TOSSUPS

1. The ritual for which they were named first took place at Zollikon, shortly before they wrote the Schleithem Confession. Early leaders included John of Leiden, who established a commune in Munster that was destroyed in 1535 and Thomas Muntzer, who led a rebellion in Franconia. More enduringly, Menno Simons and Jakob Hutter both gave their names to still-existing sects of, for 10 points what religious movement founded in opposition to Zwingli?

answer: _Anabaptists_

2. He has a fight with his lover Leni over his jealousy of the tradesman Block, and shortly afterwards, in the cathedral, a priest tells him the tale of the doorkeeper of the Law. He himself is a bank assessor before his life is destroyed by a mysterious legal authority that tries and executes him for an unspecified crime. For 10 points, name this protagonist of Kafka's "The Trial."

answer: Josef _K_ [may be pronounced "kaa"]

3. It is based on the description given by the title character, but its setting also includes members of the Cornaro family, since it sits in their chapel at the church of Santa Maria della Vittoria in Rome. The title figure is swooning apparently unsupported while an angel brandishes an arrow at her. For 10 points, name this sculpture by Bernini of a mystical experience.

answer: The _Ecstasy of St. Teresa_

4. They consist of several smaller ranges including the Trans-Alay and the Vakhan, and the highest peaks are in the Gorno-Badakhshan region. They are mostly drained by the Panj, which flows into the Amu-Darya. Mayakovsky, Karl Marx and Communism Peaks can all be found in, for 10 points, what Central Asian mountain range centered in Tajikistan?

answer: The _Pamirs_

5. Using a special corps of slaves that he later gave to the state, he built two new aqueducts and was the main agent of his old friend's building program. His military victories included Naulochus in 36 BC, which finished off Sextus Pompey. In 23 BC, a gravely ill Augustus gave his signet ring to, for 10 points, what man whose name can still be read on the Pantheon and who gets the real credit for winning the Battle of Actium?

answer: Marcus Vipsanius _Agrippa_ (prompt on "Vipsanius")

6. A doctor posing as the Angel of Death recognized that he had had rheumatic fever as a child, but his adult afflictions include a penchant for doing magic tricks on the job, an unhealthy obsession with Mel Torme and an on-again, off-again romance with public defender Christine Sullivan. "Fifty dollars and time served" is the most often repeated line of, for 10 points, what judge from TV's "Night Court," who introduces himself as "Harry, but then aren't we all?"

answer: Judge Harry _Stone_

7. The carboxylic acid of this name has formula $\text{CH}_2=\text{CHCOOH}$ and it also names a class of that acid's derivative polymers, including British-made Perspex and its German-American equivalent, made by Rohm and Haas as Plexiglas, as well as Lucite, the glassy constituent of paperweights and coffee mugs. For 10 points, name this class of compound that includes Orlon and other substitutes for wool in innumerable cheap sweaters.

answer: _acrylic_

8. The last king of Macedonia was named for this hero, whose body count includes Phineus, who turned up at his wedding and asserted a prior claim on Cepheus' daughter, his own father Acrisius, whom he accidentally hits with a discus, and Polydectes, who first sent him on his famous quest. For 10 points, name this protective son of Danae, whose main weapon was a very ugly head.

answer: _Perseus_

9. The singer of this monody asks what the point of being a poet is, and is told by Apollo that "fame is no plant that grows on mortal soil," and then is instructed by St. Peter on the wickedness of shepherds who neglect their flocks, i.e. the clergy of England. All of this is in reply to his laments on a friend lost at sea, the title character of, for 10 points, what pastoral elegy in the style of Theocritus, written in 1637 by John Milton?

answer: _Lycidas_

10. He argued that the defining factor in a sacrifice was not that it was an offering but that the sacrificed object was destroyed, in his 1902 collaboration with Henri Hubert, "Essay on the Nature and Function of Sacrifice." He also assisted his uncle in the latter's famous work on suicide. For 10 points, name this influential French social anthropologist, nephew of Emile Durkheim and author of 1925's "The Gift."

answer: Marcel _Mauss_
(prompt on Hubert before mentioned)

11. The Russian version is misnamed, as it is led by nationalist loony Vladimir Zhirinovsky. Paddy Ashdown used to head and Charles Kennedy now heads one that looks to get about 12 percent in the general election in Britain. For 10 points, give the name these parties share with one that has ruled its country almost continuously since World War II but this year lost control of its own membership, allowing Junichiro Koizumi to become prime minister of Japan.

answer: _Liberal Democratic_ Party

(do not prompt on "Liberal" or "Democratic")

12. To prevent damage to this organ during surgery, Ernst Sauerbruch invented a negative pressure chamber. The organ consists of two or three lobes connected to the circulatory system at a point called the hilum, where it also meets the bronchus. Diseases affecting it include berylliosis, silicosis and emphysema. For 10 points, name this organ containing numerous bronchioles that is encased in the pleura.

answer: _lung_

13. After being announced in 1932, it was demonstrated by the repeal of the Platt Amendment and Roosevelt's ignoring the oil lobby's demands regarding Mexico and Venezuela. In essence, it was a repudiation of Roosevelt's namesake's "Big Stick" approach. For 10 points, name the new policy of non-intervention in Latin American affairs announced in FDR's first inaugural.

answer: The _Good Neighbor_ Policy
[prompt on "FDR's Latin American policy or other such vague babblings.]

14. The hero sings briefly about his exultation at the result of the Battle of Marengo before being hauled off to prison by a magistrate who sings in a Te Deum at the end of the first act. Before that, the tenor had sung the aria "Recondita Armonia" about the looks of his mistress, the title character who later sings "Vissi d'Arte" before stabbing the villain Scarpia and throwing herself from the Castel Sant'Angelo in, for 10 points, what Puccini opera set in Rome in 1800?

answer: _Tosca_

15. Its blue and green varieties form under special temperature and pressure conditions and are rich in the minerals glaucophane and chlorite respectively. The amphibolite version comes from metamorphosis of basalt, while many other types are known by their mineral content, notably talc and mica varieties. Its mineral crystals are visible to the naked eye, unlike slate, but it splits into layers and does not exhibit banding, unlike gneiss. For 10 points, name this type of metamorphic rock.

answer: _schist_

16. His creator gave separate accounts of his "Innocence," "Wisdom," "Incredulity," "Secret" and "Scandal." He resides in Cobhole, Essex, but his companion is a Frenchman named Flambeau whom he first met while the latter was trying to transport stolen jewelry in "The Blue Cross." Flambeau's key mistake was attacking reason, which is bad theology. For 10 points, name this unworldly, slightly bungling but phenomenally acute clerical detective created by G. K. Chesterton.

answer: Father _Brown_

17. It started out as "Wildcountry," playing a club in Myrtle Beach called the Bowery, and consisted mostly of three cousins, Jeff Cook, Randy Owen and Teddy Gentry. Early

'80s albums included "The Closer you Get" and "Mountain Music," and in 1989 it was named Artist of the Decade and was the biggest group act in country music. For 10 points, name this band of songs such as "Can't Keep a Good Man Down," "She and I" and, most famously, one that declares "My Home's in" the place that gives it its name.

answer: Alabama

18. Its first major patron, in the tenth century, was Byzantine Emperor Nicephorus Phocas, who assisted in founding its Great Lavra. Numerous Russian colonies there were expanded greatly by nineteenth-century czars and the Greek constitution guarantees its autonomy as a republic made up of nine liberal and eleven conservative establishments. For 10 points, name this point on the Khalkidi Peninsula, the major center of Orthodox monasticism

answer: Mount Athos

19. Its ruler, King Msatwi III, has been unusually friendly to Libya's Colonel Khadaffi, who recently send a plane-load of doctors to treat the king's mysterious stomach-ache that everyone strenuously denies was the result of poisoning by one of his eight wives. For 10 points, name this country with its capital at Lobamba that is surrounded on three sides by South Africa.

answer: Swaziland

20. It consisted of more than 500 firms, the biggest being Bayer, BASF and Hoechst, and it reached cartel agreements with Standard Oil and Imperial Chemical Industries. In 1943 it built the biggest factory in the world, and reached far beyond the dye industry referred to in its title. For 10 points, name this chemical industry cartel that made the synthetic oil and rubber for the Wehrmacht at a plant at Auschwitz.

answer: IG Farben [can be pronounced "ee-gay"]
or Interessen Gemeinschaft Farbenindustrie, for those who like to torture moderators.

21. The variable nebula of this name, NGC 2261, is illuminated by R. Monocerotis, while as a flow, it refers to the increase in red-shifts of galaxies given their increasing distance, which can be plotted on a diagram of the same name, and will be proportional as expressed by a law and to a constant of proportionality of the same name, from which can be derived a number that is the estimated age of the universe. For 10 points, give the name all of these share with a Missouri native and with a piece of optical hardware.

answer: Hubble

22. He got Corot's permission to call himself his pupil at the 1864 Salon exhibition, was Monet's companion in exile during the Franco-Prussian war and famously painted all day outdoors at Pontoise with Paul Cezanne. In his own right, he painted the "Orchard in Bloom at Louveciennes" [looov-si-ENN] and the "Bridge at Bruges." For 10 points, name this diehard Impressionist.

answer: Camille _Pissarro_

23. He began his career as bishop of Autun [oh-TAHN], and after 1789 was one of only bishops to swear to the Civil Constitution of the Clergy. In his last post, he was influential in negotiating the creation of the Belgian state. In between, he had helped Louis-Philippe to the throne, reached a Concordat with the Pope and demanded notorious bribes from American ambassadors. For 10 points, name this foreign minister to both Napoleon and Louis XVIII.

answer: Charles-Maurice de _Talleyrand_-Perigord

24. It begins at Yount Peak in the Absaroka Range and enters Montana at Gardiner, flowing through Billings and Miles City and enters the Missouri in North Dakota. Its own tributaries include the Bighorn and Powder Rivers. A namesake lake and waterfall also lie along the course of, for 10 points, what scenic river that loses out to Old Faithful as the principal water-based attraction of the national park named for it?

answer: The _Yellowstone_ River

25. This colonial made it to the mother country on the strength of his experiments detecting electromagnetic waves through a brick wall. He expanded on this work with J.J. Thompson. He later taught at McGill and was born in New Zealand but was at the Cavendish Laboratories in 1896 when he first distinguished alpha and beta radiation. For 10 points, name this postulator of an atomic model.

answer: Ernest _Rutherford_

26. He first attracted royal patronage with his performance of his "The Amorous Doctor," but his first great popular success was the story of Agnes, the young would-be bride of Arnolphe, called "The School of Wives." For 10 points, name this comic playwright who died in 1673 while acting in his own "The Imaginary Invalid."

answer: _Moliere_ or Jean-Baptiste _Poquelin_

27. This work argues that individuals would both accord themselves as much liberty as possible and obey the "maximin" principle of making the poorest members of society as well off as possible, rather than choose utilitarian aims, in a hypothetical situation where they didn't know their social status. This "veil of ignorance" argument is the basis of, for 10 points, what 1971 book by John Rawls?

answer: A _Theory of Justice_

28. Generally known to his countrymen as Gus Dur, he became head of a religious organization called Nahdlatul Ulama and then in 1999 won the presidency in an upset. Since then he has been accused first of sleeping in Parliament and then of accepting a massive donation from a neighboring monarch. Megawati is looking to succeed, for 10 points, what embattled leader of Indonesia?

answer: Abdurrahman _Wahid_

29. Characters include Joe Harland, who loses a fortune on Wall Street and becomes a beggar and Ellen Oglethorpe, who leaves her journalist husband Jimmy Herf. They all find futility and disappointment in New York, and circulate around the title location, a subway hub. For 10 points, name this 1925 novel by John Dos Passos.

answer: _Manhattan Transfer_

30. After taking power in a coup in 1876, he ruled for 35 years, during which time he brought in the foreign oil companies later kicked out by Cardenas and restored power to the Church that it had lost under Juarez. Madero was joined by Zapata and Pancho Villa in the 1911 revolution that overthrew, for 10 points, what longtime Mexican dictator?

answer: Porfirio _Diaz_

1. Name these cathedrals whose construction didn't run exactly to plan, for 10 points each:

A. This city's medieval cathedral was supposed to become the transept of a rebuilt cathedral, some of whose long walls were finished and survive, but the Black Death ended the project.

answer: _Siena_

B. This now-blackened German cathedral was worked over from 1320 to 1560, when the work stopped in the middle, not to be resumed until 1842 and finished in 1880.
