3. Their chief god was the Asian storm god Seketh, who they worshipped at their capital Avaris. Their rule ended after the native Egyptian rulers of Thebes began to expansion northward, expelling them and founding the 18th dynasty. FTP, name these Asiatic invaders of Egypt, also known as the Shepherd Kings, who around 1674 BC overran Egypt and founded the 15th dynasty.

Answer: <u>Hyksos</u> (accept <u>Shepherd Kings</u> if given early)

- 4. "After the Race", "Clay", "Ivy Day in the Committee Room", "An Encounter", "Two Gallants", and "Eveline". All of these stories were in a collection first published in the U.S. in 1916. FTP, identify this collection of short stories, including "Grace", "Araby", and "The Dead", written by James Joyce. Answer: **Dubliners** [prompt on Joyce]
- 5. In metals, the nuclei are influenced by an interaction between the spins of the conduction electrons and the applied field. This condition results in a shift of the resonant frequency from the value observed for the same nucleus when it is present in an insulator. These so-called metallic shifts provide important information on the magnetic susceptibility, which allows scientists, FTP, to utilize what technique to help discover the structure of molecules?

- 6. In Indian myth, this critter was identified with either Agni or Prajapati, was ridden by immortals and secreted the first waters from which all creation emerged. In the Christian tradition, it represented hatred and evil, ignorance and darkness. In Greek myth, they served as guardians of such treasures as the apples of the Hesperides and the Golden Fleece. FTP, name this mythological creature, famously conquered by St. George. Answer: dragon
- 7. Legend has it that the composer wrote it for a friend, and that they were intended to be played nightly to alleviate the insomnia of the friend's employer, Count von Kayserling. On the bass line of the aria, the composer expanded the tune, creating everything from explosive gaiety to delicate wistfulness. FTP, name this series of keyboard pieces by Johann Sebastian Bach, generally known by the name of Bach's friend.

Answer: Goldberg Variations

8. The two sections of this part of the male body are distinguished externally by the raphe. Internally, the raphe connects to a muscular partition, the septum, which serves to divide it into its two areas. It develops as a result of the influence of the hormone androgen and the physical pressure exerted by the testes as they descend from the body cavity. FTP, identify this thin external sac of skin which protects the testes.

Answer: scrotum

9. After being mortally wounded, Adam Sunraider, a race-baiting Senator from New England, surprisingly calls for Reverend A. Z. Hickman, an old black minister, to attend him. As it turns out, the senator had been raised by Hickman in a religion- and music-steeped black community not unlike the author's own childhood home. FTP, name this 1999 novel published five years after the death of its author, Ralph Ellison.

Answer: Juneteenth

10. Because of the failure of the state legislature to issue paper money and reform debtor laws, he led a force of several hundred men in forcing the state Supreme Court to adjourn. Leading about 1,200 men, his attack on the federal arsenal in January of 1787 was repulsed and he was decisively defeated at Petersham the next month. FTP, name this leader of the rebellion of Massachusetts farmers of 1786-87.

Answer: Daniel Shays

11. The Svetambara group lists 45 principle works as part of this religion's canon: including 11 *Angas*, or main texts; 12 *Upangas*, or subsidiary texts; and 6 *Cheda-sutras*, which describe the rules for ascetic life. There was once a 12th *Anga*, said to be the words of the founder itself, but it has been lost for at least 14 centuries. FTP, name this Indian religion, founded by the 24th of the Jinas, Vardhamana Mahavira.

Answer: Jainism

12. Originally, the river of this name, flowing through Russia and Kazakhstan and 1509 miles in length, was known as the Jaik River, until Catherine the Great tried it for treason and condemned it to death, changing its name to its modern one. FTP, identify this river, which shares its name with the mountain range that is traditional physiogeographic boundary between Europe and Asia.

Answer: Ural

13. He turned pro in 1990, and first came to world attention in 1991, when he qualified for the French Open and made the round of 16 before losing to eventual champion Jim Courier. Although he was ranked as high as 5th in the world in 1994, prior to last year his highest Grand Slam appearance was the semis at Wimbledon in 1996. FTP, name this man who took Andre Agassi to 5 sets in the 1999 U.S. Open finals.

Answer: Todd Martin

14. While investigating digestive processes in 1836, he isolated the first enzyme prepared from animal tissue, pepsin. An acquaintance of Matthew Schleiden, who advanced the cell theory for plants, this man extended it to animals. FTP, name this scientists, who discovered the myelin sheath covering peripheral axons, which are now known by his name.

Answer: Theodor Schwann

15. Possibly, his name derives from a medieval goblin or demon. He has a shaven head, wears a mask and particolored tights, and carries a wooden sword. Often invisible to all but Columbine, he is a rival of Pierrot, for her love. FTP, name this stock character of Italian comedy, who became the buffoon of French and then English pantomime.

Answer: <u>Harlequin</u> (or <u>Arlequin</u> or <u>Arlecchino</u>)

16. He was born in Telemark, Norway and in his youth joined the army, quickly rising to the rank of captain. In 1931, he founded his own political party, the National Union, and began to have contact with the Nazis. He then served briefly as the head of the puppet government in Norway. FTP, name this famous traitor who was convicted of treason and shot in 1945 for his decision to aid German occupation forces.

ANSWER: Vidkun Abraham Lauritz Quisling

17. From 1751 to 1763, he remained in his birthplace of Edinburgh, except for two breaks in London, during which he wrote a *History of England*. In 1734 he went to France, where he composed *A Treatise of Human Nature*, an attempt to formulate a full-fledged philosophical system he later repudiated as juvenile. FTP, name this Empiricist philosopher, best known for *An Enquiry Concerning Human Understanding*.

Answer: David Hume

18. Having an apparent visual magnitude of about 1.5, it is of the same luminosity class (V) as the Sun, but is hotter, with a spectral type of B7. Its name comes from the Latin word for king, a result of an ancient belief in the astrological importance of this star. FTP, name this star, also known as Alpha Leonis, the brightest in the constellation Leo.

Answer: Regulus (Accept Alpha Leonis if given early)

19. In the early 1970s his writing, particularly his essays, reflected a growing concern for power politics in the nuclear age and with questions involving the Third World. Among his later works were the novel *The Silent Cry*, and the short story collection *Teach Us to Outgrow Our Madness*. FTP, name this man, winner of the 1994 Nobel Prize in Literature.

Answer: Oe Kenzaburo

20. He earned his bachelor's degree from Alabama State College, and did graduate work at Atlanta University before becoming a minister in Montgomery, Alabama, where he had as a colleague Martin Luther King, Jr. After co-leading the successful bus boycott with King, they organized the SCLC, and upon King's death, he succeeded him as president. FTP, name this civil rights leader who died in 1990.

Answer: Ralph David Abernathy

21. A graduate of Bologna's Liceo Musicale, he wrote some one-act operas for Venice before becoming famous for the comedy *An Italian in Algiers*. From then on, he wrote 2 to 4 operas a year, and an incredible 38 in 19 years, until he retired after the poor Parisian reception of what he considered his crowning achievement, the serious opera *William Tell*. FTP, name this composer, best known for *The Barber of Seville*.

Answer: Gioacchino Rossini

22. It and its alloys are indispensable in chemical laboratories for electrodes and crucibles and dishes in which materials can be heated to high temperatures, and it is used for electrical contacts and sparking points because it resists high temperatures and chemical attack of electric arcs. FTP, name this element, whose name derives from the diminutive of the Spanish for "silver," with atomic number 78.

Answer: platinum

23. Author of the autobiography, Fighting Liberal, his lack of partisan fervor led to his dismissal from the Republican party in 1944. Elected to the Senate in 1912, he became the leader of the Midwestern progressive Isolationist bloc. A supporter of the New Deal, he authored the 20th Amendment, and sponsored the passage of the TVA. FTP, identify this Nebraska politician who co-authored an anti-injunction act with Fiorello LaGuardia.

Answer: George Norris
