1. Some of its lesser-known signatories included Moses Fletcher, Digory Priest, and William Brewster. Written "in the presence of God and one another," it was meant to "covenant and combine" the signatories "into a civil body Politick," and its better-known signers included William Bradford, John Alden, and Myles Standish. FTP what is this document signed on November 11, 1620, at Cape Cod, the first political constitution written by European settlers in North America and named for the vessel that brought them there?

3. In one of this author's novels, Macon Dead Jr., nicknamed Milkman, has an Aunt Pilate who has no navel, and who is thus much feared. In another, the title character, whose last name is Peace, betrays her friend Nel by sleeping with Nel's husband. In yet another, the protagonist, who is raped by her father, Cholly, wishes for an eye color usually associated with a Caucasian ideal of beauty. FTP who wrote of these things in the novels *Song of Solomon*, *Sula*, and *The Bluest Eye*, a Nobel Prize winner probably best known for *Beloved*.

4. This concept was first presented by its Viennese theorizer in 1912's The Neurotic Constitution. It often manifests itself in overcompensating behavior, like being over-aggressive, to mask one's unconscious anxieties. Described by Alfred Adler, FTP name this unconscious belief that one is inadequate or even worthless.

5. Created by Mike Mignola for Dark Horse Comics, this supernatural superhero was raised by Trevor Bruttenholm, after being brought forth in the 1940's. He fights evil with his right hand of doom and giant Samaritan revolver alongside BPRD agents Abe Sapien and the fiery love of his life, Liz. FTP, name this shorn-horned demonic detective.

Answer:

Hellboy

6. He successfully commanded the Florentine militia late in the Pisan War, helping to secure Pisa's surrender in 1509, and was involved in the planning for the War of the Holy League. When the Medici were restored to power in 1512, he was imprisoned and tortured on suspicion of treason, but released due to a lack of evidence and retired in semi-poverty for the next 14 years. During that time, he wrote plays, poems, and a history of Florence that got him back into the Medicis' favor. FTP name this soldier and statesman, who would be forgotten today but for another of his writings, a work of political theory titled *The Prince*.

Answer:

Niccolo Machiavelli

7. The "Dance of the Reed Flutes" and a Pas de Deux are among its lesser-known components. Composed in 1892, it includes elements of many cultures, including the English Horn-driven Arabian Dance, the Chinese Dance and the very rapid Russian Dance, but the story takes place entirely in the home of one German family, where Clara dreams about a magical gift. FTP name this ballet, whose best-known sections are the Waltz of the Flowers and the Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy.

Answer:

The Nutcracker

8. This school of thought had its origins in a meeting at Harvard's bicentennial that included George Putnam, Henry Hedge, and George Ripley, as well as its most famous exponent. Eleven days later those men created a formal club to further American thought and letters and invited Orontes Brownson and Bronson Alcott, among others, to join. Concerned with creating a mindset that went past John Locke's empiricism, FTP this was what American literary/philosophical school most often associated with Margaret Fuller, Henry David Thoreau, and Ralph Waldo Emerson?

Answer:

Transcendentalism (acc. Transcendental Club)

9. John Russell Pope submitted the design but died before the cornerstone was laid. Its location was chosen based on a long-dormant proposal by the McMillan Commission, which itself was advocating the completion of Pierre l'Enfant's original plans over 100 years after the fact. A deal had to be struck with the D.A.R. to keep women from chaining themselves to the Japanese cherry trees blocking its construction near the Tidal Basin. FTP name this memorial, dedicated in 1943 on the 200<sup>th</sup> birthday of the U.S.A.'s 3<sup>rd</sup> president.

Answer: Jefferson Memorial (sorry, can't accept either Jefferson National Expansion Memorial, which is something else entirely, or Jefferson Monument, which is just wrong.)

10. Speaking of those Japanese cherry trees, their purchase was largely underwritten by Dr. Jokichi Takamine, who is credited with the discovery and crystallization of this compound, with formula C-9 H-13 N O-3. It has a short lifetime because of its fast degradation and thus cannot be administered orally. But it has a dual function: as a hormone – such as when it and glucagon induce the metabolism of glycogene -- and a neurotransmitter, which produces vasoconstriction, sweating, reduced clotting time for the blood, and an increase in the rate and strength of the heartbeat. FTP name this compound most associated with moments of excitement or stress.

Answer: adrenaline

11. For a few years before WWI, this poet served as literary secretary for William Butler Yeats. One of his first published works was his homage to a painter, "To Whistler, American," followed soon after by "Portrait d'une Femme." Still, it was as an editor and encourager of writers like William Carlos Williams and T.S. Eliot that his more lasting mark was made. After WWII he was imprisoned in a psychiatric ward for 12 years before returning to Italy to die. FTP name this poet known for his advice to "make it new", his authorship of "Hugh Selwyn Mauberly" and "The Pisan Cantos," or his cooperation with the Italian Fascists during World War II.

Answer: Ezra Pound

- 13. Its penultimate provision calls for an independent Polish state to include all "territories inhabited by indisputably Polish populations." The second insists on freedom of the seas in peace or war. The seventh argues that Belgium "must be evacuated and restored, without any limit to [its] sovereignty." The 12<sup>th</sup> calls for "the Turkish portions of the present Ottoman Empire" to remain sovereign, but all of its other lands to become autonomous. With its last laying the groundwork for The League of Nations, FTP name this document written after WWI by Woodrow Wilson.

Answer: Fourteen Points for Peace

14. The first of these events was predicted by an amateur English scientist named Jeremiah Horrocks in 1639. Attempts to use the 1761 instance to determine the measurements of Earth's distance from various objects were ruined by bad weather, but in 1769 worldwide efforts were coordinated by England's Royal Academy and included James Cook's establishment of an observatory in Tahiti and Jeremiah Mason and Charles Dixon's work in South Africa. Occurring in pairs eight years apart with 120 years in between, the most recent took place on June 8, 2004. FTP what is this passing of the second planet in our solar system between the Earth and the Sun?

Answer: <u>Transit of Venus</u> (don't prompt on just "Venus")

15. In the Upanisadic tradition, this term is used for the supreme principle or great soul of the universe. In traditional Hinduism, it could refer to a particular group of ancestors mentioned in the *Markandeya Purana*, or it could denote any especially magnanimous or wise person. Literally meaning "great soul," FTP name this title of honor, most associated with either a brand of rice or Mohandas K. Gandhi.

Answer: Mahatma

16. The title figure sits to the right of a framed drawing. A green curtain dominates the upper and middle left of the painting, and the figure's feet rest on a small wooden box. 22. One of the men used by the plaintiff as an example in this case was Patrick Chavis, who went on to become a Los Angeles Ob/Gyn who delighted right wingers when he botched a number of liposuctions before being shot to death in 2002. The plaintiff himself is now an anesthesiologist in Rochester, Minnesota, though in the mid-70s he failed twice to get into a mid-level state medical school. Finally, in 1978 Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell sided with both sides of a split court and issued an opinion which invalidated the UC-Davis quota program while also striking down a law barring race from being a factor in college admissions.
