Jair captured it and held out there for three years after the fall of Jersualem. FTP, name this 1300-foot-tall rocky plateau overlooking the Dead Sea, site of AD 73 mass-suicide of its Jewish occupants.

Answer: Masada

20. It began in 1958 with a single location in California. It now consists of over 900 locations, mostly franchised. True to its name, there are locations in Canada and Japan, as well as the United States. The menu features little in the way of Japanese or Canadian cuisine, however, except perhaps for Canadian bacon and maple syrup. Other items include Belgian waffles, French toast, and the chain's namesake item in numerous styles including Swedish and French. For ten points name this popular restaurant chain.
