Tossups

1. This work, first appearing in 1971, was welcomed by many as an alternative to Utilitarianism. This work proposes a scenario in which all people, prior to actually existing, participate equally in designing the world they will inhabit. However, no one knows his own attributes in comparison to anyone else's, so it makes no sense to maximize the overall utility in society. Instead, people would try to safeguard themselves against the worst that society had to offer by ensuring that they had equal liberties. They would also try to distribute the wealth so that the poor were as well-off as possible. FTP, name this book, which proposes this "veil of ignorance" scenario, written by John Rawls.

Answer: A Theory of Justice

2. Its Chinese name translates to "greenish-blue duck" and its Korean name, the Amnok, is rarely used when naming it. This river starts in the Ch'ang-pai Mountains and flows to the Yellow Sea to the southwest. It did not become a political boundary until the fourteenth century when the Koryo dynasty established it as such, and ever since the Yojin were driven into Manchuria, the northwestern banks have been inhabited by only Chinese and Manchurians and the southeastern banks have only been inhabited by Koreans. FTP, name this river that separates China from North Korea.

Answer: Yalu River

3. Venerated figures of the "religion" it puts forth include the Saints Yosarrian and Quixote, and such Apostles as Hung Mung, Van Van Mojo, Sri Syadasti, and Zarathud the Staunch. It directs followers, if they feel like it, to partake in various rituals like the Turkey Curse and Gourdfest, or to make up their own. However, it specifically suggests *not* participating in the Pilgrimage that is periodically planned to Brunswick Shrine in Whittier, where the roots of this text were revealed to Omar Khayyam Ravenhurst and Malaclypse the Younger, who went on to found their own religion-like things based on the worship of Eris, goddess of chaos. FTP, name the text coauthored by these two madmen/geniuses, which is subtitled "Or How I Found Goddess and What I Did to Her When I Found Her."

Answer: Principia Discordia

4. His father's wife, Plectrude, tried to imprison him after the father died, and she tried to rule in the name of her grandchildren. However, he escaped and gathered an army. After he defeated the Neustrians at Ambleve and Vincy, Plectrude and the Austrasians submitted to his rule as mayor. In 724, he gained control of Neustria and turned westward. He was helped by an appeal from Eudes of Aquitaine, whom he helped by turning back the Muslim invasion of Frankish lands near Tours. FTP name this illegitimate son of Pepin of Herstal.

Answer: Charles Martel or Charles the Hammer

5. He was the son of a horn and bass player, and to help his family financially, he would play piano at local inns. He never even thought about marrying because he was only able to express his emotions through his music, and because he disliked other people's sympathy. He was a disciple of Schumann, and was supported by the critic Edouard Hanslick. His less famous works include Gesang der Parzen, Double Concerto, and Schicksalied. FTP, name this composer of A German Requiem, Academic Festival Overture, and Variations on a theme by Haydn.

Answer: Johannes Brahms

6. Its compounds, especially its tetroxide, give off harsh, if not poisonous odors. Thus, when it was successfully isolated from other metals like itself in 1804 by Smithson Tennant, it was named for the harsh odors of some of its compounds. Tungsten filaments replaced its wires, which were used as early filaments in incandescent lights. Ruthenium replaced it as a hardener of other platinum metals. It is rarely used today, except in a hard alloy of it with iridium, which is used in the tips of fountain pens and phonograph needles. FTP name the densest of the naturally occurring elements of the periodic table.

Answer: Osmium

7. He was born into a wealthy family and adopted by his uncle who shared his name. At age 18, he decided to practice law, and he developed a good reputation in the civil courts. He was often called upon to try provincial officials for extortion. Becoming practor in 93 C.E. and consul in 100, his greatest legal accomplishment was securing the condemnation of a governor in Africa and Spanish

officials. FTP, name this contemporary of Tacitus who published nine books of selected private "letters written with special care" that illustrated private and public life during the fruition of the Roman Empire.

Answer: _Pliny the Younger_ or _Gaius Plinius Caecilius Secundus_

8. "There is a lovely road that runs from Ixopo into the hills. These hills are grass-covered and rolling, and they are lovely beyond any singing of it" describes a small part of the setting in Book I of this novel, and the introductory paragraphs of Book I are repeated verbatim at the beginning of each of the other two books in this novel. The story reflects the author's compassion for all South African people and his love of the country around Ndotsheni. FTP, name this Alan Paton novel, considered the greatest work of South African literature.

Answer: _Cry, the Beloved Country_

9. He was born in the Jura region of Switzerland, and was studying his father's art of enameling and engraving of watch faces until his teacher introduced him to art history, drawing, and Art Nouveau, and decided that he should go into architecture. He designed the studio for fellow artist Amedee Ozenfant, and he also designed the Pavillion d'Esprit, but he was more interested in housing many people as indicated by the vertical communities he envisioned. The first of these was completed in Marseille in 1952, and others were built in Nantes, Briey, and West Berlin. Earlier he had been disqualified from a design competition for not using India ink in his sketches. FTP, name this architect whose plan became a prototype for all United Nations buildings.

Answer: _Le Corbusier_ or _Charles-Edouard Jeanneret_

10. Mucoid types of these are typically elongated inclusions that are visible when ejected. Filamentous types usually consist of a striated shaft and a tip. Toxic ones are usually released by carnivorous protozoa in search of food or in self-defense, and they tend to paralyze or kill their prey. FTP, name these structures commonly found in Paramecia.

Answer: _Trichocysts_

11. In this country, the Confederation of Indigenous Nationalities, or Conaie, remains firmly opposed to the financial policies of the government. They have given the new president, Gustavo Noboa, six months to fix the economy or face a "social explosion." Strengthened by the country's compact geography, Conaie is Latin America's strongest indigenous people's organization, with close ties to the country's army officers. FTP, name this South American country where President Noboa is carrying out the dollarization plan of his predecessor Jamil Mahaud.

Answer: Ecuador

12. After a failed love affair and an abortive stint in the Canadian RAF, he returned to his home and enrolled at the University of Mississippi, where he was known, among other things, for not running the post office. His first sustained attempt at writing fiction began in January of 1925 and ended that July. His first novel, Soldiers 'Pay, was about soldiers returning to the South from the war and feeling alienated from the world of civilians. He was counting on Flags in the Dust to establish his reputation as a writer, but it only appeared in a very abbreviated version entitled Sartoris. FTP, name this author of such works as As I Lay Dying, Light in August, and The Sound and the Fury.

Answer: William Faulkner

13. It was first published in 1931, much to the consternation of David Hilbert, who was then trying to put all of mathematics on firm logical foundations. Its first part states that any consistent mathematical theory that includes the natural numbers must be incomplete, while the second part states that such a theory cannot contain a proof of its own consistency. FTP, identify this theorem, often named for an Austrian-born American logician, that states that some parts of mathematics are based on ideas that cannot be proven within the system of mathematics.

Answer: Gödel's theorem or Incompleteness theorem

14. The economist H.D. MacLeod first used the current name for this observation in the 19th century. Here is a historical example of it from that time: The United States had set an exchange ratio between silver and gold of 15:1, while ratios in Europe were slightly higher, so it was profitable for those who owned gold to sell it in Europe and take their silver to the U.S. mint. In effect, the exchange rate for silver abroad was driving the gold out of the U.S. FTP, name this law, which simply stated is "bad money drives out good."

Answer: _Gresham's Law_

15. It took place near what is now Brno in the Czech Republic. Allied troops occupied the Pratzen Plateau, which the French had deliberately evacuated to set a trap. The French managed to turn away the Allied offensives and then retake the plateau by smashing the weak center of Allied forces, which were left scattered by the attack. FTP, name this 1805 battle, also known as the Battle of the Three Emperors, which temporarily kept Prussia out of the anti-French alliance and forced Austria to make peace with France.

Answer: Battle of _Austerlitz_

16. Like every Spanish poet, it seems, his work was banned between 1936 and 1944. He studied law and business management until he fell ill in 1925. During his convalescence, he wrote his first poetry. In it, one can see the influence of surrealist composition and an element of the metaphysical, and he was considered a master of free verse. He also wrote a prose work, *Los encuentros*, a collection of sketches of his fellow writers. This member of the Generation of `27 won a Nobel in 1977. FTP, name this poetwhose works include *La destrucción o El amor* and *Poemas de la Consumación*.

Answer: Vicente _Aleixandre_

17. About one in every sixty people is a carrier of this autosomal recessive genetic disorder. Sufferers usually have blond hair, blue eyes, and pale skin because it inhibits tyrosine metabolism and leads to a decrease in the production of melanin. They also may suffer from mental retardation, epileptic seizures, and abnormal brain wave patterns. FTP, name this disorder caused by the inability of the body to metabolize phenylalinine.

Answer: _phenylketonuria_ or _PKU_

18. His father Carol II was excluded from royal succession by an act of state in 1926 and so when King Ferdinand died in 1927, he became king, but being only six at the time, his country was governed by a regency. He was relegated to the rank of crown prince in 1930 when Carol II returned from exile. Although Carol II abdicated in 1940, the man in question was then a prisoner of the military regime of Ion Antonescu. He overthrew the military in 1944, severed relations with the Axis powers for the remainder of World War II, and resisted the influence of Communism until he was forced to abdicate at the end of 1947, at which time he became an executive for a U.S. brokerage firm. FTP, name this Romanian ruler.

Answer: Michael of Hohenzollern-Sigmaringen

19. It measures about twice the height of the hill upon which it stands, and it has been a site of pilgrimages for centuries. It is composed of a solid brick stupa, and is completely covered in gold. Settlement around it started around the early 15th century and the Mon kings declared the settlement a town, naming it after the structure. FTP, name this Buddhist place of worship which lies a mile north of the Cantonment of Yangon.

Answer: Shwe Dagon Pagoda

20. The Romans identified him with their Mars, quite strange since it seems that this god is more known as a god of justice. He was more concerned with treaties than with war and was considered the guardian of oaths and the guarantor of contracts. He agreed to hold his hand in Fenris's mouth while the other gods trapped the wolf, but when Fenris realized this, it bit off his hand. FTP, name this one-handed Norse deity.

Answer: _Tyr_

- 21. Though he was greatly influenced by the work of Husserl, he formulated his own theories that it was necessary to analyze the organism as a whole to discover what would happen as the result of a certain set of stimuli. He also turned his sights toward social and political issues of his day, publishing a collection of essays entitled "Humanism and Terror" that defended Soviet communism. He was disillusioned by the Korean War, at which time he broke with Sartre who defended the North Koreans. FTP, name this philosopher, regarded as the leading exponent of phenomenology in France.

 Answer: Maurice Merleau-Ponty
- 22. U.N. judges handed down their harshest punishment yet in sentencing this man to 45 years in prison. He was found guilty of war crimes, crimes against humanity, and violations of the 1949 Geneva Conventions for leading an ethnic cleansing campaign in towns northeast of Sarajevo in the Lasva river valley. FTP, name this general who commanded the Bosnian Croat militia between 1992 and 1995.

Answer: Tihomir _Blaskic_

- 1. Answer these questions about a Jewish festival for the stated number of points.
- A. The first and second Temples were destroyed on this date in the Hebrew calendar. Other disasters that were said to have occurred on this day include the decree that the Jews would spend 40 years wandering in the wilderness, the establishment of a pagan temple in Jerusalem in 136, and the expulsion of Jews from Spain in 1492. FTP, name the calendar date.
