His first biography was by an unknown author, but in 1588 he gained greater fame in a fictionalized depiction by Christopher Marlowe. FTP who is this enduring character, best known as a Goethe subject?

Answer:

2. In the 1960's a system using cobalt-57 heated and diffused into iron, a loudspeaker driven at 10 Herz, and an anneated thin sheet of iron used as the detector were employed by Pound, Rebka, and Snyder of Jefferson Physical Laboratory at Harvard to measure it within 1% of the expected number, using the Mossbauer Effect. It relates the relativistic Doppler Shift from an accelerating light source to the shift in radiation frequency due to gravitational field. FTP name this phenomena explained by Einstein's General Theory of Relativity which explains why light from a height "H" has a higher frequency than light at height "0."

3. Born in Newton, Mass. in 1721, he moved to Connecticut where he became a Cobbler. In 1774 he was elected to the first Continental Congress, where he signed the Articles of Association. He then served on the committee to write the Declaration of Independence and was also a signer of the Articles of Confederation, making him the only man to sign those three and the Constitution. FTP what founding father, with Oliver Ellsworth, introduced the Connecticut Compromise, giving us the bicameral Congress we know and love?

4. Ancillary movements were to be Lord Montbatten's capture of Singapore and the conquest of the Liuchow Peninsula to supply China. Operation Olympic would land 14 divisions under General Kreuger at beaches named Buick, Chrysler, Chevrolet, and Ford. They were to establish a huge air base and would be supported by 23 battleships, 47 carriers, and 1500 transports. If all went well next spring would see Operation Coronet involving up to 28 divisions under Generals Eidelberger, who was to capture Yokohama, and Hodges who would drive to Tokyo. Casualty estimates went up to one million dead. FTP name this action stalled by the dropping of the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, the invasion of the U.S.'s Pacific enemy.

6. Pencil and paper may be needed. Cassie and her brother Matt were on a raft when they poked a big hole in it. Water started coming in at a rate of 10 gallons per minute. Their raft officially sinks with 30 gallons. 7. He was working on a novel about the Borgias at the time of his death and he was also the author of a book for kids, *The Runaway Summer of Davie Shaw*. His first two novels, *Dark Arena*, about an ex-soldier and his German mistress, and *The Fortunate Pilgrim* about a family of Italian immigrants, were critically acclaimed but sold poorly. His next novel, which he admitted was not particularly well-written, spent 67 weeks on the New York Times Bestseller List and led to two academy awards for best screenplay. 9. Holding a post in the household of Catherine of Aragon after spending several years in the court of France, she was accused of bringing about the reformation single-handedly. Dark-haired with large eyes, she had a mole on her neck and a malformed finger. The Marchioness of Pembroke, her uncle Norfolk presided over her trial. FTP, name this queen of three years that had Jane Seymour as one of her own ladies in waiting, the second queen to Henry VIII.

10. A rabbit in 1959, mice in 1968, and a calf in 1981 were among the first that resulted from this process. In 1979 Louise Brown was the first human conceived in what is inaccurately but amusingly called a "Womb With a View." FTP What term refers to the production of human embryos outside the human body, usually in a test tube?

11. After being turned down by Notre Dame, who were wary of his small size, he had an outstanding college career at the University of Louisville. He was drafted by the Steelers in 1955 but they already had too many quarterbacks; he went home and was picked up by another NFL team the following year. During an 18 year career, which he ended in 1973 as a San Diego Charger, he won three NFL championships, one Super Bowl and threw a touchdown in a a record 47 consecutive games. FTP name this longtime Baltimore Colt who recently died of a heart attack at age 69.

12. It ends with the Father discovering the youngest daughter drowned in the garden and the Young Boy shooting himself with a revolver, after which the Manager calls off rehearsal. Before this the Father had allowed his wife to abscond with his secretary, leaving his son feeling abandoned and useless. Then, the father who is missing his children, nearly seduces his Step-Daughter, who has returned to the city with her mother and is being employed by Madame Pace as a prostitute. FTP this describes the plot of what Luigi Pirandello play.

13. He sold his story to a Hollywood studio on the condition that no "oomphy" girl would play his wife; the role went to the demure Joan Leslie. While in the U.S. 82nd infantry, he singlehandedly knocked out 35 German machine guns, killed 25 Germans, and captured 132 more at the Battle of Argonne Forest on October 8, 1918. When asked how, he said, "I surrounded 'em". FTP name America's foremost war hero, who had sought conscientious objector status at the outbreak of World War I

Answer: Alvin Cullum York

Established in 1762 by Irish traders at the crossroads of Catawba Indian trials, it was a hotbed of rebels during the Revolutionary War and received its nickname from a comment by General Cornwallis. It experienced a gold rush in the early 1800's, was the place of the last meeting of the Confederate cabinet, and has recently become an international banking center and home to Duke Energy, the biggest electric utility in the nation. FTP, name this largest city in North Carolina which recently lost its NBA team, the Hornets.

Answer: Charlotte.

15. Evidence from their tools show that they were predominantly right handed and the pattern in their left cerebral hemisphere suggests they may have had speech ability. Their cranial capacity was around 700 cubic centimeters which required a complicated heat exchange system in their heads to cool their brain. Their tools included all-purpose lava cobbles, choppers and flakes. Mostly scavengers, they may have preyed on their contemporary Australopithecus bosei. 20. Loosely modeled on the nearby Rotunda of the Holy Sepulchre, it rises from the Noble Enclosure at the spot of Adam's burial and the location of the Temple of Solomon destroyed in 70 A.D. It was erected by the caliph Abd al-Malik while a rebel caliph held Mecca. With mosaic decorations on both the interior and exterior its massive octagonal dome is 60 feet across and 75 feet high, and it is a shrine rather than a mosque. FTP name this structure, containing the object on which Mohammed ascended to heaven, located in Jerusalem.

21. Her autobiographical essay *Cassandra* has been called "a major text of English feminism, a link between Wollstonecraft and Woolf." A daughter of a wealthy family, her father educated her in all the classics but her family was appalled by her career choice.
