Toss Ups

1. For the job, an undertaking of more than 900 pages, a syndicate of five men was formed, headed by Edward Blount and William Jaggard. The actors John Heminge and Henry Condell undertook the collection (*) of 36 plays, and the printing was done none-too-well by Jaggard's son Isaac. About 1000 copies were printed, and a second edition wouldn't appear until 1632. FTP, identify this first published edition of the collected works of Shakespeare, a major source for contemporary texts of his plays.

Answer: First Folio

2. Torvald envisions himself as the ethical member of the family, while his wife Nora assumes the role of irresponsible but pretty wife in order to flatter him (*). However, an outsider threatens to reveal actions Nora took without Torvald's knowledge in order to secure a loan and save Torvald's life. When Nora's act is revealed, Torvald repudiates her to save his own reputation, Nora declares herself independent and literally slams the door on, FTP, what 1879 work by Henrik Ibsen?

Answer: A Doll's House or Et Dukkehjem

3. Educated at Yale, he entered George Pierce Baker's workshop at Harvard in 1919 and his A Punch for Judy was produced there in 1920. You and I, also written while he was a student, played 170 performances on Broadway in 1923. His thoughtful approach to life is evident in such plays as Hotel Universe (*), John, and White Wings, considered by some to be his best play. FTP, identify this American best known for such plays as Paris Bound, Holiday, and The Philadelphia Story.

Answer: Philip Barry

4. Giovanni and Annabella are siblings. They're also lovers. She gets pregnant. To cover up, she agrees to marry Soranzo (*), one of her many suitors. Soranzo figures out it isn't his child and strikes out for vengeance, but he's too slow – Giovanni kills Annabella and Soranzo only to be finished off himself by Soranzo's goons. Exhibiting sympathy for the unlawful lovers, this is, FTP, what 17th century tragedy and best known work of John Ford?

Answer: 'Tis Pity She's a Whore

5. The title character is a former porter who has escaped from prison to an unnamed island. He convinces the superstitious natives (*) that he is a powerful magician, and they soon make him their monarch. However, as he becomes abusive and starts to exploit his new subjects, they rise against him. He flees into the jungle, where he confronts internal demons and the ghosts of his past before he is killed by rebels. FTP, identify this 1920 play, the first foray into Expressionism by Eugene O'Neill.

Answer: The Emperor Jones

6. He began his theater work in 1959 and by 1968 he was the resident playwright of the Theater of the Balustrade – a position achieved on the strength of works such as *The Memorandum*, *The Increased Difficulty of Concentration* (*), and *The Garden Party*. However, for the next 20 years he was persecuted by his nation's Communist regime before the Velvet Revolution brought him to power in 1989. FTP, identify this author of *Private View* and *Audience*, former president of the Czech Republic.

Answer: Vaclav Havel

7. She published her first novel, *The Glory of the Conquered*, in 1909, and a collection of short stories in 1912 titled *Lifted Masks*. The next year she married George Cram Cook (*), and while summering in 1915 they founded the Provincetown Players to put on their play *Suppressed Desires*. Two more of her full length plays – *Inheritors* and *The Verge* – were also produced in Provincetown before she settled there fulltime in 1924. FTP, identify this playwright whose final play, *Alison's House*, earned her a 1931 Pulitzer.

Answer: Susan Glaspell

8. Shen Te is a poor prostitute who is the only one willing to shelter three gods. In exchange for her kindess they give her a large sum of money (*). She buys a tobacco shop but finds that family, friends, and even strangers take advantage of her kindness. To save the shop, Shen Te begins dressing up as Shui Ta, her tough male cousin. Her neighbors become so alarmed that they put Shui Ta on trial for Shen Te's murder, forcing her to confess her ruse. FTP, identify this "parable in 10 scenes" by Bertolt Brecht.

Answer: The Good Woman of Setzuan or Der gute Mensch von Sezuan

- 9. The title character, a disillusioned white intellectual, is persuaded by Alton Scales, a black activist in love with the title character's sister-in-law Gloria, to support the candidacy of Wally O'Hara (*), a local reform politician. His wife Iris, an aspiring actress, leaves him to act in a commercial. Alton learns that Gloria is a prostitute and leaves her, she kills herself, and the suicide effects a reconciliation between Iris and her husband in, FTP, what 3-act drama by Lorraine Hansberry? Answer: The Sign in Sidney Brustein's Window
- 10. Peribáñez and the Commander of Ocaña; The King, the Greatest Alcalde; All Citizens and Soldiers; The Knight from Olmedo; The Gardener's Dog; Across the Bridge, Juana; The Lady Nit-Wit (*); The Girl with the Jug; and The King and the Farmer are English titles of some of his better known works. In 1609 he added The New Art of Writing Plays, which provides a bridge and key to his works. FTP, identify this dramatist of the Spanish Golden Age, whose 500 extant plays are probably just a quarter of his total output.

Answer: Lope de Vega

11. He first turned to the theater in 1898 with *The Epilogue*, but various accidents prevented its production until 1910 when it was renamed *The Vise* (*). He then made only sporadic attempts at drama until the success of *Right You Are – If You Think You Are* in 1917. A demonstration of the relativity of truth, it anticipated his two greatest plays. FTP, identify this Nobel laureate best known for *Enrico IV* and *Six Characters in Search of an Author*.

Answer: Luigi Pirandello

12. Ben and Gus make small talk and wait. It becomes obvious they are hired killers who are waiting for their victim, whose identity they have not yet been told. The title object keeps arriving (*) and departing, bearing food orders the two men can't possibly fill. After rehearsing the murder, Gus leaves the room; meanwhile, Ben receives a call on the intercom ordering him to shoot the next person who enters the room. That person, of course, is Gus. FTP, identify this drama infused with comic menace, an early work of Harold Pinter.

Answer: The Dumb Waiter

13. Appearing professionally as an actor from the age of 12, between roles he wrote such light comedies as I'll Leave it to You and The Young Idea. The Vortex (*), his first serious play, established his reputation as a writer in London, and the first of his durable comedies, Hay Fever, appeared in New York in 1925. Also known for 1933's Design for Living and 1936's Still Life, FTP, identify this Brit perhaps best known for Private Lives and Blithe Spirit.

Answer: Noël Coward

14. He served as drama editor of Vanity Fair while a member of the Algonquin Round Table, and published his first play, The Road to Rome, in 1927. An anti-war sentiment was a recurring theme in his works, including The Petrified Forest (*) and Idiot's Delight. He won a Pulitzer for Abe Lincoln in Illinois, a play which ultimately led to his job as speechwriter for FDR. FTP, identify this three-time Pulitzer winner who won a screenwriting Oscar for his script for The Best Years of Our Lives.

Answer: Robert E. Sherwood

15. Mr. Hardcastle plans to marry his daughter Kate to the bashful Marlow. Mrs. Hardcastle wants her son, Tony Lumpkin (*), to marry her ward Constance, who is in love with Marlow's friend Hastings. Tony dupes Marlow and Hastings into believing Mrs. Hardcastle's home is an inn. By posing as a barmaid, Kate wins the heart of Marlow, and Tony evades his mother's grip long enough to unite Constance and Hastings in, FTP, what 1773 comedy by Oliver Goldsmith?

Answer: She Stoops to Conquer

16. The story centers on Beatrice Hunsdorfer, an impractical widow living with her two teenage daughters in a dilapidated house where she earns her keep nursing an elderly invalid. Both charming and abrasive, Beatrice is selfish like her elder daughter Ruth (*), who suffers from convulsions brought on by childhood trauma. The younger daughter, Tillie, is an eccentric outcast who earns respect by winning her school science fair in, FTP, what largely autobiographical drama by Paul Zindel?

Answer: The Effect of Gamma Rays on Man-in-the-Moon Marigolds

17. It begins with a bellman ushering three recently deceased people into a room: Garcin, a traitor to his cause; Estelle, a nymphomaniac (*) who killed her own child; and Inez, a predatory lesbian. Each of the three requires another person for self-definition, yet is most attracted to the person most likely to cause great distress. Their inability to escape from each other guarantees their eternal torture in, FTP, what philosophical drama by Jean-Paul Sartre?

Answer: No Exit or Huis clos or Dead End or In Camera

18. His serious plays, such as *The Strong Breed, The Road*, and *From Zia, With Love* (*) reveal his disillusionment with authoritarianism and his nation's society as a whole. His first important play, 1960's *A Dance of the Forests*, satirized his nation's romantic legends. Clever preachers were the target in *The Trials of Brother Jero*, pompous teachers the subject in *The Lion and the Jewel*. FTP, identify this Nigerian playwright and 1986 Nobel laureate.

Answer: Wole Soyinka

19. Although Nora Clitheroe is pregnant with their first child, her husband Jack ignores her pleas, goes into the streets to fight with the Easter Rising, and dies. When her child is stillborn (*), Nora loses her mind. Her condition prompts Bessie Burgess, an embittered protestant who lost a son to the rebels, to become Nora's caretaker. At the play's end, Bessie herself is felled by a sniper. FTP, identify this Sean O'Casey play which sparked riots at its Dublin debut in 1926.

Answer: The Plough and the Stars

20. Her story provided the plot of a 1674 play by Jean Racine and a 1787 play by Goethe. Earlier, she served as a key figure in certain Greek (*) tragedies: in the *Agamemnon* of Aeschylus, in the *Electra* of Sophocles, and in a pair of plays by Euripides – one unfinished and set at Aulis, one finished and set at Tauris. FTP, identify this daughter of Agamemnon and Clytemnestra, sacrificed to Artemis so that the father's ships would be favored.

Answer: Iphigenia

21. A battle weary Swiss mercenary fighting for the Serbian army takes refuge in Raina Petkoff's bedchamber. In response to his matter-of-fact account of the war, in which he debunks her fiancé Sergius' heroism (*), she ridicules the intruder's cowardice but comes to appreciate his honesty. After the war is over, the mercenary, Capt. Bluntschli, returns, Sergius marries the maid Louka, and Bluntschli and Raina agree to wed in, FTP, what romantic comedy by George Bernard Shaw?

Answer: Arms and the Man
