2. "The Sisters" opens this loose collection of short stories with common strands of structure and setting. Other stories included in this 1907 work are "An Encounter," "Eveline," "A Little Cloud," and "Clay;" although they can be read alone, they interweave thematically, each depicting a small moment the author called an epiphany, before coalescing in the final story, the longest and most famed. FTP name this collection of short stories, including "Araby" and "The Dead," the first major work published by James Joyce.

8. He won just .9% of the vote this last Sunday's elections, well behind the 55% gamered by Aleksander Kwasniewski. It was his second loss to Kwasniewski, as he lost to him previously in 1995. He won the election in 1990, becoming his country's first post-communist president. FTP name this Nobel Winner and founder of Polish Solidarity.

9. As a young boy he was afflicted with tuberculosis, making it a daily struggle to take in every breath. Nevertheless, this boy forced himself to run every day, eventually becoming a superb athlete and soldier by his pure "Will." After graduating from Fordham Law School, he joind the FBI, later became a local prosecutor in the State of New York, and after that a stint in politics. FTP. Name this Watergate co-conspirator and nationally syndicated radio talk-show host.

10. At 4:45 PM, the whistle that ended the workday went off, and the workers at the Asch building began to leave, when someone noticed smoke coming from the building's 8th floor. The arrival of the fire engines was hampered by the crowd in front of the building, and the workers who had jumped from the higher floors onto the street. 146 were killed in the fire and panic, and today the building is a part of the New York University campus. FTP, name this March 25, 1911 disaster, which led to the establishment of the New York division of Fire Prevention.

Answer: Triangle Shirtwaist Company fire

11. This temple was named because the goddess to whom it was dedicated was a maiden (or, yes, a virgin), and sat on the citadel of the city to which this goddess gave her name. The Greeks who lived in the city and the surrounding area, called Attica, gave a lavish festival to her involving many sacrifices, libations, and, as any self-respecting goddess with fashion sense would want, a new robe to clothe her statue. FTP, name this famous temple to Athena in Athens.

Nancy Wilson and her husband cowrote the band's top single, "Fever Dog." FTP, name the band William Miller travels across the country with throughout the film "Almost Famous", a name shared with the city that is home to Oklahoma State University.

17. After its 1848 formation, Thomas Woolner, Frederick Stephens, William Rosetti, and James Collinson were recruited to join; Collinson left in 1850 and was replaced by Walter Deverell. To do this, the founding members - John Millais, W. H.
