Questions by Swarthmore A (Peter Austin, Arcadia Falcone, Jonah Volk and Adrian Packel)

- 1. Legend has it that at one time this general forced his five-year-old son to swear undying hatred toward everything Roman. During the First Punic War, he was assigned the command of Sicily against the invading Romans and succeeded in holding them at bay until the end of the war. In 237 B.C. he began the conquest of Spain, though the second war with Rome that followed was waged principally by his two sons. FTP, name this able general of Carthage, surpassed only by his son Hannibal.
- A: Hamilcar Barca
- 2. His 4th Piano Concerto incorporates the then-popular song "The Man Who Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo." A child prodigy, he made his debut at age eleven, and Liszt considered him the greatest extemporizor alive. He wrote thirteen operas, the most well-known of which is *Samson and Delilah*. A skilled organist, his third symphony, dedicated to the memory of Liszt, features that instrument prominently. He also wrote symphonic poems such as *Le rouet d'Omphale* and *Danse Macabre*. FTP, name this composer most famous for a work he would not permit to be performed the *Carnival of the Animals*.

A: Charles Camille Saint-Saëns

3. Bordered on the northwest by the Valle d'Aosta, this region contains the provinces of Novara and Alessandria. Bordered on the south by Liguria, it is drained by the Po river and is one of Italy's prime agricultural regions. It is bordered on the north by Switzerland, the west by France and on the east by Lombardy. With its capital at Turin it is also a major manufacturing region. FTP, name this region of Italy the nucleus of the united Italian state in the 19th century.

A: Piedmont

- 4. A theorem by Ken Ribet in 1986. A conjecture by Frey in 1985. The methods of Vistor Kolyvagin and Barry Mazur. Galois representations. Modular forms. Deformation theory. Elliptic curves. The Taniyama-Shimura Conjecture. FTP, all of these parts of mathematics helped Andrew Wiles prove this famous mathematical question, which states that when x, y, z, and n are all integers and $x^n + y^n = z^n$, n can only equal 2. Answer: **Fermat's Last** Theorem
- 5. Its Indian phase is known as the Third Carnatic War and it confirmed British dominance of the subcontinent. The Prussians wons victories at Rossbach, Leuthen and Zorndorf, but Prussia was attacked from all sides and only British support and the death of the Russian czarina saved Frederick the Great and allowed him to retain the province of Silesia. FTP, name this European conflict that marked the rise of Prussia as a great power, known in the United States as the French and Indian War.

Answer: Seven Years' War

6. As a soldier in World War II, he sent letters to a friend criticizing "the man with the mustaches", which earned him eight years in various prison camps. While he is lionized in the West as one of the foremost Soviet dissidents, the attitude toward him among liberal Russians is ambivalent at best, due to his isolationist and Slavophilic tendencies. His experiences doing forced research in a prison laboratory informed his novel The First Circle, while his treatment for cancer inspired Cancer Ward. FTP name this Russian author, who made the Soviet prison camps known to the world in The Gulag Archipelago and One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich.

Answer: Aleksandr Isayevich Solzhenitsyn

7. In 1936, influenced by the Great Depression, he painted *Subway (Subterranean Fantasy)* which emphasized the claustrophobia and alienation of the figures depicted. By 1944, however, he had moved on to more surrealist forms with *Slow Swirl by the Edge of the Sea*. By 1949, he had developed his distinct style, with which he painted a chapel in Houston that was named for him after he committed suicide in 1970. FTP, name this Latvian-born American painter, most famous for color-field works such as *Green and Tangerine on Red*.

A: Mark Rothko

8. He studied military theory at Staff College in England and law at Tel Aviv University, both after the 1956 Suez Crisis, in which he captured the strategic Mitla Pass. After graduating he was promoted to major general, and recaptured the Mitla Pass during the Six-Day War. He resigned from the army in 1973 and entered politics, serving in the administrations of Yitzhak Rabin and Menachim Begin, under whom he orchestrated the invasion of Lebanon in 1982. FTP, name this co-founder of the Likud Party who will challenge Ehud Barak in the upcoming Israeli elections.

Answer: Ariel Sharon

9. George Goethals was the last chief engineer of the project, and it was under him that most of the construction actually took place, though John Stevens built the infrastructure that made it possible. The terrain presented numerous difficulties, such as the floods of the Chagres River. Construction was done primarily with Bucyrus steam shovels; both yellow fever and malaria had to be controlled before construction could begin earnest. When Theodore Roosevelt visited the construction site it was the first trip abroad by a sitting president. FTP, name this canal, completed in 1914.

Answer: Panama Canal

10. Some hermaphroditic members of this phylum engage in penis fencing, where the winner impregnates the loser. Only one class, Turberllaria, is free-living, though it is considered the ancestor of the other three classes. They possess an excretory system in the form of proto-nephridia, however, they lack a circulatory system or a coelom. Digestion takes place in a pharyngeal cavity and they are the simplest organisms to possess a brain. FTP, name this phylum, which includes tapeworms and flukes, commonly called flatworms.

Answer: Platyhelminthes (prompt on flatworms until the last word)

11. It follows in the tradition of Lycidas, of pastoral elegies written on the death of poet. This poem is different from its predecessor, however, in that both the author and the subject are first-rate poets. The Spenserian stanza it uses is the same utilized by the subject in his poem "Eve of St. Agnes". It does not speak of the dead poet by name, but instead masks the tribute in a classical Greek guise. FTP identify this poem, written by Percy Bysshe Shelley on the death of John Keats.

Answer: Adonais

12. In Sri Lanka, he is known as Isvara, and he early on took on the aspects of the Vedic god Rudra. He appears as Mahayogin, or the great Yogi, and as Natatraja, or King of the Dance, in his benign forms, and his wife is either Durga or Parvati. Mahakala ("Death") and Urga ("the Violent One") are his destructive forms. FTP, name this Hindu deity, commonly though of the destroyer of the universe, forming a triad with Brahman and Vishnu.

A: Shiva

- 13. After leaving her previously most high-profile job, she joined the law firm of Brownstein, Hyatt, Farber, and Strickland, and specialized in business regulation and environmental law. She was in the Department of Agriculture from 1984 to 1985 and the Department of the Interior from 1985 to 1987 where she worked on a report regarding the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. From 1991 to 1999 while she was a state attorney general she helped develop self-audit laws and became hated by environmentalists. FTP, name this former Colorado attorney general, the new Secretary of the Interior. Answer: Gale **Norton**
- 14. This movie revolves around a pair of newlyweds who end up on the run from gangsters who want their cocaine back. The couple eventually travels from Detroit to Mexico, guided by their guardian angel, Elvis. Patricia Arquette and Christian Slater star in this movie. FTP, name this movie directed by Tony Scott and written by Quentin Tarantino.

Answer: True Romance

15. T.S. Eliot called it "one of the stupidest and most uninspired plays ever written". Its subject is historical, but in form it is more of a revenge tragedy. Modern critics have been interested by the portrayal of the Moor, Aaron. It is possibly the most brutally violent of Shakespeare's plays, including a rape and mutilation which plays out the legend of Philomel; the attackers, aware of that story, cut off the girl's hands to render it even more difficult for her to identify her violators. FTP identify this early play of Shakespeare, in which the Queen of the Goths and her family ravage the life of the good Roman of the title.

A: Titus Andronicus

16. His son, who shared his name, married the Byzantine Princess Theophano, and his grandson, also of the same name, would have married Byzantine Emperor Basil II's niece Zoe, but the grandson died too soon. Son of German king Henry I, he became ruler of northern Italy by defeating Berengar II. Crowned in 962, he successfully deposed Pope John XII and installed Leo VIII in his place. FTP, name this Holy Roman Emperor who defeated the Magyars at the Battle of Lechfeld in 955.

17. He took the world's first color photograph and proved that all colors can be produced from primary colors, and he also first posited that Saturn's rings were made up of small particles. This stimulated his interest in gases, and he developed a kinetic theory of gases which was later refined by Boltzmann. However, he is most well-known for developing his electromagnetic theory of light. FTP, name this Scottish theoretical physict of the 19th century whose name survives in his equations on electromagnetic phenomena and his demon?

A: James Clerk Maxwell

18. He appeared as the scientist Lacombe in Spielberg's Close Encounters of the Third Kind, but he is better known a director. In a reaction against studio productions he attempted to place a personal stamp on his films, others of which included Jules and Jim, The Wild Child, The Story of Adele H and The Last Metro. The first film he directed, featuring a semiautobiographical protagonist, was 400 Blows. FTP, name this French director, who won an Oscar for Day for Night.

A: François Truffaut

19. A native of Stuttgart, while in seminary at Tübingen he befriended Friedrich Hölderlin and Friedrich von Schelling. In 1801 he began lecturing at Jena, though when the French took that city in 1806, he fled. From 1812 to 1816, he published his *Science of Logic*; other works include *The Philosophy of Right* and *The Phenomenology of Mind*. He argued "what is rational is real, and what is real is rational" and sought to develop a universal philosophy, and to do this he developed the dialectic. FTP, name this German philosopher.

A: Georg Wilhelm Friedrich Hegel

20. In 1917, the general secretary of the Socialist Party of the United States sent a letter to 15,000 men eligible for the draft but not yet drafted, urging resistance to the draft, calling it a violation of the 13th Amendment. Convicted under the Espionage Act of 1917 for interfering with U.S. War Effort, the case made its way to the Supreme Court where Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr., wrote for a unanimous court. FTP, name this court case that established the "clear and present danger" doctrine for suppressing speech.

A: Schenck v. United States

- 21. Its walls were said to have been built by Amphion and Zethus. Led by Epaminondas and its Sacred Band a regiment composed entirely of homosexual men and their lovers it dominated Greece for brief time between its victory at the battle of Leuctra in 371 BC and its defeat at Mantinea in 362 BC. When it rebelled against Alexander the Great in 335 BC he leveled the city except for the temples and the house of Pindar, and sold the remaining population into slavery. The birthplace of Herakles, it was founded by Cadmus. FTP, name this Greek city, home of Laius, Jocasta and Oedipus.
- A: Thebes
- 22. Ethane with two atoms of this element substituting for two hydrogens is a constituent of anti-knock fluid in leaded gasoline. Commonly sythesized as a by-product in the production of table salt, it was discovered in 1826 by Antoine Balard. Coupled with a methyl radical it can be an ozone-destroying pollutant. FTP, name this halogen, a reddish-brown liquid just below chlorine on the periodical table.

Answer: Bromine

23. A supporter of Sulla against Marius, he built his fortune off of goods confiscated from Marius's supporters. In Rome, he ran a private fire company, refusing to provide service until the fire victim signed up with his insurance company. As praetor in 71 BC he suppressed the revolt of Spartacus and was elected consul in 70 BC and again in 55 BC. FTP, name this man, killed at the Battle of Carrhae in 53 BC, who formed the first triumvirate with Julius Caesar and Pompey the Great.

Answer: Marcus Licinius Crassus

- 24. From the age of nine she published a weekly family newspaper, the Hyde Park Gate News, in which her first short stories appeared. The death of her mother when she was thirteen halted publication, but as an adult she and her husband published their own and others' works out of a home printing press. Her first book, The Voyage Out, was published in 1915, but it was in the 1922 novel Jacob's Room that her stream-of-consciousness style became fully developed. FTP name this modernist author, center of the Bloomsbury group and author of To The Lighthouse and Mrs. Dalloway. Answer: Virginia Woolf
- 25. The son of the Titan Iapetus and either the nymph Clymene or the Titaness Themis, he was the brother of Atlas. He and another brother were tasked with designing the animals and man, but his brother gave animals so many physical attributes that he left the task of creating man superior to the animals to him. The father of the Greek equivalent of Noah, Deucalion, he tricked Zeus into picking the bones of the ox as his part of the sacrifice. FTP, name this Titan, most famous for giving man the gift of fire.

A: Prometheus

26. Expelled from Oxford for supporting the theories of David Hume, he was influenced by the French philosopher François Quesnay and Anne Turgot. In 1763 he resigned his position as professor of logic and moral philosophy at the University of Glasgow to become the tutor of Henry Scott, whom he accompanied on a tour of France, where he met leading physiocrats, then the leading school of economic thought. During his tenure at Glasgow he had written his second-most famous work, *Theory of Moral Sentiments*. FTP, name this Scot, who in 1776 published *The Wealth of Nations*.

A: Adam Smith
