TOSSUPS -- GEORGIA

1. She was educated at Radcliffe College where she worked as a research assistant for the Institute of Pacific Relations. She then became a writer and correspondent for The Nation magazine and other publications. She first gained notice with her novel, "The Zimmerman Telegram". For ten points identify this author of two Pulitzer Prize-winning works of history entitled "Stilwell and the American Experience in China" and "The Guns of August".

2. In 1677 he made the first full observation of Mercury and in 1679 he prepared a major catalog of Southern Hemisphere stars. He encouraged and eventually financed the publication of Isaac Newton's "Principia". For ten points, name this astronomer who in 1682 predicted a comet he saw would return in 76 years.

A: Edmund _HALLEY_

- 3. Although he died of a brain tumor at the age of 38 when he was at the height of his creativity, he still managed to compose a full-length opera based on Dubose Heywards novel about the lives of rural blacks living in South Carolina. He wrote the score for the Broadway musicals "A Dangerous Maid" and "Our Nell". For ten points, name this pianist and composer of "Damsel in Darkness" and "Rhapsody in Blue".

 A: GEORGE GERSHWIN
- 4. A politician and businessman, he founded the Debeers Mining Company in 1888 in Kimberly, South Africa. Until 1890 he managed an African colony that was originally named in his honor, but is now known as Zimbabwe. After 1890 he served as Prime Minister of the Cape Colony, but he is perhaps best known for his philanthropy. For ten points, identify this man who left behind a six million pound fortune to begin an Oxford University scholarship that bears his name.

 A: Cecil John RHODES
- 5. After a move to the country, this title characters neighbor, Lensky, introduces him to the lovely Tatyana. Tatyana falls in love with him, but he rejects her only to fall for her years later after she is already married. During the interlude between their meetings, the title character kills Lensky in a duel. For ten points name this 1833 verse novel by Alexander Pushkin that was later made into an opera by Tchaikovsky.

 A: "EUGENE ONEGIN" or "Yegeny Onegin"
- 6. Futuristic city installations will include the Beef Vat (which will feed people through splicing genes from sulfide-eating bacteria and Hereford cattle) and the House of Freezing, which allows frozen people to be revived. Wonders of the World will include the ESP center (which will outlaw wars) and the Star Ladder, which will establish a space city. These are among the marvels predicted in the next 1000 years in, For ten points, what Activision computer game, extending Sid Meiers most famous series?

 A: Civilization: CALL TO POWER
- 7. Four different types of these enzymes are known: series, thiol, carboxyl, and metallo. Each has a different structure and different means of operation, but all have the same goal: the dismantling of other proteins. For ten points give the name for this class of enzymes.

 A: PROTEASE s

- 8. In 1484, Pope Innocent VIII ordered papal inquisitors to root out this practice, and its persecution gained momentum in the following decades. Later, both Catholics and Protestants sought its destruction equally, but the real mania for stamping out its participants did not begin until 1580. The final death toll will never be known, but in the 1620's Wurzburg and Bamberg averaged 100 burnings a year. FTP, name this practice that was the subject of many a hunt, which only subsided after 1660 and the famous Salem hunts.

 A: WITCHCRAFT
- 9. This melodramtic Depression-era tale of frustrated lives and spiritual emptiness is set in a gas station and lunchroom along an Arizona highway. The daughter of the station's owner, Gabby, is unhappy with her life in the desert and longs to go to Paris to paint. She falls in love with Alan Squier, a failed author who stops at the restaurant on the way to California, and proposes elopement; but, everything changes when the escaped criminal, Duke Mantee, arrives and holds them hostage. FTP, identify this two-act play by Robert Sherwood whose title alludes to a national park in Arizona.

- 10. Joseph Black was the first person to advance a conception of this thermodynamic quantity in 1760. Dulong and Petit determined in 1819 that, for most elements, the product of the atomic number and this quantity comes out to about six calories. For ten points, what is this quantity, a measure of the amount of heat required to increase the temperature of a gram of material by one degree Celsius?

- 11. This country has the highest rate of population increase of any of the worlds twenty most populous nations. Its population is expected to nearly double by 2020, reaching over 200 million. Considering that this country has seen declining standards of living even with its oil wealth, due to recurring military dictatorships, this is a dismaying prospect. For ten points, identify this country formerly led by Sani Abacha.

- 12. Born in France in 1807, he fled to South America in 1835 and fought in the Uruguayan civil war from 1842-1846. He then returned to Italy and in 1848 fought for Sardinia against Austria. In 1851 he renounced his republican views and supported a united Italy under Victor Emmanuel II of Sardinia. For ten points, name this leading figure of the Risorgimento and leader of a volunteer army known as the red shirts.

 A: Giuseppe _GARIBALDI_
- 13. It is notable as being an unprejudiced listing of all of the arguments, pro and con, on the doctrinal questions of the Middle Ages with no attempt to draw conclusions. For ten points identify this twelfth century compilation of theological arguments by Peter Abellard.

A: _"SIC ET NON"_ or "Yes and No"

- 14. From 1807 to 1855 he directed the astronomical observatory at Gottingen. In 1833, with the help of Wilhelm Weber, he invented the electric telegraph, but he Is best known for his work in mathematics. For ten points, name this man, discoverer of the method of least squares, founder of a branch of non-Euclidean geometry, and discoverer of the fundamental theorem of Algebra.

- 15. Oxidation of secondary alcohols, reduction of phenols, dehydration of 1,2-diols, oxidation of amines, and ozonolysis of alkenes are several ways in which to produce, for ten points, what class of compounds marked by the presence of a C=O double bond with the carbon also attached to two alkyl or aryl groups?

16. First used by Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan in December of 1996, this phrase referring to the stock market has entered the popular lexicon. It has been used in book titles, numerous newspaper and magazine articles and columns, and the punchlines of many bad jokes about Greenspan and his wife. For ten points, give the two-word phrase Greenspan used to refer to stock prices spiraling despite their companies absence of earnings or revenues.

A: _IRRATIONAL EXUBERANCE_

- 17. As usual to politicians, he was a lawyer, but he entered politics with the Anti-Masonic party under sponsorship of Thurlow Weed, whom he then followed into the Whig Party. He subsequently served in the House of Representatives and played a key role in writing the tariff bill of 1842. He lost the race for governor of New York in 1844, but did rebound to become state comptroller in 1848. For ten points, name this man who was put on the Whig ticket in 1848 as Vice President in concession to Clay, who was defeated as the Whig presidential candidate in 1852, and who later ran as the 1856 Know-nothing party candidate.

 A: Millard FILLMORE
- 18. Originally a student of philosophy with no formal art training, he became an early member of the Dada group and one of the founders of Surrealism. A master of collage, he also developed the technique frottage, producing a series of bizarre, often allegorical landscapes. For ten points, identify this German-born French painter who devoted much of his later life to painting mystical, highly textured canvasses such as "Woman", "Grey and Blue" and "The Little Tear Gland that says Tic Tac".

 A: Max _ERNST_
- 19. His "The Conduct of Life" reveals a developed humanism together with a full awareness of human limitations. "Representative Men" contains biographies of Plato, Swedenborg, Montaigne, Shakespeare, Napoleon, and Goethe. FTP, identify this graduate of Harvard College, ordained Unitarian minister, and leading proponent of transcendentalist beliefs

 A: Ralph Waldo EMERSON
- 20. Born in 1895, he was the son of a low-level federal bureaucrat. In 1916 he earned a bachelor of laws, and in 1917 a master of laws from George Washington University. During World War I he was an assistant in the alien registration section of the Department of Justice where he monitored alien radicals. In 1919 he was appointed head of the General Intelligence Division. He was appointed to his final federal position in 1924 by Attorney General Harlan Stone. For ten points name this man who, until his death in 1972, was director of the FBI.
