1.) He replaced Carrera as revolutionary leader in 1813, but after his defeat at Rancagua, he fled to Argentina and joined forced with San Martin. After defeating the Spaniards at Chacabuco in 1817, he was named Supreme Director of his country, and declared its independence early the next year. But his reforms led to opposition and his eventual deposition and exile in Peru. FTP, who is this national hero of Chile?

Answer: Bernardo O'Higgins

2.) Its title is derived from a combination of a reference in Matthew 25:6 and the punchline of a dirty joke. It never exits the environs of a tavern, inhabited by derelicts of various stripes, such as the disillusioned anarchists Larry Slade and Hugo Kalmar, as well as soldiers of the Boer War. They all wait for the return of Theodore Hickman for his semiannual binge at the ironically named Harry Hope's saloon. FTP, what is this 1946 play by Eugene O'Neill that made a star of Jason Robards?

Answer: The Iceman Cometh

3.) There are seven species of this toothless mammal in genus Manis. They are not closely related to any other living mammals. Growing to a length of 3 to 6 feet, they break open logs with their powerful claws and use their long, slender tongues to lap up insects. For defense, they secrete a foul-smelling liquid and curl up into a ball, resembling a pine cone. FTP, what is this scaled mammal of tropical Asia and Africa, commonly called a scaly anteater?

Answer: <u>Pangolin</u> (prompt on 'scaly anteater')

4.) She was taught to paint by her father, Raymond, and from 1841 her works were regularly exhibited in the Salon. Her sympathetic pictures of animal life, such as Sheep by the Sea and Plowing in Nivernais, were remarkably enlightened in their approach, and she became highly popular in England and America, even though she herself was French. FTP, who is this artist best known for The Horse Fair?

Answer: Rosa Bonheur

5.) Even though he's been dead for nearly 30 years, previously unknown works by him are still being published, the most recent being *Roverandom*. This work tells the story of a dog who was turned into a toy by a wizard, and was written in 1925 to calm his son Michael, who had lost a toy dog on vacation. A noted literary scholar, his essay "On Fairy-Stories" includes an argument that fantasy should never be performed dramatically. FTP, name this author of "Farmer Giles of Ham," "Leaf by Niggle" and *The Adventures of Tom Bombadil*, a character who did not appear in a recent movie.

Answer: John Ronald Reuel (J.R.R.) Tolkien

6.) It is indented by the Davao and Moro gulfs, and has a large western peninsula, the Zamboanga. Its highest point is the active volcano, Mt. Apo. Generally mountainous and heavily forested, this island grows pineapples, mangoes and bananas and is the only place to which the monkey-eating eagle is native. One of the deepest parts of the oceans lies in a

trench, which shares its name, off its northeast coast. FTP, what is this second-largest Philippine island?

Answer: Mindanao

7.) It first met on September 1, 1864, and eight of the twenty-three delegates were from the Province of Canada despite the fact that province was a late invitee and irrelevant to the meeting's original purpose. The delegates from the original participants met on their own six days later, but their project of a union of the Maritime Provinces was unsuccessful. FTP, name this first conference to address Canadian unification, held in the capital of Prince Edward Island.

Answer: Charlottetown Conference

8.) Commonly found in gravels, it takes several forms, including semiprecious gems. Among its varieties are bloodstone, cat's eye, onyx, sard, jasper and agate. FTP, what is this waxy and lustrous-appearing mineral composed of fibrous microcrystalline quartz, named after a Greek city that was the site of a church council in 451 AD?

Answer: Chalcedony

9.) From 1875 he taught at Leipzig. He stressed the use of scientific methods in psychology, particularly through the use of introspection. Among his works are *Elements of Folk Psychology* and a 1916 *Introduction to Psychology*. FTP, who was this German, who founded the first laboratory for experimental psychology?

Answer: Wilhelm Wundt

10.) He was disqualified from the 1932 Olympics for violations of the amateur athletic code, and went on to become wealthy as a sporting goods merchant. He is better known for his earlier successes, when he set 20 world records and won nine Olympic gold medals, including two in 10,000 meter races in 1920 and 1928, as well as the 1500 meter and 5000 meter races in 1924. FTP, who was this dynamic track star known as the Flying Finn?

Answer: Paavo Nurmi

11.) (AUDIO TOSS-UP) With the recent resurgence in interest in the Rat Pack, it seems fitting to ask about Frank Sinatra. His career in the 1960s was marked by a number of songs focused on loneliness and drowning your sorrows. FTP, I'll play a Harold Arlen tune of this type made famous by Frank, and you give its title. (Play audio clip)

Answer: One for My Baby (and One More for the Road)

12.) This descendant of William Penn demonstrated that the properties of non-Euclidean geometry could be addressed as the geometry of three dimensions and discovered that light reflected from the retina could produce an image of eye tissue. He was also the first to measure the speed of nerve impulses, and invented the ophthalmoscope in 1856. FTP, who was this German physicist who formulated the law of conservation of energy.

Answer: Hermann Ludwig Ferdinand von Helmholtz

13.) It was founded in the 15th century as a dye works, but two Flemish weavers added a tapestry works in 1601. It was bought in 1662 by Louis XIV, who thereby made it a model

factory of royal craftsmen. Famous tapestries include a set based on Raphael's frescoes in the Vatican. FTP, name this state controlled tapestry factory located in Paris.

Answer: Manufacture Nationale des Gobelins

14.) Although this book's author is not particularly known for his pithy writings, it contains such gems as "If the devil doesn't exist, man has created him in his own image" and "The jealous are the readiest of all to forgive, and all women know it." It contains a monk, Zosima, who expresses the author's religious views, as well as Ivan, who speaks for rationalism in the story centering around the aftermath of a quarrel over Grushenka. FTP, what is this 1881 Dostoevsky novel that also features the line, "Who doesn't desire his father's death?"

Answer: The Brothers Karamazov or Brat'ia Karamazovy

15.) Its 22 sections are made up of simple fugues, stretto fugues, canons and mirror or invertible fugues. The final segment, incomplete, is a massive interweaving of four themes based on the composer's own name. FTP, what is this magnum opus of J.S. Bach, his last major work, left unfinished at his death?

Answer: The Art of Fugue or Die Kunst der Fuge

16.) It was a blend of the thinking of Ernst Mach and the concepts of Frege and Russell. The movement championed the principle of verification, which is that a proposition has meaning only if sense experience would suffice to demonstrate its truth. FTP, what is this school of philosophy championed by the Vienna Circle, including Waismann, Goedel and Carnap?

Answer: <u>Logical Positivism</u> (accept <u>logical empiricism</u> or <u>scientific</u> empiricism)

17.) This solution is used for the detection and estimation of weak reducing agents; especially sugars. The presence of even small concentrations of certain sugars, in an aqueous solution, is indicated by a distinctive red precipitate of cuprous oxide. What is this solution, named after its German inventor, that is composed of copper sulphate, sodium hydroxide and potassium sodium tartarate in an aqueous solution?

Answer: Fehling's solution

18.) He was born in the village of al-Birwah seven years before it was destroyed to build an Israeli settlement, and anger and disinheritance form the major themes of his writing. His politics forced him to leave Israel a year after winning the Lotus Prize in 1969, and for many years, he worked out of Cairo. His most recent collection is titled *Bed of a Stranger*. FTP, name this poet of the Palestinian resistance, author of *Sand and Other Poems*.

Answer: Mahmoud <u>Darwish</u> (Mah-MOOD dar-WEESH)

19.) Led by Manuel Marulanda, a/k/a Tirofijo, and Jorge Briceno, alias Mono Jojoy, this left-wing organization is also allegedly responsible for "miracle fishing," a practice of kidnaping foreigners on highways for ransom. Recently they shot down a US helicopter that was acting as an escort for a drug crop-dusting plane. FTP, what is this rebel group, which has been negotiating with the government of Colombia for an end to the 38-year-long civil war in that country?

Answer: <u>Fuerzas Armadas Revolucionarias de Colombia or Revolutionary Armed</u> Forces of Colombia

20.) Songs include "Who Needs Money," "Everything But Love," "Confidence," "Hey Hey" and the title song. Elvis plays a lovelorn millionaire masquerading as a water ski instructor, while he attempts to woo Shelley Fabares (Fab-RAY) away from playboy Bill Bixby. Answer: Clambake

21.) His political career included a defeat for the 1st Congress and for the position of elector favoring Thomas Jefferson in 1796, at which time he was Governor of Massachusetts. Earlier he had helped to organize the Non-Importation Agreement and drawn up the Circular Letters denouncing the Townshend Acts as taxation without representation. His prolific writings helped spark both the Boston Massacre and the Boston Tea Party. FTP, who was this agitator who replaced James Otis as leader of the colonial extremists, now best known for a beer named after him?

Answer: Samuel Adams
