## TOSSUPS

1. A conversion to Pietism in 1846 left him confident and a subsequent critic remarked that he believed in a God who agreed with him on all issues. His early political activism included contributing to the *Kreuzzeitung* with Ernst von Gerlach and his reactionary politics made him a favorite of Frederick William IV. He opposed an alliance with Austria and in 1862 he moved to Paris as an ambassador. For 10 points, name this editor of the "Ems Telegram" that helped bring about the Franco-Prussian War and who was the first Chancellor of Germany.

Answer: Otto von Bismarck

2. His operas include *Aleko* based on Pushkin's poem *Tsygany*, *Esmeralda* based on Hugo's *Notre Dame de Paris*, and the early one-act work *Monna Vanna*. His choral works include *Deus Meus* a motet for six-part mixed chorus; *Three Russian Songs* consisting of "Over the river", "Oh Vanka", and "Powder and paint"; and *The Bells* based on a translation of Poe. For 10 points, name this composer of *Isle of the Dead* and *Rhapsody on a theme by Paganini*.

Answer: Sergei Rachmaninoff

3. The manuscript that comprises this short story is prefaced by the note that it explains the delay of an Allied offensive during WWI. When the main character realizes he has been discovered, he flees to Ashgrove, where he discovers that the title entity is actually the novel of Ts'ui Pen. While discussing the nature of time with Dr. Stephen Albert, the protagonist realizes that Captain Madden is about to arrest him. The spy Yu Tsun then murders Albert and is arrested for spying. FTP, identify this short story about a kind of mental labyrinth, written by Jorge Luis Borges.

Answer: The Garden of Forking Paths

4. George Plimpton once described the granitic main islands of this republic as "a section of Maine [that] had been dropped into the tropical Indian Ocean." Composed of two groups of islands, the central 40 islands are rocky with a narrow coastal strip and central hills while the 70 outer islands are flat and coralline. The largest island, Mahé, holds the capital city of Victoria. FTP, name this nation, whose president, France Albert Rene, has served since 1977.

Answer: Republic of Seychelles

5. Palindromes and balanced parentheses are canonical examples of these. The languages accepted by all Finite Automata and Pushdown Automata are in this class. Most notably the syntax of almost all programming languages is in this class of languages. However, the languages accepted by Turing Machines are not. FTP, what is this class of languages invented by Noam Chomsky in a failed attempt to represent the syntax of natural languages?

Answer: Context-Free Languages

6. Among his lesser known accomplishments is as the lead singer of the band Ugly Rumours. He only became interested in politics after his father suffered a stroke while campaigning for a Conservative seat in Parliament. First winning a seat in Sedgefield in 1983, he later gained fame for his stance on crime as Shadow Home Secretary. After the man that appointed him, John Smith, died, he became the leader of the Labor party. FTP, identify this man, the current prime minister of Great Britain.

Answer: Tony Blair

7. Oliver Cowdery transcribed his work, but Egbert Grandin and Thurlow Weed refused to publish it. Grandin eventually did the printing with funds from Martin Harris' farm. Using two stones, Urim and Thummim, wrapped in silver bows and attached to a breastplate to translate, he was able to read the story of the Lamanites who became heathens and killed the Nephites. For 10 points, identify this man from Palmyra, NY who was visited by the angel Moroni and translated the Book of Mormon, and founded the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

Answer: Joseph Smith

8. This play features a parabasis on the theme of public interest, as well as a debate between Right Argument and Wrong Argument. The action is caused by one of the main characters' excessive interest in horse racing, which initially prevents him from an interest in education. The horses also lead to excessive debt, which convince the protagonist to send his son to learn sophistry, an idea which backfires once his son returns from the Thinkery. FTP, identify this satirical play concerning Strepsiades and his son Pheidippides, written by Aristophanes in mockery of Socrates.

Answer: The Clouds or Nephelai or Nugae

9. One of the commanders prophesized that the next night he would water his horse in the Tennessee River, but the next day he was shot in the back of the knee while directing troops in the Peach Orchard and bled to death. Though the Confederate army was largely successful on the first day of the battle, Lew Wallace found his way out of the woods and reinforcements from General Buell's Army of the Ohio arrived to help to victory Ulysses S. Grant. For 10 points, name this battle of April 6 and 7, 1862.

Answer: Battle of Shiloh (accept Battle of Pittsburg Landing)

10. It was once applied to understand a phenomenon that is better explained by the Coanda effect. It can be seen through a Venturi tube where the middle is narrower than the sides. Though it does not explain how an airfoil develops lift, it does explain why a shower curtain is sucked in when the water is switched on and how a perfume bottle sprays when the bulb is squeezed. FTP what is the name of the relation, stating that the kinetic energy over the volume, when added to the total pressure of a system, remains a constant.

Answer: Bernoulli's Principle

11. A pair of figures rest on the banks of a small stream while the village of Winchelsea is visible behind them. The title character is oblivious to the storm and double rainbow rising in the sky behind the village, and is separated from town by a field with grazing farm animals and birds. The title figure's poverty is shown by her ragged clothing and concertina for begging. For 10 points, name this painting of a visually impaired female by Sir John Millais

Answer: The Blind Girl

12. It is derived from a French word meaning "prevent" or "hinder," and the Good Parliament of 1376 produced the first recognized cases of it involving William, 4th. Baron Latimer. In the mid-seventeenth century, many chief officers of the English crown fell victim including Buckingham, Strafford, Laud, and Clarendon. In Britain, its most famous instance is that of Warren Hastings. It is only supposed to be used in the United States on accounts of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors. This is, for 10 points, what criminal proceeding that led to trials for Andrew Johnson and Bill Clinton?

Answer: Impeachment (accept other word forms)

13. His first works were anonymous political tracts in defense of revolution, like 1793's *Reclamation of the Freedom of Thought from the Princes of Europe*. His most popular lecture at Jena was on "Morality for Scholars" while other popular explications of his philosophy were collected in his *Guide to the Blessed Life* and *The Vocation of Man*. The latter work was a response to Jacobi's objection to his primary work, which attempted to ground Kantian philosophy with the concept of ego. FTP, identify this German philosopher, best known for his *Foundation for a Complete Theory of Knowledge*.

Answer: Johann Gottlieb Fichte

14. In this work, a milkmaid sings Marlowe's "The Passionate Shepherd to His Love" while her mother sings Raleigh's reply, which is emblematic of the author's devotion to the "via media", or middle way. Another episode demonstrating this moderation concerns a group of beggars arguing about how to divide a sum of money. It takes place on May 1<sup>st</sup>, and concerns the hunter Venator and his friend Piscator, and its themes were later extended into a sequel by Charles Cotton. FTP, identify this literary work ostensibly about fishing, written by Izaak Walton.

Answer: The Compleat Angler

15. It was originally thought to be the mythical city in the land of Ophir that supplied King Solomon with gold and it is also said to be the Queen of Sheba's capital. It was built by the Shona tribe around 1200 A.D. and derives its name from a Shona word for house of stone. It is located east of the Kalahari Desert and in between the Zambezi and Limpopo rivers. FTP, what set of ruins in southern Africa supplied the new name for Rhodesia?

Answer: Great Zimbabwe

16. He was assistant football coach at Northwestern and Purdue, and is a significant donor to Ohio State where he recently paid for a new band center. While working for the American Shipbuilding Company he put together a national championship team in the National Industrial League. Entering baseball management in 1973, he missed his first game because he had been indicted for illegal campaign contributions. Known for being controlling and difficult, as well as for stocking his team with super stars, he once called Hideki Irabu a "fat pussy toad". For 10 points, name this principal owner of the New York Yankees.

Answer: George Steinbrenner

17. Symptoms of it include hemihypertrophy and plantar hyperplasia. Also, people with this disease may develop subcutaneous tumors, lymphangiomas, and lipomas. It does not seem to be genetic, and there are only about 50 reported cases of it in the world. FTP, what is this disease often confused with neurofibromatosis that may have afflicted Joseph Merrick, also known as the Elephant Man.

Answer: Proteus Syndrome

(accept "Elephant Man Syndrome" before mentioned)

18. The Panjang and Mandai Hills border its highest point, Timah Hille, in the center of the island, but lower scarps like Mount Faber exist in the southwest. New towns like Woodlands, Tampines, and Yishun are pushing out traditional Malay kampong settlements which are now found only in remote areas. Bordered by the Johor Strait on the north which separates it from the Malay peninsula, it dominates the Strait of Malacca. Changi Airport serves, for 10 points, what heavily Chinese but largely English-speaking city state?

Answer: Singapore

19. Three researchers concluded in July 2003 that inspiration for it was received on July 13, 1889, at 9:08 p.m. It is a companion to *The Olive Trees*, and theories have been offered about the religious significance of the eleven objects which give the work its name as well as the ying-yang pattern at the center of the canvas. Painted at the mental asylum of Saint-Remy, this is, for 10 points, what famous Van Gogh painting showing the moon rising over a bluff and illuminating stacks of harvested golden wheat?

Answer: Starry Night

20. Founded in 1759, the company remains at its original location to this day and has a lease that ends in the year 10,759. It was credited with medicinal properties at the battle of Waterloo. The product is made from water from a spring fed by St. James Well in Kildare and barley roasted in the same method as coffee beans; the result of this is its dark color and distinctive flavor. For 10 points name this Irish beer and brewer that lends its name to a series of books that will have to beat out the Bible to feature as their own entry for the world's most read book.

Answer: Guinness

21. Like her mother, Erika has little luck in marriage; her husband Weinschenk is sent to prison for his business practices. Erika's mother, Tony initially loved the young doctor Morten, but she

is forced to enter into disastrous unions with Grunlich and Permaneder. Tony's brother Christian ends up in an asylum, while her other brother Tom dies after a fall in the snow. After Tom's son Hanno dies of typhoid, the lineage of the title family ends. FTP, identify this novel concerning the declining fortunes of the descendants of Johann, written by Thomas Mann.

Answer: Buddenbrooks

22. These objects were first used in their plug form by the French army in the Netherlands in 1647 and the first British unit to use them was Prince Rupert's Dragoons. Vauban introduced the more famous socket form that has been standard issue in most armies since the 18th century. Ones with triangular blades were outlawed by the Geneva Convention and now only the "sword" variety is used. For ten points give the name of this stabbing weapon that attaches to the muzzle of a gun.

Answer: Bayonet

23. It was designed by Thomas Slade, and John Lock and Edward Allen oversaw construction. Commanded early in her career by Augustus Keppel, John Kemperfelt, "Black Dick" Howe and Sir John Jervis, her current commander is James Burnell-Nugent. She received Battle Honors at Ushant in 1781 and St. Vincent in 1797, and was withdrawn from active service in 1812, but remains commissioned, making her the oldest commissioned warship in the world and a principal attraction of Portsmouth. For 10 points, name this flagship, most famously commanded by Nelson at Trafalgar.

Answer: HMS Victory

24. Originally classified as *Pithecanthropus* and *Sinanthropus*, they disappeared in 1941 during shipment to the United States for safekeeping during World War II. Discussed in a famous book by Harry Shapiro, they were discovered in 1927 by Davidson Black who determined them to be human. Dated to the Middle Pleistocene, these Chou-k'ou-tien hominid fossils were given the scientific name of *Homo erectus pekinensis*, but, for 10 points are more commonly known as what extinct hominid species?

Answer: Peking Man

25. Eighteen of the stores in this chain closed in early 2002, and two more closed in late 2002 and early 2003 as the company which owns Zany Brainy declared bankruptcy. Though stores in Las Vegas and New York stayed open, the fates of the remaining stores were less certain. In 2001 Right Start purchased, for 10 points, what chain of toy stores that began in 1862 and whose flagship store is at 59th Street and Fifth Avenue in Manhattan?

Answer: FAO Schwarz

26. In 2006, a mission titled New Horizons will venture to this object if funding is secured, hoping to reach it in 2015. Its plane of its equator is nearly perpendicular to the plane of its orbit, and it is perceived by some to be the largest object in the Kuiper Belt. FTP, what is this object revolving around our sun that was discovered in 1930, is smaller than 7 of the moons in the solar system, and is named after the Roman god of the underworld?

Answer: Pluto

27. He refused to believe that World War II existed, insisting that it was a conspiracy to keep young men from eclipsing the older authorities. Brinker Hadley laments that after this boy broke his leg, and after Leper Lepellier went crazy in the military, Devon School had lost two of its potential soldiers. FTP, name the inventor of Blitzball, smooth-talker and athlete supreme, and best friend to protagonist Gene Forrester in John Knowles' *A Separate Peace*

Answer: Finny or Phineas

28. This man, born on Halloween, 1961, directed mostly low-budget films throughout the 1980s and early 1990s. Many scenes from his movie *The Frighteners* with Michael J. Fox resemble scenes in his more famous movies that were made more recently. However, he was relatively unknown outside his native New Zealand until three recent films have been nominated for numerous Academy Awards and have grossed billions of dollars worldwide. FTP, name this director of the Lord of the Rings trilogy.

Answer: Peter Jackson

[10] Wieland's novel *The History Of Agathon* is considered among the first German examples of this literary genre, whose other examples include *Wilhelm Meister's Apprenticeship*.

Answer: bildungsroman

[10] Wieland's *Dschinnstan* is the basis for this Mozart opera concerning Papageno's encounters with the Queen of the Night.

Answer: The Magic Flute or Die Zauberflöte

A. (10) Name the man who delivered the Atlanta Compromise address and whose conservative policies conflicted with the liberal ideas of DuBois' movement.

Answer: Booker T. Washington

B. (10) Written in 1903 this is perhaps his most famous and most studied work. Name this book that describes African American life after the Emancipation Proclamation.

Answer: The Souls of Black Folk

C. (10) In 1940, DuBois' published this book about his ideas about his own role in the black-white conflict and the campaigns for African and African-American freedom.

Answer: Dust of Dawn: An Essay Toward an Autobiography of a Race Concept

4. Answer some questions about charged particle beams and coherent optical radiation For 15 points each.

(15) This type of device has an electron beam traveling in a straight line down the center of a wave guide. The wave guide is designed such that propagating light is slowed to a speed below the speed of the electrons allowing the light to be amplified. It is named after the Russian who predicted radiation from particles traveling faster than the speed of light in a medium.

Answer: Cherenkov Radiator

(15) This device has an electron beam traveling between a series of magnets with spatially alternating polarities. The magnets cause the beam to wiggle and high intensity electromagnetic radiation can be created at different wavelengths than standard lasers.

Answer: Free Electron Laser

[10] The last novel to be written, it takes place on Lake Otesgo and concerns Natty's youth with his friend Harry March. Judith Hutter also unsuccessfully courts Natty.

Answer: The Deerslayer

[10] Like Haggai, this prophet is concerned with the rebuilding of the Temple, but also offers prophetic visions of the Apocalypse, and describes the Messiah riding into Jerusalem on a donkey.

(10) These aquatic mammals are like manatees except they have a slightly different tail and live in Australia and the Indian Ocean.

Answer: dugongs or Dugong dugon

(10) There are eight species of these "scaly anteaters" in Africa and Asia. They have brownish scales made of cemented hair and they curl into a ball when threatened.

Answer: pangolin
