TOSSUPS

1. She and her husband founded the Hogarth Press, which published her books. Her biography of art critic Roger Fry is straightforward, but her fragment *Flush* is a fanciful biography written through the imagined memories of Elizabeth Barrett Browning's dog. The title of her book *The Waves* refers to a stream of consciousness approach, but also presaged her eventual suicide by drowning. Her other prominent works include *Between the Acts* and *Jacob's Room*. FTP, name this author of *To The Lighthouse* and *Mrs. Dalloway*.

(Adeline) Virginia _Woolf_ or _Stephens_

2. This man, dejected by the famine conditions predicted by the sage Bhadrabahu, ended his days fasting to death in the sage's service at Sravana Belgola. His domain – patterned after the Achaemenids and the Arthashastra, a political text by his one-time owner, Canakya – survived him by at least two generations. He had formed his empire first by defeating the Nanda autocracy, becoming ruler of the Magadha and, later, the Punjab. FTP, name this founder and first emperor of the Maurya dynasty.

Candra Gupta or _Chandragupta_ (accept: _Maurya_ before it is given; do not accept or prompt on _Gupta_)

3. An important part of it is the duende (DRAIN-day), the performer's possession by the unhampered emotion of the music or dance. This form of expression, whose well known practitioners include Camaron de la Isla and Paco de Lucia, also rests on the *cante* (KAHN-tay), or song, which can be "jondo" (HONE-doe), intermediate or "chico." Graceful hand and body movements define the woman's part, while heel-toe clicking, or *zapateados* (ZAH-puh-tay-AH-dos), is important for men. FTP, name this type of music and dance that includes the *fandango*.

flamenco

4. This particular song has been around since 1974. It has hit Number One on the charts three times – in 1974, 1983, and 1992. Dolly Parton wrote it and sang both the 1974 and 1982 incarnations, the 1982 version being the love song from the film version of *The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas*. But you many know this song better from another singer. For 10 points, name this song which hit Number One for 14 weeks in 1992, sung for the *Bodyguard* soundtrack by Whitney Houston.

I Will Always Love You

5. It is necessary for the synthesis of nucleic acids and the formation of heme, the pigmented, iron-carrying component of hemoglobin. Found in leafy green vegetables, citrus fruits and cereals, its deficiency can lead to megaloblastic anemia or neural tube defects. FTP, name this B complex vitamin, also called pteroylglutamic acid, that is vital to newborns.

folic acid or _folate_ or _folacin_ (accept: _pteroylglutamic_ before it is given)

6. At its outset, Deems Taylor explains that there is music that tells a definite story, music which paints a series of pictures, and "absolute music" which exists simply for its own sake. Bach's *Tocatta and Fugue in D minor*, an example of the latter, launches the rest. Schubert's *Ave Maria* concludes it, chasing away the darkness of the Black God Chernobog on Bald Mountain. FTP, name this 1940 work, whose more famous segments include *Hippos pirouetting to Dance of the Hours*, and *Mickey as the Sorcerer's Apprentice*.

Fantasia (accept: _Concert Feature_)

7. Zola once described this man as "able to row fifty miles a day on the Seine for pleasure," and his Seine excursions formed the basis for "Mouche" (MOOSH). Through his uncle Alfred le Poittevin, (pwah-tay-VAHN) he apprenticed with Gustave Flaubert and eventually wrote articles for *Le Gaulois* (gawl-WAH) and *Gil Blas* (geel BLAH). His most important novels include *Bel-Ami* and *Une Vie*. FTP, name this French author, better known for short stories like "The Necklace" and "Boule de suif" (bull-day-SWEEF).

(Henry-Rene-Albert-) Guy de _Maupassant_

8. Worthington Whittredge posed for the principal figure of this painting, which hangs in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Whittredge had been visiting the artist in Dusseldorf, as the artist was a main figure in that city's school. Some historical details, such as the flag, are quite incorrect. FTP, name this 1851 romantic painting by Emanuel Leutze, depicting an event that occurred near Trenton, New Jersey, 75 years before.

Washington Crossing the Delaware 9. This man was instructed in Marxism by Karl Korsch, and applied those ideas in his "Little Organum for the Theatre." A noted poet, his collection A Manual of Piety dates from the same six-year period as his first play (Baal) and first success (Drums in the Night). He wrote what he called "exemplary plays" to music by Eisler and Hindemith, and later developed his ideas of epic theater with his Berliner Ensemble. FTP, name this creator of the City of Mahagonny, Mother Courage and – with Kurt Weill – The Threepenny Opera. Eugen Berthold (Bertolt) Friedrich _Brecht_ [BREKT]

10. A member of the 1964 gold medal U.S. Olympic basketball team, he was a three-time ABA All-Star. In 1977 he began coaching at Denver, and went to New Jersey before returning to the college level from 1983-89. He then picked up coaching in the pros at San Antonio, went to the L.A. Clippers, and on to Indiana before his current assignment. FTP, name this man, who led Kansas to an NCAA title in 1988, and who, at 5' 9", must now look up slightly to his star Allen Iverson.

Larry _Brown_

11. The eldest son of the 1st Earl of Northumberland, he fought the Scots and supported Henry IV of Lancaster against Richard II. He and Henry had a falling out over ransoming Scottish captives during border warfare in 1402; so, with the Welsh Prince Owen Glendower, he rebelled. FTP name this noble who died in 1403 at the Battle of Shrewsbury, famous today mainly as the model for the prominent character Hotspur in Shakespeare's Henry IV, Part One.

Sir Henry _Percy_ (accept: _Hotspur_ before it is given).

12. This substance was found in a rock mined in western Australia that produced the oldest hunk of Earth found to date. This tiny crystal was dated via uranium and lead impurities because tetravalent uranium can substitute for its main component. It also allows for the determination of the temperatures of both its crystallization and its remelting which has changed theories of the Earth's geological history. FTP name this silicate mineral, which should not be confused with the type one might give a sweetheart to save a few bucks.

zircon (accept _zirconium_ before the first "crystal"; do not accept _cubic zirconium_)

13. His theories provided rationale for the repeal of Britain's Corn Law in 1846, since high priced corn could lead to inhibited economic growth. In his most famous work, he argued that profits vary inversely with wages and that high wages encourage capital-intensive production. He also held that countries should do what they do best. FTP, name this creator of the law of comparative advantage, the author of 1817's Principles of Political Economy and Taxation.

David _Ricardo_

14. It received its English name from the city in the Troad where, in 85 BCE, Mithradates [mith-ruh-DAH-tees] VI and Sulla signed a peace treaty. In Turkish, it is also named for a city – Canakkale – situated near it. Ranging from _ to 4 miles wide, this strait experiences a rapid surface current from the Sea of Marmara to the northwest, complete with a nasty undertow. FTP, name this strait that links Marmara with the Aegean Sea, and that separated the lovers Hero and Leander.

the _Dardanelles_ or the _Hellespont_ or _Canakkale Bogazi_

15. It is hypothesized that she lived in Israel during the 10th Century B.C., and was an openly female writer during this golden age of literature (during the reigns of Solomon and Rehoboam). She wrote in a Phoenician-Old Hebrew script. FTP, name this woman, only known by a letter of the alphabet, whose current claim to fame is having written a now-un-included book of the Bible.

16. Frank Wilczek first postulated the existence of these particles in 1973 as a graduate student at Princeton, while studying protons. Red-anti-green, blue-anti-red, green-anti-red, and even blue-anti-blue are all names for some of these tiny buggers. Like photons, they are massless, but, unlike photons, they are charged, and they contain 98% of the energy of a proton. FTP, what purveyors of the strong nuclear force are the subject of QCD?

_gluon_s

17. Its area of 12,096 square miles makes this the largest lake in the world north of the 60th parallel. A river of the same name drains the lake, and though the river spends only 4 months free of ice, it still provides essential transport for the hardy souls who populate Fort Franklin on the lake's shore. Abundant speckled trout provide food for the nearby wildlife. FTP, name this lake that is eventually drained by its namesake river into the Mackenzie, and that is identified with a particular type of nearby wildlife.

Great Bear Lake

18. Exiled in 1887 for allegedly trying to kill Czar Alexander III, he joined the Socialist Party upon his return and began publishing *Robotnik*. In 1918, he assumed command of his country's army, becoming chief of state in a compromise government the following year. He expanded his country's eastern border by force, completed the 1921 Treaty of Riga, and then retired, only to return in 1926 to overthrow the Witos (VIT-osh) cabinet and establish a de facto fascist government. FTP, name this military leader and strongman of early 20th Century Poland.

Jozef _Pilsudski_

19. This neoplasm arises from undifferentiated keratinocytes (care-AH-tin-oh-sites) at the bottom layer of the epidermis. Fortunately, it is rarely metastatic, easily treated, and can be avoided by limiting unnecessary exposure to the sun. FTP, name this most common form of skin cancer, found in January, 2001, on the back of President Clinton.

basal cell carcinoma (or cancer) (prompt on _skin cancer_)

20. In his role as George Herbert Walker, "king" chicken, he supposedly fled so that he would never again have to say "Duckman isolated me as a child, so now I'm going to isolate him, mwah ha ha. Buk buk buk." This English actor has also lent his voice to both Rugrats movies, and the TV series Gargoyles, where he was Dr. Sevarius. When on screen, he has a penchant for white-face with lipstick, as in his role as Pennywise the Clown in It. FTP, name this actor, also made-up when he played Doctor Frank-N-Furter in The Rocky Horror Picture Show.

21. When the "Llamas.org" interactive adventure based on this work begins, you are down town, the people on the pavement are looking at you. You can say "good morning" and glitter when you walk, or go home. Eventually, all choices lead to home, where you can either go down town again or examine a table with a gun on it. FTP, this game, where the final significant choice is always "put a bullet through your head using gun," is based on which poem by Edwin Robinson?

This philosopher was ripped to shreds with oyster shells by a frenzied mob of Nitrian monks and Christian followers of the patriarchate Cyril in 415 A.D., supposedly because of association with the pagan prefect Orestes. This only child of Theon wrote influential treatises on Diophantus' Arithmetica and Apollonius of Perga's Conics. FTP, name this philosopher of Alexandria, often called the first notable woman in mathematics.

23. The director's daughter Vivian appears in this film during a phone conversation with Dr. Floyd. Alex North's original score was eventually discarded in favor of a composite assembled from music by Ligeti and Khachaturyan (KAH-chuh-TUR-ee-an), among others. Ineligible for an Oscar nomination for original score, this now-revered film was not even nominated for best picture in a year when Oliver! won. FTP, name this 1968 sci-fi film, getting a lot of attention this particular year, directed by Stanley Kubrick.

2001: A Space Odyssey 24. It only happens when the sky is clear and there is a sharp horizon, which generally means it can be seen only from a mountain or over water. Occurring at sunset or sunrise, and only for a few seconds, it is, in effect, a mirage, created by refraction of wavelengths of light between the violet of the overhead sky and the red on the horizon. FTP, name this elusive astronomical phenomenon, named for its characteristic color, that could also be what you would see if Kyle Rayner was verdantly luminescent for just a moment.

Green Flash

25. This name serves as the species designation for a tiny tree kangaroo from New Guinea. It is the surname of Trevor, a Breen dictator who lusts after, duplicates, and tries to kill a certain thanatophilic Monican terrorist. A fictional servant of Oberon also bears this name. FTP, give the surname of Aeon Flux's nemesis/lover and the mischievous fairy Robin from A Midsummer Night's Dream, who is also known as Puck.

Goodfellow (do not accept: _Puck_) 26. H.I. "Hi" McDonough worked as a drill press operator for this company when he wasn't in jail for robbing 7-Elevens. While it evidently had interests in Tempe, Arizona, Norville Barnes had to stray far from Muncie, Indiana to find a job in the mail room for this corporate giant where the mandatory moment of silence for the recently defenestrated CEO is deducted from the employee's pay. FTP, name the company where Mr. Barnes becomes CEO and invents the hula-hoop, a company created by Joel and Ethan Coen.

Hudsucker Industries (do not accept: _Hudsucker Proxy_, as this is the name of the film)

27. Her personal library is known to be organized according to the Dewey Decimal System, in which she is well versed. According to the Ladies' Home Journal, her list of books for families to read together includes Officer Buckle and Gloria, Old Yeller and Little Women. In 1996, she helped organize the Book Festival in her home state that became a major library fundraiser. FTP, name this unimpeachable Texan, who will now have to work out of the White House.
