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TOSSUPS

1. John Ashberry's first published collection of poems, and Bertolt Brecht's last unfinished play both share this name. By far the most famous work of this name, however, was also left unfinished in 1924, although it was based on a complete work by Carlo Gozzi. Franco Alfano's completion is now standard, although at its premiere, Arturo Toscanini stopped conducting at the point the composer had reached before dying. FTP, name this opera about Calaf's victory in the contest for the hand of the title princess, a work by Puccini.

ANSWER: _Turandot_

2. In 1806 he married Anne Key, the sister of Francis Scott Key. A Federalist until 1812, he later joined the Cabinet of Democrat Andrew Jackson as attorney general in 1831. Two years later Jackson appointed him secretary of the Treasury, but the Senate rejected him due to his unpopular views on the Bank of the U.S., marking the first time Congress had refused to confirm a Cabinet nominee. FTP, name this man whose lasting fame probably comes from his majority opinion on the Dred Scott case, written while he was Chief Justice of the U.S.

ANSWER: Roger B[rooke] _Taney_

3. In the 18th century, the Swiss-German mathematician and philosopher Johann Lambert applied this word to that part of his theory of knowledge that distinguishes truth from illusion and error. 20th-century theorists of it include Emmanuel Lévinas, Maurice Merleau-Ponty and Jean-Paul Sartre, but the term is more closely associated with Edmund Husserl. Husserl's colleague Martin Heidegger also attempted to define the term in his *Being and Time*. FTP, name this philosophical movement concerned with the description of conscious experiences.

ANSWER: _phenomenology_

4. In 1919 he became an associate editor of *The Dial*, and in the 20's he began to publish works on American culture such as *Sticks and Stones*, *The Golden Day*, and *The Brown Decades*. In the 30's he began writing architectural criticism for *The New Yorker* and also began his "Renewal of Life" series, which included *The Culture of Cities*. FTP, name this American historian and urban planner, most famous for *The Myth of the Machine* and *The City in History*.

ANSWER: Lewis _Mumford_

5. In 1875 the French mathematician Gaston Darboux proved its existence for continuous functions using his eponymous limits. Darboux thus completed the work of Riemann, who had shown its existence for continuous and piecewise monotone functions, and Cauchy, who had originally defined it in terms of the areas of rectangles. FTP, what is this mathematical object, which the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus relates to the difference in the antiderivative at the upper and lower limits?

ANSWER: _definite integral_ (prompt on integral; accept _Riemann integral_ before Riemann is mentioned)

6. His first important work, *Daedalus and Icarus*, was so lifelike that he was accused of making plaster casts from life models. Somewhat Rococo in style, he gradually evolved to fit into a different school and became one of its leading proponents. Buried in a tomb at Possagno that he himself designed in imitation of the Roman Pantheon, his other works include a sculpture of Pauline Borghese as *Venus Victrix*, several statues of Napoleon, and the tombs for Pope Clement XIII and XIV. FTP, name this Italian, the leading Neoclassicist sculptor.

ANSWER: Antonio _Canova_ , Marchese d'Ischia

7. The fifth son of Hildegard the Swabian, he ruled Aquitaine from age 3 until age 15; then he became co-emperor and then emperor when his father died a year later. He twice lost his kingdom to his sons, but gained it back each time. Unfortunately, he was unsuccessful in his efforts to divvy up his kingdom at his death, leading to three years of turmoil and the Treaty of Verdun in 843. FTP, name this son of Charlemagne, whose name was so popular that 15 other French kings also took it.

ANSWER: _Louis I_ or _Louis the Pious_ or _Louis the Debonair_ (prompt on Louis)

8. The CD jacket contains 16 "plates" of paintings and etchings by Vasily Kafanov, with titles like "Desire holds the moment still" and "This echo rings forever on." The album itself contains "Wound" [pron: the verb, to injure, not the past participle of to wind], "Glass and the Ghost Children," and "Raindrops and Sunshowers," as well as the much-ballyhooed "The Everlasting Gaze." Marking the return of drummer Jimmy Chamberlin from drug rehab, FTP, what is this most recent release of the Smashing Pumpkins, subtitled "The Machines of God"?

ANSWER: _Machina_

9. One of its most memorable and joyful choruses from it is "Achieved is the glorious work." Suggested to the composer during his second stay in London by the concert manager Salomon, it represented his first attempt in the genre; *The Seasons* would be his only other. With text from a German translation by Baron Gottfried van Swieten, it premiered in 1798. FTP, name this oratorio composed by Josef Haydn, which takes its subject matter from *Paradise Lost* and the first chapter of Genesis.

ANSWER: The _Creation_ or Die _Schöpfung_

10. It is believed to cause lesions or sores, respiratory ailments, short-term memory loss, and nausea symptoms. It's been identified in the Pamlico and the Neuse River Systems, the Manokin, Indian, and Nanticoke Rivers, but it is probably most infamous for being in the Pocomoke River and Chesapeake Bay. FTP, name this fish-killing dinoflagellate.

ANSWER: pfisteria piscicida (fee-STEER-ee-uh pis-kuh-SEED-uh)

11. Martin Luther derided it as an "epistle full of straw" because of its lack of evangelical character and its focus on works. Luther was not the first to criticize it, as its authority was disputed by the early church and Eusebius counted it among the Antilegomena, or "contested writings." However, by the end of the third century it was widely accepted as canonical, a position reaffirmed by the council of Trent. FTP name this Biblical letter, attributed to the Lord's brother.

ANSWER: Epistle of James

12. Tellingly, it had no words for "tiger," "iron," or "palm tree," but some words in it include "yewo" (grain), "ayos" (copper or bronze), and "ekwos" (horse). It possessed a noun form for "dual" as well as singular and plural, and four tenses: present, aorist, imperfect, and perfect. FTP, name this reconstructed language, the hypothetical ancestor of language families including Sanskrit, Germanic, Greek, and Italic.

ANSWER: proto- Indo-European (prompt on just "Indo-European")

13. A defense of this work, in the form of a letter from the author to Martin Dorp, now accompanies almost all editions. The title character of the work claims to be the daughter of Plutus, god of wealth, and argues that she should be exalted above all other gods because she makes humans happiest and bestows her favors on all, not just the powerful or heroic. FTP, name this satiric treatise, dedicated to Sir Thomas More, written in 1509 by the Dutch humanist Desiderius Erasmus.

ANSWER: The Praise of Folly or Moriae encomium

14. At the right a few tall trees loom over an armless statue of Venus which is covered with pink roses. In the foreground, several little Cupids accompany the eight couples who are making their way out of the woodland toward the golden barge at left. Three versions exist; the second, painted between 1717 and 1719 as the artist's acceptance piece for admission into the Academy, is the most well-known. FTP, name this masterpiece of the Rococo style painted by Antoine Watteau.

ANSWER: Embarkation for Cythera or L' Embarquement pour l'île de Cythère

15. While Prime Minister of Italy, his cabinet included Antonio di Pietro a famous corruption investigator who was accused of corruption but cleared. A former economics professor, he succeeded Jacques Santer in his current position and has been quoted as saying Qaddafi should visit Brussels. His current big idea is the "governance" of Europe that he has described as "a networking arrangement." FTP, name this man, current head of the European Commission.

ANSWER: Romano Prodi

16. It consisted of an Assembly, in which every member had an equal vote and veto power, and a Council, which consisted of four permanent and a varying number of temporary members. Headquartered at Geneva, it settled disputes between Finland and Sweden, Albania and Yugoslavia, Poland and Germany, and Hungary and Czechoslovakia, but it was hamstrung by its need for unanimity and the absence of certain nations. FTP, name this international body, urged by Woodrow Wilson as one of his Fourteen Points.

ANSWER: League of Nations

17. In prokaryotes, they are 15 to 20 nanometers in diameter, and consist of three molecules of RNA and about 50 different proteins. In eukaryotes they are somewhat larger, and in addition to being found free in the cytoplasm, are also located on rough ER and in mitochondria and chloroplasts. Consisting of a large and a small subunit, FTP, what is this cellular organelle whose function is to synthesize proteins?

ANSWER: ribosomes

18. Long before Titian gained fame for painting *The Rape of Europa*, this artist depicted that scene, as well as several others in which the foibles of the Olympians are made manifest. Yet the work, brilliantly executed as it was, brought the artist doom rather than success, as it would arouse the ire and envy of Athena. Ovid's description of the event includes a famous comparison of threads to rainbows. FTP, name this mythological woman, who bested Athena in a weaving contest but was transformed into a spider.

ANSWER: Arachne

19. Just 637 square miles in size, this island is principally populated by Arabs, who mainly speak Kiswahili, and by the Hadimu and the Tumbatu, who speak Bantu. In the 1880s, the British usurped control of it from the sultan Barghash, and it became a British protectorate in 1890. In 1963, the sultanate regained its independence, and it became a member of the British Commonwealth. But in January 1964, leftist Africans overthrew the sultanate and established it as a republic. FTP, name this island that merged in April 1964 with the Tanganyika Republic to create Tanzania.

ANSWER: Zanzibar Island

20. Although this novel begins with a quote from Virgil's *Georgics* stating that the best days are the first to flee, the book itself belies the quote, as it is ostensibly a collection of memoirs written by the narrator regarding a certain individual from his childhood. Although he flirts with all of the hired girls and has a brief fling with Lena Lingard, he is always drawn irresistibly back to the title character. FTP, name this Willa Cather novel narrated by Jim Burden about a member of the Shimerda family.

ANSWER: My Antonia (stress on first syllable)

21. One derivation of it uses the work-energy theorem to find the kinetic energy of a relativistic particle, then adds in the constant rest energy to produce the only equation included in Stephen Hawking's *A Brief History of Time*. Implications of it include the nuclear binding energy curve and the debunking of absolute conservation of matter. FTP, state this equation which expresses the equivalence of mass and energy, famously derived by Albert Einstein.

ANSWER: $E = mc^2$ (grudgingly accept $E = \gamma mc^2$)

22. In his youth he wanted to join the navy, but he failed the necessary exam. Instead, he became an aviator and later a journalist. Following the 1939 occupation of France he moved to New York and began to write novels. In 1942, he became a pilot in North Africa where he was shot down in 1944. FTP name this aviator and author of *Le Petit Prince*.

ANSWER: Antoine de St-Exupéry

23. At Abu Simbel he ordered the construction of two great temples carved out of a cliffside, one of which was devoted to his first and favorite queen Nefertari. He also completed a temple begun by his father Seti I at Abydos, but is also well-known for his military exploits. FTP, name this 3rd king of Egypt's 19th dynasty, perhaps best remembered for his defeat at the hands of the Hittites at Kadesh.

ANSWER: Ramses II or Ramses the Great

24. On March 2 he scored 8 of his 33 points in the final three and a half minutes, setting up a game-winner by DeMarr Johnson enabling his team to avert an upset to DePaul. On January 19 he recorded his second career triple-double, netting 28 points, 13 boards and 10 blocks against Memphis. 3 minutes into a C-USA tournament game against St. Louis, he broke his leg. FTP, name this front-runner for college player of the year, a senior center for the Cincinnati Bearcats.

ANSWER: Kenyon Martin

BONUSES

1. Identify the following concerning a certain kind of data structure FTPE.

A) This type of structure consists of several nodes, each of which contains a data element and a pointer to the next node. The first node is called the head.

ANSWER: singly-linked list

B) The only place where you can add or remove an element to a linked list in order-1 time is at the head. This makes the linked list a suitable implementation of this other data structure, governed by the principle "last-in, first-out."

ANSWER: stack

C) If you want to be able to add to both the head and the tail, you could instead use a doubly-linked list, which is also known by this five-letter word.

ANSWER: deque (pronounced "deck")

2. Identify these world capitals for 15 points from the first clue, or 10 points from the second.

A) [15] Its skyline is topped by Ch'ollima (Choal-lee-mah), a winged horse. The reputed grave of Chinese sage Kija (1122 BC), legendary founder of the city, lies just north of the city.

[10] Its most prominent university is Kim Il-sung University.

ANSWER: Pyongyang, North Korea

B) [15] Its name derives from the Spanish word for "many fish," and, at its original location, it was founded in 1519 by Governor Pedro Arias Dvila.

[10] In the Hay-Bunau-Varilla Treaty of 1903, the United States was given the right to keep order in the city and to maintain hygiene. The U.S. put it to good use, particularly starting in 1914.

ANSWER: Panama City, Panama

3. Name these literary sidekicks FTPE.

A) This short, pot-bellied rustic rides the ass Dapple and is the squire of Don Quixote.

ANSWER: Sancho Panza (accept either name)

B) Lorenzo da Ponte's version of the story opens with this man singing of his master Don Giovanni's 1003 conquests in Spain alone.

ANSWER: Leporello

C) In Ivan Goncharov's novel *Obломov*, the slothfulness of the title character is contrasted with the industriousness of this German-born friend of his.

ANSWER: Andrey Stolz (prompt on Andrey)

4. Identify these related things about Italy FTPE.

A) This June 14, 1800 battle in northern Italy was a narrow victory for Napoleon but was the first of a series of battles that won the War of the First Coalition for France.

ANSWER: Battle of Marengo

B) This opera, whose non-title characters include Scarpio and Cavaradossi, takes place during the Battle of Marengo.

ANSWER: Tosca by Puccini

C) A performance of *Tosca*, in turn, is incorporated in *Tonight We Improvise*, the third part of this playwright's so-called "trilogy of the theatre within the theatre."

ANSWER: Luigi Pirandello

5. During the Civil War, the Army of the Potomac went through many different generals before coming under the command of General Grant. FTPE give the commander who led the army in each of the following battles.

A) First Bull Run, July 21, 1861

ANSWER: Irvin McDowell

B) Second Bull Run, August 29-30, 1862

ANSWER: John Pope

C) Gettysburg, July 1-3, 1863

ANSWER: George Meade

6. Name these mythological figures from their relations FTPE.

A) Husband of Sif and father of Magni and Modi

ANSWER: Thor

B) Father of Ossian and husband of Oonagh

ANSWER: Fionn mac Cumhail ["Finn MacCool"]

C) Daughter of Tantalus and wife of Amphion

ANSWER: Niobe

7. Identify these buildings designed by Ludwig Mies van der Rohe FTPE.

A) Commissioned by the German government for the 1929 International Exposition, it consisted of a huge travertine platform supported by steel columns, and contained nothing but a pool, a few sculptures, and some cantilevered chairs he designed which shared its name.

ANSWER: Barcelona Pavilion (the chairs were "Barcelona chairs")

B) Mies collaborated with Philip Johnson on this skyscraper office building, whose exterior of glass, bronze and marble exemplifies the International style.

ANSWER: Seagram Building in NYC

C) Dedicated in 1968 and later renamed the New National Gallery, this late work in Berlin is perhaps most representative of Mies' mature style.

ANSWER: Gallery of the 20th Century

8. Identify the following about analytical chemistry FTPE.

A) This method, sometimes called volumetric analysis, measures the concentration of some constituent of a sample by determining what amount of a known substance must be added in order for a visible reaction to occur.

ANSWER: titration or titrimetric analysis

B) In spectrophotometry, this law states that the absorptive capacity of a dissolved substance is directly proportional to its concentration in a solution.

ANSWER: Beer's law

C) In this type of analysis, an excess of added reagent forms a precipitate with the analyte; the precipitate is then filtered, dried and weighed to determine how much there is.

ANSWER: gravimetric analysis

9. Identify the following works of 19th-century literature from descriptions FTPE.

A) This 1830 novel tells the story of the young romantic Julian Sorel while satirizing the church and the army, both of which are alluded to in the title.

ANSWER: The Red and the Black or Le Rouge et le Noir

B) Subtitled "The New Pilgrim's Progress," it is based on a series of letters the author wrote while traveling in Europe.

ANSWER: Innocents Abroad

C) The title character of this 1859 novel loves Hetty, but their marriage plans are ruined when it is discovered that she is pregnant with the child of Arthur Donnithorne. She kills the child and is taken away, and the title character marries Dinah Morris instead.

ANSWER: Adam Bede

(These works are all pseudonymous, by Stendahl, Mark Twain, and George Eliot.)

10. Name these players in the 16th-century Japanese power struggle FTPE.

A) Originally named Kichihoshi, this member of the Fujiwara family overthrew the Ashikaga shogunate and united half of Japan under his rule.

ANSWER: Oda Nobunaga (prompt on Oda) or Saburo

B) This brilliant general of Oda Nobunaga completed the unification left unfinished when Nobunaga killed himself in 1582.

ANSWER: Toyotomi Hideyoshi (prompt on Toyotomi) or Hiyoshimaru

C) After Hideyoshi died during his frustrated attacks on Korea, this rival daimyo founded a new shogunate in 1603; it would prove to be Japan's last.

ANSWER: Tokugawa Ieyasu (prompt on Tokugawa)

11. Name these related things from economics FTPE.

A) Among the things named for this British economist are a type of supply-generated demand, the concept of net substitutes and complements, and (with Keynes) a hypothesis about hedging.

ANSWER: Sir John R[ichard] Hicks

B) Hicks shared his 1972 Nobel Prize with this American economist. Both attempted to resolve the conflict between the equilibrium theory and the business-cycle theory by showing that active forces, not passive ones, strike economic balances when the forces cancel.

ANSWER: Kenneth J[oseph] Arrow

C) Name Arrow's famous and somewhat startling result, which showed that under certain conditions of rationality and equality, a ranking of societal preferences does not necessarily correspond to rankings of individual preferences.

ANSWER: Impossibility Theorem

12. Identify these people associated with Martin Luther FTPE.

A) This elector of Saxony was Luther's protector until his death in 1521.

ANSWER: Elector Frederick the Wise

B) Luther often said he should defer to this man as John the Baptist did to Christ. A learned humanist, he authored the Augsburg Confession.

ANSWER: Philip Schwarzerd or Melanchthon

C) The leading painter of Saxony in the 16th century, he painted Luther and his family, and became the chief pictorial propagandist of the German Protestants.

ANSWER: Lucas Müller or Cranach the Elder (prompt on Cranach)

13. Name these players in the upcoming Russian presidential election, none of whom is Vladimir Putin FTPE.

A) This candidate of the Communist Party is second with about 20% support.

ANSWER: Gennady Zyuganov

B) The third major candidate, the leader of the Yabloko Party, who has called Putin a "secret Communist."

ANSWER: Grigory _Yavlinsky_

C) This extreme nationalist is now considered a fringe candidate, despite his claim that he and Putin are the only "real" candidates. He has said that he would require a life term as president to restore Russia as a global superpower.

ANSWER: Vladimir _Zhirinovsky_

14. Identify these related things from psychology FTPE.

A) [10] This Czech-born psychologist developed a lie detector while still a grad student, but became more famous for an experiment involving a toy stroboscope he purchased during a 1910 train trip.

ANSWER: Max _Wertheimer_ ["VAIR-time-er"]

B) [10] Using the stroboscope, Wertheimer demonstrated this phenomenon, in which two adjacent lights flashed in succession appear to be a single moving light.

ANSWER: _phi_ phenomenon

C) Wertheimer and his two assistants founded the new Gestalt school of psychology based on their research in the phi phenomenon.

FTP, name either of those two assistants.

ANSWER: Kurt _Koffka_ and Wolfgang _Köhler_

15. Name the following regarding Shinto belief FTPE

A) "Shinto" literally means "the way of" this four-letter word, which means mystical, superior, or divine, but also refers specifically the various gods or deities.

ANSWER: _kami_

B) In the story of creation, two kami emerged and gave birth to the Japanese islands. Name them F5PE.

ANSWER: _Izanami_ and _Izanagi_

C) The central figure in the pantheon is the sun goddess Ameterasu, who is believed to be a direct ancestor of this legendary first emperor.

ANSWER: _Jimmu_

16. Tired of hearing questions on national epics? Well, I have bad news for you. Answer these questions about national epics FTPE.

A) The Portuguese poet Luis de Camões penned what work in 1572, recounting the voyage of Vasco da Gama to India?

ANSWER: The _Lusiads_ or Os _Lusiadas_

B) Elias Lönnrot compiled the standard edition of what Finnish epic in 1849?

ANSWER: _Kalevala_

C) The *Sundiata* recounts the founding of what kingdom?

ANSWER: _Mali_

17. Identify the following enzymes FTPE.

A) One of the most primitive and slowest-working enzymes known, it fixes carbon dioxide in the Calvin cycle.

ANSWER: _rubisco_ or _ribulose biphosphate carboxylase_ (do not accept Nabisco)

B) During DNA replication, this enzyme unwinds and separates the two DNA strands.

ANSWER: _helicase_

C) Found in tears and particularly in egg whites, this enzyme attaches to a polysaccharide substrate, stressing particular bonds and allowing the usually stable polymer to be broken.

ANSWER: _lysozyme_

18. Identify these paintings which include curved mirrors FTPE.

A) This work by Parmigianino renders the artist's hand extremely large, since it is closest to the canvas, which is supposed to be a mirror.

ANSWER: _Self-Portrait in a Convex Mirror_

B) This 1434 painting famously includes a tiny convex multifaceted mirror executed in exquisite detail, just below the inscription "Johannes de Eyck fuit hic."

ANSWER: The Marriage of Giovanni _Arnolfini_ and His Bride (or any other title which includes "Arnolfini" and "Wedding," "Marriage," or "Bride")

C) Perhaps the most famous painting by Quentin Matsys, this double portrait includes a mirror that shows the artist and a window behind him.

ANSWER: The _Money-Changer and His Wife_

19. Four state governors will not be able to seek re-election in 2000 due to term limits. Given the name of the governor who will be stepping down, name the state FTPE.

A) Democrat Thomas Carper

ANSWER: _Delaware_

B) Democrat James Hunt Junior

ANSWER: _North Carolina_
C) Republican Marc Racicot
ANSWER: _Montana_

20. Name these people and things involved in the beginnings of the independent country of what is now the Democratic Republic of the Congo FTPE.

A) This founder of the Congolese National Movement became the first Premier of the Congo at its founding in June 1960. Eight months earlier, he had been jailed for inciting a riot; seven months later, he was assassinated.

ANSWER: Patrice Lumumba

B) This man was the first President of the independent Congo; he ousted Lumumba in September 1960.

ANSWER: Joseph Kasavubu

C) The situation in the Congo was complicated when Belgium tried to reassert some authority in the region by supporting the independence of this southeastern province of Congo.

ANSWER: Katanga

21. Two equal and opposite charges, plus q and minus q, are located on the x-axis at x equals a and x equals negative a. FTPE answer the following questions:

A) What six-letter name is given to this arrangement of charges?

ANSWER: dipole

B) What is the magnitude of the dipole moment of this arrangement, in terms of a, q, and fundamental constants?

ANSWER: 2 q a (2 times q times a, or 2 times a times q)

C) At distances much greater than a, the net electric field due to the dipole is proportional to what power of the distance?

ANSWER: negative three

22. Given a continent, identify its second-longest river FTPE.

A) South America

ANSWER: Paraná River

B) Europe

ANSWER: Danube River

C) Africa

ANSWER: Congo River

23. Identify these opera librettists FTPE.

A) Although he was poet-laureate of England and collaborated with Dryden on *Absalom and Achitophel*, he is probably best remembered for the libretto for Purcell's *Dido and Aeneas*.

ANSWER: Nahum Tate

B) This poet sometimes wrote his own operas, including 1868's *Mefistofele*, but his lasting fame comes from inspiring Verdi to compose his last two operas, *Falstaff* and *Otello*, for which he was the librettist.

ANSWER: Arigo Boito

C) This Austrian collaborated with Richard (REE-card) Strauss on several operas, including *Der Rosenkavalier*.

ANSWER: Hugo von Hofmannsthal

24. Given the first line of an English poem, recite the next line FTPE. If you don't know the next line exactly, you can name the poem's author instead F5P, but you only get to give one response.

A) Glory be to God for dappled things

ANSWER: For skies of couple-colour as a brinded cow [10]
or Gerard Manley Hopkins [5] (the poem is "Pied beauty")

B) When to the sessions of sweet silent thought

ANSWER: I summon up remembrance of things past [10]
or William Shakespeare [5] (Sonnet #30)

C) The curfew tolls the knell of parting day

ANSWER: The lowing herd wind slowly o'er the lea [10]
or Thomas Gray [5] ("Elegy written in a country churchyard")

25. Answer these questions about the blockbuster Ken Griffey, Jr. trade FTSNOP.

A) The only major-leaguers the Reds gave up were these two, a lefty pitcher and a middling outfielder. Name them F5PE.

ANSWER: Brett Tomko and Mike Cameron

B) The Mariners really wanted to get somebody who could play shortstop for them since they expect to lose Alex Rodriguez to free agency. But they succeeded in getting neither the Reds' young second baseman, who has shortstop skills, nor their grade-A shortstop prospect. Name these two F10PE.
