Tossups

1. Developed in 1857 by T. Lauder Brunton of Edinburgh, this compound was superseded by nitroglycerin for use in angina and other heart problems, and is used today medicinally as an antidote to cyanide poisoning. It is classified as a nitrovasodilator, and it is an ester of isoamyl alcohol with nitrous acid, but it is used commonly today as a "club drug", popularly in the gay community because, when inhaled, it delays ejaculation and relaxes the sphincter. FTP, identify this compound whose street names include locker room, snappers, and poppers.

Answer: amyl nitrate

2. Some of his later published works include *Tsotsi* and *Notebooks 1960-1977*. A resident of Port Elizabeth, many of his plays are set there, including the trilogy made up of *Hello and Goodbye*, *Boesman and Lena* and *Blood Knot*, the first play performed with a mixed cast in his country. Better known for 1982's *Master Harold and the Boys*, for ten points, name this South African playwright, whose masterpieces also include *Sizwe Bansi Is Dead* and *The Island*.

ANSWER: Athol Fugard

3. Born in Basel, this man was a student of Johann Bernoulli and led such a distinguished career that he went to Berlin for twenty-five years at the invitation of Frederick the Great. Some of his research was into the motion and positions of the moon, which led him into the field of fluid mechanics. He enlarged mathematical notation and developed a theory of differential equations as well as the calculus of variations. FTP, name this mathematician whose number is useful in the summation of particular series.

Answer: Leonhard Euler

4. Written for the Press Celebrations held in November, 1899, this piece was originally the final section to a four part tableaux, in which the titular location "awakes". Due to the national feeling it stirred, the piece was forced to be performed under the title "Impromptu" and words were written for it by Waino Sola in 1937. FTP, identify this nationalistic work by Jean Sibelius.

Answer: Finlandia

5. Located on the only continent that has been cooling over the past fourteen years, this area covers about 6,000 square miles. With 2 inches of annual precipitation accompanied by subzero temperatures and howling winds, this is one of the driest areas in the world. Name this Antarctic region that NASA uses as a test track for Mars exploration.

Answer: The Dry Valleys

6. In *The School for Husbands*, he and his brother Ariste are the guardians of two young

orphans, Isabelle and Leonore. In *The Forced Marriage*, he is a septuagenarian who promises marriage to the teenager Dorimene. In *The Doctor In Spite of Himself*, he is a woodcutter who eventually sees through his wife Martine's ruse. For ten points, identify this common name from the comedies of Moliere, an eponymous character in the 1660 work *The Imaginary Cuckold*.

ANSWER: Sganarelle

7. Taking place in the year 2026, this film opens with the thinker Freder Fredersen, played by Gustav Froehlich (FROE-lick), seeing the woman Maria, played by Brigitte Helm, emerge from a fountain. Although she is dismissed as the daughter of a worker, Freder follows her to an underground city. Freder is the son of Joh, the master of the titular location. The workers revolt against the thinkers, and Freder assumes the role of mediator. Filled with symbolic religious imagery, this is, FTP, what 1926 sci-fi classic directed by Fritz Lang?

Answer: Metropolis

8. In April 2000, obsessed 19-year old student Karen Burke held this professor at the University of Warwick hostage in her own home. Author of a 1991 book about menopause entitled *The Change*, she criticizes the efforts of the health industry to manage women's bodies in her most recent book, *The Whole Woman*, which serves as a sequel to the 1970 book which made her famous. FTP, name this Australian-born feminist who railed against female sexual passivity in *The Female Eunuch*.

Answer: Germaine Greer

9. This state had five different governors over an eight-day span earlier this year. This came about because, along with New Hampshire, this state only has one state wide elected official. A split of the state Senate caused part of the problem, as both party leaders will serve. FTP name this state which now had John Bennett, Richard Codey, John J. Farmer, Jr, Donald DiFrancesco, and James McGreevey all serve as Governor.

Answer: New Jersey

10. He was elected to the offices of quaestor, aedile, praetor, and consul on his first try and at the earliest age at which he was legally allowed to run for them. After being allowed to return to Rome after his exile, he wrote *On the Laws*, *On the Orator*, and *On the Republic* between 55 to 51 BCE. He would eventually be murdered on the orders of Mark Antony. FTP, name this Roman politician, most famous for his *Philippics* and for exposing the Cataline Conspiracy.

Answer: Marcus Tullius Cicero

11. After the initial plan of attack at Fort Detroit failed due to information being leaked by a Chippewa woman to her lover the commander of the fort, open warfare ensued and the Native American forces were able to destroy almost every British fort west of Niagara except for Fort Pitt and Fort Detroit. The relief forces of Fort Pitt were able to defeat the Native American forces at Bushy Run, and peace came soon after. FTP, name this rebellion named after the chief of the Ottawa Indians that led the uprising.

Answer: Pontiac's Rebellion

12. In this work, Ptolemy proposed a geometric theory to account mathematically for the apparent motions and positions of the planets, sun, and moon against a background of unmoving stars. This work did not include any physical descriptions of objects in space. Written in Greek, the name it is known by comes from when it was translated into Arabic. FTP name this earliest and most famous work of Ptolemy.

Answer: The Almagest

13. Once this condition takes hold, it is very difficult to correct. Fiscal and monetary policies aimed at stimulating the economy only exacerbate part of the problem. Tight money policies, on the other hand, amplify the other part of the problem. It was once thought that this economic condition was not possible. FTP name this economic condition that occurred in the 1970s in which inflation and a lack of growth coincide.

Answer: stagflation

14. The final compilation of this work was made during the rule of Judah ha-Nasi. It is divided into six Orders: Zeraim, Moeds, Nashim, Nezikim, Kodashim, and Tohorot. Each order is divided into tractates, which are in turn divided into chapters. The penultimate tractate of the fourth Order is called Avot or Pirke Avot, and consists of general religious and moral sayings. FTP, name this codified collection of Oral Law-legal interpretations of portions of certain biblical books, that along with the Gemara, comprises the Talmud.

Answer: Mishna

15. He was active in the transport strike of 1913 and an active member of the Irish Citizens Army; however, he is better known for his writing, including his six-part autobiography; the first part, *I Knock at the Door*, was published in 1939. His 1928 play *The Silver Tassie* ended his relationship with the Abbey Theatre, which was the site of his best works. For ten points, name this Irish playwright of *The Shadow of a Gunman*, *Juno and the Paycock*, and *The Plough and the Stars*.

ANSWER: Sean O'Casey

16. From 1946-1943 she was granted an extended leave from Columbia in order to serve with the Bureau of Overseas Intelligence of the Office of War Information. Her works emphasize the concepts of cultural configuration, national character, and the role of culture in individual personality formation. Her widely read books helped popularize the concept of culture and attacked racism and ethnocentrism. FTP name this woman who wrote such works as *Patterns of Culture* and *The Chrysanthemum and the Sword*.

Answer: Ruth Benedict

17. His 1976 autobiography *A Book* revealed that he was a man of production, more than just Babalu. Born in Santiago, Cuba, he started his versatile career in nightclubs, becoming popular with Latin rhythms. His first film and Broadway role was in "Too Many Girls," where he met his future wife. For ten points, identify this Cuban actor who was introduced to millions of households in the U.S. as Ricky Ricardo in "I Love Lucy."

ANSWER: Desi Arnaz

18. Richard Feynman believes that Sadi Carnot was the first person to formulate this idea,

but Thomas Kuhn and the general population attribute it to Rudolf Clausius and William Thomson. The central quantity in this law was termed "mixupedness" by Gibbs, and it helps to explain the impossibility of a perpetual motion machine. FTP, identify this law of thermodynamics that in its simplest terms states that entropy in a closed system never decreases.

Answer: **second law of thermodynamics**

19. Of all the major countries, only Germany, Italy, and Japan extended diplomatic recognition to this country. Used as a war base by Japan, the Japanese expanded industry and railroads while the Japanese army exerted strict control over the administration of the country. Its capital was renamed Xinjing from Changchun and Pu Yi ruled as regent and emperor. FTP, name this Japanese puppet state created from the three provinces of Northeast China after the Japanese invaded Manchuria in 1931.

Answer: **Manchukuo**

20. He attended Yale law school at the age of 14, and practiced in New Orleans after law school. Also a founder of the Illinois Central Railroad, he was a state legislator in Louisiana and was elected to the US Senate in 1852, becoming the first person of Jewish decent to be elected to the Senate. A conservative, he advocated that the South secede when Lincoln was elected president. FTP, name this man, who held cabinet positions of Attorney General, Secretary of War, and Secretary of State under Jefferson Davis.

Answer: Judah P. **Benjamin**

21. Within a year of their creation the new Mirage Studios met with animation producers to start a cartoon series that debuted in 1987 and lasted through 1996, when a short-lived life action version, The Next Mutation, took over. Created by Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird and appearing in three movies and countless video games in the early 1990s, for ten points, name these reptilian characters with the names of Renaissance artists.

ANSWER: **Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles**

22. These creatures' names mean "three lobed" and their bodies consist of two pleural lobes on either side of a central axial lobe. The three main body parts are the cephalon, a segmented thorax, and a pygidium. There are of 15,000 species of this creature, with new species being discovered every year, but they constitute an extinct class of arthropods that developed in the paleozoic era. FTP, identify these creatures.

Answer: **trilobites**

23. A tapestry dominates the left side of the painting draping over a chair in the lower left corner, and it blocks the window that is presumable the light source for the room. A map is at the back wall, behind a woman holding in her hands a sort of trombone and a book. The floor is black and white tile, and a man sits at the right composing a picture of the woman. FTP, this describes what painting by Jan Vermeer?

Answer: **The Art of Painting**

24. Topics they taught included rhetoric, politics, grammar, etymology, history, physics, and mathematics. They wandered about Greece from place to place and taught for a large sum of money, the first in Greece to take fees for teaching wisdom. The philosophical

school had taken on negative meaning by Aristotle's time, and he defined one as one who reasons falsely for gain. FTP, name this philosophical school whose most famous member was Protagoras of Abdera.

Answer: **Sophists**

25. The play begins and ends with the appearance and disappearance of Amor, son of Venus. He appears as a shepherd, ready to aim his arrows at Diana's most stubborn nymph, Silvia, who has repulsed all her suitors. Daphne tries to convince her to look into the eponymous shepherd, but she rejects him as Tirsi predicts, even when he rescues her from Satiro. However, they eventually wed in, for ten points, this 1573 Renaissance pastoral play by Tasso.

ANSWER: **Aminta**

[10] John, the metaphysical English poet of the late 16th and early 17th century, created such collections as *The Anniversaries*, *The Devotions Upon Emergent Occasions* and 1610's *Pseudo-Martyr*.

8. Identify the following about the parts of the brain, TPE.

a. This part controls all the voluntary or skeletal movements. It contains half the brains neurons, but only constitutes 10% of the brain's weight.

Answer: **Cerebellum**

b. This part of the brain stem, Latin for "bridge" connects the halves of the cerbellum.

Answer: **Pons**
