TOSSUPS

1. Konstantin Bakhurin supposedly wrote the scenario for this opera in 15 minutes while drunk, while Valerin Shirkov wrote the libretto after the death of <sup>the</sup> original librettist. It tells of rivals Farlaf, Ratmir, and Rogdai, and finally of rescuing the most beautiful woman in the world by cutting off the beard of the dwarf Chernomor. Its rousing overture is perhaps the only reason it is now better known than the same composer's *A Life for the Czar*. For 10 points, name this opera based on a Pushkin poem and composed by Mikhail Glinka.

answer: Ruslan and Ludmila

2. The speech of Agathon in Plato's *Symposium* is a stylistic imitation of this man, who visited Athens as an ambassador in 427 and introduced numerous new rhetorical techniques. Examples of his rather sing-songy style include "On Not Being," a less than serious demonstration that nothing exists, and even if it does, you can't say anything about it. For 10 points, name this Sicilian sophist, who along with Polus and Callicles defends rhetoric in the Platonic dialogue named for him.

Answer: Gorgias of Leontini

3. The story is slowly revealed to the horrified narrator at the Hotel Congress, Maple Court, and the Pink Palace. In the end, the title character chooses to take cyanide capsules with her lover, a mentally unstable librarian at Pfizer, because she cannot cope with the horrors she faced at Auschwitz, particularly sending her daughter Eva to the crematorium while being unable to save Jan through the Lebensborn movement. For ten points, identify this novel narrated by Stingo, written by William Styron.

answer: Sophie's Choice

4. Using forcing, Paul Cohen proved that this was not equivalent to the axiom of choice. Woodin formulated a consistent set theoretic axiom in 2000 which would imply that this hypothesis is false. Originally stated by Cantor and claiming that there exists no cardinal number between aleph naught and  $c$ , this is, FTP, what hypothesis that claims that there is no set with cardinality between that of the natural numbers and that of the reals?

answer: continuum hypothesis

5. On January 1 2004, this leader, who initially gained control of his nation in a bloodless coup in 1999, received over 60% of the votes of his nation's electoral college, more than the simple majority he needed to extend his rule until 2007. Opposition parties such as the MMA, a hard-line Islamic coalition, and the Alliance for Restoration of Democracy, supporters of two former prime ministers, Benazir Bhutto and Nawaz Sharif, boycotted or abstained from voting. For ten points, name this current president of Pakistan.

answer: Gen. Pervez Musharraf

6. The day before this battle, First Sergeant Bloss's company discovered Special Order 191 wrapped around some cigars, giving the Union Army foreknowledge of Lee's battle plan. Beginning near Dunker Church, the battle featured a struggle for the Rohrbach bridge by Burnside's IX Corps. It ended in Lee's retreat and was thus a Union victory, although Lincoln was furious at McClelland for allowing Lee to get away. For 10 points, name this bloodbath of 1862 that ended Lee's advance into Maryland.

answer: Antietam or Sharpsburg

7. It was denied in the case of *Keel v. North Carolina*, and Joseph Keel was not granted a stay of execution. This petition is usually granted in about a hundred cases a year, and can be supported by *amicus curiae* briefs. If it is granted, a lower court must transmit all documents pertaining to the case to the higher court; if denied, the lower court's ruling will stand. FTP, identify this document, which can be filed with the Supreme Court, with a Latin name meaning "to be informed of."

answer: petition for a writ of certiorari

8. One object with this name is a joint CNES and NASA satellite which has been mapping ocean surface topography for the past ten years. A second is a ship that sank at midnight on New Year's Eve in a film starring Red Buttons, Roddy McDowell, Gene Hackman, and Ernest Borgnine, while a third is the Greek national weather service. For ten points, give this shared name, whose first representative was the father of Antaios and Polyphemus.

answer: Poseidon

9. It opens with a poem calling for celebration because "it is fifty years tonight that God has saved the Queen." Many of its 63 short poems have no titles, but those that do include "The New Mistress," "When I Was One and Twenty" and "To an Athlete Dying Young." For 10 points, name this collection of poems about youth, death, war, love and loss, that was published in 1896 by the famous Latinist A. E. Housman, who hardly knew the title county at all.

Answer: A Shropshire Lad

10. It was discovered by Sir William Ramsay in 1898 while studying the residue left after evaporating liquid air components. It is present in earth's atmosphere to the extent of about a part in twenty million. It is present in the Martian atmosphere to the extent of 0.08 parts per million. It has nine stable isotopes but was not known to exist in compounds until 1962. Since then, compounds of this element have been made with sodium, deuterium, fluorine, and oxygen. FTP, identify this noble gas with atomic number 54.

Answer: Xenon

11. His *Wild Horses* featured a young director making a movie about a scandal involving a British racehorse trainer. The protagonist of his *Decider* was an architect with a young family who just happened to be redesigning a racetrack. *Longshot* tells about the biographer of another trainer. All of these novels were departures from form for this mystery writer whose

novels usually star a British jockey who just happens to solve a mystery. FTP, name this retired steeplechase jockey turned mystery writer, the creator of Sid Halley.

answer: Dick Francis

12. He never became his country's president and once opined that the job should go to the stupidest person available, a description that in his eyes neatly applied to Raymond Poincaré [PWAHN-ca-ray] who was president during this man's term as Premier. He had early been mildly disgraced during the Panama Affair and more famously used his newspaper the *Aurore* to publish Emile Zola's "J'Accuse" articles on the Dreyfus Affair. For 10 points, name this French statesman who was one of the "Big Four" at the 1919-20 Paris Peace Conference.

Answer: Georges Clemenceau

13. After graduating from the University of Chicago in 1936, she did anthropological fieldwork in the West Indies, which lent inspiration to her later work in dance. Her first dance company was the "Ballet Nègre," and she is now famous for the Performing Arts Training Center she established in St. Louis in 1967. For 10 points, name this anthropologist, civil rights advocate and "matriarch of the black dance."

Answer: Katherine Dunham

14. The first book written in this language, *Linguae Vasconum Primitiae*, by Bernard Dechepare, was published in 1545; the first book in this language to be translated into English was the 1988 magical realist novel *Obabakoak* by Bernardo Atxaga. An official language of the provinces of Guipuzcoa, Alava, and Vizcaya, its closest known relative is the ancient language of Aquitanian. For ten points, identify this language that is known as Euskara to its roughly 700,000 speakers in France and Spain.

answer: Basque (accept Euskara before mentioned in the question)

15. A young married woman who is often a mother, she is a crucial figure in Laguna mythology. Although the exact details of her story vary, generally she wanders away from the pueblo and has a sexual encounter with a stranger who ends up being a ka'tsina [kachina] spirit from the mountains. FTP, name this mythological figure who features prominently in the writings of Leslie Marmon Silko and in fact is the title of one of her books.

Answer: Yellow Woman

16. The name's the same. Shielding exerted by a plasma due to a balance between electrostatics and thermal motion. A temperature that determines how the heat capacity of a substance approaches the theoretical Dulong-Petit value. Along with Hückel, an equation for electrolytic solutions that improved upon that of Arrhenius. The unit of measurement for a molecular dipole moment. For ten points, these were all named for which Dutch scientist who won the 1936 chemistry Nobel prize for his work on X-ray and electron diffraction and dipole moments?

answer: (Peter) Debye

17. This native of Manheim, Pa. set a freshman record at his university with 1,365 passing yards in nine games. His sophomore season earned him the third-best single season QB rating in Big Ten history. He was suspended for substance abuse after seven games of his junior year, but came back in 2003 to lead his team to eight wins and the Alamo Bowl. For 10 points, name this new holder of numerous school records at Michigan State.

Answer: Jeff Smoker

18. Its author's other major work is a defense of himself on the charge of using witchcraft to kill a rich widow he had married. This work's protagonist has a major hair fetish, although by the end of the novel he is a bald priest of Isis. While he is kidnapped by bandits, he hears at great length the story of Cupid and Psyche, although in general he is more concerned with finding a rose to eat so that he can turn into a human being again instead of the title animal. Our only extant complete Latin novel is, for 10 points, what work of Apuleius?

answer: The Golden Ass or Metamorphoses

19. A district near the West Bay of Grand Cayman Island was given this name for its distinctive, jagged ironshore formations. A similarly named town in Michigan received its name either from popular reactions to its low, swampy, and mosquito-infested terrain, or from a German word for bright and sunny. New York has both a Gate and a Kitchen named after, for ten points, what mythical region whose capital is at Pandemonium, according to John Milton in *Paradise Lost*?

answer: Hell  
(do not accept "Inferno" or "perdition" or "heck" or any other equivalents)

20. Along with several other sons of Tancred de Hauteville, he went to fight in the wars then in progress in Southern Italy. In 1061 he captured Messina, starting a conquest of Muslim-ruled Sicily, which he ruled along with Calabria after the death of his brother Robert Guiscard in 1086. For 10 points, name this man who founded the Norman kingdom of Sicily and, after dying in 1101, passed it on to a son of the same name.

Answer: Roger I

21. Joan Osborne asks, "What if God was one of us?" in the theme song for this CBS television program, but in this show, God is not *one* of us but visits the title character in multiple guises such as a cute boy, a cafeteria worker, and a garbage collector, to name a few. FTP, name this fall 2003 family drama starring Amber Tamblyn whose title is reminiscent of a the patron saint of France.

Answer: Joan of Arcadia

22. The heroine of this novel leaves town in a blue satin dress and returns at the age of 40 wearing overalls and much wiser. The mayor of Maitland dies from kidney failure and Vergible Woods dies after being bitten by a rabid dog and getting shot by his wife. It is with the latter man, better known as Tea Cake, that the heroine finally finds the true love that she first imagined while gazing at a blooming pear tree. For ten points, identify this novel that tells the story of Janie Crawford and was written by Zora Neale Hurston.

answer: Their Eyes Were Watching God

23. His real name is Daniel Handler, but he attempts to maintain the pretense that Handler is merely his literary agent. All of his books are dedicated to a mysterious Beatrice, who apparently met an untimely, tragic demise. Horrible happenings prevail in books by this gloomy children's author who, although nowhere near as popular as J. K. Rowling, has developed a following of fans who can't wait to see what terrible things will happen to the Baudelaire orphans in each of the ten books in the series. FTP, name the author of *The Series of Unfortunate Events*.

Answer: Lemony Snicket

24. It currently contains religious inscriptions written on several hanging green wooden medallions that are too large to be removed even though this building is no longer a house of worship. It is also supposedly home to some priests who were interrupted celebrating Mass when their city was conquered and who will return to finish, if it is ever reconquered from Islam. Anthemius and Isidorus were the architects appointed by Justinian to build, for 10 points, what domed former church and mosque of Istanbul?

answer: Hagia Sophia or San Sofia or St. Sophia or Santa Sofia or Ayasofya or The Church of the Holy Wisdom

25. She was converted by her first husband Robert, a Pentecostal minister, and began to hold her own revivals in Rhode Island in 1910. She later moved to Los Angeles, where she founded a Bible college, evangelistic association, and radio station featuring popular broadcasts of her sermons from the Angelus Temple, a 5300-seat auditorium which she opened in 1923. For ten points, name this founder of the International Church of the Foursquare Gospel who may have staged her own kidnapping in 1926.

answer: Aimee Semple McPherson

26. After failing the scholar examination five times, this Hakka rebel sought the spiritual tutelage of Issachar Roberts, a Christian missionary. After studying Christianity, he became convinced that a dream had told him he was the younger brother of Jesus Christ, and so, along with Feng Yunshan, he founded a new religious sect, the God Worshippers, which ultimately developed into a revolutionary movement against the Qing dynasty. For ten points, name this leader of the Taiping Rebellion.

answer: Hong Xiuquan

27. The Src (pron. SARK) and Abl (ABLE) oncogenes are examples of this class of proteins. Growth-factor receptors, such as the insulin receptor, usually incorporate the tyrosine-targeting subfamily. Other subfamilies include the mitogen-activated-protein and cyclin-dependent varieties. The action of these proteins is opposed by phosphatases. FTP, identify this class of proteins that add phosphate groups to other proteins.

answer: kinases (accept receptor tyrosine kinases until they're mentioned)

28. Though the charges filed against this West Point graduate were fairly mild, including adultery and possession of pornography on a government computer, he was detained for 76 days in solitary confinement with leg irons and manacles. He was originally suspected of being part



of an espionage ring due to his association with Airman Ahmad al-Halabi and other detainees at Guantanamo Bay. FTP, identify <sup>this</sup> former Muslim chaplain.

answer: Captain James Joseph (Yousef) Yee

29. This linguistic theory is at odds with the general American practice of not teaching foreign languages until children are in their teens. Its proponents include Noam Chomsky and Ray Jackendoff. Genie, a "wild child" who no one spoke to on a regular basis until she reached age 13, is used as an example to prove their point. FTP, name this theory, which posits that children can acquire languages much more easily when they are younger.

Answer: Critical Period Hypothesis

30. John Sulston completed the cell lineage for this organism in 1983, a task simplified by this organism's invariant size of 959 cells. The first multicellular organism to have its genome fully sequenced, it is sexually dimorphic, with self-fertilizing hermaphrodites as the heterogametic sex. FTP, name this model organism, a 1mm-long nematode.

answer: Caenorhabditis elegans
