TOSSUPS

1. He said of his reign that "I rule with my ass in the saddle and a gun in my fist." Appropriately enough, he met a violent end in 1610, when he was assassinated by the catholic fanatic Ravaillac [ra-va-yac]. The first Bourbon king, his marriage to Margaret of Valois coincided with the St. Bartholemew's Day Massacre. He converted to Catholicism in 1593, allegedly declaring that "Paris is well worth a mass." FTP, name this French king who issued the Edict of Nantes, granting toleration to Protestants.
Answer: Henri IV (accept Henri de Navarre or Henry of Navarre)

2. As rubidium 87 and sodium 23 produce weak repulsive forces when cooled, remaining dilute gasses, those elements are used to produce this. Through the cooling and trapping of neutral atoms to 100 nanokelvins, the density of atoms in a wavelength-sided cube exceeds 2.6, allowing the atoms to form a coherent superatom. Cornell, Ketterle and Wieman garnered the 2001 Nobel Prize in physics for producing, FTP, this 5th and lowest-energy state of matter named for the Indian and Swiss physicists who proposed it.
Answer: Bose-Einstein Condensate

Used 3. He illustrated the 1967 book of poems "In Memory of My Feelings" by Frank O'Hara, and created a set of prints for Samuel Beckett's *Fizzles*. His 1959 painting *False Start* features printed names of the colors that appear on the canvas. His two 1960 works *Painted Bronze* are a coffee tin with brushes sticking out of it and two cans of Ballantine Ale. FTP, name this American pop artist best known for painting flags.
Answer: Jasper Johns

4. The usual derivation of her name is from the Greek words for "pig" and "raven," or from a variation of Ovid's name for Medea, the Scythian raven. The spectator also learns that her god was the Patagonian deity Setebos. Prospero mentions that she was banished from Algiers, and has grown into a hoop with age and envy, but not before imprisoning Ariel in a pine and giving birth to a deformed son. FTP, Caliban claims that the island is his by this witch, his mother, an absent character in *The Tempest*.
ANSWER: Sycorax

5. It received the nickname of bakufu, meaning "tent government." Under it, daimyo were forbidden to engage in foreign trade and, under the Alternate Attendance System, were forced to reside in Edo for half the year. It first came to prominence in 1601 when its founder defeated rival warrior families at the Battle of Sekigahara, and ended with the 1868 Meiji Restoration. FTP, name this Japanese shogunate.
Answer: Tokugawa shogunate

6. Iarn-greiper allows its bearer to grasp ^{this} firmly. As it was forged, Loki disguised himself as a gadfly and stung the dwarf Brock, who was tending the bellows, above the eye, forcing him to stop momentarily. Consequently, Brock's brother Sindri forged it with its handle one inch too short. Nevertheless, it remained effective, and always returned to its wielder after thrown. FTP, name this weapon, Thor's hammer.
Answer: Mjölknir [myeull-neer] (prompt on "Thor's hammer")

7. Exhibiting both photovoltaic and photoconductive action, this element is extensively used in rectifiers. Found in such rare minerals as crooksite and clausthalite, its compound with hydrogen is highly toxic, but it is an essential trace element in its pure form, as it is a key cofactor for the antioxidant enzyme glutathione peroxidase. Plant foods and especially Brazil nuts are important sources of, FTP, this element of the oxygen group, number 34 on the periodic table, named for the Greek goddess of the moon.
Answer: Selenium

8. To woo Dorimène, the title character has the master of philosophy tell him five different ways to say "Marquise, your beautiful eyes make me die of love." As criticism from the title character's wife and his servant Nicole does not suffice, Covielle, in a mock-Turkish ceremony, makes him into the Grand Mamamouchi so that he will marry his daughter Lucile to the Grand Turk, actually Cléonte in disguise. FTP, name this Molière comedy, in which the boorish Monsieur Jourdain tries to act like nobility.
Answer: Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme (The Would-Be Gentleman)

9. The video for this song features the lead singer's bed igniting several times, as well as the animation of several extremely long-legged mastodons from a painting by Joseph Hahn. The speakers declare that "When this began / I had nothing to say / And I'd get lost in the nothingness inside of me." In the chorus, they go on to say that "I want to heal / I want to feel / Like I'm close to something real / I want to find something I've wanted all along," the titular location. FTP, identify this Linkin Park song from *Meteora*.
Answer: Somewhere I Belong

10. When this man was arrested and tried in Rome in November of 1926, Mussolini said of him, "We must prevent that this mind continue thinking." Afflicted with scoliosis, this Sardinian worked as the Secretary General of the Italian Communist Party from 1924 until his imprisonment, during which he wrote his most famous work. FTP, name this Italian political theorist whose *Prison Notebooks* are key to Marxism.
Answer: Antonio Gramsci

11. His 1988 novel *Fiasco* details the silence with which his first novel was received. In 1990's *Kaddish for a Child not Born*, the titular prayer is said for a child who refuses to reproduce in a world that allowed the existence of Auschwitz. The protagonist György Köves appears in the two aforementioned novels, which form a trilogy with his 1975 first novel, which has been called "Huck Finn in Buchenwald." FTP, *Sorstalanság*, or *Fateless*, was written by this Hungarian winner of the 2002 Nobel Prize in literature.
Answer: Imre Kertész (kerr-tej)

12. An anallagmatic curve, its polar equation is of the form $r = b + 2a \cos(\theta)$ [r equals b plus 2a cosine theta]. If $b = a$, it becomes a special case named a trisectrix, and if $b = 2a$, it becomes a cardioid. With a name derived from the Latin word for a snail, FTP, name this figure whose graph resembles a circle with an inner loop.

Answer: Limacon of Pascal (lee-mah-sohn)

13. She suspects her lover of having an affair with the Marchesa Attavanti, whose features she recognizes in a painting of Mary Magdalen. Attavanti's brother, the Bonapartist Angelotti, is hiding in a garden well, which she reveals when her lover is tortured by the police chief Scarpia's men. Pretending to submit to Scarpia's advances, she instead stabs him, but leaps to her death when she learns that Cavaradossi's mock execution turned out to be a real one. FTP, name this titular singer of a Puccini opera.

Answer: Tosca

14. It is currently involved with Egypt in a border dispute over an area along the 22nd parallel entitled "The Hala'ib Triangle." This country's dictator, first elected popularly in 1996, Lieutenant General Omar al-Bashir, heads a military junta fronted by the Islamist National Congress Party, formerly the National Islamic Front. The nation is ravaged by civil wars between southern non-Muslims and northern Muslims centered in the capital, which is located at the confluence of the Blue and White Nile rivers. FTP, name this largest African country with a capital at Khartoum.

Answer: Republic of the Sudan

15. In the preface, the author declares his hopes that one of his fellow beings, should he dare, will declare that "I am better than that man there." One famous scene from them details how the author still feels guilty for blaming the theft of a ribbon on a fellow servant as a child. Collected in twelve volumes written between 1766 and 1770, it was published posthumously in 1781. FTP, name this autobiographical work of Jean-Jacques Rousseau, which shares its name with the spiritual autobiography of St. Augustine.

Answer: Confessions

16. She appeared in over 20 Burger King commercials before her onscreen debut in 1983's *Jaws 3-D*. Her first important role came opposite Tom Cruise in *All the Right Moves*. She also portrayed Beverly, the front woman of Cherry Bomb who befriends Howard the Duck. FTP, name the actress who depicted Lorraine in the *Back to the Future* trilogy, and the titular urbanite of the TV series *Caroline in the City*.

Answer: Leah Thompson

17. He was coordinating the defenses in southern Iraq until a coalition surgical airstrike during the weekend of April 5-6 destroyed his home in Basra, leaving that city's defenses in disarray. On April 7th, an almost certain confirmation by British Defense Secretary Geoff Hoon prompted Donald Rumsfeld to announce that the "reign of terror" of this Iraqi general had ended. A cousin of Saddam Hussein, FTP, this commander received his nickname for overseeing a 1988 chemical attack on Kurds in northern Iraq.

Answer: Chemical Ali (Ali Hassan al-Majeed)

18. The journal of Charles Brown indicates that this poem was written in two hours as its author, Brown's friend, sat under a plum tree. The poet concludes by asking "Was it a vision, or a waking dream? / Fled is that music: - Do I wake or sleep?" The poet begins by lamenting that "My heart aches, and a drowsy numbness pains / My sense, as though of hemlock I had drunk." FTP, name this John Keats ode, in which he addresses the titular animal with: "Thou wast not born for death, immortal Bird!"

Answer: Ode to a Nightingale

19. In *Dirty Work*, Chris Farley portrays a Vietnam veteran who lost this to a Vietnamese whore. The barber Ivan Yakovlevich finds one in a loaf of bread in a Gogol short story. After Tycho Brahe lost his in a duel with a Dutch nobleman, he purportedly replaced it with one made of gold and silver. FTP, identify this cartilaginous facial prominence, which the Egyptian Sphinx famously lacks.

ANSWER: Nose

20. He was the first to prove that contact between sperm and egg is necessary to produce a new animal. In 1767, he published an article criticizing Buffon and Needham's theory of "vital atoms," asserting and proving that van Leeuwenhoek's animalcules were indeed living. He did so by boiling gravy in two flasks, and showing that nothing could grow in a flask sealed immediately after boiling. FTP, name this 18th century Italian scientist and opponent of spontaneous generation.

Answer: Lazzaro Spallanzani

21. Critiquing this man's boastfulness, Lincoln said, "The hen is the wisest of all animals, for it never cackles until the egg is laid." On May 2nd, 1863, he lost his nerve after Lee resisted his initial push through the Wilderness, and he withdrew his troops, allowing Lee and Jackson to roll up his flank, forcing him to retreat from Chancellor House on May 6th. FTP, name this Union general nicknamed "Fighting Joe," who lost at Chancellorsville, whose name denoted the prostitutes housed in his headquarters.

Answer: Joseph Hooker

22. This bagatelle in A Minor has no opus number, but it is number 59 among the Works without Opus. One theory posits that its popular title, taken from the autograph on its original manuscript, is actually the mistake of a copyist, as its original manuscript was dedicated to a woman named Therese von Malfatti. For ten points, identify this short piano piece by Beethoven, played by Schroeder in *A Charlie Brown Christmas*.

Answer: Für Elise [foor eh-leez-uh] (For Elise)

23. This work details a trading ritual in which red shell necklaces are traded by permanent trading partners in a clockwise ring around the islands, and white shell necklaces are traded in a counterclockwise direction. That ritual, called the Kula, takes place among the inhabitants of the present day Kiriwana Islands. FTP, name this anthropological work about the Trobriand islanders by Bronislaw Malinowski.

Answer: Argonauts of the Western Pacific

24. At one point, the narrator, in one of many breaks in the narrative, describes and diagrams Freitag's Triangle of dramatic narrative. This short story ostensibly concerns a family's Fourth of July trip to Ocean City, during which the protagonist deals with his envy of his boisterous uncle Karl and his brother Peter, and with his attraction to Magda. Realizing that he can never be a regular person, Ambrose decides to construct the titular building for others, though he would rather be a lover for whom it is built. FTP, identify this titular short story of a 1968 John Barth collection "written" for voice recordings, which compares narrative to a labyrinthine building found in amusement parks.

Answer: Lost in the Funhouse

25. A bachelorette goes out on the town to watch a male stripper dressed as a policeman. A man breaks up a wedding to run off with the groom. A group of three hip dudes make their car bounce in order to impress three ladies, but one of them falls out. A group of tourists are chased through the streets of Pamplona by bulls, which are actually hamsters with horns tied to their heads. These scenarios acted out by bottles are, FTP, commercials for this brand of drink "made from the best stuff on earth."

Answer: Snapple

26. The one in Virginia met at the Raleigh Tavern, and was proposed by Dabney Carr, Thomas Jefferson's best friend. First organized in 1772 by Samuel Adams, these were integral to the planning of the First Continental Congress, and the Second Continental Congress created its own to convey American interpretation of events to foreign powers. FTP, name these informal networks of communication between towns and states in the years before and during the American Revolution.

Answer: Committees of Correspondence

27. Followers of this religion obey a strict observance of the five K's: kada, or the steel bangle, kaccha, or the undergarment, kanga, or the hair comb, kesha, or long hair, and kirpan, or the short dagger. Its sacred text, composed by Arjun, is the Adi Granth. Led by Gurus such as the founder Nanak, FTP, this religion represents an attempt at reconciliation between Hinduism and Islam.

Answer: Sikhism

28. The chief investor in this company, Edward Lambert, will receive 49% of its stock in exchange for converting \$2 billion of financial claims to stock via his company, ESL Investments. This company hired Ron Hutchinson as chief restructuring officer last January, impressed by his turnaround of Pizza Hut and Denny's. After 600 closings and thousands of layoffs, FTP, this Troy, Michigan-based company climbed out of bankruptcy on May 6th, aided by intensive minority advertising and the blue light.

Answer: K-Mart Corporation

29. It is used to discover binary stars, as well as in echocardiography in conjunction with ultrasound. When this concept is applied to light waves, a red shift occurs when the source and observer are moving away from each other, and a blue shift occurs when the source and observer are moving towards each other. Famously tested by musicians playing their instruments on a moving train, FTP, this effect involving the sound emitted by a moving object is named for its Austrian discoverer.

Answer: Doppler Effect

30. 92% of males reported having masturbated, as opposed to * 62% of females. Other statistics indicated 68% of males and 50% of females had engaged in premarital sex, and that 37% of males and 13% of females had at least one orgasmic homosexual experience. Published in two parts in 1948 and 1953, respectively *Sexual Behavior in the Human Male* and *Sexual Behavior in the Human Female*, FTP, this sociological statistical compilation, named for the Indiana University researcher who compiled it, is still the largest study ever conducted on human sexual behavior.

Answer: The Kinsey Report (accept "Sexual Behavior in the Human Male" before *)

A. [10] This term denotes the struggle between the Bismarck-dominated Prussian state and the Catholic Church which was most intense from 1870 to 1878.

Answer: Kulturkampf [cool-tour-kahmph]

B. [10] This 1873 set of laws restricted the disciplinary powers of the church, placed the education of the clergy under state supervision, and provided for the punishment of those who refused to cooperate.

Answer: May Laws

C. [10] By getting Bismarck to agree to a modus vivendi in 1887, this pope found a way to tactfully end the Kulturkampf.

Answer: Leo XIII

3. Name these sundry physical effects FTPE.

A. [10] Made possible by fixing nuclei in lattice solids, it permits the resonance absorption of gamma rays, and is named after the German physicist who discovered it in 1957.

Answer: Mössbauer Effect

B. [10] Named for its co-discoverer with Ochsenfeld, it is the expulsion of a magnetic field from a material approaching superconductivity.

Answer: Meissner Effect

C. [10] Involving the tunneling of Cooper pairs, it is the flow of electric current between two pieces of superconducting material separated by insulation.

Answer: Josephson Effect

A. [10] In an 1826 battle, the Turks, aided by Egyptians, took this city on the Peloponnese, which allowed them to advance on Athens. Lord Byron died here.

Answer: Missolonghi

B. [10] In this 1827 battle, the British and French fleets scored a key victory for the Greeks by destroying the Egyptian fleet.

Answer: Navarino Bay

C. [10] By this 1829 treaty, the allies guaranteed Greek independence, which would later be formally recognized by the Treaty of Constantinople.

Answer: Treaty of Adrianople

8. Identify these extreme planetary moons FTPE.

A. [10] This largest moon of Neptune is also the largest planetary satellite with a funky retrograde orbit.

Answer: Triton

B. [10] The third Galilean moon, it is also the largest satellite in the solar system.

Answer: Ganymede

C. [10] Along with its larger companion, it is thought to be an asteroid captured by the planet that it orbits. It is the smallest known planetary satellite.

Answer: Deimos

9. Name these Gustave Courbet paintings FTPE.

A. [10] It depicts two laborers working with picks.

Answer: The Stonebreakers (Les casseurs de pierres)

B. [10] This 1866 painting depicts two nude women lying on a bed, locked in what just might be a hot lesbian embrace.

Answer: The Sleepers (Les dormeuses)

C. [10] This painting is the equivalent of an 1866 spread shot, as its focal point is a woman's hairy genital area.

Answer: The Origin of the World (L'Origine du monde)

10. Identify these creatures that Zeus banished to Tartarus FTPE.

A. [10] Except for Atlas, whose strength was necessary to hold up the vault of the sky, Zeus banished these rather large relatives of his to Tartarus.

Answer: **Titans**

B. [10] After hitting this terrible dragon, occasionally equated with Mount Etna, with a hundred thunderbolts, Zeus hurled it down to Tartarus.

Answer: **Typhon** or **Typhoeus**

C. [10] These two moronic giant brothers, who piled up mountains as high as Olympus, were tricked into wounding each other, and cast down to Tartarus. Sucks to be them.

Answer: **Otus** and **Ephialtes**

A. [10] Born with the name of Anna Fierling, this title character makes a living by following armies around during the Thirty Year's War, selling various items to soldiers.

Answer: **Mother Courage (Mutter Courage)**

B. [10] It details the dispute between two Russian communes over a valley. When the usurping yet beneficial commune wins, it is compared to a parable in which a child is rewarded to his adoptive mother who refuses to yank him out of the titular design.

Answer: The **Caucasian Chalk Circle (Der kaukasische Kreidekreis)**

C. [10] This play, in a clear parallel to Hitler, details the rise to power of the titular dictator.

Answer: The **Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui (Der Aufhaltsame Aufstieg des Arturo Ui)**

13. Identify these post-Flavian Roman emperors FTPE.

A. [10] ~~Succeeding Nerva in 98 CE, this Spaniard was one of Rome's most popular emperors. To honor his conquest of Dacia, a column was built in Rome in 113.~~

Answer: **Trajan**

B. [10] ~~Trajan's protégé and fellow Spaniard, this less-popular emperor spent most of his time outside of Rome completing such projects as a certain barrier in Britain.~~

Answer: **Hadrian**

C. [10] ~~This adopted son of Hadrian received his title from his exemplary behavior toward Hadrian. His reign saw the building of another wall in Britain.~~

Answer: **Antoninus Pius**

14. Given lyrics, identify the songs by Pearl Jam FTPE.

A. [10] "And all I taught her was everything / I know she gave me all that she wore / And now my bitter hands chafe beneath the clouds / Of what was everything."

Answer: **Black**

B. [10] "Waitin', wathcin' the clock, it's four o'clock, it's got to stop / Tell him, take no more, she practices her speech / As he opens the door, she rolls over / Pretends to sleep as he looks her over."

Answer: Better Man

15. The pen is mightier than the sword, but not mightier than the spear. Identify these types of pole arms from descriptions for ten points each, or from other clues for 5.

A. [10] A sign of rank for infantry officers, it is a spear whose especially long tip features a set of often ostentatiously-decorated wings.

[5] Its name is also used to denote guerilla fighters.

ANSWER: partisan

B. [10] This weapon is actually a spear combined with an axe head.

[5] The Swiss Guard, as a nod to tradition, still carry this weapon.

ANSWER: halberd

C. [10] It is essentially an elongated thrusting spear with a rhombus-shaped tip. Its name comes from the French for "to thrust."

[5] It shares its name with a fish.

ANSWER: pike

16. Identify these musical works based on literary works FTPE.

A. [10] This François Poulenc opera is based on a "surrealist drama" by Guillaume Apollinaire.

Answer: The Breasts of Tiresias (Les Mamelles de Tiresias)

B. [10] This Debussy prelude is based on a poem by Mallarmé.

Answer: Prelude to "The Afternoon of a Faun" (Prélude à 'L'après-midi d'un faune') [Note: "Prelude to" is necessary to distinguish musical work from literary]

C. [10] In this Jacques Offenbach opera, a young poet tells his drinking buddies about Olympia, Giuletta, Antonia and Stella, four women that he just can't get with.

Answer: The Tales of Hoffman (Les contes d'Hoffman)

17. 30-20-10, identify the scientist.

[30] During his 1846-1850 voyage aboard the HMS *Rattlesnake*, he first classified Cnidarians as Nematophora, and discovered that they were all composed of two "foundation membranes," later named the ectoderm and endoderm, which he suggested resembled a vertebrate embryo.

[20] He is accredited with the theory that an infinite number of monkeys with an infinite number of typewriters would eventually reproduce the works of Shakespeare.

[10] This originator of the word "agnosticism" was known as "Darwin's Bulldog" for his staunch defense of the theory of evolution.

Answer: Thomas Henry Huxley

18. Identify the following about the 1938 annexation of Austria by Germany FTPE.

A. [10] From the German for "connection," this is the term given to that annexation.

Answer: Anschluss

B. [10] The Austrian Nazi Party paved the way for the Anschluss with the 1934 assassination of this Christian Socialist chancellor, who attempted to purge Austrian National Socialism.

Answer: Engelbert Dolfuss

C. [10] The Anschluss was enabled by the forced resignation and imprisonment of this Austrian Chancellor, who resisted Nazi takeover after the assassination of Dolfuss.

Answer: Kurt von Schuschnigg (shoosh-nig)

19. From lines, identify the poems by Edgar Allan Poe FTPE.

A. [10] "Keeping time, time, time, / In a sort of Runic rhyme, / To the tintinnabulation that so musically wells..."

Answer: The Bells

B. [10] "Ah, broken is the golden bowl! the spirit flown forever! / Let the bell toll! – a saintly soul floats on the Stygian river; / And, Guy De Vere, hast *thou* no tear? – weep now or never more!"

Answer: Lenore

C. [10] "But see, amid the mimic rout / A crawling shape intrude! / A blood-red thing that writhes from out / The scenic solitude! / It writhes! – it writhes! – with mortal pangs / The mimes become its food, / And the angels sob at vermin fangs / In human gore imbued."

Answer: The Conqueror Worm

20. Identify the following about the recent appearance of a disease in Canada FTPE.

A. [10] Canadian officials reported on May 20th that an 8-year-old cow was discovered to carry this prion-induced disease, known as Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease in humans.

Answer: Mad Cow Disease or Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy

B. [10] The cow, slaughtered on January 31st, was discovered on a farm near Cardston in this largely rural province, which controls 60% of Canadian cattle production.

Answer: Alberta

C. [10] Almost immediately after the disease was reported, shares in this company fell by \$1.02, or 5.6 percent.

Answer: McDonald's

21. Given a quote for which he is famous, name the architect FTPE.

A. [10] Though the quote "Form follows function" is often associated with Walter Gropius, it was actually spoken by this partner of Louis Sullivan.
