1. (piguy_bio) The structure of this polymer consists of molecules of N-acetylglucosamine alternating with molecules of N-acetylmuramic acid, both of which are cross-linked by tetrapeptides. (*) Gram-positive cells may have as many as 40 layers of this polymer, which is also known as murein. FTP, name this polymer that is the single most important component of the bacterial cell wall.

Answer: peptidoglycan (accept murein for early answers)

2. (jgaunt_alit) Deeply touched by war, this man wrote a number of books about the subject, the most notable of which was For Esme - With Love and Squalor. (*) He introduced the character Seymour Glass in his story, "A Perfect Day for Bananafish." He recently produced his first new novel in 34 years in the form of another Glass story in 1999, titled Hapworth 16, 1924. FTP, name this author who received critical acclaim for another one of his other characters: Holden Caulfield.

Answer: Jerome David (J.D.) _Salinger_

3. (tallpaul_bhist) This man was a prince of Gwynedd who was formally recognized as holding a more important and more fitting title by Henry III at the Treaty of Montgomery in 1267. (*) He clashed with the subsequent English king, Edward I, which resulted in Edward's invasion of his territory in 1277, forcing him to pay homage. After a couple years of relative peace, this man clashed again with Edward in 1282 in a battle that resulted in his death. FTP, name this man, the last truly Welsh Prince of Wales.

Answer: _Llewelyn the Last_ (accept Llewelyn ap Grufudd or Llewelyn ap Gruffydd) [note: Llewelyn is also spelled Llywelyn—be lenient on pronunciation]

- 4. (Maddog_blit) The novel begins in Green Heys Fields, a beauty spot just outside the city of Manchester. (*) The first portion of the book vividly portrays the horrors of English working class life, but towards the end it loses its edge as a social critique and instead becomes a melodramatic romance. Appearing the same year as the *Communist Manifesto*, FTP name this work by Elizabeth Gaskell that portrays England during the peak of the Chartist movement.

 Answer: Mary Barton
- 5. (kyle_flit) The protagonist in this novel is normally a peace-loving individual, but with the arrival of World War I, he must detach from those feelings (*) and fight for his native Germany. After killing Gérard Duval in hand-to-hand combat, he realizes that he had just killed a husband and printer, realizing that the French opposition on the other side of the trenches was not an abstraction, but instead was a group of human beings like himself. FTP, identify this anti-war novel by journalist Erich Maria Remarque.

Answer: _All Quiet on the Western Front_

6. (tallpaul_geog) These islands' governments were responsible to the Queen in Council until 2001, when responsibility for these islands, along with the Isle of Man, was passed to the Lord Chancellor's Department. (*) This group of islands does not have representation in the UK Parliament, and Acts of Parliament are only extended to the Islands by Order in Council after local consultation. These islands were once a part of land in France owned by the Duke of Normandy, and a later invasion by the English led to their inclusion among the English territories. FTP, name this group of islands whose largest members are Jersey and Guernsey that lie off the northern coast of France in a namesake waterway.

Answer: _Channel_ Islands

7. (piguy_chem) This chemical is commercially produced by first oxidizing ammonia to nitrogen dioxide and then dissolving the latter in water. (*) The 14th most produced chemical in the United States in 1995 at 7.8 billion kilograms, the end uses of this chemical include ammonium nitrate and phosphate fertilizers, nitro explosives, plastics, dyes, and lacquers. FTP, name this acid with formula HNO₃.

Answer: _nitric acid_ (accept HNO₃ for early answers)

- 8. (Maddog_AmHist) The first chairman of this commission was Joseph P. Kennedy, and its five members are chosen by the President and confirmed by the senate. (*) Unlike most other governmental positions, this commission's membership terms are not a multiple of 2 in years, as they are sworn in every five. FTP, name the commission that administers many of the most influential New Deal reforms and was created by the Securities Exchange Act of 1934. Answer: The Securities and Exchange Commission_ (accept SEC)
- 9. (Maddog_econ) One effect of the early acceptance of this curve's trade-off theory was that it made inflation more respectable. Inflation could now be seen not as the government's failure to control prices, but as the tradeoff we make for low unemployment. The curve was created in the 1950s (*) when its namesake economist examined the annual wage growth rates and the unemployment rates in Great Britain from 1861 to 1957. FTP, identify this curve, named for the British economist who discovered that there was an inverse relationship between annual wage growth rates and the unemployment rate.

Answer: Phillips Curve

- 10. (greg_ceurhist) It is sometimes considered the first integrated American fighting force, and one of its officers, Oliver Law, was the first black American to lead white troops in combat. (*) Members of the unit were of incredibly diverse backgrounds, with some being members of the Communist Party or even the IWW. They saw extensive combat in the defense of the Valencia-to-Madrid supply road but were withdrawn from combat in 1938. FTP, give the popular name for the American volunteer group that served on the republican side in the Spanish Civil War. Answer: Abraham _Lincoln Brigade_
- 11. (brian_religion) On his deathbed, the patriarch Jacob prophesied that this tribe would bear the line of Messiah.

 (*) After the death of King Saul, David took the throne, but only held control over this tribe, which happened to be his own. FTP, name it, the name of the Southern Kingdom after the division following Solomon's death as well as the linguistic root of the term "Jew."

Answer: _Judah_

12. (laura_psych) This psychologist studied groups of Native American children among the Dakota and Yurok tribes to formulate his theories on the influence of society on children's development. (*) His first book, published in 1950 and titled *Childhood and Society*, has become a classic in the field of psychoanalysis, describing the eight psychosexual stages of development in the human life cycle. FTP, name this psychologist who is known for coining the phrase "identity crisis."

Answer: Erik Erikson (accept Erik Homberger)

13. (kerrith_music) The narrator and titular character is an old man when the story begins. He brags to the youngsters of the village (*) about how he single-handedly defeated Napoleon on the Austria-Russia border, while Napoleon's wife falls in love with him. He travels to the court at Vienna, where he sees a "Viennese musical clock," depicted in the second movement of the suite. He meets the Emperor Franz, and returns to his home with his beloved country sweetheart. FTP, name this comic opera by Zoltan Kodaly (ko-DIE), which begins with a dramatic "musical sneeze."

Answer: _Hary Janos_ (YA-nos)

- 14. (greg_ceurhist) The third son of the founder of the Aviz dynasty, he became interested in trade after seeing the wealth being generated in Ceuta after Portugal captured that city in 1415. (*) He later became governor of the Order of Christ and used that position to fund expeditions that established Portuguese contact with the west coast of Africa and Brazil. FTP, name this royal patron of explorers who funded the voyages of Vasco de Gamma.

 Answer: _Henry the Navigator_ (accept Infante Dom Henrique)
- 15. (Maddog_Art) Located in the Cornaro Chapel of the Church of Santa Maria della Vittoria in Rome, this sculpture is cut from a single block of solid marble and is supported by a hidden pedestal and steel bars sunk into the chapel wall. The two (*) figures in the image appear to float upward on the clouds, and the marble is skillfully molded to portray their billowing robes. The angel on the left holds an arrow ready to pierce the title figure, who swoons in oneness with God. FTP, identify this sculpture of a Spanish mystic, executed by Gianlorenzo Bernini.

 Answer: _Saint Teresa of Avila in Ecstasy_ (accept clear knowledge equivalents)

16. (piguy_phys) Recent measurements of this quantity may lead to a definition of the kilogram not dependent on the Platinum-Iridium artifact in France. (*) It was originally determined experimentally in connection with blackbody radiation curves. To obtain agreement between the theoretical and experimental curves, the physicist for whom it is named assumed that the energy of an atomic oscillator could only have discrete values. FTP, identify this quantity whose symbol is h.

Answer: _Planck's_ constant

- 17. (kyle_misclit) His death in 1938 marked another blow to Czechoslovakia, as the nation this playwright sought to keep free was slowly annexed by the Third Reich. (*) Two of his lesser known plays, The Insect Play, or The World We Live In, and Power and Glory, warned of the evils of totalitarianism and attacked dictatorships. FTP, name this playwright, although a close friend of Czechoslovakia's first president, was best known for his play R.U.R. Answer: Karel _Capek_
- 18. (brian_polisci) He preached his first sermon at the age of four, and was licensed and ordained by the Washington Temple, a Pentecostal church in Washington, D.C., at the very tender age of 10 in 1964. (*) After spending seven years as James "The Hardest Working Man in Show Business" Brown's road manager, he returned to New York, where he had attended college. At that time, he served as a minister, civil rights activist, and frequent political candidate. FTP, name this democratic presidential candidate, harshly criticized for his role in the Freddie's Fashion Mart arson and Tawana Brawley affair.

 Answer: Al Sharpton
- 19. (jgaunt_math) Start with zero and then write down multiples of three. Then add four to each number and divide by ten. (*) In addition to planets, this numerical relationship also applies to moons that surround the planets. This law also led to the prediction of the existence of another planet between Mars and Jupiter now recognized as the asteroid belt. FTP, name this law which almost accurately predicts the distances of the first seven planets from our Sun. Answer: _Bode's_ Law (accept Titius-Bode Law)
- 20. (Maddog_asianhist) In 1956, he called for replacing liberal democracy with what he called "guided democracy," essentially giving himself more power. It took him three years to implement the system, (*) and all the while unrest grew in the extreme islands of the nation, leading to attempted military coups on Sumatra and Sulawesi. With his system in place, the economy steadily declined yet he remained popular with the ordinary Indonesian. FTP, name this first president of Indonesia, eased out of power by Suharto in 1966.

 Answer: Sukarno
- 21. (kyle_misclit) Many of these stories were not written in Greek until the 2nd Century AD, when the Hellenic Roman Babrius paraphrased these oral traditions. (*) Phaedrus also wrote these stories down a century earlier, but they have dated back as far back as the 6th Century BC. FTP, name this collection of stories that are attributed to a man who was supposedly a freed slave from Thrace and include "The Peacock and Juno" and "The Lion and the Mouse." Answer: _Aesop's Fables_ (prompt on Aesop)
- 22. (Maddog_geology) Years before he became president, Herbert C. Hoover and his wife prepared the first English edition of this text. Its author was originally a physician and his fascination (*) with metals grew from their medicinal use. Filled with Renaissance woodcuts, it provides an illustrated record of ore mining, processing, and the mine history of 16th century Saxony. FTP, give the name of this classic geologic text by Georgius Agricola. Answer: De Re Metallica (accept On the Subject of Metals)
- 23. (Maddog_mischist) Born in Nkroful in 1909, he attended Catholic schools in the Gold Coast and in his teens was an elementary school teacher. He traveled to the United States to study in his 20s, and became familiar with the works of Marx, Engels, and Lenin. (*) An outspoken supporter of Pan-Africanism, he helped organize the fifth Pan-African Congress in Manchester, England. Returning to the Gold Coast in 1947, he became the leader of the nationalist party, paving the way for independence. FTP, name this first prime minister and first president of Ghana, also the first black leader in post-colonial Africa.

Answer: Kwame Nkrumah_

- 10—At the age of 55, he first tried his hand at children's literature and in 1697 he wrote Tales and Stories of the Past with Morals, with the subtitle: Tales of Mother Goose. Its publication made him very popular and marked the beginnings of a new literary genre, the fairytale.

Answer: Charles Perrault

- 10—His more famous works include Mysterious Island, In Search of the Castaways, and Five Weeks in a Balloon. Answer: Jules _Verne_

9. (Maddog_ceurhist) FTPE, give the Napoleonic Marshall from clues.

10—This Marshall distinguished himself in the invasion of Russia and was appointed prince of Moscow. After defecting to Napoleon's side during the Hundred Days, he was defeated by Wellington at Quatre-Bras. Upon returning to France he was tried for Treason and shot.

Answer: Michel Ney_

10—Appointed Prince of Pontecorvo after Austerlitz, he was chosen by the Swedish Legislature to succeed to that country's throne. He changed his name, became a protestant, and ended up fighting against Napoleon.

Answer: Jean Baptiste Jules _Bernadotte_ (accept Charles XIV of Sweden, Charles III of Norway, Carl XIV Johan, or Carl III Johan)

10—He fought under the Marquis de Lafayette in the American Revolution, was Chief of Staff during the Egyptian campaign, and served as Minister of War from 1799-1808.

Answer: Louis Alexandre Berthier

10. (Maddog AsianHist) FTPE, answer these questions about ancient cities of Asia.

10—This city of the Ancient Indus Valley Civilization was located in the present region of Punjab and sat near the Ravi River. Along with Mohenjo Daro, it is viewed as one of the key cities of the civilization.
Answer: Harappa

10—For five and half centuries this city served as the capital of the Khmer empire, and was found by Yasovarman I, king from 889-900 AD.

Answer: _Angkor_

10—This city shared its name with the northern region of Mesopotamia of which it was capital. The first to rule in the city was Sargon, whose conquests ranged from Sumer to the Mediterranean.

Answer: _Akkad_ (accept Agade)

Government officials panicked, calling in riot police and eventually the army. On October 2, these law enforcement officials opened fire on the crowds, killing 325, wounding 2,000, and jailing or beating 2,000 more.

Answer: Tlateloco

10—Protests spawned in this South African town in 1976 after the government imposed Afrikaans as the official language of half of the subjects in school. Riots arose and spread to several towns, resulting in 575 deaths.

Answer: Soweto

10—This massacre resulted from a tin miners' strike in Bolivia in 1942. The miners demanded safer working conditions and more sanitary housing. When they refused to disperse, they were fired upon by Bolivian army troops, leaving hundreds dead.

Answer: _Catavi_ Massacre

10—A person suffering from this disorder experiences anxiety and excessive worry most of the time. The anxiety is not about any single life circumstance or situation, and it is unrealistic and excessive given the reality of the person's life. Answer: Generalized Anxiety Disorder (prompt on GAD)

10—This disorder is similar to Generalized Anxiety Disorder but is characterized by the occurrence of one or more unexpected discrete periods of intense fear or discomfort.

Answer: Panic Disorder

10—People with this disorder experience recurring and persistent thoughts and acts which cause them significant distress. Answer: Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder (prompt on OCD)
