1. He was introduced in the moralistic *El Burlador de Seville*, though a Jose Zorrilla play made him out to be a romantic hero. Also the subject of a Strauss tone poem, he is in Marena in a Dumas play, the title character of one of [*] Moliere's most controversial plays, and a hotshot in Hell in the third act of Shaw's *Man and Superman*. FTP, name this adulterer, title character of a Byron epic poem and one of Mozart's late operas.

2. Its founder, Col. M. Lewis Clark, leased the land from two uncles in 1874; it opened a year later. A new grandstand, with its impressive twin spires, was built two decades later. The Humana Distaff, the Woodford Reserve Turf Classic, the Open Mind, the Firecracker Breeders Cup and the Crown Royal American Turf are all held here annually. FTP name this facility located in south central Louisville, KY, that also hosts the Early Times Mint Julep, the Kentucky Oaks and the Kentucky Derby.

3. They're usually prepared just before use because of their volatility. Not only do they react vigorously with compounds containing active hydrogens, such as OH and NH groups -- in fact, they are so reactive that they are known to react with the moisture in the air. They are generated by dissolving an alkyl halide magnesium metal in a non-reactive solvent, typically a dry ether ethyl. Earning their French discoverer the 1912 Nobel Prize in Chemistry, FTP name these reagents that behave as carbanions.

4. It was settled by the British in 1627 and remained under their control until independence in 1966. Slavery was an important part of the economy until 1837, while the plantation economy, based on the cultivation of sugar and the manufacture of rum and molasses, dominated the country until only recently. The flag is composed of three equal vertical stripes, blue on the sides, gold in the middles, with a black trident head centered on the gold band. FTP, name this Caribbean country with capital at Bridgetown.

5. Orphaned at age 4 when his mother was murdered, he dropped out of high school to join the army. An MP in Korea, he served as chief of investigations for a hospital in Saudi Arabia from 1982 to 1984, when he was deported. In the 1990s he became a bodyguard to New York City mayor Rudolph Giuliani. In August 2001 he was appointed commissioner of the NYPD, a position from which he profited greatly. For 10 points—name this man, briefly President Bush's nominee to succeed Tom Ridge as Secretary of Homeland Security.

Answer: Bernard Kerik

6. Born in 1806, he made his philosophical mark in 1843 with his *System of Logic*, which was the most influential English work in logic and philosophy of science and language of the nineteenth century. He is also known for his clerkship in the East India Company, his close friendship with the married Harriet Taylor, and his brief stint in Parliament. His politics were radically liberal for his time, expressed in works such as *On the Subjugation of Women* and *On Liberty*. Name this philosopher who, for 10 points, expounded on themes of Jeremy Bentham in his *Utilitarianism*.

Answer: John Stuart Mill

7. It invokes the sphinx in the image of "A shape with lion body and the head of a man, A gaze blank and pitiless as the sun," the movement of whose "slow thighs" send the shadows of nearby birds reeling. Its third line was the source for the most famous Chinua Achebe title, and the author's earlier *A Vision* is invoked by the opening line, "Turning and turning in the widening gyre." FTP, name this apocalyptic poem by William Butler Yeats.

Answer: "The Second Coming"

8. His popular autobiography was entitled *The First Half of My Life*, and as he attempted to escape to Japan in 1950, he was apprehended by the Soviets and put into a prison in his native country. He then became a gardener and was protected during the Cultural Revolution. The puppet governor of Manchuria during WWII, he inherited his most famous position at the age of 3 but was overthrown in the 1911 republican revolution led by Sun-Yat Sen. FTP, name this last emperor of China.

9. The first experimental work in the discipline may have been Eratosthenes' estimate of the earth's circumference from observations at Alexandria and Syene. Distinct from cartography, which is concerned with smaller spatial scales, and from geology, which focuses on the composition, structure, and history of the earth, today it is primarily concerned with the three-dimensional measurement and representation of the earth and its gravitation. FTP, name this discipline that is not the study of rocks with crystals in them.

Yet the angel must hang!" This decision is made by Captain "Starry" Vere, so named for his intellectual nature and obsession for reading. The title character is impressed off of his previous duty aboard the aptly named *Rights of Man* to serve tragically aboard the H.M.S. *Bellipotent*. FTP, name this novel by Herman Melville.

12. As a 9 year-old he followed his father to the country he would one day rule following the 1807 French invasion. His father returned to Europe as King in 1821, but he stayed behind and in 1822 proclaimed an independent country. His reign was marked by the dissolution of the [*] Constituent Assembly, an unpopular constitution, rocky relations with Portugal and a bloody war with Argentina from 1825-1828. In 1831, riots in Rio de Janeiro caused him to abdicate. FTP, name this first of two Emperors of Brazil.

13. Between 1994 and 1996, 12 people in England came down with a disease caused by this cell malfunction. They work by entering brain cells and converting the normal cell, PrP, to the abnormal form, PrPSC. The latter then infects other cells, blocking cell-to-cell communication. The medical term for diseases derived from the defect is spongiform encephalopathies. FTP, name this protein defect associated with such diseases as mad-cow disease and scrapie.
