Toss-Up Questions

1. In this 1957 drama, one of the main characters has an affair with Helena (*) and leaves his pregnant wife Alison, who eventually loses the baby, forcing her reconciliation with Jimmy Porter. It was this play that brought England's Angry Young Men to prominence. FTP, identify this play that lent its name to that movement by John Osborne.

Answer: Look Back in Anger

2. This quantity is used in the calculation of the equilibrium constant, but it is normally replaced by concentration due to the assumption of ideal mixtures. This quantity is the liquid and solid analog of fugacity (*) for gasses, because equations of state that spanned the boiling point did not exist until recently. FTP, name this quantity, defined to be 1 in pure component solids, and something you might do to keep small children busy.

Answer: activity

3. A member of the committee that investigated the Triangle Shirtwaist Company fire, she wrote a book entitled *People at Work*. In 1928, the governor of New York appointed her Industrial Commissioner, (*) and she helped draft the Social Security Act and Fair Labor Standards Act. FTP, name this Secretary of Labor under President Roosevelt, the first woman to hold a cabinet position.

Answer: Frances "Fannie" Coralie Perkins

4. Divided into the transcendental doctrines of the elements and of method, the elements section is further divided into three transcendental sections: the aesthetic, analytic, and dialectic. (*) It is here that the author answers the main question of the work, "how are synthetic a priori judgments possible?" FTP, this describes what 1781 philosophical masterpiece of Immanuel Kant?

Answer: Critique of Pure Reason

5. The name for this holiday probably comes from a Teutonic goddess of spring and fertility. It is a movable feast that takes place between March 22 and April 25. (*) The ninth Sunday before this day is called Septuagesima Sunday, and it always follows the 40 days of Lent. FTP, identify this Christian holiday that, oddly enough, celebrates the crucifixion of Christ with colored eggs.

Answer: Easter (yeah, that's right, it's Easter)

6. He gradually began to lose his sight after receiving a head wound. (*) Some of this writer's works include *The Book of Imaginary Beings* and *The Book of Sand*. He served in his most famous post as Director of the National Library in Argentina. An opponent of Juan Peron, he is better known for works like *The Library of Babel*, and *The Garden of Forking Paths*. FTP, name the Argentine author of *Ficciones* and *Labyrinths*.

Answer: Jorge Luis Borges

7. This mathematician received his PhD from the University of Budapest in 1926. His Minimax (*) theorem states that for a large class of two-person games there is no point in playing since the optimal strategy for each player is the one that minimizes maximum possible loss. FTP, name the designer of game theory and solver of a special case of Hilbert's 5th problem.

Answer: Johann von Neumann

8. Its creation is shrouded in legend, involving its creators lusting after a maid named Verginia. Another story claims that the Senate appointed ten men (*) to document this law code at Plebian insistence in 451 BCE. FTP, name this first Roman law code, displayed in the Forum Romanum on bronze tablets.

Answer: Law of the Twelve Tables

9. He discussed the basic conflicts that an individual undergoes over the course of his life in his *Insight and Responsibility* and *Gandhi's Truth*. (*) Each corresponds to one of the eight stages such as oral-sensory and muscular-anal. FTP, identify the creator of the psychological development theory as developed in his *Young Man Luther*.

Answer: Erik Erikson or Erik Homburger

10. Cities have power plants before electricity is even discovered and armies contain riflemen before gunpowder is invented. Still, it's all part of the game (*) when you have Greeks, French, Mongols, and Zulus at war with each other. FTP, name this series of computer games, created by Sid Meier that pits numerous cultures in a race for world, or scientific, dominance.

Answer: Civilization (accept any number along with that)

11. He explores the conflict between European and black cultures his autobiographical poem *Another Life*. Other works of this author born in Castries (*) include *Midsummer* and *The Star-Apple Kingdom*. He paid homage to Homer in his modern-day epic *Omeros*. FTP, identify this writer from St. Lucia and recipient of the 1992 Nobel Prize for Literature.

Answer: Derek Walcott

12. In its most general form, it gives the axial normal strain at a point in an object as a function of the 3 axial normal stresses, (*) the elastic modulus of the material, and Poisson's ratio for the material. A slightly more specialized form states that the elastic modulus is equal to the ratio of normal stress to normal strain in an object. FTP, name this law, whose most common version is "F equals minus K times X."

Answer: Hooke's law

13. This group took its name from a speech given in the British Parliament in 1765 by Isaac Barré. (*) The two original ones formed in New York City and Boston out of the Committees of Correspondence. FTP, name this loosely organized secret society formed to prevent the enforcement of the Stamp Act.

Answer: Sons of Liberty

14. He married Spanish soprano Isabella Colbran, who sang in several of his earlier works, like his *Demetrio e Polibio*. (*) A master of the opera buffa, he is one of the three main exponents of the bel canto style in opera. With such works as *The Turk in Italy* and *Cinderella*, FTP, identify this Italian composer of *William Tell* and *The Barber of Seville*.

Answer: Gioacchino Rossini

15. After a long and successful career as a mercenary and fighter, he overthrew the feeble king of Aquilonia and remained so for the rest of his life. Born on the battlefield during a raid by the Vanir, (*) FTP, name this Cimmerian savage created by Robert E. Howard and portrayed in movies by Arnold Schwarzneggar.

Answer: Conan

16. His magazine short stories were written under the pen name Dod Grile and published as *Cobwebs from an Empty Skull*. (*) While covering the Mexican Civil War, he disappeared after publishing his most

famous work, originally titled *The Cynic's Word Book*. FTP, name this American author of *The Devil's Dictionary*.

Answer: Ambrose Bierce

17. This parasitic nematode's eggs are released in faeces, and they hatch into larvae in moist earth. These larvae penetrate a human host, often through the soles (*) of the host's bare feet. Its larval stage is thus blood-borne, but its adult stage resides in the human duodenum and small intestine. FTP, name this parasite, which gets its name from the way it attaches itself to the intestinal walls of its host.

Answer: hookworm or ankylostoma

18. Following the death of King Cleph, this people entered a ten-year "Rule of the Dukes", though these nobles eventually surrendered much of their wealth and power to Authari (*) for the maintenance of his court at Pavia, and their first king was Audoin in the 6th century. FTP, what was this Germanic tribe that today gives its name to a region of Italy adjacent to Switzerland, with its modern capital at Milan?

Answer: Lombards

19. Dominated by shades of blue and gray, this 1882 painting features a woman standing in the center with a mirror (*) behind her. In the reflection, we see a rather large ass as well as a guy in a tophat. In front of her are a crystal bowl of fruit, and a few bottles of champagne, beer, and other types of alcohol. FTP, identify this famous work by Manet depicting a bar at a certain locale.

Answer: A Bar at the Folies-Bergere

20. Started in December 1925 by former reporter George Dewey Hay, it was originally known as WSM Barn Dance, (*) but changed to its current name before moving to its hometown's Ryman Auditorium. Its staples included Earl Scruggs, Roy Acuff, and Kitty Wells, and in 1974 it again changed venues to a large theme park. FTP, radio's longest run belongs to what poorly-spelled Nashville show?

Answer: The Grand Ole Opry

21. The main character wishes to know more about the Brotherhood, whose legendary leader, Emmanual Goldstein, (*) never appears in this novel. The main character's break with the Party occurs when he purchases a private room above Mr. Charrington's store, where he conducts an affair with his lover Julia. Centered on the oppression by Big Brother, FTP, identify this novel about Winston Smith written by George Orwell.

Answer: 1984

22. His autobiography, *One Life*, was published in 1969. He continued his work until forced to quit by arthritis in 1983. He received a medical degree from the University of (*) Cape Town and his most famous patient was Louis Washkansky. FTP, give the name of this South African surgeon, the first to successfully transplant a human heart.

Answer: Christiaan Barnard

23. Great Britain was to give up the Cape of Good Hope Colony and Malta but could keep Ceylon and Trinidad. France agreed to leave Egypt, Naples, and the Papal States. Neither Great Britain, nor France, Spain, and the Batavian Republic observed all the terms. FTP, name this 1802 (*) treaty ending the War of the Second Coalition.

Answer: Treaty of Amiens

24. Upon Socrates' death, he spoke of owing a cock to this god. The equivalent of the Egyptian god Imhotep, (*) this son of Apollo and Coronis had a daughter named Hygeia, who was the first person to use

soap and water. He angered Zeus when he used his most famous abilities to raise a person from death, earning a wicked thunderbolt in the ass. FTP, identify this Greek god of healing and medicine.

Answer: Asclepius

Answer: Janos Bolyai

 Einstein discovered that his form of non-Euclidean geometry perfectly described the spacetime manifold under general relativity.

Answer: Goerg Friedrich Bernhard Riemann

c) This mathematician published a system of 21 axioms in an attempt to axiomatize all systems of geometry regardless of curvature requirements.

Answer: David Hilbert

 - a) In an effort to protect US industry, this tariff was passed in 1930 raising the average import duty from 26% to its highest point ever at 50%.
