TOSSUPS:

1. "It is a matter of life and death, a road either to safety or to ruin. Hence it is a subject of inquiry which can on no account be neglected.(*)" It, "then is governed by five constant factors, to be taken into account in one's deliberations, when seeking to determine the conditions obtaining in the field." These passages pertain to, FTP, what, also the title of a master work of strategy by Sun Tzu?

ANS: The ART OF WAR

2. In an experiment conducted by Lord Rayleigh, gas obtained from air contained a small amount of a gas (*) heavier than nitrogen. This gas was later found to make up 0.94 % of the atmosphere, and have an atomic weight of 39.948 a.m.u. FTP, name this noble gas, used in electric light bulbs and fluorescent tubes, having atomic number 18.

Answer: Argon_

3. It often occurs in water shielding nuclear reactors where electrons from the reactor displace electrons from atoms in its path. These displaced electrons form strong electromagnetic waves that are of a characteristic blue color. FTP, name this effect, named for a Soviet physicist, that is analogous to a sonic boom and occurs when a charged particle moves faster than the speed of light in a particular medium.

Answer: Cerenkov Radiation or Effect or Light

4. In the second part of this work, a letter by Judge Vilhelm, "The Aesthetic Validity of Marriage", attempts to refute A's claims in "The Seducer's Diary. (*)" It is thought that Vilhelm takes a Kantian stance in trying to present the Ethical way of life as opposed to the Aesthetic. Subtitled "A Fragment of Life," FTP, what is this notable work about choosing between ethics and aesthetics, by Soren Kierkegaard?

Answer: Either/Or

5.Examples of this style of Italian opera writing include Wolf-Ferrari's *The Jewels of the Madonna* and Giordano's *Andrea Chenier*. Flourishing in the 1890's (*), it is marked by melodramatic, violent plots with characters drawn from everyday life, and it takes its name from the Italian for realism. FTP, identify this style, the most famous examples of which are *I Pagliacci* and *Cavalleria Rusticana*.

Answer: verismo accept realism on early buzz.

6. This unlikely titular seducer of Pushkin's erotic poem was sent to Daniel to explain the vision of the ram and the he-goat and to communicate the prediction of Seventy Weeks. In the Book of Enoch, he is placed in the same group as (*) Michael, Uriel, and Suriel or Raphael. The messenger sent to Zechariah to announce the birth of John the Baptist, FTP, name this archangel who announced the birth of Jesus to Mary.

Answer: Gabriel

7. He became a friar under the name Giovanni da Fiesole and he once refused a nomination to be Archbishop of Florence. His altarpiece for San Marco (*) is one of the first works in the theme of the Sacred Conversation. FTP, identify this painter, known for his piety, who created the frescoes "Lives of Saints Stephen and Lawrence" and "The Beheading of Saints Damian and Cosmas."

Answer: _Fra Angelico_ or Guido di _Pietro

8. The last of its 14 scenes was interchangeable and could be used either to begin or end the film. Directed by Edwin S. (*) Porter, a former Thomas Edison cameraman, it caused a sensation due to the aforementioned scene wherein a bandit points a gun at the camera and fires. FTP, identify this film, based on the August 29, 1900 hold up of the No. 3 train by Butch Cassidy and his gang.

Answer: The Great Train Robbery

9. This act built on the understanding created by the 1907 Gentleman's Agreement (*). It was prompted by concerns about Japan's violation of the Open Door Policy and American discrimination against Japanese immigrants. FTP, identify this 1908 agreement named after the Japanese ambassador and US secretary of state who drew it up.

Answer: Root-Takahira agreement

10. Written by Farid ud-Din Attar, it is an allegorical work about the Sufi quest for spiritual liberation. At the heart of the work lies a pun in that the (*) "Simorgh," the object of the spiritual journey, is actually "si morgh", or the 30 birds who under took the journey. FTP, identify this narrative verse work about these winged pilgrims.

Answer: _The Conference of Birds_ or _Manteq at-Tair_

11. He was victorious twice at the Masurian Lakes, once over the army of Rennenkampf and once over a Russian force of 120,000 who were only saved because they fled into a swamp. He formed the Third Supreme Command with Erich von Ludendorff which ruled until September 1918 when defeat became inevitable. FTP, identify this German commander at Tannenberg who later served as President of Germany and appointed Hitler chancellor.

Paul Ludwig Hans Anton von Beneckendorff und von Hindenburg

12. This tragedy, written in 1677, represented the playwright's return to the Jansenist group. Borrowing from Euripides' *Hippolytus* (*), this work focuses on the sin and punishment of the stepmother of Hippolytus since the playwright correctly believed that women best represent the weakness of human nature. FTP identify this work about a wife of Thesues by Racine.

Answer: Phaedra

13. The first victim is the Comedian. Jon Osterman, a.k.a. Dr. Manhattan, flees to Mars after being ambushed by a reporter claiming he causes cancer. An assassination attempt is made on (*) Adrian Veidt, formerly Ozymandias, and Rorschach is arrested after being set up for Moloch's murder. FTP, identify this graphic novel by Alan Moore and Dave Gibbons, which takes its title from Juvenal's *Satires*.

Answer: Watchmen

14. While analyzing the decays of K-mesons, Lee and Yang (*) came to the conclusion that it may not apply to weak interactions. In 1957 Wu showed that electrons ejected along with antineutrinos during cobalt decay are predominantly left handed. FTP, what law does this describe, which is now believed to apply if the eponymous concept is joined by charge conjugation and time reversal.

Answer: _Parity conservation_

15. This work of fiction, published in 1939, was known as *Work in Progress(*)* as it was developed over 17 years with excerpts appearing in the Parisian magazine, *transition*. Characters include Kevin, Jerry, Isabel, and Mrs. Plurabelle and it consists entirely of the night thoughts and dreams of the central family. FTP, identify this work dealing with the family of Humphrey Earwicker by James Joyce.

Answer: _Finnegan's Wake_

16. His theories provided rationale for the repeal of Britain's Corn Law in 1846, since high priced corn could lead to inhibited economic (*) growth. In his most famous work, he argued that profits vary inversely with wages and that high wages encourage capital-intensive production. He also held that countries should do what they do best. FTP, name this author of Principles of Political Economy and Taxation.

Answer: David Ricardo

17. This plan of governmental reform was annulled by the Dictum of Kennilworth (*) in 1266. The king, bankrupted by a venture in Sicily, called the Mad parliament which promised financial aid in exchange for _it_. It placed the government under the joint direction of the king and a 15 member baronial commission. FTP, identify this plan, accepted in 1258 by Henry III.

Answer: Provisions of Oxford

18. Tossup: Other History

This leader eventually abolished the collection of tolls on the roads and from the guilds, and he took agricultural control of the Owari plain. A member of the (*) Fujiwara clan, he was the first of the daimyo (DIME-yo) to equip his military troops with muskets, and by the end of his tenure as dictator in 1582, he had united half of Japan. For 10 points-- name this warrior, who brought an end to the Ashikaga shogunate.

Answer: Oda Nobunaga (either name is acceptable on its own)

19. The last two poem's in this poet's most famous collection are "Of the Vanity of All Worldly Creatures" (*) and "David's Lamentation for Saul and Jonathan." The collection, "Contemplations" earned her critical acceptance. FTP, identify this 17th century American poet of *The Tenth Muse*.

answer: Anne Bradstreet

20. Springing from a land grant to the Indian monk Ba Tuo, it expanded during the reign of Wen Di, who sought to strengthen imperial ties to Buddhism (*). 527 A.D. saw the arrival of Bodhidharma, who proceeded to found Zen Buddhism within its confines. FTP, name this religious compound in Henan province where some 6,000 students are trained in kung fu by Chinese warrior monks.

Answer: Shaolin Temple

21.Becoming a quaestor at 21, he served on the Rhine under the command of his adopted father, (*) Tiberius. Although offered the throne after the death of his grandfather, Augustus, he remained loyal to Tiberius While in Syria, he was poisoned by Piso. FTP, name this grandfather of Nero, father of Caligula, and elder brother of Claudius.

Answer: Germanicus

22. There are actually three narrators: a man travelling in the Caucasus from Tiflis to Vladikavkaz; an old officer by the name of Maksim Maksimovich; and the central character, the quintessential (*) superfluous man. Stories told include romnces, such as "Princess Mary", and the story of Vulich in "The fatalist". For ten points, name this work about Pechorin by Mikhail Lermontov.

Answer: _Hero of Our Time_ or _Geroy nashego vremeni_

23. Tossup: Biology

One class of these, colicogenic factors, makes possible the production of colicins, proteins which have antibiotic activity. Another class, (*) R factors, provide resistance to antibiotics. When they are attached to the cell membrane or integrated into the chromosome they are called episomes. For ten points, name these circular pieces of DNA found in bacteria.

Answer: plasmids

24. A member of the 1964 gold medal U.S. Olympic basketball team, and a three-time ABA All-Star, in 1977 he began coaching at (*) Denver, and went to New Jersey before returning to the college level from 1983-89. He then went to the Spurs, the L.A. Clippers, and, Pacers before his current assignment. FTP, name this man, who led Kansas to an NCAA title in 1988, and now coaches Allen Iverson.

Larry Brown

25. Dini and Dirichlet (DEER-ih-shlay) give conditions for almost-everywhere convergence, while Fejer (fay-YER) showed convergence in arithmetic mean. Discontinuity in the target function can cause a localized deviation of about 9%; this is called the Gibbs effect. For ten points, identify these trigonometric approximations of functions, named for their French discoverer.

Answer: Fourier series (do not accept "Fourier transform")

26. Discovered 23,000 years ago, its chief exports included pocket lint, dental floss, and battery-operated hamsters. Legislation ensured that all presidential candidates shared their middle names with cheese (*). For leisure, residents played bouillabaisseball. Tragically, on October 28, 1986, the Orbit Guard failed in an attempt to save it from destruction. FTP, name this planet, the birthplace of Gordon Shumway, also known as ALF.
