2. Its discovery stemmed from studying cloud chamber photographs of cosmic ray impacts. In so doing, Carl Anderson theorized that there existed another atomic particle, equal to the electron in weight, but opposite in sign. FTP what is this particle, whose existence was confirmed in 1932?

3. Set in Georgia's fictitious Macomb County, it was written as a compilation of letters: to God in the first half and to the protagonist's sister Nettie, a missionary in Africa, in the second half. Notable characters include: Fonso, the sexually abusive stepfather: Albert, a small farmer who marries Celie and generally treats her poorly: Sofia Butler, Celie's daughter-in-law, an outspoken woman who spends years in prison for a minor crime: and Shug Avery a strong blues singer who inspires Celie. FTP name this 1983 Pulitzer Prize winning novel by Alice Walker.

The Color Purple.

4. Pencil and paper ready. You want to paint a regular hexagon with side length 1, but you've forgotten the formula for its area. You remember quickly, however, that you can divide the hexagon into a rectangle with any two opposite sides as its width, leaving 4 small triangles each with equal area. Remembering that each interior angle of a hexagon is 120 degrees, FTP give the total area of the hexagon. You have 15 seconds.

5. In his youth he spent 18 months in prison for attempting to defect to France, and later he served as a colonel in the War of Polish Succession. His first test as a military commander resulted in an accidental victory at Mollwitz in the First Silesian War. By the end of the 2nd Silesian War his army was regarded as invincible and later, in a period of less than ten months during the Seven Years War he crushed the French at Rossbach, the Austrians at Leuthen, and the Russians at Zorndorf. The prototypical enlightened despot, he corresponded with Voltaire and abolished censorship in his country. FTP name this king of Prussia.

Answer:

Frederick the Great or Frederick II.

6. Songs on the soundtrack included "Police Truck" by the Dead Kennedys, "Jerry Was A Race Car Driver" by Primus, and "Superman" by Goldfinger. The three two-player modes were HORSE, Graffiti, and Trick Attack. Rune Glifberg scored big points with the Christ Air, Elissa Steamer used the Judo Madonna, and the title character busted out Kickflip McTwist style. FTP, name the 1999 release which revived interest in skateboarding video games.

7. Located on and around Toompea in the Harjumaa region, its medieval street pattern and Hanseatic architecture are maintained in its Old Town. Other sites include the open air museum Rocca al Mare and the palace and park of Kadriorg. This city, home to the 2002 Eurovision Song Contest, was captured by the Danes in 1219 and subsequently held by, in order, the Teutonic Order, Swedes, and Russians until 1991. For ten points, name this city located directly across from Helsinki on the Gulf of Finland, the capital of Estonia.

8. A veteran of the Seven Years War, his first work was *Flore Francaise*, about the plants of France, which was published with the help of Georges Buffon who would later become an intellectual opponent. His critical breakthrough came in 1809's *Philosophie Zoologique*. Here he proposed three major ideas on evolution. First, species change through time even though life arose by spontaneous generation. Secondly he proposed that species progressively change from low forms to complex and perfect forms. For ten points, name this thinker who erred in theorizing the inheritance of acquired characteristics?

Answer:

Jean-Baptiste de Lamarck.

9. He appears in Walter Scott's novel Ivanhoe as the "holy clerk of Copmanhurst." A traditional character in medieval English May-Day plays, his costume is the russet habit of the Franciscans, with a red-corded girdle, red stockings and wallet. Usually depicted as fat and jovial, FTP, who is this vagabond friar best known from the Robin Hood ballads?

Answer:

Friar Tuck

10. The climax of the battle came in the middle of November when an American fleet defeated a Japanese fleet in "the Slot." This victory, one of seven separate naval battles, cut off Japanese supplies and reinforcements, called the "Tokyo Express" by American troops, allowing Marine and Army divisions to push Japanese land forces back to the east of the island and consolidate their hold over Henderson Air Field. FTP name this decisive battle fought in the Solomon islands, which raged from August 7, 1942 to Feb 9, 1943, signaling the beginning of island hopping.

Answer:

Battle of Guadalcanal.

11. At 18 he was an associate of the Fatico crew and in 1968 his first major arrest happened for cargo theft and truck hijacking. After two acquittals, he was convicted for life by the testimony of Salvatore Gravano. FTP, name this mobster who succumbed to cancer in 2002, once a prominent member of the Gambino family.

Answer:

John Gotti

12. Presiding over the east and the west, he dwells in the Himalayas at Mt. Kailash and has over one thousand names. Usually depicted with his eyes half closed and in a meditating position, he wears cobras around his neck, grasps a trident, and has the sacred river Ganga falling around his head. The father of Kartikeya and Ganesha, his consort Parvati was the cause of both his blue neck and his third eye. Part of the Hindu triad, with Brahma and Vishnu, FTP name this god often called "The Destroyer."

Answer:

Shiva.

13. Mr. Carmichael becomes a successful poet. Prue marries and dies in childbirth. Andrew enlists, is sent to France to fight the First World War, and is killed by an exploding shell. The mother dies in her sleep. Lily Briscoe returns to the Isle of Skye to attempt to finish her picture of the cottage from whose window James and Camilla saw the title black and white striped structure to which James sails. They appear in--FTP--which novel about the Ramsey family by Virginia Woolf?

Answer:

To The Lighthouse

14. This does not set in for three to six months, indicating the time for collagen turnover. The symptoms also suggest that blood vessels are the first to suffer from a lack of collagen replacement. This disease occurs because functional collagen requires hydroxylated amino acids, and the enzyme responsible for hydroxylation requires ascorbic acid. FTP, name this disease caused by the lack of vitamin C.

Answer:

Scurvy.

15. He spent 17,000 francs at the First Impressionist show and was later tutored by Camille Pissaro. A proponent of subjective expression he achieved his desired impression by using flat shapes and unmodulating color. After the bank where he worked went under, he became a professional painter and traveled to Rouen where he briefly worked with Van Gogh, and Pont Aven in Brittany, where he painted *The Vision After the Sermon*. FTP name this post-impressionist whose most famous works, including *Where do we Come From? What are We? Where are we Going?* were painted on Tahiti.

Answer:

Paul Eugene-Henri Gauguin.

16. A supporter of the Socialists in the Spanish Civil war, he became a member of the Communist Party in the last months of his life. A leader of the American Naturalist style, nearly all of his novels deal with poverty and steamy love affairs, both of which he was personally acquainted with and wrote about in the semi-autobiographical works *Hoosier Holiday* and *The 'Genius*.' He nearly committed suicide when his first novel sold poorly because it wasn't promoted by its publisher Frank Doubleday, who objected to its immorality. FTP identify this author of *Sister Carrie* and *An American Tragedy*.

Answer:

Theodore Dreiser.

17. A workaholic and celibate Quaker, he was known for collecting copious amounts of data. Yet, it was often poor, like his innacurate and omission-plaued aurora borealis observations. He also posited the discredited theory that discoloration of the liquids within the eye caused color-blindness. His name is sometimes given to that condition, but not to Charles's gas law, which he discovered. FTP name this chemist who developed an eponymous law of partial pressures and an early 19th century atomic theory.

Answer: John Dalton

18. Its first performance did not go smoothly, partly because its creator packaged it with all the other music he had composed while vacationing at Heiligenstadt outside of Vienna and also because the orchestra wasn't given much time to prepare. Written in F Major it looks forward to the tone poems of the late 19th century. The main "plot" of the work begins in the third movement, "The Merry-Making of the Country Folk," which is interrupted by a thunderstorm and ends with the "Shepherd's Song: Happy Thankful Feelings after the Storm." FTP name this rustic symphony by Beethoven, his sixth.

Answer: Pastoral Symphony. (accept 6th symphony before it is said.)

19. The language of this people has 178 words for "rain" but no word for "crisp." Their society is exceedingly patriarchal: women are not allowed to leave home without a male escort, and often chew the food of males before consumption. Upon reaching adulthood, males auction their boyhood possessions. Their contract with the Karemma for Tulaberry wine was among the first successful link with a gamma quadrant. FTP name the Star Trek race whose members include Brak, Grand Nagus Zek, Rom, and Quark.

Answer: Ferengi

20. A lawyer with the firm Sullivan & Cromwell, at the age of 30 he was member of the U.S. delegation to the Paris Peace Conference of 1919. In 1942 he traveled to London to discuss post-war security three years before helping draft the United Nations Charter. The American Ambassador to the Treaty of San Francisco, he developed a conflict with Anthony Eden that would last beyond his formulation of the Eisenhower Doctrine. FTP, name this brinksman, a Secretary of State under Eisenhower.

Answer: John Foster Dulles

21. Name's the same. Herodotus described the first as very cosmopolitan housing Greeks, Jews, Phoenicians, and Libyans. Its necropolis stretched 19 miles along the Nile's western bank. Ptah was the principle deity of this administrative capital of the Old Kingdom founded by Menes which declined only after the Muslim had established their capital only miles away at Cairo. The second is home to Historic Elmwood Cemetary, Libertyland Amusement Park, and the Cardinal's AAA affiliate Redbirds. FTP name this Tennessee City on the Mississippi home of Elvis and Graceland.

Answer: Memphis.

22. In one legend, he learned the Phoenician alphabet from Cadmus but gave each letter its definitive name and shape himself. Often linked to Hermes, this son of Apollo and a Muse invented rhythm and melody. However, when he tried to settle down the rebellious Heracles while teaching him music, Heracles killed him with a stool.FTP name this remarkable musician who was a masterful lyrist but never known to carry around a security blanket.

Answer: Linus

23. At the age of ten he wrote a short paper on an albino sparrow so that a university librarian would take him seriously; he eventually received a doctorate in zoology and spent his early career studying mollusks. After WWI he became interested in psychology and worked in one of Alfred Binet's laboratories. However, he disagreed with how Binet examined children's intelligence and developed a theory of genetic epistemology, an empirical study of how our learning processes change and improve as we age, which posited that children progress through four stages of learning beginning with the Sensorimotor and ending with the Formal Operational. FTP name this Swiss child psychologist.

Answer: Jean Piaget.
