1. This equation is used to determine lipid solubility in various regions of the digestive tract, and the ratio of bicarbonate ion to carbon dioxide is an approximation which can be used to determine the acidity of blood. Derived from the equation for the equilibrium constant of a weak monoprotic acid, it can be stated as pH minus pKa equals $\log$ A-minus over HA. For 10 points - name this equation which gives a quantitative interpretation of buffer solutions.
Answer: Henderson-Hasselbach equation
2. Although [pan-FEE-lo de NARV-ez] Pánfilo de Nárvaez entered its namesake bay in the 1520 s, it did not thrive as a city until the Civil War. Although it was known as a fishing center then, its Ybor City is home to a thriving cigar industry. Also home to the University of South Florida - for 10 points - name this seat of Hillsborough County, Florida, whose metropolitan area includes St. Petersburg and Clearwater.
Answer: Tampa
3. A [Yan-ush Glo-VAHTSK-ee] Janusz Glowacki play detailing the travails of three homeless men trying to bury their friend places this character in New York. She appears as a principal character in Euripides' Phoenician Women, and at the end of Aeschylus' Seven Against Thebes. Also appearing as the title character of a Jean (ahn-WHEEL) Anouilh play and also an installment of the Theban Trilogy - for 10 points - name this subject of a Sophocles tragedy, who is sentenced to death by Creon for burying Polynices.
Answer: Antigone
4. He gave his son-in-law, Baldwin Ironarm, control of Flanders as a buffer for his frontiers. He was defeated at Andernach by Louis III, the Young, in 875, but in the same year, an expedition into Italy resulted in his being crowned Holy Roman Emperor, a title he maintained for two years. For 10 points - name this son of Louis the Pious, who received the Western Frankish kingdom per the Treaty of Verdun.
Answer: Charles II or Charles the Bald
5. Written in response to a 1997 bestseller by Robert Bork, the author visits Las Vegas, attends a swingers convention and a pro fat acceptance conference. Attacking what he considers "rightwing virtuecrats" such as William Bennett and Laura Schlessinger, he rather enjoys his forays into the freedom to take part in each of the seven deadly sins. For ten points, name this new book by sex columnist Dan Savage.
Answer: Skipping Towards Gomorrah: The Seven Deadly Sins and the Pursuit of Happiness in America
6. In 1945, she was named one of Mademoiselle magazine's "Ten young women of the year," after the publication of her first book of poetry, A Street in Bronzeville. Appointed Poet Laureate of Illinois in 1968, she switched to conventional, yet confrontational poetry in such volumes as Family Pictures and In the Mecca. For 10 points - identify this winner of a 1950 Pulitzer Prize for the collection Annie Allen, an African-American poet from Chicago.
Answer: Gwendolyn Brooks
7. In the upper right corner, a head peers out of a church, and a man carrying a scythe walks toward an upside-down woman. A woman milking a cow appears on the cheek of the character in the left foreground, and the character in the right foreground holds a tree in his hand. This character, a man with green skin, stares into the eyes of the other character, a sheep. For 10 points - name this Marc Chagall painting, a depiction of his native town of Vitebsk.

8. Compared by Plutarch in Parallel Lives to Crassus, this Greek politician engineered a Iull from warfare during the Peloponnesian War that was eventually named after him. Although he opposed [al-cih-bye-a-DEEZ] Alcibiades' Syracuse Expedition he was killed after he was left to command it when Alcibiades defected to Sparta. For 10 points - name this Athenian politician, more noted for leading the peace party against Cleon and Alcibiades after Pericles' death. Answer: Nicias
9. His name means "one-legged" in Taino and he originally existed as mist surrounding the world. When humans began acting wickedly, he chose to flood the earth and start over again, becoming the wind until the water receded. After a violent storm experienced by Spanish soldiers was documented, his name entered European vocabularies. For ten points, name this Mayan creator god, the bringer of natural disasters as a measure of the gods' displeasure and the namesake of one as well
Answer: Hurukan (WA-ruh-CAN or UR-rue-Cahn)
10. The original voice of "Captain Planet" villain Looten Plunder, his career began with two TV westerns, which typecast him until the late 1960s, when he landed two big roles as a psychiatrist and an espionage agent. He won a 1998 Oscar for Best Supporting Actor as Nick Nolte's abusive father in Affliction. For ten points, name the actor who filled the eponymous roles of The President's Analyst and Our Man Flint, who died on November 18, 2002.
Answer: James Coburn
11. NP-complete problems on graphs are solvable in polynomial time by this algorithmic method. It can also be used to predict RNA folding by beginning with a single codon and applying structural rules to subsequent codons, and to iteratively calculate the $n$th Fibonacci number in linear time. For 10 points - name this method of dividing large problems into a polynomial number of smaller subproblems, essentially turning recursion on its head.
Answer: dynamic programming
12. Influenced by his time in Auschwitz and Buchenwald, his 1975 novel [sor-stal-an-SAHG] Sorstalansag, is about a young man's decision to conform and survive when taken to a concentration camp. His works reveal that "Auschwitz is not an exceptional occurrence, [but] the ultimate truth about human degradation in modern experience," according to the Swedish Academy. For 10 points - name this Hungarian author who won the 2002 Nobel Prize in Literature.

13. An IBM development project on a high resolution Active Matrix Liquid Crystal Display is named after this physics professor who published papers on specific heats of gases and thermal conductivity of crystals, but he is better remembered for an experiment in which he passed a current through a vacuum tube, causing a fluorescent screen to glow. For 10 points - name this German physicist who won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1901 for the discovery of X-rays. Answer: William Roentgen
14. Because Buoso Donati left his estate to monks, his relatives ask the title character to change Donati's will. Though he initially spurns them, the title character disguises himself as Donati to redictate the will to a lawyer, but he leaves the entire estate to himself. After driving the relatives away, he consents to his daughter Lauretta's marriage to Rinuccio. For 10 points - name this Puccini opera which features "O mio babbino caro."
Answer: Gianni Schicchi
15. This woman lost 34 family members at the hands of Nazi sympathizers, and even though she was a strong supporter of the Dayton Accords, her actions during the racial warfare in her homeland, according to Madeline Albright, resemble the actions Germany took in concentration camps during World War II. For 10 points - name this Bosnian Serb leader who is the first woman to be tried by the United Nations Tribunal at The Hague.

Answer: Biljana Plavsic (bill-ya-na plav-sitch)
16. Norman Rockwell painted her portrait for the cover of the May 29, 1943 edition of the Saturday Evening Post. Although she appeared in a photo for Lockheed in 1941, she more famously appeared in a series of ads for Westinghouse in the winter of 1944, wearing blue jean overalls and a red bandanna. For 10 points - name this World War II symbol of female empowerment best known for saying "We can do it!"
Answer: Rosie the Riveter
17. She voices Kayley in 1998's The Quest For Camelot and plays Lucy in The Horse Whisperer. After guest-starring as an ADA in two episodes of The Practice, she was supposed to replace Paula Marshall in a starring role on Snoops, but when Snoops was canceled, David E. Kelley cast her as the head of a Social Studies department. For 10 points - name this actress who played Lauren Davis on Boston Public.

18. Varian notes that this theorem's original version may hold in situations where there are no income effects. An example may be two neighbors, one of whom overplays loud music. The culmination of the [bain ham-metz-ah-rim] Bein Hammetzarim, which begins on the 17th of Tammuz, reading Torah is forbidden and a black curtain is draped over the ark. The book of Lamentations is read and normal prayers of mourning are recited as it commemorates the destruction of the first and second temples in Jerusalem. For 10 points - name this summer Jewish holiday, taking place on the ninth of the namesake month.
