For 10 points, the surprise German invasion of the Soviet Union was given what code name, after a Holy Roman Emperor who had a red beard?

Answer: Operation Barbarossa [prompt on early buzz with German invasion of Soviet Union, etc.]

2. A city in California, a city in Fife County, Scotland, and the largest asteroid in our solar system all share their name with this Roman goddess. Known as a Goddess of Agriculture, she was the daughter of Saturn. FTP, name this deity whose Greek counterpart is Demeter.

Answer: Ceres

3. Originally defined by Danish biochemist Soren Sorensen in 1909, its value in complex organic solutions can be calculated using the Henderson-Hasselbach equation. Typically used to compare solution acidities, FTP, what is this logarithmic measure of hydrogen ion concentration?

Answer: pH

4. His 1861 work *The Descent of Odin* imitated traditional Norse verse. Some of his more famous poetic works include "Ode on the Death of a Favorite Cat, Drowned in a Tub of Gold Fishes," "The Bard" and "Sonnet on the Death of Richard West." FTP, name this English poet best know for "Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard."

Answer: Thomas Gray

5. A critic of the likely economic impact of the Treaty of Versailles, he wrote *The General Theory of Employment, Interest and Money* amidst the Great Depression. A strong believer in government intervention in the economy, he positioned aggregate demand as a centrepiece for his economic analysis. FTP, name this macroeconomist and namesake of a school of economic thought.

Answer: John Maynard Keynes

6. Referee Joe Forte Sr. ejected this man from a Miami Heat game in February for cursing the officiating. He once sang that he made enough money smuggling grass to buy the city of Miami, but he "pissed it away so fast." These facts are in his song "A Pirate Looks at Forty." FTP, what pop star's hits also include "Come Monday," "Cheeseburger in Paradise," and "Margaritaville."

Answer: Jimmy Buffett

- 7. Upon the death of his father, he shared control of the realm with his brother Carloman. After Carloman died in 771 he began a series of wars of conquest where he defeated Lombardia, Saxony, Bavaria and the Avars. From 794 on his capital was at Aachen and he gathered scholars from around his kingdom. For ten points, name this man whom Pope Leo III crowned Emperor of the Romans on December 25, 800. Answer: **Charlemagne** (or Carolus Magnus)
- 8. Rocks from this period can be found at Marble Mountains in the Mojave and in House Range, Utah. Major land masses included Baltica, Siberia, and Laurentia. Perhaps the most notable event was the appearance of every metazoan phylum with hard parts except one. FTP, name this period of the Paleozoic Era, 540-500 million years ago, sometimes referred to as the "Age of the Trilobites."

Answer: Cambrian Period

- 9. He was committed to a mental asylum at Endenich after throwing himself into a river. His only opera, Genoveva, was a flop, and his first symphony "Spring" was completed after four failed attempts at the form. FTP, name this composer of the "Rhenish" symphony, whose wife Clara was also a noted musician/composer. Answer: Robert **Schumann**
- 10. Potential entrances include a ring, a picture on a bedroom wall, and a train station. To its east lie the Bight of Calormen and the island of Terebinthia, while Archenland is to its south, and its inhabitants include Shift the Ape and Farsight the Eagle. The first character to enter is the youngest, Lucy, and the rest of the Pevensie children arrive in increasing age order to, FTP, what fantasy-land created by C.S. Lewis?

 Answer: Narnia
- 11. This is the massless gauge boson for electromagnetic interactions, and has a value equal to Planck's constant times the frequency of the oscillation of the wave in question. They also have momentum equal to the frequency of the wave times the wave-vector of the wave that generates them, but their maximum speed is always the speed of light. FTP, what particle is typically thought of in one special sense, as a quantum of light? Answer: **photon**
- 12. William Gibson coined it in his novel, *Neuromancer*. This term refers to a global computer network where people share information. FTP, name this word formed by a concatenation of two words often used to describe a medium where electronic communication takes place.

Answer: Cyberspace (do not accept anything else)

13. Constable Warren, Simon Stimson, Joe Stoddard, Howie Newsome, George Gibbs, Emily Webb, and the Stage Manager are characters from this play, set in the picturesque town of Grover's Corners, New Hampshire. FTP, name this Pulitzer winner for best drama in 1938, written by Thornton Wilder.

Answer: Our Town

- 14. They were passed in 1774 by British Parliament, and consisted of: the Impartial Administration of Justice Act, which removed British officials from the jurisdiction of Massachusetts courts; the Massachusetts Government Act; the Quartering Act; and the Boston Port Act. These punitive measures led to the calling of the First Continental Congress. For ten points, name these laws also known as the Coercive Acts. Answer: Intolerable Acts (accept coercive acts early, DO NOT accept Townshend Acts)
- 15. The Islamic lunar calendar is based on the occurrence of this event, Mohammed's movement to Medina from the holy city of Mecca in 622. FTP what is the term given to this migration, from which the Moslem calendar reckons?

Answer: Hegira or Hejira (do NOT accept "hajj" or "pilgrimage")

16. His work includes "Darkman" and "For Love of the Game", and he directed Billy Bob Thornton's Oscar-nominated performance in 1998's "A Simple Plan." However, he is perhaps best known for directing a trilogy of horror films starring Bruce Campbell. FTP, name this director of the Evil Dead movies.

Answer: Sam Raimi

17. The result was a conviction of violating the Butler Act and a \$100 fine, but the verdict was later reversed. The trial featured Clarence Darrow arguing for the defense and William Jennings Bryan arguing for prosecution and also appearing as an expert witness on the Bible. For ten points, name the defendant and you've named this famous Tennessee case dubbed the "Monkey Trial."

Answer: Scopes Trial (prompt on "Monkey Trial" before the word "defendant")

- 18. This term was first used by William James, the American philosopher and psychologist, in his 1890 book *The Principles of Psychology*. Often confused with interior monologue, the latter technique works the sensations of the mind into a more formal pattern: a flow of thoughts inwardly expressed, similar to a soliloquy. For ten points, what literary technique reveals the character's feelings, thoughts, and actions, often following an associative rather than a logical sequence, without commentary by the author?

 Answer: stream of consciousness
- 19. The State Department recently barred U.S. citizens from adopting children from this nation, because of profound irregularities in the court system, routine bribery, total collapse of major government institutions, and the confusion brought about by the relocation of the capital to Astana from its former home at Almaty. Its population is 98 percent literate, but that's no help with the country's political and environmental woes, including poisonous dust storms arising from the rapid disappearance of its second largest body of water. FTP name this country almost evenly divided between Muslims of Turkic background and Russian Orthodox Christians, home to the northern shores of the Caspian and Aral Seas.

Answer: Kazakhstan

20. Fibrous systems, used by monocots, consist of many thinner structures that provide maximal surface area, while dicots often have a thin structures branching off from a large, deep-growing structure that stores excess resources. Regardless of the system, a cap protects the growth site, known as the apical meristem. FTP, name the structures that provide water, minerals, and an anchor for plant life.

Answer: roots

21. The first formal observation of this type in North America took place in the eastern Arctic in 1578, by Martin Frobisher and his crew. It became a Canadian national holiday in 1879, fifteen years after Abraham Lincoln declared it a national holiday in the U.S. For 10 points, what annual celebration is usually thought to trace back to 1621 in Massachusetts?

Answer: Thanksgiving

22. In February, this group oversaw several whippings for adultery and executed two prostitutes in a soccer stadium in Kandahar. They have forced women to wear the burqa, a traditional veil, and have imposed a strict interpretation of the Shari'a on the roughly 95% of their nation won from the old Rabbani government. FTP, what hard-line Islamic group controls most of Afghanistan?

Answer: Taliban

23. One example of this type of reaction is the rusting of iron. Another is the addition of nitric acid to copper. In both of these cases, one of the reactants gains electrons, while the other loses electrons. For example, in the rusting of iron, iron changes from iron (I) into iron (II). FTP, name this type of reaction, in which one reactant is oxidized and the other is reduced.

Answer: <u>redox</u> reaction (accept reduction-oxidation before "oxidized" is mentioned in the question; prompt afterwards).

It's the SMALLEST positive integer that is equal to the sum of all of the smaller positive integers that divide it.

ANSWER: 6 (= 1 + 2 + 3)

Host: "Numbers with this property are called 'perfect' numbers."
