1. This album features such varied fare as Turnadot's *Nessun Dorma*, Simon and Garfunkel's *Bridge Over Troubled Water* and Ultravox's *Vienna*. It sold over 500,000 copies in England, with concerts promoting the album filling soccer stadiums and is presently climbing the pop and classical charts in the U.S. and Canada. For 10 points - name this album by former bolt-fitter and now full-time tenor Russell Watson.

Answer: The Voice

2. It is likely that the author borrowed the plot from William Painter's 1575 book *The Palace of Pleasures*. Unpopular in Shakespeare's time, it has seen a revival in the 20th Century, in large part because of its heroine who, refusing to accept a preordained place in a hierarchical man's world, does what she has to do to win her own way. For 10 points--name this tale of Helena and Bertram.

Answer: All's Well That Ends Well

3. The Final National Priority List for this program includes such ironic sites as Fort Devens in Massachusetts and Rocky Flats in Colorado. Started in 1980, more mundane but well known sites include Love Canal in New York and Times Beach in Missouri. For 10 points – identify this governmental program that so far has completed clean up at 757 targeted environmental problem areas.

Answer: <u>Superfund</u> or <u>CERCLA</u> or <u>Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation</u> and <u>Liability Act</u>

4. The names are the same in the plural. One was a car produced by Ford in the 1970s that replaced the Falcon, another is a progressive country group most notably known for the album *What a Crying Shame* and the song *O What a Thrill* and another still is a U.S. military missile used aboard the F-16 during Desert Storm. For 10 points - identify this shared word that also refers to the 23rd franchise to join the NBA in 1980, a southern franchise currently owned by Mark Cuban.

Answer: Mavericks -- Dallas would be wrong because of parts 1 through 3.

5. Originally a Ben Franklin franchisee, he went out on his own when they rejected his discounting proposals. A pioneer in "just in time inventory" management, he was also one of the first retailers to use computer networking to follow sales trends. In 1985, he became the wealthiest American due to the value of his stock, and in 1991, his stores became America's largest retailer. For 10 points--name this Arkansas entrepreneur, a pioneer in discount retail.

Answer: Sam Walton

6. Due to the large number of shipwrecks, it is among the most popular non-tropical diving sites in the world. Its first recorded military use was by the Vikings in the 13th Century. During World War I, the British established its Northern base here, which they used as their launching site for the Battle of Jutland. During World War II, it was the base of the Home Fleet, which ferried convoys to Murmansk. For 10 points-name this British naval base in the Orkney Islands of Scotland.

Answer: Scapa Flow

7. They occupied central Anatolia by about 2000 BC, and their language was found to be an early, independent branch of Indo-European. They entered Cappadocia (CAP-uh-DOH-shee-uh) in Asia Minor around 1800 B.C., and were finally conquered around 1200 B.C. by their neighbors, the Assyrians. With capital at Hattusas (hat-TOO-suhs), or Bogazkoy--for 10 points--name this people, most famous for their mastery of iron weaponry.

Answer: Hittites

8. After establishing himself during the Civil War as one of the top young officers in the Union Navy; Admiral Stephen Luce invited him to be the primary lecturer at the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island. His approach, stating that sea power was the key to national supremacy, were adopted by many militaries around the world. For 10 points--name this admiral, whose lectures were collected in the influential *The Influence of Sea Power upon History*, 1660-1783.

Answer: Alfred Thayer Mahan

9. The name's the same. One is a feature on *The Late Show with David Letterman* featuring people eating pizza that no contestant has won or even figured out the rules. James Dean worked as a stunt tester for this longtime TV show that ran on-and-off from 1951 through 1980. For 10 points -- identify this game show featuring couples attempting to do wacky stunts for cash and has been hosted by Jack Narz, Gene Wood, Monty Hall and most famously by Bud Collyer.

Answer: Beat the Clock

10. There were 18 of these papers, published whenever the author felt the need arose, including a pair of "supernumerary" editions and "extraordinary" one. Addressing a number of recipients, including the people of England and the people of America, they were published without copyright, keeping costs down so that they could be cheaply distributed among the people of the Colonies. For 10 points--name this 1776-1783 series of papers by Thomas Paine.

Answer: The American Crisis

11. Springing from a dinner conversation with Paul Whiteman, the piece's importance came about largely as a surprise. The author of the song found a rhythmic inspiration on a train to Boston and combined it with Joplin's piano rags, the rhythmic jazz of Harlem, Yiddish folk music, and the new post-Romantic music of Ravel and Schoenberg and Stravinsky. For 10 points--what is this "experiment in modern music" by George Gershwin.

Answer: Rhapsody in Blue

12. Formed in 1945, their name became a misnomer in 1964 when Chatham and Windsor left the league. The original season featured four teams in just two cities, but by the mid 1990's they had spiraled to 19 teams. In 2001, the Turner Cup will be given for the 56th and probably last time since the six strongest teams are jumping to the AHL for the 2001-02 season. For 10 points -- identify this minor hockey league featuring the Manitoba Moose and Orlando Solar Bears which will most likely be no more.

Answer: International Hockey League or I.H.L. or "The I"

13. It stemmed from a purported incident in 1731, when the master of the merchant ship Rebecca ran into the guarda coasta, who proceeded to relieve him of auris, which he proceeded carefully preserve and display before Parliament in 1739, leading a reluctant Sir Robvert Walpole to declare war in Spain. For 10 points-name this 1739-41 conflict between Spain and England leading up to the country's involvement in the War of Spanish Succession.

Answer: The War of Jenkins' Ear

14. This person believed that in order to properly psychoanalyze a child, you need to assume the role of a caring parent and not as a buddy. This postulate is theorized in *The Ego and the Mechanisms of Defense*, which started the ego psychology movement. For 10 points – identify this founder of the Hamstead Child Therapy Clinic in London, England, a lecturer well into her 90's and a famous daughter of an even more famous psychoanalyst father.

Answer: Anna Freud

15. Griffin, Porter Stoddard's friend, is cheating on his wife, Mona. So when Mona goes down south to try to sort things out, Porter ends up tagging along but ends up getting in affairs of his own. He hooks up with a cellist named Alex and a Halloween party-maven named Auburn. Also, for some reason, he's been chased by a guntoting elderly gentleman played by Charlton Heston. For 10 points -- identify this 2001 bomb starring Garry Shandling, Goldie Hawn and Warren Beatty.

Answer: Town and Country

22. In 1867, a farmer by the name of Jack Swilling discovered favorable farming conditions in this area and in 1874, a patent for the town was issued by President Grant. Incorporated as a city in 1881 on the edge of the Sonoran desert; it is today serviced by SkyHarbor International Airport. For 10 points--identify this city, the birthplace of Barry Goldwater.

Answer: Phoenix, Arizona

23. Their new PR campaign, based upon the theme of "Do Good", comes in reaction to decreased recruitment in wake of the 1999 Rampart Station scandal, in which members were found to be absconding cocaine from evidence lockers. With a mere 9,000 officers to patrol a city of 7 million, they are seriously undermanned. For 10 points--name this police force, which also took PR blows with the Rodney King incident and OJ Trial.

Answer: LAPD or Los Angeles Police Department

24. A native of Hamilton, Ontario, he earned his B.A. from Toronto, his Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins and studied in Europe with Fuchs, Frobenius, Hensel, Schwarz and Planck. Returning to the University of Toronto, he lectured while researching algebraic functions, his specialty until his 1932 death. For 10 points--name this mathematician, whose last will established the medal which has served as the highest honor in his field.

Answer: John Fields

25. Proponents of this system in the United States included Talcott Parsons, who introduced the notion that there were stable structural categories in society. English devotees included Radcliffe-Brown and Malinowski. For 10 points -- identify this philosophical theory that stresses the importance of interdependence among all behaviors in a society, partially formulated as a reaction against evolutionary speculations, postulated in *The Division of Labor in Society* by Émile Durkheim.

Answer: <u>functionalism</u>

26. In May of 2000, many young people in this country started taking the Beastie Boys to heart and began fighting for their right to party, staging mass protests in opposition to proposed new laws that state party organizers who do not get a license from local authorities could face prison sentences of six months, fines of \$6,400 and confiscation of their expensive sound systems. For 10 points--name this EU nation opposed to "le rave."

Answer: France

16. One of his great concerns is that his wife Juana, will not make much of a queen when he is given his promised reward of an island kingdom. A lover of animals, later in the narrative he distresses his master by asking for wages, an arrangement unknown between knights-errant and squires. For 10 points--name this proverb spouting peasant who calls a windmill a windmill, companion to Don Quixote.

Answer: Sancho Panza (prompt on either name)

17. "If you give me six lines written by the most honest man, I will find something in them to hang him." So stated this bishop of Luçon, one of the earliest known proponents of "the ends justify the means," he was also a prime supporter of scholastic activity, rebuilding the Sorbonne and establishing the French Academy in his role as Prime Minister for Louis XIII. For 10 points--who is this man, born Armand Jean du Plessis?

Answer: Cardinal Richelieu (accept Armand Jean du Plessis before it is mentioned)

18. By getting a hit in his last career at bat, he raised his lifetime average to .300. Now a hitting coach for the Reading Phillies, he missed the beginning of the 1994 season when he had a cancerous testicle removed. Not known for his conditioning, this one time Padre and Chicago White Sox was listed at a conservative 200 pounds on his 5-10 frame. For 10 points -- identify this Phillie first baseman of the early 90's who stated "I'm not an athlete, I'm a ball player."

Answer: John Kruk

19. It sits upon the shores of the Bow River, right near Bow Falls. Due to its position in the Canadian Rockies, this park is among the first to feel the negative effects of the Chinook wind. Alberta's first UNESCO World Heritage site, during World War I, almost 8,000 Ukrainians were interred at this home of the Sulphur mountains and Lake Louise. For 10 points-name this national park, Canada's first.

Answer: Banff National Park

20. The absolute value of this number is used for determining the volume of a parallelepiped. More importantly, they can be used to determine if a matrix has an inverse. For 10 points – identify this mathematical property that is defined as the sum of all signed elementary products from the matrix.

Answer: determinant

21. Newborns Lauren and Sarah were kept an extra night to be treated for jaundice. Having decided to convalesce for the nest two months in her home in Williamstown before returning to the State House, she will keep abreast of affairs by joining a number of meetings via video conferencing. For 10 points-name this Massachusetts Republican, who became the first U.S. governor to give birth while in office.

Answer: Jane Swift

27. Near the earth, these travel around 250 miles per hour and can penetrate both the upper atmosphere and the magnetic poles. Near their source, they travel near the speed of light. It has also been known to make comet trails change direction suddenly, such as was observed on Hale-Bopp in 1997. For 10 points -- identify this output of the sun of intense radiation that can be dangerous to space travelers.

Answer: solar wind

28. Before its development, iron oxide was employed to carry oxygen to the site of purification. In that year, as an inventor was working on ways of improving cannons, it occurred to him that oxygen for refining could come directly from the air if wind was blown over the melted metal. Perfected by Alexander Holley, it eliminates the alloyed impurities in pig iron to produce steel. For 10 points--what is this process developed by the Englishman for whom it is named.

Answer: Bessemer Process

Answer: Network Solutions, Inc.

- (10) What was Seraut's primary technique which involved using dots of varying colors to create subtle changes in form?

Answer: pointillism or divisionism

- (10) This former world statesman became Prime Minister under Valentin Paniagua Corazao after the fleeing of Albert Fujimori.

Answer: Javier Perez de Cuellar

(10) Not only is he the President of The Democratic Republic of the Congo, he's also the foreign minister.

Answer: Joseph Kabila

(10) While not inner-tubing on a lake, he also serves as Prime Minister of Australia.

Answer: John Howard

- 4. Based on the given stimuli, give the lobe of the brain most affected for 10 points each.
- (10) The temperature in this room has just been raised to 115 degrees. This lobe behind the central culcus is telling you it's hot.

Answer: parietal lobe

(10) I've just shown you a picture of a cute puppy. This lobe in the back is processing the visual information.

Answer: occipital lobe

(10) Does this puppy remind you of anything? This lobe containing the hippocampus is helping you remember.

Answer: temporal lobe

Answer: Chianti

Answer: The Crucible

(10) Miller's first hit was this 1947 play, about the post-WWII trauma incurred by war profiteer Joe Keller and his family.

Answer: All My Sons

(15) The 1955 drama about the Carbonnes is named for the most prominent landmark in Miller's native Brooklyn, New York.

Answer: A View from the Bridge
