- 1. (brian_religion) **Born to a devout Jewish convert mother and pagan Greek father**, (*) the apostle Paul called this man his "true child in the faith," as it is believed that Paul himself had no natural children. He is best known as first pastor of the church at Ephesus and the stress of the job apparently got to him, as Paul advised him to "drink a little wine for [his] stomach." FTP, who is this apostolic father, the recipient of two of Paul's epistles?

 Answer: Timothy
- 2. (Maddog_AmHist) In 1859, the state of Wisconsin championed this cause by overturning a United States Supreme Court conviction (*) that imprisoned an abolitionist for violating the Fugitive Slave Law. Proponents of this doctrine cited the 10th Amendment as all the justification they needed. This doctrine embraced both absolute state sovereignty as well as the strict constructionist interpretation of the U.S. Constitution. FTP, name this doctrine, the rallying cry of John C. Calhoun and later the Confederacy.

 Answer: States' Rights
- 3. (piguy_sports) In 1990, the Pro Set card company produced hand-numbered holograms featuring this trophy and inserted it into every 10th case of their football cards. (*) The subject of this hologram, a mirror-like, sterling silver trophy produced by Tiffany & Company, has been given out 37 times before the 2003 NFL season and is named after the man who coached the Green Bay Packers from 1958 to 1967. FTP, name this trophy that is given to the winner of the Super Bowl every season.

Answer: Vince Lombardi Trophy (prompt on Super Bowl trophy)

- 4. (Maddog_geog) This massive inlet stretches 680 miles across from Cape Pasley to Cape Carnot. Home to very shallow waters, its coastline is dominated by the desolate Nullarbor Plain, (*) creating massive cliffs with few safe refuges for ships from the violent storms that sweep up from Antarctica. FTP, name this body of water stretching from Western Australia to South Australia, a wide inlet of the Indian Ocean.

 Answer: The Great Australian Bight
- 5. (kerrith_blit) At first he thinks he's a bird, so he goes to live on an island in the river Serpentine. When the birds there tell him that he is a human boy, (*) he loses faith and can no longer fly, becoming trapped on the island. However, the poet Shelley sends a five-pound note floating down the river, with which the boy pays the birds to build him a giant nest to serve as a boat. He sails across the river to live in the park where today there is a statue of him. FTP, name this character, who played his pipes in Kensington Gardens.

 Answer: Peter Pan
- 6. (Maddog_archaeol) A student of early writing systems, he revealed his study of ancient sealstones in *Cretan Pictographs and Pre-Phoenician Script*. (*) While in Crete researching the sealstones, he stumbled upon a larger project, unearthing a palace that covered more than 2 hectares. This project led to the discovery of two unknown languages, one of which has never been deciphered. FTP, identify this discoverer of the Ancient Palace at Knossos, the man who coined the term "Minoan civilization."

Answer: Sir Arthur Evans

7. (Maddog_econ) By its very nature, this economic system was dependent on precious metals. Gold and silver not only served as an index of national power but also allowed countries to raise armies. (*) If a country did not have reserves of such metals within its territories, the only way to accumulate them was through a favorable balance of trade. This desire led to governmental policies that favored the production of lots of cheap exports, such as low wages and child labor. FTP, name this economic system focused on national self-suffiency, the dominant system in Europe from the 16th to 18th centuries.

Answer: _mercantilism_

8. (jgaunt_alit) His family has been a well-to-do clan in Minnesota for three generations, but he longed for a more exciting life. After fighting in the Great War, (*) he settles down in Long Island, hoping to get involved in the bond

market. Disgusted by the affairs of his cousin's husband, he finds solace in the man who represents everything which he scorns, yet is great nonetheless. FTP, name this narrator of *The Great Gatsby*, the cousin of Daisy Buchanan. Answer: Nick Carraway (accept either name)

- 9. (jlive_phys) **Her mathematical assistant, Samuel König, had been a student of Maupertuis, which might explain her early support of Newtonianism.** (*) She even helped her lover Voltaire with his *Elements of the Philosophy of Newton*. But she later supported Leibniz's ideas in her work, *Institutions of Physics*, published in 1740. FTP, identify this woman, the only person thus far to translate Newton's *Principia* into French.

 Answer: Madame du Chatelet
- 10. (Maddog_misclit) In this 1521 work, the author was one of the first to give politics and war a functional unity, with war serving as the instrument of politics, an idea adopted by Clausewitz. (*) The author also proposes the return of the Roman legion as the dominant battlefield formation. FTP, name this Renaissance-era war treatise by Niccolo Machiavelli, with a name you've probably heard before.

 Answer: *The Art of War*
- 11. (Maddog_AmHist) **Started in 1869 by tailors from Philadelphia and led by Uriah Stephens, it was a secretive group until 1878,** (*) when it reached a national scope. It accepted women, blacks, and employers, and the only professions disallowed membership were lawyers, gamblers, and stockholders. FTP, name this immensely powerful labor union responsible for many successful railroad strikes, yet grossly weakened by the failure of the Missouri Pacific Railroad Strike and perhaps unjustly blamed for the Haymarket Square riot.

 Answer: Knights of Labor
- 12. (piguy_chem) Its name is derived from the Greek for acid-forming, because it was once thought to be a part of all acids. (*) Discovered simultaneously and relatively independently in 1774 by Joseph Priestley and Karl Wilhelm Scheele, this element was first described as "fire air." FTP, name this gaseous element that is important to all aerobic cellular processes.

Answer: oxygen (prompt on O)

13. (Maddog_AmHist) It resulted in the ceding of over 7,000 square miles of territory to the United States, including the Aroostook (*) River valley, a heavily disputed region. It opened several waterways, including the St. John's River, to both involved countries, but totally ignored border disputes in the Oregon Territory. FTP, name this treaty of 1842, which is named after the U.S. Secretary of State at the time and the official title of British Noble Alexander Baring.

Answer: _Webster-Ashburton Treaty_ (Note: Baring was the 1st Baron of Ashburton)

- 14. (brian_religion) It became official Catholic doctrine after edicts by Pope Gregory XVI in the 1830s (*) and is now considered a cornerstone of Church teaching. It holds that Mary, unlike all other human beings except Christ Himself, was born without the scar of original sin. FTP, name this belief, which raises Mary to perfect moral status. Answer: _Immaculate Conception_
- 15. (brian_asianhist) Originally named Ma Sanbao, this man was a close confidant of Yongle and helped to put to action the Emperor's tremendous interest in world exploration. (*) As commercial activity flourished with the development of industry in the Yangtze valley, Yongle ordered a fleet of sixty-two trading ships commanded by this man carrying 28,000 men to sail south in 1405 in hopes of entering the growing international trade routes. This commander was a eunuch admiral who ended up exploring the rim of the Indian Ocean. FTP, name this admiral, who is thought to have reached the east coast of Africa.

Answer: Zheng He (accept Cheng Ho)

16. (kyle_misclit) **Born in the Hague, this Dutch diplomat and poet translated John Donne's poems into Dutch in 1630.** (*) In addition to his native Dutch, he wrote poetry in French, Italian, and Latin, and was collected in the 27-volume anthology entitled *Cornflowers*. He often engaged in dialogue with René Descartes during his several trips across Europe. He even composed airs for strings, but, FTP, who is the man whose son Christiaan dwarfed all his accomplishments by becoming a renowned scientist?

Answer: Constantijn Huygens

17. (piguy_bio) In its mildest form, this disease is called gingivitis and affects only the gums. In its most severe form, the disease is called trench mouth, named because it was common among stressed World War I soldiers "in the trenches." (*) The disease is a combination of gum inflammation and erosion of mouth ligaments and the alveolar bone that supports teeth. FTP, name this disease that occurs when plaque is allowed to accumulate, resulting in overgrowth of potentially virulent bacteria.

Answer: _periodontal_ disease

18. (kerrith_music) It is described as disorienting; impossible to discern what key the piece is in. Full of pentatonic scales, whole tone scales, quartile harmonies and multiple scale types, (*) it marks the beginning of the 20th century's escape from traditional tonality. As radical as the music was, most people were shocked by the openly sexual content of the poem on which this piece was based, and later by Nijinsky's suggestive choreography. FTP, name this Debussy piece that supposedly caused a riot in Paris when it premiered.

Answer: _Prelude to the Afternoon of a Faun_

19. (Maddog_Art) It was a massive undertaking, built in two phases, from 1705-1712, and then from 1715-1725. The architect, John Vanbrugh, (*) used symmetrical design and a heavy angular style to create an imposing look. The grounds were redesigned by Capability Brown in the 1760s, and ushered in a radical new style of landscape architecture. FTP, name this palace in Oxfordshire, England, funded by Queen Anne and Parliament to honor John Churchill, The Duke of Marlborough.

Answer: Blenheim Palace

- 20. (Maddog_asianlit) **This novel is unique in that each character is introduced by a three part name—a surname, given name, and then a style name.** (*) The story follows the quest of three sworn brothers to help the emperor put down the Yellow Turban Rebellion. After the rebellion is put down, the brothers struggle surviving in an era dominated by warlords. FTP, identify this novel by Lou Guanzhong describing a turbulent period in China's history. Answer: *The Romance of the Three Kingdoms*
- 21. (tallpaul_bhist) This man is commemorated by the 50 roads or streets named after him in the UK, his depiction among the Moonstones, two individual statues, and a statue of him, Matthew Boulton, and William Murdoch located in Birmingham. (*) This extravagant display of commemoration was based on his impressive contribution to mathematics and engineering, although he also learned the trades of mathematical-instrument-making and surveying. FTP, name this man who introduced the unit of horsepower and received a patent in 1769 for his invention of the first efficient steam engine.

Answer: James Watt

22. (laura_mischist) In 1880, this man along with his brother Jacques, demonstrated that an electric potential was generated when crystals were compressed. (*) Prior to his famous doctoral studies on magnetism he designed and perfected an extremely sensitive torsion balance for measuring magnetic coefficients. He studied ferromagnetism, paramagnetism, and diamagnetism, and discovered the effect of temperature on paramagnetism. FTP, identify this scientist who died in 1906 after being run over by a carriage.

Answer: Pierre Curie

23. (brian_polisci) **He formerly served a term as junior senator from Idaho before his election to the governor's mansion in 1998.** (*) This Republican Idaho governor, whose focus issues are education and the environment, has developed a reputation as a likable, freewheeling conservative. FTP, name this Idaho governor who was elected to the chair of the National Governors' Association in 2003.

Answer: Dirk Kempthorne

1. (Maddog_asianhist) Because I've always had a thing for *Quotations of Chairman Mao*, FTPE, identify these leaders of Communist China.

10—In October 1949, this man became the first premier of the Communist regime and held the post until 1976. He also held the post of foreign minister, and in 1972 he signed the Shanghai Communique with Richard Nixon.

Answer: Zhou Enlai (accept Chou Enlai)

10—Long time defense minister and hand picked successor of Chairman Mao, he led a plot to assassinate the Chairman. After the plot was discovered, he and his family died in a plane crash while fleeing to the Soviet Union. Answer: Lin Biao (accept Lin Paio)

10—Purged from office by the Gang of Four in 1976, he returned as Vice Premier in 1977 and was in firm control of the government by the next year. He was the de facto ruler for two decades, and after he died in 1997 power was smoothly shifted to Jiang Zemin.

Answer: _Deng Xiaoping_

10—Durer created multiple images of this Saint, the author of the *Vulgate Bible*, the standard in the Roman Catholic Church for centuries.

10—Durer revealed his belief in Lutheranism with this diptych, donated to the city of Nuremburg. The four title figures are dressed in luxuriant robes and long inscriptions at the bottom of the painting warn viewers not to fall victim to false prophets.

Answer: The _Four Apostles_ (Accept "The Four Holy Men")

10—This Durer woodcut is based upon figures from Revelations 6: 1-8. It portrays mounted horsemen trampling civilians while an angel floats above.

Answer: The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse

5. (Maddog mischist) For the stated number of points, name the Chilean Dictator or would-be dictator.

5—He rose to become commander and chief of the armed forces under Salvador Allende, eventually leading a U.S.-backed coup in 1974. He is known for his numerous human rights violations.

Answer: Agusto Pinochet

10—The illegitimate son of an Irish born Spanish governor of Chile, he fought in the revolutions of 1810 and 1813. Fleeing the country in 1814, he returned in 1817 with the help of Argentinean freedom fighter Jose de San Marti and defeated the Spanish, becoming the supreme dictator of independent Chile. Answer: Bernardo O'Higgins

15—Member of the Chilean National Assembly from 1870-1878, he also served as Ambassador to Argentina and Interior Minister. Lawfully elected president in 1886, he lost the support of the Assembly in 1891 and attempted to install himself as dictator. Civil War erupted and he committed suicide.

Answer: Jose Manuel Balmaceda

10—This is the minimum kinetic energy that the reacting molecules must possess to overcome the repulsions between their electron clouds when they collide.

10—The activation energy represents the energy difference between the reactants and this state, which is the highest-energy state in a molecular collision that leads to a reaction. Name this state.
