## SOC. SCIENCE - GEOGRAPHY/DEMOGRAPHY

1. This city gained prominence during the Almohad period as a port city of much greater importance than Tangier, and benefitted greatly from the "brain drain" of Andalusian Muslims during the Reconquista in the 13th century. After the fall of the Almohads, this city became an entropot for Genoese merchants between the Mediterranean and the Atlantic ports of Flanders. For 10 points, name this city, now under Spanish rule, opposite Gibraltar and with a rock of its own, that was probably founded by the Phonecians.

7. This company was set up in 1902 on the shore of Lake Superior in an effort to exploit corundum. In 1905, it began to manufacture sandpaper, and at that time, ceased mining until 1930, when it began to mine quartz, rather than corundum. FTP Name this alliterative company, best known as the makers of Scotch tape.

FTP, name this body of work whose oldest portion is the Rig.

10. In 1986, the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences established polka as a new category in which the Grammy awards would be given. For ten points, name this musician, who had been known as for several decades as, and had even been crowned "America's Polka King".

For 10 points, name the year in which all of these events occurred.

15. ## SCIENCE - GEOLOGY/METEOROLOGY/ENVIRONMENT/ASTRONOMY

16. Astronomers often express both dates and long time intervals in days, but due to the idiosyncracies of both the Gregorian and the Julian calendars, this is usually done by placing events within this system, which places day #1 at noon on January 1st 4713 BCE, the last time the 28 year solar cycle, the 19 year lunar cycle, and the 15 year indication cycle, used in Ancient Rome to regulate taxes, coincided. This system can also be used to quickly compute the number of days between any two dates. For ten points, name this system developed in 1582 by Joseph Scaliger, and named after his father, not, as is often assumed, after the then floundering calendrical system.

# MISCELLANEOUS - CURRENT EVENTS

The FBI created a front for its agents, who, posing as associates of an Arab sheik, offered selected public officials money or other considerations in exchange for special favors.
