## Tossups

- 1. (Maddog\_AmHist) Captured fraudulently flying the United States flag while supplying rebel Cubans with arms, this ship (\*) was captured by the *Tornado* of the Spanish Navy on October 31, 1873. The Spanish executed the ship's Captain, Joseph Fry, as well as 52 members of the crew and passengers, many of whom were Americans, nearly leading to war. Spain ended up paying the United States an indemnity of \$80,000 as a result of the incident involving this ship. FTP, name this ship, which came to name the affair between Spain and the United States it caused. Answer: *Virginius*
- 2. (kerrith\_music) **He may be the most prolific composer of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, with nearly 600 pieces** (\*)—not counting some 200 pieces of early work that he destroyed. This composer believes "atonality is against nature;" his influences include Indian, Japanese and Armenian music and mysticism. His most popular work, *Symphony No. 2* "*Mysterious Mountain*," has Bach-like fugues, while another of his symphonic pieces uses recordings of whale song. FTP, name this American composer.

Answer: Alan \_Hovhaness\_

3. (jlive\_philo) Bertrand Russell joked that Christine Ladd-Franklin professed to believe in this but was surprised that no one else did. (\*) Closely related to skepticism, it arises from an apparent impossibility of connecting internal states to an external world. FTP, identify this philosophical theory asserting that only a single mind and its experiences exist.

Answer: \_solipsism\_

4. (brian\_religion) **Yathrib was renamed in the year 622 AD as a result of this event.** (\*) The year 622 was crucial for the development of Islam; at that time, merchants and power-brokers grew very impatient with the emergence of Mohammed and his followers as a new religious force in Mecca and persecuted them severely, forcing them to the rival city of Medina. FTP, what is the Arabic-Islamic term for this flight to Medina, avenged when Mohammed conquered Mecca in 630?

Answer: \_hegira\_ (accept hijira)

- 5. (laura\_psych) This doctrine originated with the work of John B. Watson in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, who argued for a methodology that was a substantial break from the (\*) psychology of the time, which used the method of introspection. One of its principles is that the material world is the ultimate reality. It teaches that man is nothing more than a machine, and is the root of sociobiology. FTP, name this branch of psychology that allows man to be studied objectively and is now associated strongly with B.F. Skinner.

  Answer: behaviorism
- 6. (tallpaul\_bhist) An interesting event in this British historical period saw King James II toss the Great Seal of England into the Thames on December 11, 1688. (\*) This change of British monarchy and government occurred in 1688 and 1689 as a result of James, who had thoroughly alarmed his Protestant Parliament with his pro-Catholic policies. Parliament responded by conspiring to replace James with his daughter Mary and her Dutch husband William of Orange, both of whom were Protestant. FTP, name this peaceful change in government that featured the coronation of William and Mary as joint sovereigns and was succeeded by the signing of the English Bill of Rights and thus the growth of Parliamentary power.

Answer: Glorious Revolution (accept Bloodless Revolution)

7. (Maddog\_geog) **Rising as the Guanias River in Southeastern Colombia, it enters the Amazon 1,400 miles later at Manaus.** (\*) Itself a major tributary of the Amazon, the chief tributaries of this river are the Vuapes and Branco Rivers, and it is connected to the Orinoco by the Casiquiare. FTP, identify this river that forms part of the boundary between Colombia and Venezuela.

Answer: Rio Negro

8. (brian\_alit) **Best known for her poetry, this Chicago-based writer did publish one novel,** *Maud Martha*, in 1953. (\*) The winner of numerous awards, including a Pulitzer in 1949 for her poem "Annie Allen," she was named Illinois' Poet Laureate in 1968. FTP, name this poet, whose works such as *The Bean Eaters* depict the life of the black community in Chicago in the decades following World War II.

Answer: Gwendolyn Brooks

9. (jlive\_phys) One early difficulty for theories of this was Boyle's demonstration that calx weighed less than the metal it came from. (\*) This was a problem, since every metal was thought to contain some of this, while calx was thought to contain none. Air was thought to absorb it like a sponge, and early experimenters noted that combustion and respiration ceased when the air in which they took place was saturated with, FTP, what material theorized in chemistry and physics until Lavoisier?

Answer: phlogiston

10. (Maddog\_mischist) Winston Churchill said her journey caused, "more slaughter, more misery, and more ruin than has ever before been borne within the compass of a ship." Her greatest adventure started at 2:00 am on August 4, 1914, (\*) when Admiral Tirpitz ordered her to "proceed at once to Constantinople." With boilers bursting and four stokers dying from heat stroke and exhaustion, she steamed toward her goal, with the British not far behind. FTP, name this German battleship that evaded the *Indomitable* and *Indefatigable* on a seven day chase through the Mediterranean, finally arriving at Constantinople on August 10, christening the alliance between Germany and the Ottoman Empire in World War I.

Answer: Goeben

- 11. (Maddog\_sociol) Known as "The Bulge" in the United Kingdom, there are approximately 76 million of these in the United States, and six million in Canada. (\*) There are also substantial populations in Australia and New Zealand, with sociologists explaining them as the product of the sudden catching up of fertility after the end of WWII. FTP, identify this group of people born between 1946 and 1964 who are in their 40s and 50s by now.

  Answer: Baby Boomers
- 12. (brian\_religion) During the turbulent period of the Judges in Hebrew history, he is remembered as a rock of tremendous stability for the people of Israel, reigning twenty years. His social stability, however, was a different (\*) story, as he burned the fields of his wife's friends over a lost wager and lost his famous strength when his lover Delilah cut his hair. FTP, who was this judge, the subject of a great deal of artwork, who died fighting the hated Philistines?

Answer: Samson

13. (Maddog\_Art) Built explicitly for the automobile age, cars could drive right underneath this house, and its ground floor was designed to accommodate the turning radius of most automobiles. One of the epitomes of the (\*) international style, it was one of the last homes built using the domino construction system in which ferroconcrete homes were floated on six free standing steel posts. FTP, name this summer home 30 miles from Paris, the last Purist villa designed by Le Corbusier.

Answer: Villa Savoye (accept clear knowledge equivalents)

14. (Maddog\_AmHist) **Members of this group included Senators Richard Russell and John Sherman Cooper, Representatives** (\*) Hale Boggs and Gerald Ford, and former President of the World Bank John J. McCloy. It employed 15 lawyers, 12 staffers, and weighed the testimonies of 552 witnesses and reports from 10 Federal Agencies. FTP, name this commission whose results are often criticized, which met from December 1963 to September 1964 to investigate the assassination of John F. Kennedy.

Answer: Warren Commission

15. (piguy\_chem) An alternate name for this group of organic compounds is derived from olefiant gas, meaning "oil-forming gas." (\*) Thus, these compounds are sometimes called olefins, and are among the most important industrial compounds. This functional group also has characteristic sp<sup>2</sup> hybridization in its bonding, and the bonding between the two carbons that define this functional group appears as a peak around 1660 cm<sup>-1</sup> on the infrared spectrum. FTP, name this group of compounds that is defined by its carbon-carbon double bond and includes pinene and ethylene. Answer: alkene(s) (accept olefins for early answers)

16. (greg\_blit) It begins with its author explaining how in 1886, German chemist Louis Lewin published a study on the plant know as peyote. (\*) He goes on to describes how taking four tenths of a gram of mescalin allowed him to experience a new appreciation of his surroundings and suggested that hallucinogens might allow people to experience the world from the point of view of an artistic genius. FTP, name this 1953 Aldus Huxley work whose title was take from a quote from William Blake.

Answer: The \_Doors of Perception\_

- 17. (piguy\_bio) **Bateson and Punnett discovered this type of gene interaction when studying crosses involving the sweet pea,** *Lathyrus odoratus*. (\*) This type of interaction often arises because two or more different proteins participate in an enzymatic pathway leading to the formation of a single product. FTP, name this type of gene interaction that is used to describe the situation where one gene can mask the phenotypic effects of a different gene.

  Answer: epistasis
- 18. (greg\_ceurhist) Though Swiss by birth, he played a key role in the radical politics of the French Revolution. Despite a chronic skin condition which caused him to spend much of his time in the bath, (\*) he managed to establish the "Committee of Surveillance" and authorize the execution of captured "enemies of the revolution." FTP, name this Jacobin who was praised by his fellow radicals as a martyr to the revolution following this assassination, which was later famously depicted in a painting by Jacque-Louis David.

  Answer: Jean-Paul Marat
- 19. (kyle\_glit) **Napoleon's occupation of Berlin drove this man along with his mistress to commit suicide in 1811.** (\*) He spent 11 years studying law in Frankfurt, and during that time, wrote poetry and novellas such as *Penthesilea* and *Michael Kohlhass*. He is best known for his plays, including *The Prince of Homburg* and *The Broken Pitcher*. FTP, name the man who wrote *Die Familie Schroffenstein*. Answer: Bernd Heirich Wilhelm von Kleist
- 20. (brian\_asianhist) At one time, this man, his wife Motilal, and Mohandas Gandhi were called "The Holy Trinity of India." (\*) Born to a wealthy Anglicized family in 1889, he became a supporter of independence after the brutal Jallianwala Bagh massacre in 1919 and spent long periods of time in British prisons for his socialist and Indian nationalist views. FTP, name this first prime minister of India and founder of the "nonaligned" movement in world politics.

  Answer: Jawaharlal Nehru
- 21. (Maddog\_misclit) It is essentially several stories within one novel. One is the story of Pontius Pilate and his treatment of the Jewish prisoner Yeshua Ha-Notsri. Another is the story of the devil and his entourage—(\*) a man named Faggot, a witch, and a giant cat named Behemoth—wreaking havoc on Soviet Moscow. The third story deals with the title characters: an author in an asylum and the woman that loves him more than anything. FTP, identify this novel by Russian author Mikhail Bulgakov, a satire of the Soviet Union in the 1920s.

  Answer: *The Master and Margarita*
- 22. (piguy\_chem) Based on the tetracyclic androstane ring system, this compound has a side chain at the 17<sup>th</sup> carbon and a double bond between the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> carbon. (\*) Gallstones are composed mainly of this chemical, which is a common biological intermediate and is believed to be the biosynthetic precursor to other steroids. This chemical also plays an important role in governing the fluidity of a biological plasma membrane. FTP, name this compound, whose level in the blood plasma can increase with increased ingestion of certain fats.

  Answer: cholesterol
- 23. (brian\_polisci) He lived in Cuba until he was 15, when the Catholic Church started "Operation Peter Pan," which brought about 14,000 Cuban children to Florida in 1961. A Florida State graduate, he was elected (\*) chairman of Orange County in 1998, the first republican to do so, and three years later was appointed by President Bush as Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. FTP, name this Florida republican who now is running for the vacant Senate seat in Florida.

10—A product following this type of orientation will obey the rule that states the following: in elimination reactions, the most highly substituted alkene usually dominates.

10—In cases where there is too much steric hindrance, the Saytzeff product may not form. In these cases, a bulky base is prevented from abstracting the proton leading to the most highly substituted alkene.
