Fraud, intimidation, and violence by Southern Democrats slowed their growth between 1892 and 1896; however, at the 1896 convention, they managed to nominate a presidential candidate -- William Jennings Bryan, the same man nominated by the Democrats. For ten points, name this political party, formed by a merger of the Farmers' Alliance and the Knights of Labor, writers of the Omaha Platform.

Answer: Populist or People's Party

A. In 1876, Peter Cooper of New York ran on this verdant ticket.

Answer: Greenback Party

4. TOSSUP: In a book by psychologist Clarissa Pinkola-Estés which examines folklore and feminine psychology, she relies greatly on the theories of a single psychologist. In her book, she discusses several aspects of the female psyche, illustrating her examples with folktales from around the world. In the tale "The Handless Maiden" this figure is positively represented by the young King who marries the Handless Maiden. The figure's negative side is illustrated in her version of "Bluebeard," with the title character as this archetype. Representing, for Pinkola-Estés, the side of the woman that protects and guides her, this character is a figure of great strength. FTP, name this Jungian archetype defined by Jung as the masculine side of the soul.

6. TOSSUP: His father was a chief Minister to Henry III, and his mother was the daughter of a concillor of the Parliament of Paris. When his father's death lent weakened his family's claims to their possessions, including a bishopric, he was made a bishop at the age of 22. He was later appointed chaplain to Anne of Austria, However it was when he expelled Papal troops from the Canton of Grison, with his power as Chief of the royal council, that his ruthlessness and decisiveness showed through. FTP, name this religious and political figure, born Armand-Jean du Plessis, and later made Cardinal.

9. TOSSUP: Invented by Petro Vlahos who won an Oscar for it in 1964, this compositing technique uses a special background usually painted with special-purpose paint from such firms as Rosco. After filming, a matte is made from the footage, which is used to drop in a different background. FTP, name this technique also called chroma key, which depends on the fact that flying saucers are generally not the same color as the sky.

10. TOSSUP: He is considered by many modern scholars to be the most difficult Greek author to read or translate. This is not a new as even in the 4th Century BCE Dionysus of Helicarnassus complained of this man's style. Nevertheless in the first book of his work, he asserts it is a possession for eternity and not for contemporary popular enjoyment. In the next book of that work, he reports his version of Perikles' Funeral Oration. While we don't know his birth year, he was a general and thus at least 30 by the battle of Amphipolis in 424, the loss of which led to his exile from Athens. FTP, name this author of "History" which concerns the Peloponessian War

Answer: Thucydides

BONUS: Answer the following concerning the Peloponessian War FTPE:

A. The proximate cause of the war was the dispute over Corcyra and Epidamnos [eh-pi-DAM-naws] in which Athens sided with Corcyra against this polis, whose navy, although small in comparison to Athens, was one of the largest in Greece.

It was captured in the first crusade in 1110, but was retaken in 1187 by Saladin even though maintaining control was difficult due to the raiding of the Druze. FTP, name this city, which sits at the foot of the Lebanon mountains and is the Capital of Lebanon.

Answer: Beirut

His new theology focuses on the idea of Geist, or spirit, which later became the absolute spririt which is at the center of his monistic philosophy. Later, when his fame was already insured, he wrote the Science of Logic as well as the Philosophy of Right. FTP name this German philosopher who first became popular with the Phenomenology of Spirit in which his argument is laid out in his famous dialectical form. Answer: Georg Wilhelm Frederick Hegel

BONUS: Hegel's theories dominated philosophy for nearly a century. Answer the following questions about some of his followers for ten points each.

A. The leader of the so called left or young Hegelians, he wrote "The Essence of Christianity" in which he argues that man makes God, not the other way around.

Answer: Ludwig Feuerbach

B. A student of Feuerbach and a member of the left Hegelians, he broke from the group with his Thesis on Feuerbach as well as a critique of Hegel's Philosophy of Right. Both are contained in what is today called "The 1844 Manuscripts"

Answer: Karl Marx

C. This social scientist joined with Max Horkheimer to revive the Frankfurt school of critical theory. He used the dialectical form in Dialectic of Enlightenment in an attempt to solve social problems of his time.

Answer: Theodor Adorno
