As an additional hint, all may be found on adjoining pages of Samuel S. Hill's **Encyclopedia of Southern Religion**.

The first of the three, both alphabetically and chronologically, this Englishman was largely responsible for promoting antislavery ideology in colonial Georgia. Preaching a doctrine of holiness achieved through disciplined study of scripture, he founded what is today the second largest Protestant denomination in Georgia. He left the colony and returned to England after participating in one of that colony's first publicized sex scandals.

This preacher, a disciple of Jonathan Edwards, preached up and down the coast from Georgia to New England, and is widely credited with the backcountry revivals collectively known as the "Great Awakening." He broke with John Wesley over Wesley's rejection of predestination and became identified with a group calling itself "Calvinistic Methodists."
