Toss-Up Questions

1. The second narrator, shamed by his sister's wantonness, commits suicide. The third spends his energy tormenting his niece. The fourth, the family's maid (*) Dilsey, wraps up the story and in the end depicts, a pitiful Benjy and Jason, slouched in a carriage. FTP, name this novel focusing on the Compson family, a work by William Faulkner.

Answer: The Sound and the Fury

2. Monomers of the compound are all in the beta configuration. The configuration flips every other molecule with respect to each other due to glycosidic linkages and chains to connect in parallel via hydrogen bonds. Lacking the enzyme to cleave the linkages, (*) humans are unable to digest it. FTP, name this polysaccharide that comprises about one-third of all vegetable matter.

Answer: cellulose

3. Annulled by papal bulls in 1261 and 1262 and by Louis IX of France in the Mise of Amiens, it was first installed in the spring of 1258 by the Easter Parliament. (*) Yielding control of reform to a 24-man council, half of which chosen by the barons, in 1264 it was annulled for the last time by the Dictum of Kenilworth. Reluctantly agreed to by Henry III, FTP, name this document regarded as England's first written constitution.

Answer: Provisions of Oxford

4. Their precursor is considered to be Nagarjuna, who founded what is known as the Madhamika philosophy or Middle Path. As opposed to its rival sect, its ideal goal is not to become an arhat, or perfected saint, but rather a (*) bodhisattva, a person who has attained Enlightenment and works towards the salvation of others. FTP, name this form of Buddhism that takes its name from Sanskrit for Greater Vehicle.

Answer: Mahayana

5. After accidentally killing his brother Deliades he fled to Argos. (*) The son of Glaucus and husband of Philonoe, he was falsely accused of coming on to the King's wife and was sent to Iobates to be killed. Given a bridle by Athena before he killed his brother, he was able to tame Pegasus and used him in his most famous conquest. FTP, name this Greek hero who slayed the Chimera.

Answer: Bellerophon

6. Beginning with a game in which the two characters are flipping a coin, they are met by a troupe of actors who offer sexual favors. They find themselves witnessing a performance of the *Murder of Gonzago* (*) they take a boat to England with the troupe, are ambushed by pirates and lose their prisoner before resigning themselves to fate. Ending with deaths at Elsinore, FTP, name this play by Tom Stoppard featuring two characters from *Hamlet*.

Answer: Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead

7. The flow of energy through an intermediate system orders that system. Two systems in thermal equilibrium with a third (*) are in thermal equilibrium with each other. It is not possible to construct an

engine whose sole effect is the extraction of heat from a heat source at a single temperature. Mass and energy cannot be created or destroyed. FTP, these statements are known by what collective name?

Answer: laws of thermodynamics (accept equivalents)

8. Buried at Gur-e Amir, he was originally from Transoxania and grew up in the Chagatai khanate. He defeated his rival of Tokhtamysh in 1391. Defeating the Delhi sultan Mahmud Tughluq at Panipat, (*) his last quest was to revenge losses to the Mamluke sultan of Egypt and the Ottoman sultan Bayazid I. An ancestor of Mughal king Babur, FTP, name this Turkic Muslim conqueror featured in a Marlowe work.

Answer: Tamerlane

9. A student under Christian Wolff, his first position was as lecturer in Arnsdorf. In that time he completed three works: On Fire, Monodologia physica, (*) and First Principles of Metaphysics, an analysis of the principle of sufficient reason. According to this philosopher it was Hume who first awoke him from his dogmatic slumber. FTP, name this philosopher and author of Critique of Pure Reason.

Answer: Immanuel Kant

10. Used to construct the contract curve, it is drawn on two axes and consists of two indifference curves one convex to each axis. (*) A graph with quantities of available goods as dimensions, FTP, name this analytical tool that is named for a British economist and used to study the behavior of two economic agents based on preferences for goods and services when production of those goods is held constant.

Answer: Edgeworth Box

11. He journeys through the Orient after the *Judea* sinks. He works for a Belgian exporting firm in the Congo. A member of the crew of the *Patna* (*) that was carrying Muslim immigrants, he testified for the captain who abandoned the vessel. Finally, in the novel *Chance*, he attempts to rescue the story Flora de Barral. Featured in four Joseph Conrad works, FTP, name this character of *Lord Jim* and *Heart of Darkness*.

Answer: Charles Marlow

12. It plays a role with benzene and aluminum chloride in the Friedel-Crafts Reaction, with lithium and pentane to form a Gilman reagent, (*) and with magnesium and ether to form a Grignard regent. The missing reagent in all of these reactions is this type of organic compound containing a parent alkane chain and one or more halogen substituents. FTP, identify this organic compound which contains chlorine, fluorine, bromine, or iodine.

Answer: alkyl halides

13. Prompted in part by Rhode Island's Gaspee Affair, in March of 1773 Dabney Carr proposed the formation of a permanent one before the Virginia House of Burgesses. (*) Samuel Adams organized the first group in 1772, and collectively they helped organize the constitutional convention. FTP, identify these bodies that maintained communication between the colonies before and during the American Revolution.

Answer: Committees of Correspondence

14. First appearing on "The One With the East German Laundry Detergent," she is married to a mattress salesman by the time her ex-boyfriend becomes interested. Once she is available, he tells her he is moving to Yemen and any hope of their relationship is ended later when he marries Monica Geller. Played by Maggie Wheeler, FTP, name this whiny character from TV's *Friends* with the absurd laugh.

Answer: Janice

15. In April 2001, he succeeded in gaining a guilty verdict in the trial of Mohammed Nawaz Sharif. (*) Awarded the Imtiazi Sanad medal for gallantry in 1965, his favorite personality as a child was Kemal Ataturk. Appointed head of his nation's armed forces in October 1998, he was dismissed while visiting Sri Lanka in 1999 and took power in a bloodless coup. FTP, name this military president of Pakistan.

Answer: Pervez Musharraf

16. Beginning with Elisabetta Gonzaga asking for a topic of conversation for the evening, the work is narrated by Ludovico da Canossa, Frederick Fregoso, (*) and Julian de Medici among others. An argument on day two between Lady Emilia and Lord Gaspar may have inspired *Much Ado About Nothing* and the discussion of Platonic love by Pietro Bembo may be its most famous part. FTP, name this 1528 treatise by Baldassare Castiglione.

Answer: Book of the Courtier

17. Applicable only to holomorphic functions, it can be defined for complex functions by the Cauchy integral formula. (*) The form may be taken over any number of real variables and may include a Cauchy or Lagrange remainder. Containing a special subset about the origin called Maclaurin series, FTP, name this series expansion of a function about a point named for a British Mathematician.

Answer: Taylor series

18. Exiled to Marseille for his part in the Carbonari, his first public gesture was an "open letter" to Charles Albert, the king of Piedmont. He served in the army under (*) Garibaldi but was called by Count Cavour the "chief of the assassins." He founded a new patriotic movement called "Young Italy." FTP, name this Italian revolutionary and champion of the Risorgimento.

Answer: Giuseppe Mazzini

19. Taking place on January 11, 1987, it took 5 minutes and 1 second and sent the game into overtime. Taking 15 plays, (*) it included 5 runs, 9 passes, and 1 sack. Getting 6 first downs along the way, it covered 98 yards and sent the game into overtime, where Rich Karlis sent the Denver Broncos to the Superbowl. FTP, give the moniker of this AFC Championship clutch performance over the Cleveland Browns by John Elway.

Answer: The Drive

20. A student of K.F. Zelter, in 1821 he met and played for Goethe and later dedicated to him his *Piano Quartet No. 3. in B Minor*. (*) Conducting the first performance *St. Matthew's Passion* since J. S. Bach's death, this composer also wrote *Elijah* and the *Song Without Words*. FTP, identify this German romantic composer of the *Hebrides Overture* and incidental music to *A Midsummer Night's Dream*.

Answer: Jakob Ludwig Felix Mendelssohn-Bartholdy

21. His works fall into two main categories: historical romances and domestic tragedies. During his lifetime his most popular work was *The Battles of Coxinga*, (*) which was based loosely on an adventurer who attempted to restore the Ming dynasty. A writer of bunraku dramas, he is best known today for his double-suicide plays. FTP, identify this Japanese playwright and author of *The Love Suicides at Sonezaki*.

Answer: Chikamatsu Monzaemon (Sugimori Nobumori)

22. It occurs in four varieties, the classic version being prevalent in older males of Italian or Jewish ancestry. Often treated with Vinblastine, (*) which tends to weaken the immune system, its modern incidence is believed to be associated with human herpes virus 8. Characterized by red-purple or bluebrown lesions of the skin, FTP, name this lethal cancer primarily associated with AIDS patients.

Answer: Kaposi sarcoma

23. This man started a successful lumber company at the age of 17 and by age 27, he owned his father's bank. Allied with Henry Frick (*) he founded Union Steel and Union Trust, and as Treasury Secretary under three presidents he reformed the U.S. tax structure during the 1920s. He also endowed the National Gallery of Art. FTP, name this man after whom a humanities foundation and a Pittsburgh university are named.

Answer: Andrew Mellon

24. Located on Ludgate Hill, it was once used as a marketplace and barracks. Built with the aid of ironworker Jean Tijou and sculptor Grinling Gibbons, its dome consists of three shells, (*) the innermost of which is decorated with frescoes and grisaille and may be viewed from the Whispering Gallery. Housing the graves of Lord Nelson and the Duke of Wellington, FTP, identify this landmark designed primarily by Sir Christopher Wren.

Answer: St Paul's Cathedral
