## 1 USC A Tossups, Round 4

1. It was razed by Horemheb and Ramses II reused the stone blocks of its temples for his work at nearby Hermopolis. Built about 1348 BCE, its primary buildings line the royal way, but the royal tomb where Meketaton is buried lies to the east. Its importance, however, was short-lived; upon taking the throne, Tutankhamen restored the old religion and moved the capital back to Thebes. Located halfway between Thebes and Memphis, for ten points, name this city dedicated to Aten, capital of Egypt under Ahkenaton.

Answer: Tell el-Amarna

2. Give the shared last name. Buddy is the narrator of Raise High the Roof Beam, his older brother meets a woman in the elevator, who claims that she only "happened to be looking at the floor," and was not gawking at his feet; he later spins yarns for Sybil Carpenter on the beach before killing himself without waking his wife, Muriel. Seymour's younger brother thinks he's talking to Buddy, only to find out that he is really talking to his sister, who just got back from a date with the snobby Lane Coutell. For ten points, give the common last name of Franny and Zooey, members of a family created by J.D. Salinger.

Answer: Glass

3. It's highest point is Mount Chirripó in the Cordillera de Talamanca range. The Río Grande de Tárcoles drains the western half, while its eastern half is drained by the Reventazón river. Also On the Caribbean coast lies Tortuguero, named for the plethora of sea turtles, and in the west is Monteverde, a Quaker settlement founded after the country abolished its army in 1949, making it considerably more stable than its neighbor to the north. For ten points, name this Central American country, with capital San Jose.

Answer: Republica de Costa Rica

4. Madeira is allowed to impose non-uniform rates, while the Canary Islands, Ceuta and Melilla, Gibraltar and the Aland Islands are exempt. Begun in 1954 in France to replace the turnover system, it sought to eliminate the pressure of mergers when a good was repeatedly sold; under the current system mandatory in the EU a seller's liability is the difference between the taxes collected and the taxes already paid on the product. For ten points, name this system that incrementally taxes purchases used the UK, Canada, and most European nations.

Answer: Value Added Tax or

Answer: Venus of Urbino

6. First drafted from San Jose State in 1984, he played his first league game in 1987. A three-time All-Star, he was named the National League's Most Valuable Player in 1996. But his luster wore off in 2002 when he admitted to using steroids during his MVP season. For ten points, name this former Houston Astros' third baseman who died in October 2004 of a drug overdose.

Answer: Ken Caminiti

7. Shelly wrote of this event "as the whole nation lifted up its voice ... spies went forth," and the greatest devestation was caused by the 15<sup>th</sup> Hussars and the Cheshire Volunteers, who joined the attack after Wallace's cry "God armeth the Patriot" was taken up. Organized by Henry Hunt as a call for parlamentary reform, for ten points, name this 1819 massacre at St. Peter's Fields in Manchester likened to Waterloo.

Answer: Peterloo Massacre, accept anything about St. Peter's Fields and killing before it's mentioned

8. In "the Ledger," we learn Crystal steals post-it notes from *Happy Time*, while the protagonist, after the inevitable happens, steals a Mustang from Xavier, a man hawking a mini-guillotine for food processing. Earlier, the protagonist's sister Reggie had been stealing toilet seats and putting them in a trea as a means of coping with George's death when a toilet from MIR fell from the sky. For ten points, name this Showtime series about a bunch of reapers led by Mandy Patinkin's Rube that stars Ellen Muth.

Answer: Dead Like Me

9. In 1929, Ernst Schwarz examined the skull found in a Belgian colonial museum and realized that he had discovered a new spiecies. They are lankier and slimmer than chimps, and are the smallest "great ape." Primatologist Frans de Waal has extensively studied their unique social patterns. Non-related females form alliances through genito-genital rubbing, the only primate where this behavior is observed; their sexual conflict resolution also seems to allow food sharing. For ten points, name this amorous ape that shares 98% of its DNA with humans.

Answer: bonobo or pygmy chimpanzee or Pan paniscus

10. Born in 1904, at the age of sixteen he went to France in a work-study program, but dropped out to work as a kitchen worker and a boot-maker. When he returned home, he became a leader of the Kiangsi Soviet and, after a stint as the Second Field Army's commissar, became general secretary in 1954. Discredited along with Liu Shaoqi during the Cultural Revolution, with Zhou Enlai's help he prevailed against the Gang of Four. For ten points, name this man, who was until his 1997 death the most powerful man in China.

Answer: Deng Xiaoping or Xiansheng

11. Described and named by John Kerr in 1972, a cell becomes rounded because of the action of caspases on the cytoskeleton and the chromatin condenses. After the lamin degrades, karyor-rhexis occurs and the cell is phagocytosed. A part of its pathway is the p53 protein degraded by E6 is affected by the HPV, which can lead to cancer, although it serves a useful purpose in development, allowing webbed fingers to separate and lens cells to become transparent. For ten points, name this process of programmed cell death.

Answer: apoptosis [AH-pah-TOH-sis]

12. Formed by Rick Nielsen and Tom Petersson, this band started as the unsuccessful "Fuse' in the late 1960s in Rockford, Illinois and later moved to Philadelphia as "Sick Man of Europe." After an unsuccessful European tour, the band returned to Illinois where it took its current name. Their self-titled first album was a hit, but their second album, In Color only peaked at 73 in America. For ten points, name this band that made such hits as "Surrender" and "I Want You To Want Me" that Homer Simpson prefers over his own voice.

Answer: Cheap Trick

13. Hermans et al. were the first to use it to approach protein folding, while Nathalie Prevost has applied it to language evolution. It got its name in a 1928 paper by Heisenberg, and the idea

of using a regular array of bimodal lattice sites was validated when Kramers and Wannier used a two-dimensional one to calculate the Curie temperature. For ten points, identify this model proposed in a 1925 doctoral thesis by a German physicist to explain ferromagnetism.

Answer: Ising model

14. Taking place over the course of seven days, Narrated as a series of Powerbook entries, the story of characters who like flat foods like Kraft singles. Michael gets a flame that "[wails] on a chunk of code" for the e-mail system, and all of the characters live in fear of Bill. Once they finally tire of Microsoft, Todd, Susan, Michael, Abe, Bug Barbecue, and Dan set out on their own to form a startup called Oop! A story about computer culture in the 1990s, for ten points, name this Douglas Coupland work which sounds like it's about small peons.

Answer: Microserfs

15. A specialist of historical paintings and ivory sculptures, this Yale grad was teaching art tat he University of the City of New York when he became obsessed with a new scheme with industrialist Alfred Vail and physicist Joseph Henry. In 1844, his lobbying efforts for a prototype line between Baltimore and Washington came to fruition. For ten points, name this onetime artist who transmitted the message "What hath God wrought" on his telegraph.

Answer: Samuel Finley Breese Morse

16. His first book references *Pilgrim's Progress* and has chapter titles like "I Begin a Pilgrimage" and "An Approach to the Delectable Mountains" that showcase the slang he picked up while serving in a French internment camp for treason. After *The Enormous Room*, he got his poetic start in 1923, though, with the assistance of classmate John Dos Passos, in his collection *Tulips and Chimneys*, while further collections included *VV* and *Adventures in Value*, a collaboration with his third wife, Marion Morehouse. For ten points, name this poet, most famous for his dislike of capital letters and punctuation.

Answer: e e cummings

17. It lasted for almost 5 years. Though it was only supposed to use existing technology, automatic blood pressure and oxygen level detectors were created for it to enhance safety. Begun in 1958, it satisfied its simple goals using a modified Atlas missile: to orbit around earth and come back safely. For ten points, name this first series of manned space missions, which shares its name with the planet closest to the sun.

Answer: Mercury

18. He resigned from the army twice. The second time in 1862 after getting trounced by Stonewall Jackson in the Shenandoah Valley Campaign and being placed under Pope. The first time was after Commodore Stockton made him a major and General Kearny tried had him court-martialed for overstepping his authority in accepting the Spanish's surrender at Cahuenga Pass. President Polk set his punishment aside, however, and he remained popular enough to win the 1856 republican nomination. For ten points, name this leader of the "Bear Flag Revolt."

Answer: John C(harles) Frémont

19. Their animist religion reveres the bear, the avatar of Chira-Mante-Kamui. Their men typically have dark brown beards, and their women similarly had heavy tatoos around their mouths. Their epic is the Yukar and they are supposedly descended from the Emishi. In the 15th century, these successors of the Jomon were exploited and shunned by the Bakufu, who brought in thousands of settlers and smallpox into Sapporo. For ten points, name this indiginous people of Hokkaido.

Answer: Ainu

20. He was called upon while threshing wheat. The following day he was told to destroy the altar to Baal and construct one to God. Having done this, he led the Israelites against the Madian and Amalec tribes. After sending most of his army home, his men broke jars with torches in them, and blew trumpets, resulting in divinely inspired confusion in their foes. For ten points, name this Old Testament judge, namesake of a organization known for hotel room bibles.

Answer: Gideon (do not accept Gideons, we're asking for the person)

21. In apothecary weight, it is equivalent to an eighth of an ounce or 60 grains, but in ancient times was the equivalent of 66.5 grains. It used to be divided into six oboli, but when it became the currency of a newly independent nation, this currency name means "to grasp" was divided into 100 lepta. What currency featured the inventor of the Pap smear test on the 10,000 note and was, for ten points, the main currency of Greece until it was replaced by the Euro.

Answer: drachma
