6. Bertrand Russell's proof took several hundred pages, mostly due to his definition of number. For 10 points--name this equation, the simplest form of addition taught in grade school.

7. Born in England in 1874, he earned a living as a trombonist, conductor and most importantly a composer. In 1910, he composed the first of his two suites for military band. Today, his suites, which are based on English folk tunes, continue to serve as cornerstones of the wind band repertoire. FTP, name this composer who is best known for his seven-movement orchestral suite, The Planets.

8. Though to police, he often seemed invincible, in fact, this man died twice. The first time, he achieved a state of legal death on the operating table after swallowing his tongue before the surgeon who was altering his

appearance managed to revive him. The second and more famous time, he was gunned down in front of the Biograph theatre in 1934 after being set up by his date. FTP name this longtime "public enemy #1".

9. It originated on Feb. 20, 1909, when Parisian newspaper *Le Figaro* published a manifesto by the Italian poet and editor Tommaso Marinetti that glorified the new technology of the automobile and the beauty of its speed, power, and movement. It also exalted violence and conflict and called for the destruction of cultural institutions like museums and libraries. FTP, what artistic movement, prominently displayed in the visual arts and poetry, emphasized the dynamism, speed, energy, and power of the machine and the vitality, change, and restlessness of modern life in general?

10. Unlike a familiar later adaptation, at its conclusion the heroine becomes Mrs. Frederick Aynsford-Hill. It begins with a simple bet. Back in the U.S., before the Civil War he was a successful lawyer in several fugitive slave cases. After serving in the Union Army, he served in Congress in 1865, and as governor of Ohio from 1868 until 1876. Due to disputes over the validity of Electoral College ballots, some argue he never really won the Presidential election of 1876. FTP, name this 19th president of the U.S., who as a result of his election, brought an end to Reconstruction.

13. This prize-winning novelist recently used an awards-ceremony speech in Bangkok to assail how the humanities are taught at universities in Britain and the United States and to discourage Thai students from studying the humanities at British universities.
